TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Kingston on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$377.79 and the State will contribute \$2,518.58 for Class V Highways, under the Provisions of the T. R. A. so-called.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be used for the permanent construction of the Cooper's Grove Road so-called.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000 to be used for the permanent construction of West Shore Park Road also known as Merrill Avenue, West Shore Park, South Kingston.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$1,500 for the purchase and installation of a hydraulic wing and plow for the Town truck.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225 to be used in opening and making passable certain Fire Roads as determined by the Board of Selectmen and the Fire Wards. (To be voted on by ballot.)

8. To see if the Town will vote to deed Tax Sale Property to the Lions Club of Kingston. (The Lions Club has paid the taxes due on the property of Anna Wentworth, and Horrace H. and Evelyn Wright, and Mrs. Evelyn Baker Wright.)

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the donation of a strip of land by Mrs. Ralph Bake. This piece of land being approximately 124 feet by 10 feet adjoining the westerly side of Kingston Plains Cemetery.

10. To see if the Town will vote to approve the installation of a Street Light on 18th Street in Great Pond Park.

11. To see if the Town will vote to rescind 1956 Town Warrant Article 22 which read as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to require all articles concerning Zoning or Planning at any Town Meeting voted upon by ballot.

(This article was passed in the 1956 Town Meeting.)

12. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow sums of money not exceeding \$20,000 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes, the aforesaid notes to be paid during the current year from taxes collected during the year.

13. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire relating to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town? (This article to be voted on by ballot.)

14. To vote to see if the Town will accept the Auditor's Report and the Town Report as printed.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING, MARCH 13, 1956

Article 1. Polls opened at 10:10 o'clock with the reading of the Warrant by the Moderator, Leonard Sanborn, who read his appointment by the Supervisors. Balloted until seven o'clock when the polls were declared closed. Election officials sorted ballots until eight o'clock when the meeting was called to order by the Moderator. Prayer was given by Wendell Irvine.

Article 2. Motion that the sum of \$108,078.80 be raised and appropriated to defray town charges for the ensuing year with the following amendment added, "that the Town pay the Tax Collector $1\frac{1}{4}\%$ commission on all Poll, Property, and timber yield taxes collected during the ensuing year." Amendment made that the collection of taxes be put up to bids and given to lowest bidder. Moderator ruled this amendment out of order. Original motion and amendment passed as read.

Article 3. Voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$378.81 and the State will contribute \$2,525.40 for Class V Highways, under the provisions of the T. R. A. so-called.

Article 4. Voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be used for the permanent construction of the Cooper's Grove Road so-called.

Article 5. Motion made and seconded that the town raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the repair and improvement of West Shore Park, South Kingston, with an amendment that they make permanent construction from tarred end toward the Park and that road be called "Merrill Avenue." Motion and amendment passed.

Article 6. Motion made by Robert Nichols and seconded by J. Edward Stevens that the town raise and appropriate \$100 to repair the bandstand on the Kingston Plains, work to be done by the Road Agent. After much discussion the Motion was put to a rising vote. Result: Yes 87, No 116. Motion not carried.

Article 7. Motion made and seconded that we accept the road called Cottage Street from Robert Fisk, subject to the approval of the base and grade by the Road Agent. Amendment that we take up Article 16. (Regulation for acceptance of new streets). Amendment passed. Voted that Article 16 be passed as read. Return to Article 7. Voted that this Article pass as read.

Article 8. Voted that \$250 be appropriated to provide permanent construction on the road called Cottage Street.

Article 9. Voted that the Town install two additional street lights at Great Pond Park.

Article 10. Motion made by J. Edward Stevens that Article pass as read except that \$4,000 be spent this year and \$1,000 next year. Discussion followed with the following amendment, "that the word 'cement' be changed to 'concrete', that bridge be changed to rectangular culvert and Selectmen seek advice from competent engineer. Amendment seconded. Amendment not carried. By a show of hands motion was not carried.

Article 11. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$300 to carry on White Pine Blister Rust Control in Kingston, work to be performed by the State Forestry and Recreation Commission.

Article 12. Voted that the Town accept land at the Great Pond dam site from the State of New Hampshire,

this land to be used as right of way to Great Pond by the Fire Department and raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 to build the same.

Article 13. Voted that the Town abandon a section of road which was formerly a portion of the old Route 125. This section of road is on the southeast side of Route 125 between the property now or formerly of Wicker and the Plaistow line.

Article 14. Amendment that this Article be laid on the table was not carried. Voted that the sum of \$50 be raised and appropriated to be used as operating expenses of the Kingston Planning Board.

Article 15. Voted to adopt the official map of the Town of Kingston, with Amendment to accept the map subject to correction of the classification of the roads.

Article 16. Voted under Article 7.

