TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PETER-BOROUGH, IN THE COUNTY OF HILLSBOROUGH, IN SAID STATE QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town of Peterborough on Tuesday, the thirteenth of March next at eight of the clock in the forenoon, (Polls close at 6 P.M. unless otherwise voted) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, Expenses and Election and Registration, Municipal Court, Town House, Police Department, Fire Department, Civilian Defense, Tree Spraying, Health Department, Town Dump, Vitals, for laying out and repairing of the Highways, Street Lighting, Old Age Assistance and Town Poor, Memorial Day, Adams Playground and Pool, Putnam Park, Cemetery, Town Library, Town Water Charge, Monadnock Region, Town Planning Board, and for any other charge arising within the town.

Article 3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward paying the Town Debt and Interest.

Article 4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts to the Town in trust or otherwise by any individual or individuals.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to remodel the Town Offices and make adequate provisions for a court room and Judges Chambers, and to take a portion of the apportionment B Fund to do the same, or to raise and appropriate a sum of money for said purpose, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to use a portion of the apportionment B Fund to resurface Main Street, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to reappropriate the sum of twenty three hundred and twenty-two dollars and fifty-two cents (\$2,322.52) to rebuild Prospect Street.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money from the income of the Albert W. Noone Trust Fund to further improve the Skating Rink this year, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven hundred seventy five dollars and forty cents (\$1,175.40), provided the State gives Seventy-eight hundred thirty-five dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$7,835.98) for the construction of Class IV and V Highways.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the portico of the Library, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to install a new curtain on the Town House Stage, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate from the income of the Albert W. Noone Trust Fund as a capital outlay for the construction of permanent walks in Putnam Park or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to the Fire Station, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a tractor shovel and withdraw from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the balance that may be necessary for said purchase, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and place in a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase and installation of chlorinating and purification equipment at the Pool, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of heavy equipment for the Highway, Fire and Police Departments, and to be apportioned to each department as recommended by the Planning Board, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to install the following street lights and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action relating thereto:

- A) From intersection of Union & Elm, High & Main Sts. to East side of Main St. Bridge; 3-20 Lumen, 7-7000 Lumen and three 11,000 Lumen Lights all of which are replacements except on East side of Main Street Bridge.
- B) Grove Street from Intersection of Main and Grove Sts. to and including South Side of Grove St. Bridge; 6-U/G 11,000 Lumen Lights, 1-OH 11,000 Lumen Light including Standards for the same.
- C) 1 new-11,000 Lumen light at entrance to Hospital on Old Street Road.
- D) 1 new-20,000 Lumen Light at the intersection of 123 & 101 (Wilson Corner).
- E) 1 new-20,000 Lumen Light at corner of Elm St. and By-pass.
- F) 1 new-20,000 Lumen Light between entrances of the Armory.
- G) 1 new— 7,000 Lumen Light at entrance to Old Dublin Rd. from By-pass.
- H) 2 new— 7,000 Lumen Lights, one at each entrance to Lobacki Drive.
- I) 1 new— 7,000 Lumen Light at the junction of Hunt Road and 202 State Highway, North Peterborough.
- J) 2 new— 7,000 Lumen Lights on Lower Concord St. between Cemetery Entrance and Buckley Area.
- K) 1 replacement— 7,000 Lumen Light at the Hospital exit, lower Concord St.
- L) 1 replacement—20,000 Lumen Light at North Peterborough Bridge.
- M) 1 replacement—11,000 Lumen Light at the Junction of Concord St. and Sand Hill Rd.
- N) 1 replacement—11,000 Lumen Light at corner of Vale & Grove Sts.
- O) 1 replacement—11,000 Lumen Light at corner of Windy Row and Upper Union St.

Article 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the planting of trees, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see what action the Town will vote to take, providing Capital Reserve appropriations are discontinued to the balances now held in Capital Reserve Trust Funds to the credit of the Highway, Fire and Police

Departments and any other monies held in trust for specific purposes not now needed, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a board of four to work with the Selectmen for the possibility of merging the Parks, Playground, Cemetery and Highway Departments and bring to the next annual Town Meeting their report and recommendations, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to officially name the new highway in the Robbins Development as laid out by the Selectmen and constructed in 1961.

Article 23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.

Article 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of collection of taxes for the current Municipal Year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be paid in the current Municipal Year from taxes collected during the current Municipal Year.

Article 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT, 1962

During the year your Budget Committee met several times with both the School Board and the Selectmen. At the invitation of the Selectmen we also met with the various town departments. Other meetings included the Planning Board to consider Capital Reserve and Street Lights. Special groups consisting of members of the Planning Board, Selectmen and Budget Committee met to consider Roads, overall Town Maintenance and the Water Department.

