TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the town of Grantham in the County of Sullivan, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Grantham on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose by ballot and major vote one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Police Officer and one Overseer of the Poor for the ensuing year; one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds and one Trustee of the Public Library for the ensuing three years.
- Art. 2. To choose one or more Highway Agents and all other necessary town officers, agents and committees, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 3. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of the poor, and Old Age Assistance.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid for highways and raise and appropriate money for same.
- Art. 6. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to repair highways and bridges.
- Art. 7. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for snow bill.

- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 a year for the rent of Barton's field for a term of years not to exceed five years.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.
- Art. 10. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the support of the Public Library.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for control of the White Pine Blister Rust to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to extend the electric light line over Dunbar Hill and on the Pillsbury road, so called.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for fire fighting apparatus to be matched by an equal amount by the state.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to care for the common.
- Art. 16. To see what the town will do to put a furnace in the town hall in cooperation with the Grange.

- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money if necessary.
- Art. 18. To hear the reports of the officers, agents and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 19. To transact any other business that may come legally before said meeting.

Grave Forest Situation Follows September Hurricane

Woodland problems of timber salvage and fire control created in many towns by the September hurricane are of the greatest importance. GOOD CITIZENSHIP CALLS FOR PERSONAL AND WIDESPREAD ACTION.

The salvage of every thousand feet of logs which can be sold means money for landowners, wages for workers, employment for trucks, teams and machinery, as well as reduced forest fire hazard for all. If owners of windthrown timber have not yet acted, they should communicate with those who can help. Town Chairmen are fully informed; State Advisory Agents can help to start logging by suggesting names of operators and giving other useful advice; Federal Agencies are increasing the number of log storage places as rapidly as possible. INDIVIDUALS MUST NOW CO-OPERATE.

Forest fire danger for several years will be greater than usual. So much work must be done by public agencies to reduce hazard along roadsides, near improved and other exposed areas that many places will remain hazardous for some time to come. INDIVIDUAL LANDOWNERS MUST TAKE A PERSONAL INTEREST! Aid in clean-up work through the Agricultural Conservation Program is available to any woodland owner at \$4.00 per acre on areas up to 15 acres. The County Agent should be consulted.

Support your local Forest Fire Wardens and Deputies. They are planning, with State and Federal

agencies, an intensive campaign to control fires. Help them by strict observance of the fire laws. Kindle no open fires without a permit from the Warden except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooperate by reporting fires you may see and in other ways. Fire fighting tool supplies are inadequate and should be reasonably increased by many towns. YOU CAN HELP, AND IT WILL PAY, TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES!

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Chapter 150, Laws of New Hampshire

Section 6—Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually on or before April 30 cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar distinctly marked with its owner's name, and bearing attached to said collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its registered number. Said tag shall be furnished by the clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from dog license fees.

Section 18—The mayor of each city and the selectmen of each town shall annually within ten days from May first issue a warrant to one or more police officers or constables directing them to proceed forthwith either to kill or cause to be killed all dogs within such city or town not licensed and collared according to the provision of this chapter, and to enter complaint against the owners or keepers thereof; and any person may, and every police officer and constable shall kill or cause to be killed all such dogs, whenever and wherever found.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Grantham:

This is my first report on the Grantham schools since the reorganization of the Supervisory Union due to legislative economy, whereby several districts in the State were reorganized. It was my privilege to be associated with the Grantham schools for eight years, from 1925 to 1933. It is a pleasure to return and see that the school buildings, in a general way, have been greatly improved during the past five years.

The electric lights in both buildings and the toilet facilities at Grantham Village are highly gratifying. The exterior of the buildings should be painted during the coming summer, but this may not be possible due to the deficit incurred during the preceding years.

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment for the present year will be found on another page. The total is 71 up to January 1. There are almost as many children in the North Grantham school as there are in both rooms in Grantham Village. It might be well even now to bring the seventh and eighth grades to the Grantham Village school, but it certainly will be necessary if there is further increase in numbers.

From year to year more children are attending neighboring high schools. This necessitates an increase each year in high school tuition assessment. Some talk has been made concerning State Aid for high school tuition payments, but as yet no legislative action has been taken.

THE BUDGET

The budget, as made up, is designed to carry your schools along in the same progressive manner in which they have been going this year and last. The State Aid amount is estimated at the present moment and may be a little more or a little less. It no doubt should be more, on account of the decrease in valuation due to the timber loss, but since the loss is general throughout the State, it is hard to know whereby State Aid could be increased to make up for local depreciation. The budget, considering the high type of teaching we are getting and the fact that it is our own children who are receiving the benefit, cannot be considered as excessive in comparison with the costs in other communities of the same or even greater size.

A school dental clinic was held in both schools in April, 1938. Twenty-four pupils received dental care; five were examined by Dr. E. F. Keene of Newport.

The school health work includes the routine inspection for outstanding defects, classroom inspection, inspection before returning to school after sickness, weighing and measuring, home visits and taking children to clinics or hospital.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, the teachers, parents, pupils and other Grantham folks for their cooperation and splendid interest in the health program.

TESTING PROGRAM

During the latter part of February standard tests are being given in all of the schools to ascertain the capacity to learn, and these are followed by achievement tests to check on the standard of progress which our children are making with relation to that of children in various sections of the country. This is a necessary function of teaching and supervision, so that we can check ourselves and also determine whether the children are working to capacity.

TEACHERS

I am glad to have found three very excellent teachers in charge of our schools and hope that they or their equal can be retained for another year.

CONCLUSION

It is gratifying to know that a considerable number of parents attend the special exercises which teachers and pupils arrange. This gives encouragement to the teachers and pupils alike. Appreciation is hereby expressed for the cooperation of teachers, pupils, and you members of the School Board.