Article 17. Voted that the Town authorize the Tax Collector to allow a deduction of $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ from town Property Tax when payment is made within 30 days of billing.

Article 18. Regulation regarding Hunting. Not passed. Moderator declared a recess until order was restored.

Article 19. Voted that the Town turn over the Greenwood Cemetery Fund to the Trustees of Trust Funds.

Article 20. Voted that the Town take over the ownership and control of the South Kingston Cemetery, known as the Mill Hill Cemetery.

Article 21. Motion made and seconded to establish a Municipal Court for the Town of Kingston. Motion not carried.

Article 22. Voted that the Town require all articles concerning Zoning or Planning at any Town Meeting to be voted upon by ballot.

Article 23. Voted by ballot.

Article 24. Voted that the Town borrow \$15,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Voted that beginning with Town Election (1957) the office of Fire Ward shall be open for a one year a two year, and a three year term and that each year thereafter only one man shall be elected.

Motion that Town elect four police officers besides the Chief and vacancies be filled by the Selectmen. Motion declared out of order by the Moderator because it would involve money, etc.

Voted to return to Article 1 and count ballots.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS OF THE TOWN OF KINGSTON FOR THE YEAR 1956

At the annual town meeting held March 13, 1956 it was voted to turn over to us the Greenwood Cemetery Fund for investment. The transfer was made in May when \$1,646.00 of principal and \$396.06 of accumulated interest, totaling \$2,042.06 was delivered to us. We have purchased 11 shares of American Telephone & Telegraph Co. common stock for \$1,934.10 and banked the balance. We have since received for the sale of 4½ plots \$112.50 and in interest \$42.46, making a grand total as of January 1, 1957 of \$2,197.02.

We have also received the following trust funds:

John H. S. Sanborn and Edward Kimball Fund of \$100.00 by Marion S. Collier.

Amos Davis Fund of \$100.00 by Vera Davis.

In this report we would like to include what has been accomplished during the year to improve the cemeteries.

In the Greenwood Cemetery a new road has been built that encircles the entire cemetery as now laid out and which gives ready access to about 100 additional plots, to be laid out when needed.

In the Plains Cemetery the old bar fence that separated the south section from the old original cemetery and the two old fences that ran across the front from the well to the south property line have been removed at no expense to the town. We would like the town to acquire an additional ten foot wide strip of land along this part of the cemetery so that a driveway can be built that will give access to the south section without encroaching on adjoining property.

In the Mill Hill Cemetery the front fence which was badly damaged by trees falling has been repaired. The lumber was furnished by Miss Lizzie Bartlett of South Kingston.

Arrangements have been made to transfer the antique hearse from the tool house in the Plains Cemetery to the store room of the Town Hall where we hope it will be carefully preserved for all time. This room should be made into a museum to preserve all of the old historic relics that are still in existence and of interest to the general public. We wish that the citizens of the town will co-operate in this worthy project.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

Many library buildings constructed fifty or sixty years ago were not planned to care for the normal growth of the book collections by purchase, not the mention the acquisition of gift material. Book space is now at a premium. The situation can resolve itself in part, at least by giving the book collection a drastic weeding of obsolescent material — by tossing out books that are now meaningless in content and repellent in appearance. In small libraries especially it is considered a wise administration of book funds where the library's annual report reveals a fair correspondence between the number of books purchased and the number of books discarded.

During the past year 400 books have been discarded under the supervision of Mr. Gardner Soule of the N. H. State Library Commission.

Fifty new juvenile and thirty-five adult books were displayed during National Book Week, after which these were available for circulation. During that week the first and second grades of the Bakie school, accompanied by their teachers, visited the library for a story hour. The librarian gave instruction in the use of the library and the care of books. Book marks were distributed to each child.

There has been a marked increase in the circulation of juvenile non-fiction during the year.

The library has a new edition of "Books for You" published by the National Council of Teachers of English, a list for leisure reading for students in Senior High School which includes current titles as well as former favorites.

The U. S. News and World Report has been added to the library's list of periodicals. We are grateful to Mrs. Aaron Kalman for her donation of Life magazine.

Again we would like to express our appreciation to the Kingston Garden Club for replenishing the urns each summer and for the Christmas wreath.

ANNUAL REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

The department responded to a total of 24 calls this year, 4 of which were out of town. The insured losses by fire in the town were \$1,500.00.

We were fortunate that there were fewer fires than usual. It is to be emphasized, however, that this fact must not lead to general apathy within the department or on the part of the citizens of Kingston. It is to be stressed that this is a volunteer department and its efficiency is only as great as the public interest in it.

With the installation of the new dial system, we have experienced many changes. The faithful and excellent services of Miss Eleanor Martin and her staff have been greatly missed. The department and Telephone Company, however, have made every effort to make the new system of reporting fire calls as satisfactory and efficient as possible. This has been done by installing nine fire phones in the homes of various firemen who are within the close vicinity of the fire house. These phones are to be used strictly for *FIRE* and *EMERGENCY* use only. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN PLANNING BOARD

For the Year Ending March 12, 1957

The following members made up the Kingston Town Planning Board for the year 1956.