We commend the Planning Board and the Selectmen for initiating this cooperative effort to find practical solutions to many perplexing problems. We sincerely hope

that the effort will continue.

Before 1970, Peterborough must consider the costly problem of Sewage Disposal and greatly increased costs of Education. Consequently, prudent management and sound fiscal policy in both Town and School Departments are necessary if Peterborough is to provide for this increase at an equitable tax rate. Your Budget Committee, therefore, makes the following specific recommendations:

- 1. That our School Board find means by which Tuition Towns can share future Capital expenditures since our school is expected to be at maximum capacity next September.
- 2. That our School Board invite the Budget Committee to future meetings devoted to the **preparation** of the school budget. Much could be accomplished by these joint meetings in bringing about a mutual understanding of the educational needs and the budgetary limitations of our town.
- 3. That a job evaluation study be made because of the inconsistencies in salaries found throughout both the Town and School Departments.
- 4. That the Fire Department conduct an overall Town Fire Protection study with immediate emphasis upon hydrants and alarm boxes which seem inadequate in many areas.
- 5. That our Selectmen consider a plan by which the town's share of sewage disposal cost would minimize its effect upon the tax rate. Perhaps a Capital Reserve is in order.
- 6. That our General Court Representatives give greater consideration at the State level to the problem of the local property tax load, particularly as it applies to education.

TOWN BUDGET. Your Budget Committee approves the gross base budget of \$179,984. This represents an increase of \$1,200. over the 1961 base budget.

We submit the following comments on several department's budgets and some proposed special articles:

Adams Playground. The Adams Playground Committee has requested a \$7,700. budget, an increase of \$200. over the 1961 appropriation. Since last year's operation costs were \$6,754. a \$7,000. budget should be adequate to cover the program for 1962. The addition to the Playground Capital Reserve Fund of \$2,500. as a Special Article has our approval.

Putnam Park. We commend Mr. Martin Keenan, Sr., and his committee for making Putnam Park a real asset to our town. While we fully appreciate that improvements can and should some day be made, we feel that this year's appropriation should be limited to a maintenance cost of \$850. The request is for \$1,250. In addition, there is a Special Article (\$2,034.) for major capital improvements. Since March 13th is the 100th anniversary of Putnam Park, we suggest that interested folk might appreciate an opportunity to consider memorial contributions for specific projects.

Library. We approve a \$6,500. budget which is a \$500. increase for new books. We also approve a Special Article calling for \$2,200. for major repairs in the interest of economy.

Planning Board. The Planning Board requests \$1,000. Included in this is \$600. anticipated payment for a town map. This sum was appropriated in 1961 for the map and returned unused this year because the map has not been completed. Since it is unlikely that the map will be completed this year, and the maker is unwilling to submit a partial bill, we do not recommend this appropriation at this time.

Fire Department. We recommend a \$2,000. Special Article to cover installation of a new furnace, repair leaky roof, move two fire alarm boxes, replace old fire alarm wire on Elm Street and provide an automatic switch for the auxiliary power plant.

Capital Reserve. We believe that Capital Reserve accounts are good business. However, for several years the amount appropriated for the Highway and Police Departments has approximated withdrawals. Consequently, neither account seems to serve a useful purpose. There-

fore, we recommend that neither the Highway Department nor the Police Department Capital Reserve appropriations be voted. On the other hand, the Fire Department Capital Reserve needs a slight increase to provide a replacement truck by 1965. We recommend that the amount be \$3,500. this year.

Town House. We approve the \$1,300. requested for Stage Curtains with the additional recommendation that the new curtains be "fire proofed" at regular intervals as prescribed by good fire prevention practice.

Street Lights. We believe some lights are needed in the interests of safety. We therefore recommend a Special Article of not more than \$800.

Town Offices. The need to remodel our Town Offices is apparent. Good planning indicates that an architect should be engaged and plans be presented to the 1963 Town Meeting.

Apportionment "B" Fund. We suggest that the Planning Board and the Selectmen study the overall Town needs and bring a recommendation for use of the Apportionment "B" Funds to the 1963 Town Meeting.

Highway Department. Last year our Highway Department built roads at the expense of maintenance for a number of reasons. We are encouraged to learn that better planning in 1962 will find our maintenance program greatly improved.

"Loader." Your Budget Committee recommends the Special Article covering a "Loader" for the Highway Department. To pay for same, we suggest an appropriation of not more than \$7,000. plus withdrawal of some \$7,600 from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.

"Trees." Following discussions concerning the request of \$1,500. for the start of a tree replacement program, we recommend a Special Article for \$1,000.

