

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Wells Memorial School in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls to remain open from 1:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.36 (six cents per \$1000 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote, and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 towns of the Monadnock Region.

5. To see whether the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$320.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of Elliot Community Hospital.

6. To see if the Town will vote to ratify, approve and confirm the action of our Fire Department in joining our Town to the Southwestern New Hampshire District Fire Mutual Aid System and in agreeing that our Fire Department may give and receive outside aid as provided in R. S. A. 154 as amended.

7. To see if the Town will vote to Discontinue the plowing of private driveways except for those residents over 70 years of age and for the clergy.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for a four wheel drive Jeep Pickup with plow should article No. 7 above be voted down. (By request).

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) to purchase the 22 acre Wiswall Lot from the Charles Beauregard Est. This area to be developed for a town owned gravel bank.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4.500.00) to replace the bridge connecting Lake Skatutakee and Skatutakee Reservoir and authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sum on credit of the Town. To be repaid \$2,500.00 in 1964 and \$2,000.00 in 1965.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) to purchase a new plow for the Mack Truck.

12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five (or seven) members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board shall consist of one Selectman and four (or six) other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

13. To hear reports of agents, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Business meeting called to order at 3:30 p.m.

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Police: Leo Dion (qualified), Philip Trudelle.

Trustees of Trust Funds: Ralph Bemis for 3 years (qualified), William P. House for 2 years.

Fire Wards: Robert Walker, David Schmidt, Ralph Clark (qualified), Justin Chamberlain, William F. Bemis (qualified).

Fence Viewers: John F. Priest and William P. House, both qualified.

Overseer of Poor, Martha Mattila.

Art. 2. A motion to take up Art. 2 after Art. 12 passed.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 4. To see of the Town will vote to accept One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) from Mrs. John J. Colony, Jr. for care of the Page cemetery lots. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 5. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Eighty-one Dollars (\$281.00) as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 6. To see of the Town will vote to raise One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to defray operating expenses of Sunset Beach. A motion to raise Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) was lost. A motion to accept as printed passed. Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be placed in a Sinking Fund for the replacement of major town-owned bridges under provisions of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943, Chapter 160, as amended. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to be placed in a Sinking Fund for the replacement of Highway Equipment under provisions of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943, Chapter 160 as amended. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in a Sinking Fund for improvements and repairs to Town owned buildings under provisions of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943, Chapter 160, as amended. A motion to accept the Article as printed and that the Selectmen be authorized to withdraw any funds deemed necessary during the year passed.

Art. 10. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to be used for algae control of Lake Skatutakee. These funds to be matched by Lake Skatutakee Association and the program of control under the supervision of State of New Hampshire. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 11. To see of the Town will vote to accept a parcel of land donated by Mr. Wellington Wells, Jr. and Mrs. Robert Kennard as a site for a cemetery in the village of Chesham. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred, Fifty-six Dollars and seventy-five cents (\$456.75) for the purchase of a leased Model R.B. 59 York Road Rake, purchase price of rake set at \$756.75 less \$300.00 paid in as rental during year 1961. A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. With the exception of the School Taxes a motion to accept the Budget as printed on pages 14 and 15 of the Town Report passed.

Art. 13. A motion to pass over Art. 13 until the last of meeting passed.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to agree on a location for a new fire station to be located in Harrisville, funds for such building voted at Annual Meeting March 1961. A motion that the Selectmen be authorized to negotiate with John J. Colony, Jr. for land on which to build a fire station in Harrisville. Amendment offered to include John J. Colony, Jr. and John N. Clark on above committee. Amendment passed and original motion as amended passed.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) for a complete revaluation of all taxable property in the Township of Harrisville, N. H.; this revaluation to be carried out by the State Tax Commission of New Hampshire. A motion to lay this article on the table passed by a standing vote 36 yes, 11 no.

Art. 13. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum necessary to purchase a decoder and monitor for the Fire Department, the equipment to eliminate the use of Red Network phone equipment. A motion to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for a decoder and monitor for the Fire Department passed.

