





COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

Your Commissioners herewith submit their report for the year ending December 31, 1915, together with the reports of the Sheriff, Solicitor, Clerk of the Court, Jailer, Treasurer, and Auditors, and the Superintendent, Physician and Chaplain of the County Farm, and a statement of the financial standing of the County at the close of the year.

Our Institution at Horse Meadow continues under the able management of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Phillips, with Miss Blanche Hemeon as nurse in charge of the hospital; Dr. E. M. Miller, physician; and Rev. A. M. Markey, Chaplain.

Their services have been all that could be desired, and we wish hereby to give public expression of our appreciation of them.

In our last report we made mention that more room and increased facilities were needed by both the Register of Probate and the Register of Deeds, and recommended that this matter receive the attention of the County Convention.

It had also been brought to the attention of the Commissioners that the vaults in the Woodsville Court House were probably not fire-proof, and this was also reported to the Convention.

A copy of the report of the proceedings of the Convention may be found on the last pages of this report.

The engineer employed to make the examination of the vaults reported that they were not fire-proof, and the Commissioners were authorized to obtain plans and specifications for making the necessary changes and estimates of the cost of doing it. This information was furnished and the Convention authorized a loan of \$10,000.00 to cover the cost of the addition and alterations as proposed.

The engineer's examination did not reveal the class of construction used in the walls of the vaults when they were first made, and upon removing the floors and ceilings it was found that the walls were not of sufficient thickness and strength to insure safety in the vaults, and the inner lining walls were removed, the walls of all

of the vaults were rebuilt in a manner such as is now specified by most reliable architects for work of this kind. This extra work and material cost \$688.85 and the \$10,000.00 appropriation was exceeded by \$357.65, as will be seen elsewhere in our report.

These enlarged vaults will provide sufficient room for the County Records for more than one hundred years to come, and we feel that the records are now secure from fires which may occur outside the vaults.

The addition to the Court House also furnishes a co-venient and much needed office for the Register of Deeds as well as additional room in his main office. No appropriation was made for filing cases for the enlarged vaults, and barely enough to provide for immediate needs will be furnished until an appropriation is available for the purpose.

We recommend that the next County Convention provide means for the purchase of this equipment and that the matter of new floor covering and new furniture for the Court Room of the Woodsville Court House be given consideration at the same time.

The Convention also provided for an appropriation to cover the cost of a new carpet and new furniture for the Plymouth Court House.

This matter has been attended to and a heavy linoleum was laid on the floor of the Court Room and all new furniture supplied for this room, and we believe these improvements are appreciated by all who have occasion to use the building. The County Farm property is in excellent condition and the inventory is larger than it has been before. This is principally due to the larger valuation of the live stock.

The herd of cattle is composed of Holstein and Durham, with rather more of the former and with a good proportion of registered stock of both breeds.

The statement of the financial standing shows that the surplus was reduced \$8,891.48, which is explained by the cost of the addition and alterations to the Woodsville Court House.

We cordially invite you to inspect the property of the County, and hope that our management has been such as to merit your approval.

SELECTMEN OF TOWNS AND OVER-SEERS OF THE POOR

Your attention is called to the following extracts from the laws of 1903

CHAPTER 42, SECTION I

Section 1. Any town or county furnishing any assistance to any person within six years preceding his death shall be entitled to recover from the estate of such persons the sum or sums paid out for such assistance, the said claim to be a preferred claim against his said estate after the payment of funeral charges, expense of last sickness and expenses of administration, provided he leaves no widow or minor children living at his decease.

CHAPTER 106, SECTION 1, as amended

"Section 1. No town shall be liable for the support of any person unless he, or the person under whom he derives his settlement, shall have wholly gained a settlement therein during the ten years preceding the last date of application for support; provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he still resides in said town."

CHAPTER 110, SECTION 1, last clause as amended

"Also to Chapter 67 of the laws of 1903, Chapter 84 of the Public Statutes, Chapters 1 and 71 of the laws of 1907, relating to paupers, and the following from Chapter 110, Public Statutes, relating to 'assistance to persons in quarantine.'"

SECTION 1. Whenever any person or family is placed in quarantine by a board of health, to protect the public against small pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or any other dangerous, infectious or contagious diseases, it shall be the duty of said board to assist such person or family while in quarantine in such manner as in the judgment of the board may be deemed wise and necessary.

SECTION 2. All expenses thus incurred, or such part thereof as the board may determine, shall be deemed a legitimate expenditure for the protection of the public health and shall be charged to the account of incidental expenses, but not to any indigent pauper account, nor shall such expenditure be construed to mean a public aid to the person or persons so quarantined and assisted unless such person or persons are already paupers as defined by the Public Statutes.