SCHOOL BUDGET. Our School Budget this year is a complex problem. Four fundamental items will cause the Budget to increase: additional students, need for more classrooms, an improved program and increases in all salaries . . . each contributing to the other. The additional students and our improved program require three additional classrooms. This means that the "Echo Area" must be completed. The improved program dictates the need for two additional classroom teachers and the extra service of three teachers who will work this summer on curricu-

lum. This program compounds the problem presented by the implementation of a new teachers' salary schedule.

The new teachers' salary schedule is a good one. For the teachers it provides the incentive to remain with us longer. For the taxpayer it means that the teachers receive top pay only when they perform satisfactorily and "grow" professionally.

Your Budget Committee and School Board have reached agreement on most items of the budget. We approve an increase of \$21,000 in Instruction which includes some increase for teachers, text books and other teaching aids, Auxiliary Services increase of \$3,000. and Plant Operation increases of \$2,850.

However, at this writing we neither approve of the School Board's "across the board" policy of salary increases for all school personnel nor the amount of some increases. We hope before the school district meeting, they will slow the rate of implementation of the teachers' new salary schedule and that they will reconsider their position on other proposed salary increases.

As it now stands, your 1962-63 school base budget totals \$378,278. Of this, \$296,430 must be raised by property taxes, the balance being met by tuition payments and other income. Taxwise this is an increase of \$26,909. over 1961-62. In addition, there will be a minimum of \$17,175. requested in Special Articles — a total increase of \$44,084.

We recommend that the School Board reduce its base budget on salaries another \$5,000. We believe this can be done without jeopardizing the educational program. The \$17,175. for Special Articles include \$8,250. for completing the "Echo Area," \$5,000. for Deficiency Appropriation, \$775. for 50 student lockers and \$1,150. for a kitchen hood and three rollaway tables for the cafeteria. If the School Board will reduce its Base Budget by \$5,000. these Special Articles can be approved.

We regret that the increase in the School Budget cannot be kept within the limits of our Town's estimated growth of 4 per cent. However, the expanded and improved program and the increased number of pupils dictate the need to exceed it.

SUMMARY. Below is a comparison between the net (affects Property Taxes) Town and School requests and the Budget Committee's recommendations.

Again this year we will attempt at both School and Town Meetings a graphic representation of your "on the spot" spending as it affects the tax rate. To this end we have made considerable progress toward accurate "growth" figures and by March 7th we hope to have an exact County Tax figure. At this writing, if all requests from both School and Town are voted, our tax rate will be about \$35.50. If Budget Committee recommendations are followed, we should have a \$33.50 tax rate. To arrive at these tax rates we have estimated "growth" at \$400,000. and a County Tax of \$50,000.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT FOR THE PETERBOROUGH TOWN LIBRARY

To the Trustees of the Peterborough Town Library:

During the year 1960 a survey of library service in New Hampshire was requested by the Honorable Wesley Powell, Governor of the State of New Hampshire, and authorized and approved by the State Librarian, Mrs. Mildred McKay, and the Library Commission. This survey was conducted by Mr. Joseph P. Ford and Mr. John T. Holden of the Public Administration Service, Department of Government, University of New Hampshire.

We would like to share with you a few of the conclusions which the study of library service in New Hampshire revealed: "Book collections are poor in quality and scope. Very few libraries offer an adequate range of titles, and most are pathetically weak on basic reference material." How did and does Peterborough meet that revelation? We have 35,790 volumes; our reference corner houses twelve sets of encyclopedias, some of which have been purchased as recently as 1959 and 1961. We have recently accessioned 8 new atlases and the most recent Merriam Webster Third International Dictionary.

"Library buildings are old, over-crowded, and poorly equipped." It is a waste of valuable reporting space to elaborate upon this observation. Our building is not old, is not overcrowded, is not poorly equipped. During the past year we have purchased two card catalogs, so now we are completely, efficiently, and magnificently equipped.

"The range of local service is too limited. Only 26 of our 231 public libraries are open daily, the great majority being closed most of the week." The Peterborough Town Library is open daily, and in 1961 circulated 45,368 volumes. This is an increase of 3,073 over that of 1960, which at that time broke all records for a library of our size in the state of New Hampshire.

We dislike sprinkling our report with figures, as they seem rather boring and vague as we go on, but we would like to point out that of the books circulated in 1961, 7,028 were withdrawn by 2 summer camps in the region and the teachers of the Peterborough Consolidated Schools. Teachers who are interested in drawing books from the library either leave a request for 25, 50, 75 or more books which we then organize for them; or they visit the library with a few representative students and select their own. Incidentally, the teachers are always welcome to avail themselves of whatever resources we

have. They may keep these books for any reasonable length of time: 2, 3, or 4 months. We do like to have the

books returned by Memorial Day!