Art. 16. To hear reports of Agents, Committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. A motion to accept as printed with corrections as explained passed.

Art. 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

A motion to have the same Harrisville Beach Committee as in 1961 consisting of Philip Trudelle, Gordon Getty, John Marnell, Edson Sundstrom, and Evelyn Fisher passed.

A motion to have the same Chesham Beach Committee as in 1961 consisting of John Oja, Roy Williams and Robert Lake passed.

A motion to elect the Fire Chief by Australian Ballot passed.

A motion to have the Clerk send a letter of thanks to Mr. Wellington Wells, Jr. and Mrs. Robert Kennard for land given by them to the Town for a cemetery in Chesham passed.

A motion that the Selectmen be authorized to appoint a committee of three to secure information regarding the acquisition of land to be used as a ballfield and playground for the children of Harrisville passed.

A motion to have the Selectmen look into the release of land on the opposite side of the road from Francis Parker on the Parker Road so called passed. A motion to have the Selectmen investigate the possibilities for a community fallout shelter and report at the next Town Meeting passed.

Dump situation discussed. No action taken.

A motion to include the Fire Wards with the Selectmen as a committee to supervise the building of the Fire Station in Harrisville passed.

A motion to start the business meeting at 4:30 p.m. passed.

Question of Zoning discussed. A motion to have a committee of three appointed to bring in recommendations as to zoning at the next Town Meeting passed. Committee as appointed: Ralph B. Bemis, W. B. S. Clymer and Raymond Goodyear.

A motion to elect the Fire Wards by Australian Ballot was lost.

A motion to recess at 6:25 p.m. until 7:00 passed.

A motion to close the polls at 7:00 p.m. passed.

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$5,423.78, plus a revenue surplus of \$513.98, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$5,937 76.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any charges which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$5,819.15, from \$9,172.36 to \$14,991.51 during 1962, as shown herewith:

Chesham Cemetery was worked over and is nearly completed. A short piece of road by Francis Parkers' was widened.

PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- 2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire. In 1962 we had 0 fires. We burned 0 acres. Permits issued 169.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Wells Memorial School in said district on the 5th day of March, 1963, at 3 P.M. in the afternoon to bring in your votes for the election of the following officials:

 A moderator for the coming year. A clerk for the ensuing year. A member of the school board for the ensuing three years. A treasurer for the ensuing year. One auditor for the ensuing year.

Polls open at 3 P.M. on March 5, 1963, and close not later than 9 P.M. March 5, 1963.

You are hereby further notified to meet at 7:30 P.M. on March 5, 1963 at the Wells Memorial School to act upon the following subjects:

2. To determine and appoint the salaries of school board members and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.

3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

5. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, auditors and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. 6. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to enter into tuition contracts for the school year 1963-64 with the Union School District of Keene at the rate of five hundred thirty dollars (\$530.00) per pupil for high school instruction and four hundred ten dollars (\$410.00) per pupil for junior high school instruction, and with the Marlboro School District at the rate of four hundred forty-nine dollars (\$449.00) per pupil for high school instruction and two hundred ninety-five dollars (\$295.00) per pupil for junior high school instruction and two hundred not with other approved schools.

7. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) to be used for the purchase of a new television set for instructional purposes at the Wells Memorial School.

9. To see if the district will vote to discontinue the capital reserve fund which was established in March, 1957, and to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay any or all monies in the capital reserve fund to the Harrisville School District to be used to reduce the district assessment or take any action thereon.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) to cover pupil cost expenses for grades five and six at Camp Union for the school year 1963-64.

HARRISVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

The School District Meeting opened March 7, 1962 at 1:00 P.M. Mr. William House, moderator, read the warrant and declared the polls to be opened for voting.

Article 1: Voting for School District Officers by Australian ballot.

Article 2: Motion was made to increase the school board salaries as follows: Chairman to \$125, other members to \$75. This is an increase of \$85. It was so voted.