At the first meeting of the Board, George H. Harmon was elected Chairman, Robert H. Andersen, Secretary and Frank W. Foster, Treasurer, and the general duties and plans for the year were discussed. Frank W. Foster found it necessary to resign during the year. Merle K. Simes was appointed to serve out the term. Robert H. Anderson assumed the duties of Treasurer.

The subcommittee form of planning was initiated. Two committees were set up, with Mr. Andersen as Chairman of a Map Planning Committee and Mr. Wight as Chairman of a School Planning Committee.

The Map Planning Committee, with the following members, Irving E. Johnson, Warren G. Bakie, George Shaw, Keith K. Simpson, John Pizar, John G. Brown, Edwin G. Warrington and John Ratta undertook the problem of determining whether the official Town Map could be used by a volunteer group as a base for a map of the Town which would be completely sub-

divided by lots. The findings of the Committee indicated that a major portion of the Town could be mapped by volunteers, but that there was several years work required. Information regarding boundary lines was obtained from State organizations, the Exeter and Hampton Electric Company, and deeds of Kingston citizens which provide an excellent base for the final map.

The School Planning Committee with the following members, Mrs. Gladys M. Merrick, Mrs. Isabel Magnusson, Mrs. Barbara Norris, Mrs. Josephine Swett, Mrs. Janet Fellows, Richard Smith, Paul S. Barnes and Maurice Aiken, met nine times to consider what educational problems might develop in the Kingston School System. The Committee, in order to know what future events might affect, investigated the present situation, not only in Kingston, but surrounding towns which now share facilities used by Kingston. The findings indicated that at the present time the elementary school facilities are inadequate and that developments in the entire area will soon create a similar situation with respect to Secondary Educational facilities. Possible recommendation for solution of the problem were checked — expansion of present facilities, or changing the type of facilities to include a Junior High School. The provision of a Junior High School would seem to be the solution but the expense to the Town would be great. Investigation of a Cooperative Junior High School showed that for a small expense the Town could have excellent facilities for educating its children over the next decade with the most inexpensive method made available for expansion when required.

A suggestion was processed by the Board regarding the opening of Fire Roads in Town to assure proper access to possible fire areas, which resulted in the Article in the Warrant on that subject.

An investigation of the bridges in the Town was started with the capable engineering assistance of Mr. Leonard P. Sanborn. A complete report should be available next year.

At the request of the Board of Selectmen, the location of street lights in Great Pond Park was investigated. A recommendation was made for placement of two lights already approved for installation as well as an overall plan for the area.

A proposal was made that the Town aid in the creation of a "Drag Strip." The Planning Board suggested that a responsible organization be set up by townspeople to operate the "Strip" before the Town takes action.

Other subjects discussed included prospects for industrial development, the provision of town and street identification signs, recreational facilities, a town timber preserve, road improvement, and town appearance improvement.

The Kingston Planning Board wishes to express sincere appreciation to the Board of Selectmen, the Bakie School teachers, the Kingston Police Department and other people of the Town for their assistance.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Kingston, N. H. qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the ninth day of March, 1957, at ten o'clock in the morning, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen

the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. On petition of Richard W. Senter and 18 registered voters to see if the Kingston school district will vote to petition the State Board of Education to become a part of a cooperative school district for the education of the secondary school children (grades seven through twelve) with other districts in the area, including the districts of Newton, Plaistow, Danville, Brentwood, or any two of the districts in addition to the school district of Kingston.

10. If the preceding article is adopted, to see if the district will elect two representatives to serve on an interim committee who shall prepare a financial budget for the operation of the proposed cooperative school district, and to include in the organization warrant an article calling for an appropriation for the proposed cooperative school district during the first year and such other items of business as need to be acted upon at the organization meeting.

11. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of
the Town of Kingston, N. H.:

We have heard a great deal about reading in our schools. I believe that you parents will welcome the opportunity to come behind the scenes with me in order to gain an insight into what our reading program is endeavoring to do for our children.

A child's success in school, as well as the pattern of his personal and social adjustments later on in life, will be greatly affected by the success with which he makes adjustments in reading during the early years of his life.

When children enter school they differ in many ways that can be measured. They differ in height, weight, strength of grip, emotional control and ways of working and playing with other children.

They differ in their perception skills, their ability to follow direction, their language powers, their home backgrounds and their readiness to read.

When they face their first teacher in school they differ in their capacities, achievements, attitudes, abilities and interests. The teacher is confronted with the problem of adopting materials and methods to the needs of each child.