Stealing a sales technique utilized by the local telephone company, we telephoned a group of teachers in order to sample their reaction to the cooperation which they had received from us. As we anticipated, all teachers contacted were generous in their praise of the fine coopration which existed between the local schools and the library. We like to think that both buildings are educational institutions and that we can work harmoniously for mutual good, but what is even more important, for the educational growth of our children, and the young men and women of our community. Confusion and misrepresentation of facts should never be allowed to arise between American educational institutions at such a crucial time in our history, as such confusion taints the taxpayers and seriously harms our boys and girls academically. Peterborough and the United States march forth upon the feet of young people growing into citizenzenship; so they, therefore, should receive the educational benefits of both institutions; and both schools and library should invest their funds, their mental and physical energies where they will do the most good—which would be in continuing to perfect the town library and to organize an acceptable school library with a competent librarian to serve the school population while the students are in session.

One more remark concerning the library survey of library service in New Hampshire: representatives of the Public Administration Service, Department of Government, University of New Hampshire paid an unexpected call upon the Peterborough Town Library. They were extremely pleased with the physical aspects of the building, and very complimentary in their reactions to the manner in which the library was operating under the direction of the staff and the library trustees.

During 1961 we clocked an attendance of 7.569 people who came to do reference work within the library proper. Most of these people used the public table, and others took advantage of the smoking room or the private carrells which are made available to adults who would like absolute privacy in which to pursue their research.

139 mounted and framed reproductions of art masterpieces were taken home during the year. 668 records, we hope, brought pleasure and culture into the homes of our patrons; and 64 picture puzzles provided diversion or tension-relief to others. As we are not infallible, it was recently pointed out that we had few recordings of Ed-

ward MacDowell's music — in fact we had only 1 record — this is a situation which we shall remedy in 1962 by trying to purchase all the musical compositions we can secure of our famous Edward MacDowell.

In observance of National Library Week the library trustees and librarian held Open House Sunday afternoon, April 16, from 2 to 5 P.M. Several outstanding exhibits were scheduled including a one-man show of still lives and landscapes by Mr. Sidney Willis of Bennington, one of America's outstanding representational artists. Mr. Arthur Buxton created a collection of outstanding floral arrangements for the pleasure and enlightenment of the ladies. Mr. William R. Caldwell displayed a choice collection of his stencil ware along with the library books which had directed him in accomplishing so much beautiful work. The carrels and the smoking room were enhanced with some of Miss Nora Unwin's favorite prints and watercolors. Mrs. Richard Simpson loaned and arranged an antique doll collection along with many of the valuable doll books which are in the library's holdings. In addition to so much food for intellectual thought, refreshments were served in the Trustees' Room under the supervision of Mrs. Maurice Blodgett. Although the event was successful, the weatherman refused to cooperate, so our attendance did not equal that of 1960.

This has also been the third year in which the members of the Peterborough Historical Society have voted to share with us the income from the Farwell Fund for the purchase of books of a local or historical nature. The Farwell Fund was left to the Peterborough Historical Society in 1928 for the purchase of volumes for the Society's library. It was felt by the Executive Committee of the Society that the benefits would be greater if further purchases made available by this Fund were turned over to the Town Library. For these additional books and the confidence which the Society has vested in the library we are indeed grateful.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S APPEAL

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook — yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carlessness — our carelessness. This, we — you — and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations — hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you -

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.
- 3. Keep your fires under control.
- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
- 5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board, during the year 1961, up to and including February 21, 1962, has held 21 meetings.

The following recommendations for Class V and Town Roads were approved for 1962:

1) Complete Windy Row on the Class V program.

2) Prospect St.: Reappropriate the balance due this account and complete this year.

3) Sand Hill Road from Concord Street to Street

Rd. was approved for 1963.

4) Town Roads approved were Upper Pine St., Laurel St., Vale St. and Elm St. No appropriations are suggested for the above named roads for 1962.

Land Subdivision:

The Mercer Development on the so-called Scott-Farrar land is now in the process of final approval by the Board.

Three possible future developments have been given

preliminary consideration:

- 1) Blanchette property, between MacDowell Rd. and Union St.
- 2) Graves development on Street Road.3) Favre development on Street Road.

Tentative maps have been presented to the Board but no requests for approval have been presented to date.

Capital Reserve Fund:

The Board recommends that for 1962 only the Fire Department should be considered and that the sum of thirty five hundred dollars be appropriated. It will be necessary to replace the present Chevrolet truck within the next two or three years.