Article 3: Motion was made and voted to accept the reports as read.

Article 4: Motion was made and voted to leave the choice of committees and auditors to the school board.

Article 5: A motion was made and passed to lay this article on the table and to be taken up after Article 7.

Article 6: Motion was made and passed to authorize the School Board to enter into High School tuition contracts with Keene High School at the rate of \$515 per pupil for the school year 1962-63, and with Marlboro High School at the rate of \$457 per pupil and with other approved High Schools.

Article 7: Motion was made to lay on the table this article which is for the school board to enter into Junior High School tuition contracts with Keene Junior High and Marlboro Junior High School for the school year 1962-63 for the sum of \$8,464. A ballot vote was asked for. Results, 20 YES, 48 NO. More discussion followed and the article was passed as read.

(Amendments to send only 8th grade were defeated.)

Article 5: Motion was made that the School District raise and appropriate \$53,978.61 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk to certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes. It was so voted. Article 8: The motion was made and accepted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 to be used as matching funds for Federal Aid to science and mathematics courses, and to authorize the acceptance of such Federal funds.

Article 9: Motion was made and passed to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 as the District's share of support for Educational TV Station WENH.

Article 10: An amendment was made to this article by Mr. Ralph Bemis that the School District sell for the sum of \$1450 the Johnson lot, so called being the land originally acquired from Mrs. Lisa Johnson, by the district for a school site, to Mrs. Lisa Johnson and that the school board be, and hereby is authorized to sign a deed conveying the same. A standing vote was asked for and was passed unanimously.

Polls were closed at 9:00 and recess was called to count votes.

71 votes were cast and the following were declared elected:

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Harrisville:

I hereby submit my first anual report.

STAFF CHANGES: Mr. Richard Wyman, former teacherprincipal, resigned to accept a teaching position at the Cutler School in Swanzey. Although it was not necessary to secure a replacement for Mr. Wyman, Mrs. Gladys Libby has assumed the additional responsibility of the principalship. Otherwise, the regular teaching staff remains the same.

Mrs. Maxine Dobson has taken over the duties of school nurse from Mrs. Marion Warner who retired and Dr. Lawrence Cloud replaces Dr. Samuel Paul as school physician.

The above figures do not take into account pupils who might move into Harrisville or who might move out. Obviously, the most recent figures are the most reliable. Although the above figures should not be used as a basis for absolute predictions, they are indicative of possible trends. SCHOOL FACILITIES: The Wells Memorial School plant is by all standards excellent. The only less than desirable condition, that is utilizing part of the all-purpose room for classroom space, was removed by the tuitioning of the seventh and eighth grade students to Keene and Marlboro.

The program of lighting improvement was completed this year so that all classrooms as well as the all-purpose room have fluorescent fixtures with the required amount of light. Also, new power heads have been installed on the existing electric radiator valves to improve the efficiency of the heating system. Interior painting was continued during the summer vacation period as part of the regular program of maintenance. All of these improvements were brought about to insure the health and safety of our young people.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM: The citizens of Harrisville want the best possible education for their children. The Harrisville School Board shares this wish and is striving to see that it is accomplished. This was demonstrated when the decision was made to educate pupils in grades 7 and 8 on a tuition basis. Not only does this provide an opportunity for a more comprehensive program for junior high school students, but it also makes for better utilization of our elementary school facilities.

The reorganization of our supervisory union has brought about changes which affect each district. An example is the loss of the services of a teacher consultant. Many other changes at the state level have taken place such as a new state-wide accounting system and new high school minimum standards. Forthcoming changes as a result of the report of the Interim Commission are speculative.

Education in New Hampshire, as elsewhere in the nation, is in a period of constant change. The Harrisville School Board and the citizens of Harrisville are to be commended in their efforts to provide a program and facilities necessary in the highly complex and competitive world of today.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the teachers, pupils and parents, the School Board and the patrons of our school for their understanding and cooperation.