ORA A. BROWN, Ashland, N. H.—Ashland, Alexandria, Bristol, Bridgewater, Campton, Ellsworth, Hebron, Holderness, Lincoln, Groton, Plymouth, Rumney, Thornton, Wentworth, Waterville, Woodstock, and present their bills to the commissioners at Plymouth the second Tuesday in May.

HARRY E. MORRISON, Orford, N. H.—Dorchester, Enfield, Canaan, Grafton, Hanover, Lebanon, Lyme, Orford, Orange, Piermont, and present their bills to the Commissioners at Lebanon on the first Tuesday of January.

ARTHUR C. CLOUGH, North Haverhill, N. H.—Bethlehem, Bath, Easton, Franconia, Haverhill, Landaff, Littleton, Lisbon, Lyman, Livermore, Monroe, Warren, and present their bills to the Commissioners at Woodsville the second Tuesday in September. If considered advisable, additional dates for settlements with towns may be arranged.

All applications for aid should be immediately reported to the Commissioners, as under the laws of 1903 no bill will be paid for more than ten days' support previous to the proper affidavit being received. Affidavit blanks will be supplied by the Commissioners upon request.

In accordance with Chapter 30, Section 1, Public Statutes, the Superintendent of the County Farm shall make up his report to Jan. 1, annually, and also Section 2 of said chapter requires that the Superintendent's report shall contain in addition a list of paupers actually supported at the farm and the number of weeks each was supported; also a statement of the average cost per week for each pauper with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending Dec. 31, 1915, was 99. The number of weeks board is ascertained by taking the number of days between the day of admittance and the day of departure of each individual and dividing that number by seven, which gives the total number of weeks each was supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the farm for the year ending Dec. 31, 1915, was \$16,347.96. This sum divided by the whole number of weeks furnished, viz: 5,178+ gives \$3.15+ as the price per week.

Before closing this, my annual report, I wish to extend my sincere thanks to the Commissioners, Chaplain, and Physician for their hearty cooperation in the management of the institution, also to the W. C. T. U. for their continued kindness in remembering the inmates each year with fruit, flowers, entertainment, etc., and the many friends who so liberally donated reading matter.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY PHYSICIAN

The physician-in-charge of the Grafton County Hospital presents the following report for the year 1915 with a feeling of deep gratitude to the Honorable Board of Commissioners and to Superintendent and Mrs. Henry C. Phillips for their earnest co-operation in maintaining the Hospital at its high degree of efficiency.

The Hospital has cared for more patients this year than ever before and with as small a percentage of deaths as could be expected from the seriousness of some of the cases, most of which were in an advanced stage of disease and hopeless when admitted. All of the patients with acute illness have been discharged cured, or greatly improved.

The statistics following include only those cases who have occupied beds in the Hospital. Besides these there have been many out-patients in the jail, house of correction and almshouse, who have been attended in their rooms or have come to the Hospital for daily treatment.

The rooms for the patients are large, well ventilated and equally exposed to the sunlight. From part of these there is a picturesque view of the Connecticut River valley.

The aim for the future will be as for the past, to make the Hospital a restful, cheerful, comfortable home for the sick and those in need of Hospital care.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT

Woodsville, N. H., Dec. 31, 1915.

This report covers only the period from Apr. 1, 1915, to Dec. 31, 1915, as my term of office has included only that period.

The statute requires the solicitor to include in his report such recommendations as in his judgment the public good requires. There is only one matter about which it seems necessary to speak. Prosecutions for petty offenses, and especially for offenses against the police of towns, should be begun by the parties interested or by the selectmen, and the county should not bear the burden of them, especially since the towns in which municipal courts are located take all fines imposed therein. Even if the solicitor is willing to do the work, he is not justified in paying the expenses from the county treasury.

Selectmen are often reluctant to institute proceedings at the expense of the town. The result frequently is to deprive poor persons of just redress for their injuries. Petty prosecutions of course should not be encouraged, but where offenses have been committed which are too small for the solicitor to prosecute, and yet which demand attention, the selectmen should be willing to assume the expense of a prosecution.

Often no one person is sufficiently interested in a matter to make complaint and prosecute at his own expense, and yet the public good requires that it should have some attention. This suggestion is made with the hope that it may lead some selectmen to adopt a more liberal policy in these cases.



T. Ramsdell, Architect of Dover, N. H., at an expense not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00), and said County Commissioners are further authorized to issue notes or bonds of said county, not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00), for the purpose of paying for said alterations and additions; two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) of said notes and bonds to mature in 1917, and a like sum in each year thereafter, until the whole sum is paid.