Street Lights:

In 1957, the Town voted to request the Planning Board to cause a survey to be made of street lighting. This was done in 1958, and some changes have been made on Main and Concord Sts. The Planning Board and the Board of Trade, through cooperation with the Public Service Co., have recommendations for Grove and Main Sts. A number of requests were made to the Selectmen and Planning Board. We have them listed on an article in the Warrant:

Main St. to and including one light on east side of the bridge, will include 3-20,000 Lumen lights (about

400 watts), 7–7,000 Lumen lights (175 Watts), 3–11,000 Lumen lights (250 Watts). All 13 new lights are the mercury type.

The four lights on Main St. bridge will be removed. The new light on east side of bridge will be on a new standard. This will give sufficient light to the bridge as well as the junction of Concord, Main and Pine Sts.

The proposed Main St. lighting will replace 18 existing lights with 13, and the one on the east side of the bridge, making a total of 14 lights at a decreased cost of \$220.32 per year. The existing lights on Grove St. will be replaced, 6–11,000 U/G Lumen lights (250 w) and one 11,000 OO/H. (250 w).

The present eight standards will be removed and replaced by steel standards. They will not be placed in the sidewalk. The Town will be required to pay for the new standards, installation and labor, which will be an estimated average of \$68.00 per month over a 5-year

period.

The decreased annual cost of lighting Main and Grove Sts. will be \$243.52 per year. The 10 new and the five replacement lights, in most cases, are based on a safety necessity. If all the lights are voted, it will add approximately one thousand dollars per year to the street lighting account.

Mr. Lithgow's assistants at the pool were Miss Brenda Blomgren and after several years absence Mrs. Dolly Whipple. Sue Rainier once again had charge of the bath house. Miss Carol Brassard returned for her third year much to the enjoyment of our younger children.

Our maintenance department was under the directorship of Mr. Lithgow with his assistants Terrence Lowe,

and Peter Silverman.

Our playground activity concerned more of the younger children and Carol kept them busy with various programs which included the following: over-night hikes, camping, camperaft, tennis, ping-pong, cook-outs, softball

and costume parades. Her program for the second year

closed with another very successful carnival.

Our pool program remained much the same as in the past. Mornings were set aside for instruction from beginners to advanced swimmers. Afternoons were split in two sessions, life saving and water safety and free swim period. The pool was open two evenings a week for family nights which were not well attended. At the close of the season swim and diving competitions were held with appropriate awards given.

Our maintenance covered the following: Fence on street painted, new sign painted and lettered, area behind tennis courts cleared, roads cleaned of grass in parking area, maintained Little League Ball Field, painted lines on new tennis court and basketball court, backboards erected, and carried on the general maintenance

expected around a playground area.

Our major improvements for the year were as follows: New tennis court, new basketball court, seams in pool re-caulked and painted, new basketball backboards and standards, new fence around the new tennis court and basketball area with wings for tennis.

Suggested improvements for this year are as follows: Repair pool machinery, seal and paint pool, repair pool ladders, new buoy lines, paint lifeguard stands, paint fence around pool, and the installation of adequate light-

ing for night tennis and basketball.

This year was by far the most successful for our skating program. Several factors contributed for this fine program. The able leadership of Mr. Robert Thompson from the High School Staff, the long period of cold weather, and the erection of warming hut which proved very popular. We have had our problems as we have had in the past with spraying the ice but with additional experience we are gaining. We would like at this time to mention the fine cooperation we have received from the highway department in making the skating so successful. Also during the summer program we called them for help on several occasions and they were cooperative at all times.

We would like to thank the voters at this time for going along with the playground committee last year and approving our recommendation for the Capital Reserve Fund. We hope this year to get started on the improvement of our filter equipment with the purchase of a much needed chlorinator. This past season we continued to have much difficulty with it and it seems wise this year to replace it which will come under the Capital Reserve Fund. We are also continuing to listen to recommendations on

re-building or re-placing our filter equipment. We realize under the Capital Reserve Fund it will be a year or two before we will have money enough but when the time arrives we hope to have all the correct answers.

This past season the Adams Playground Committee accepted the responsibility of the addition to our skating rink and tennis court. We believe we now have a play area second to none in this area. It is now possible to have four tennis courts, or three tennis court and a basketball court. Provisions have been made to change these areas over within a short period of time. We do have one problem now which we hope the recreation committee in time will consider if possible. In front of the tennis court area we do have a so-called swamp which does create a hazard both in summer and winter. It would be nice if this area could be piped for drainage and then filled in which would give us additional level play area.

Once again as in the past the committee members wish to extend our sincere thanks to our staff, selectmen, chief of police, highway department, Lions Club, and to all who have assisted us when help was needed. We also wish to extend our thanks and appreciation to the many parents who gave us a helping hand.