The problems of providing for the range of abilities tend to multiply as the children grow older. In a typical upper grade classroom, children may vary five or more years in reading ability. The range tends to increase as the number of school years increases.

The teacher must have ways of determining how efficiently each child reads so that appropriate reading material may be selected. It should be realized that all pupils cannot be brought up to a single standard of reading achievement in any grade. Various materials are used by the skilled teacher in dealing with reading needs of children. Grouping of children in certain classes according to their achievement level as well as into groups within classes helps reduce the range of reading in each group. Such groupings need to be flexible to allow for differences in the rate of growth of children.

Elementary teachers face the necessity of providing quiet activities for the children not in the particular group engaged in intensive reading. These activities may be related directly to reading, such as reading a library book silently or drawing pictures to illustrate some part of a story which has been read.

Reading materials of various levels of difficulty are needed to meet the abilities found in each group. Free reading periods may be used to stimulate interest in reading.

Teachers at all levels are alert to teach the reading skills needed in their subjects. The reading skills needed in mathematics class are different from those required in reading a current magazine.

The teacher who is responsible for a particular subject is in the best position to provide help in overcoming difficulties for many pupils because through practice and training he is able to identify the need at an early stage and to provide some special help.

This teacher understands the kinds of reading skills needed to do effective work in his subject and helps pupils develop the particular one which will be of greatest value at the time of need.

Instead of further reading practices of the kind on which the pupil has been failing she offers specific help, directed toward a particular need. New reading material is used and the teacher uses additional tests to help in planning the individual's program.

In order to plan the pupil's program, a diagnostic and remedial program based upon the work of the regular classroom teacher is a fundamental part of an effective reading plan which provides for the individual differences in the reading abilities of the children.

Looking Toward the Future

Never in the history of education has the shortage of schoolhousing been so acute, serious and confusing. This year marks the greatest number of registered children in our schools. In the near future, a serious shortage of classroom facilities will be in the upper four or six grades. Making the situation more difficult is the rising cost of bond interest due to federal policies, the continuing shortage of building materials, and the increasing rise in labor costs.

Because of the present and future housing difficulties in our schools, I urge the serious need of studying building plans with other educational groups in our area — thinking in terms of educational efficiency and ultimate economy. Only through determined study with representative groups of our neighboring communities, can a solution be reached.

I wish to thank the school board, parents, friends, teachers and pupils for having made the year one of success.

NURSE'S REPORT

To the Superintendent, School Board
members, and citizens of Kingston:

The school health program of 1956-'57 was off to a busy start with the replenishing of first aid kits, checking on vaccinations of first graders, acquiring of health histories, and a general appraisal of each child. This latter in no way supplants your doctor's regular check-up, as any number of serious conditions may go undetected by the nurse.

Heights and weights were obtained and compared with last year's. Snellen eye test, which is required annually by state law, has been done, and defects reported to the parents. Where necessary, follow-up home visits will be made.

The hearing testing program is now under way. Because of the large enrollment in the Union, I feel it will be better to confine the testing to certain grades, namely the 1st, 4th, 7th, and 8th. This policy is recommended by the State Dept. of Education. Children who have a known hearing loss, new children, and any whose teacher suspects a hearing loss, will be done regardless of grade.

Polio clinics were held in May, October, and January. Preparation for these is time-consuming and hard work, but well worth it when one sees the number of people who are eager to avail themselves of the opportunity to be immunized. Third shots will be given in the Spring, provided vaccine is available.

Teachers, parents, and co-workers have been most helpful in making the health program a success.

MUSIC TEACHER'S REPORT

I have the honor to submit a report on the music activities in the town of Kingston, N. H.

In Kingston the music program is now being taught by Miss Thelma Loven. The work formerly handled by Mrs. Joan White has been taken over by Miss Loven in order that Mrs. White may devote more time to the other towns in which she is presently engaged. Miss Loven visits each class weekly and provides regular work in music each day of the week. The instrumental program in Kingston is coordinated with that of the Sanborn Seminary. Several pupils are studying instrumental music under the direction of Mr. Engels of the Sanborn faculty. This cooperative arrangement makes it possible for boys and girls in Kingston who plan to enter Sanborn Seminary to have preliminary band experience before they enter the school.

A new vocal curriculum guide is now being prepared. A copy of this guide will be placed in the hands of each teacher. It will be in loose-leaf form so that additional material may be added from time to time. It is expected that this guide will be of great value to the teachers, not only in the preparation of their work, but in the continuing growth and development of the music program in the various towns of the Union.

Various special projects are planned in certain of the towns in order to utilize the values of music in the overall development of the school and community activities in each of the towns served.

At this time I would like to express my personal appreciation to the superintendent of schools, the members of the various school committees, the principals

and teachers for their unqualified support of our music program. I feel that we are moving forward in the direction of developing a very well rounded and outstanding music program for the boys and girls in the various schools of the Union.