D. REPORT OF DISTRICT CLERK

Record of the Proceedings:

At a meeting of the inhabitants of the School District of Peterborough, qualified to vote in District affairs, holden at the Peterborough Consolidated School on Wednesday, the 8th day of March, 1961, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

The Moderator, Maurice M. Blodgett, presided and called the meeting to order and proceeded with the business as follows:

After the reading of the Warrant, the following motion was presented by the School Board, under Article 1, and was passed without discussion:

Moved: that action on Articles 1 through 4 be deferred until Tuesday, March 14, 1961, at eight o'clock in the forenoon.

Under Article 5, the School Board presented the following motion, which was passed:

Moved: that the salaries of the district officers for the ensuing year be as follows: Each school board member \$50.00, treasurer \$75.00, clerk \$10.00, moderator \$10.00, each ballot clerk \$5.00.

Article 6: It was moved that reports be accepted as printed and placed on file with the Clerk. This motion was passed, and under Article 6, a second motion was made and passed as follows:

Moved: that the Central School Building Committee be discharged, and that an expression of appreciation be extended to said committee. Under Article 7, the following motion was passed

without discussion:

Moved: that the district petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

Article 8: The budget for the school year 1961-62 was presented by the School Board under the following motion:

Moved: that the school district raise and appropriate \$335,233.94 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriations such income as is estimated by the School Board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

Kenneth Whiton, chairman of the School Board, explained the separate items in the budget. There was very little debate. The Budget Committee had no criticism of the amounts, and had interesting charts to show the different amounts appropriated, and what effect they would have on the tax rate. Mr. David Ashton and Mr. Walter Peterson, budget committee members, explained the

charts. The motion was passed.

Under Article 9, a motion presented by the School Board and approved by the Budget Committee was passed:

Moved: that the school board be authorized to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district such sums of monies as may be made available under the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-964 (for purposes outlined under Titles III, V and VIII thereof), and that the district appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for said purpose(s), \$1,000.00 of which amount shall be raised as an assessment by the town, and a like amount to be received from federal sources.

Under Article 10, the following motion was presented

by the School Board:

Moved: that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,425.00 for the purchase of bleachers for the

auditorium-gymnasium.

It was argued that these bleachers were needed badly in the gym, that people had to stand on chairs in order to see, and chairs were being damaged as a result. The Budget Committee opposed this appropriation, but after much discussion, the motion was passed.

Article 11: The following motion presented by the School Board was opposed by the Budget Committee, but

after some discussion, it was passed:

Moved: that the district vote to purchase and install new science laboratory benches, and to appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for said purpose, \$2,000.00 to be raised as an assessment by the town and a like amount to be received under Title III of the N.D.E.A.

Article 12: The following motion under this Article,

approved by the Budget Committee, was passed:

Moved: that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the establishing and operating of a program for retarded children, the use of such funds to be dependent upon receipt of sufficient funds from tuitions and state sources to make the project seem financially feasible in the opinion of the School Board

Article 13: The following motion was passed with very little discussion:

Moved: that the district authorize the School Board to request annually the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay over to the Treasurer of the school district such funds as have become available from the Adelbert M. Nichols Trust Fund as of December 31st of the prior calendar year, such funds to be appropriated to the general fund of the school district.

Article 14: Under this Article, the following motion was presented by the School Board:

Moved: that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$555.00 for the purchase of risers and chairs.

This motion was opposed by the Budget Committee and after some discussion, it was defeated.

Article 15: The following motion was presented by the School Board:

Moved: that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to set up and equip an area for maintenance use.

This motion was opposed by the Budget Committee and it was defeated.

Under Article 16, the following motion was presented by the School Board and it passed:

Moved: that the district authorize the School Board to place any unanticipated income received during 1960-61 into the general fund.

Article 17: Under this Article, the following motion was presented by the School Board:

Moved: that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 as a Capital Reserve Fund for future additions and/or capital improvements to the school building, such monies to be placed in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town of Peterborough.

After the reading of the motion, Mr. Mark Wheeler of the School Board withdrew the motion explaining that after reconsidering the matter, it was thought to be impractical at this time. No further action was taken.

All of the business being transacted, the motion was made and passed that the meeting of the Peterborough School District be recessed until Tuesday, March 14, at 8 o'clock in the forenoon.

This was the first District Meeting to be held in the Peterborough Consolidated School. It was a very stormy night, and there were about 200 voters present.

At the adjourned meeting on March 14th the following officers were elected by the District for the ensuing year.

B. SCHOOL PROGRAM

1. Report of the Elementary School Principal

Again I am happy to present the annual report of your elementary school.

The teaching staff in the elementary grades has changed very little in the past year. However, we were fortunate to add to the staff two very capable teachers. Mrs. Dianne Maki came to us in September and is teaching students in one division of grade two. Mrs. Ruth Pope also joined us in the fall and is doing a commendable job in our special class. It is our feeling that Peterborough has an outstanding staff in the elementary grades, and I wish to thank each and every one of these people for the job which they are doing.

Our reporting system which was changed last year has been very successful, and we plan to continue with the parents-teacher conferences in the first two grades. The opportunity for parents and teachers to meet to discuss a student's progress is most beneficial. Through these conferences, both teachers and parents have a clearer picture of each child.

The use of television has added to our program. Besides television, we have various other visual aids in our program, which we find enriching and beneficial in this space age.

Our sixth grade students will again attend Sargent Camp in May. This experience is most worthwhile for the student and gratifying for the teacher. The opportunities both educational and social have great merit. Teaching science and social studies "in the field" is a change of pace and an outstanding educational advantge offered in Peterborough.

This year we have started to group the students in the fifth and sixth grades. The grouping has been only in arithmetic, and we feel the pupil has a better opportunity to achieve at his own level. Through this ability grouping, a teacher is able to use her teaching time to better advantage and more individual instruction is possible.

Our school lunch program is one of the finest in New Hampshire. Mrs. Gilchrest and the entire staff of helpers should be given credit for a job very well done. At present there are about 600 students eating hot lunch in our school each day. This along with an additional 200 cold lunch people represents a big job. We are now serving in four different sittings, and the entire lunch program is accomplished within a two-hour period.

The new position of assistant principal in the high school has kept me busier than ever, as you might expect. Improvement in the growing area of curriculum has taken much of our time. To offer the number of different "tracks" or programs has been a big step forward in your educational system. We like to feel that we are better meeting the needs of more young people and therefore are preparing the students of Peterborough for future roles in life.

The further development of industries in the area and the expansion of the town will cause your school to grow to the point where three divisions of some grades will be necessary. At the present time we have three divisions of grade one and two of each other grade. Our present fourth grades have 34 students each. These are larger groups than we would like, but the extra growth has come to us since the opening of school in September. The addition of a remedial reading-guidance teacher in the first eight grades would be a big step forward and one we're sure would better prepare students for entering the high school.

In closing we wish to thank all that have made our school year successful.

2. Report of the High School Principal

The school year of 1961-62 has brought about many changes and the administration and the faculty have spent considerable time in presenting constructive developments to conform to the evaluation held at Peterborough High School on April 17, 18 and 19 in 1961. Therefore, the main part of this School Report will be spent on this evaluation, along with the major highlights as developed by members of the faculty.

The evaluation report under the heading of Commendations pointed out that the following credits should be given to the Peterborough school system:

- 1. That homogeneous grouping is established when possible.
- 2. Competent handling of the severe discipline problems.
- 3. High percentage of students attending post-high school institutions.
- 4. Professional attitude of staff and administration.
- 5. Providing a full program for general students as well as college students.

- 6. Efforts of the business department to meet the varying needs of the pupils.
- 7. Good rating in the English Department for its efforts and use of English material.
- 8. The effective methods of instruction in foreign languages.
- 9. The proper instruction and equipment and fine atmosphere in the home economics department.
- 10. The well-equipped industrial arts department, along with the fine rapport among the faculty members of this department.
- 11. The ability of the mathematics department to keep abreast of the recent philosophy in regard to mathematics even to the extent of our fine accelerated program (given in detail later on in this report).
- 12. The good start in improving the facilities and developing a broader curriculum in science education and the ability of the science teachers to avail themselves of the institutes, workshops, and other National Science Foundation supported programs.
- 13. The fine approach to understanding present up-todate world affairs by the social studies department.
- 14. An athletic program for boys and girls that is applicable to the school situation.

Good participation in the intramural program. Excellent organization in the controlling of monies

in the activity fund.

Well constructed regulations governing school social functions.

Student Council participation in the routine organization and management of student affairs.

All of these are listed under the heading of Pupil Activity Program.

- 15. Library services of Peterborough Consolidated School have shown a decided improvement during the last few years and that the book budget has been increased since 1958 in helping to bring our library up to the proper standard.
- 16. Guidance services at Peterborough have begun to mature and become effective to a great extent during the last year (given in detail later on in this report).
- 17. Under the title of School Plant, the custodial staff is to be commended for the maintenance of the buildwithin the limits of the building's condition and the number on the staff.

The policies regarding loading, unloading and dispatching buses is developed to a fine degree. The community is to be commended for providing properly equipped areas and providing a suitable auditorium for school and community use.

18. The interest and perserverance demonstrated by the staff and administration in carrying out the school evaluation over an extended period of three years. The School Board for its efforts to fulfill the commitments of the present salary schedule for teachers. The interests and efforts of the staff and administration in studying its educational program in the light of the needs of both college-bound and general students.

Recommendations:

- 1. A 7-period day be set up this was developed in our 1961-62 schedule.
- 2. Late bus for after school activities not feasible at the present time.
- 3. That more general courses be added our schedule this year includes sociology, shop math, business English, and general physics.
- 4. That an activity period be added to the school program this was carried out in our present school year.
- 5. That more rooms be added in the Echo room these additional rooms were added during the last school year.
- 6. Additional teaching personnel two teachers were added in the senior high school area.
- 7. That certain key people be placed on a 12-month basis to develop each subject matter in grades 7-12 it is our hope to put this suggestion into operation during the summer of 1962.
- 8. That driver education be added to the program this item is included in our plans for 1962-63.
- 9. That a teacher be added to the business education department because of the increased interest in business courses this is included in our plans for '62-'63.
- 10. That we continue to spend \$1000 a year to bring our library up to standard this item is included in our budget plans.
- 11. That elected courses in speech, journalism, creative writing and advanced composition be added this is being done by the exchange of teachers.

- 12. That a teacher be added to the foreign language department – we added a part-time teacher this year to develop this area.
- 13. That a language laboratory be added to this department – this is part of our Title 3 plans for 1962-63.
- 14. That the foreign language program be extended to include the junior high – this is planned for 1962-63.
- 15. That additional equipment be added to the home economics departments – these items are included in our '62-'63 budget.
- 16. 9th and 10th grade program in shop should bring out the latent talents of the students and help them to decide their choice of vocations with the help of the guidance department. 11th and 12th years should consist of the limited vocational program allied to industry.

Both of these suggestions have been incorporated in our philosophy.

- 17. That an additional teacher be added to the mathematics department by adjusting our school schedule we have added a half time teacher in this area. That a third science teacher be added to the staff by adjusting our teaching schedule - we have added a half time science teacher and will use the same teacher fulltime in '62-'63.
- 18. To get better homogeneous groupings in social studies — this was carried out as far as possible.
- 19. That a student's handbook and a teacher's handbook be developed — work has been started in both of these areas.
- 20. That a school magazine be produced the school magazine was reactivated, with the first issue coming out this fall.
- 21. Within the next two years a full-time, trained librarian should be hired to assume full responsibility for the operation of the library - we hope this can be accomplished by the school year '63-'64.
- 22. That a further effort be made to offer more guidance and testing in grades 1 through 8 – we hope to concur with this recommendation during the coming school year with the addition of a part-time teacher in this
- 23. That a special study committee composed of lay people and educational consultants be formed to study the feasibility of adding to the school needs in the future. Factors to be considered are extra classrooms, expanded toilet facilities, janitorial workshop, and cen-

tralized storage — all of these items have been seriously considered this year and the administration is prepared to propose plans to cover all of the items listed.

24. That a full-time maintenance man be added to the custodial staff — it is hoped that this can be covered by adding a part-time maintenance man for the coming school year.

It should be pointed out at this time that a framework has been developed which encourages and provides for a mutual exchange of ideas among the School Board, the Superintendent and the school staff.

This evaluation report points out that we have many reasons to be proud of our school and that the people of Peterborough should know that every step is being taken to comply with the many recommendations that were submitted in this report.

Each new school year and new personnel bring about changes which affect the general school program. Listed below are some of the areas which have produced new methods, new ideas, new philosophies and results which should be brought to the attention of the citizens of Peterborough.

Physical Fitness Testing

This year we have started our Physical Fitness Program, grades 7-12, boys and girls. The test being used is the A.A.H.P.E.R. (N.E.A.).

The test is administered twice a year with a three to five month break between each battery given with emphasis being placed on weak areas during the time gap.

There are seven test items that will evaluate the all around fitness of the individual according to his or her age, height, weight classification.

At the end of the school year each student will be given a fitness report card showing the results of the two tests and comparative scores shown in percentile and graph form.

Pupils receiving a 50th percentile rating on any or all items are considered as having good physical fitness and those with scores of 85th percentile on one or all items are considered as having above average fitness.

Few, if any, in the education field need be convinced of the importance of youth fitness. The A.A.H.P.E.R. (N.E.A.) test will give an adequate measure of youth fitness in all its aspects.

Test items are:

1. Set ups (maximum 100)

2. Pull ups (as many as you can do)

3. Shuttle Run (quick go and stop run against time)

4. Standing broad jump (explosive power for distance)

5. 50 yard dash (against time)

6. Softball throw 7. 600 yard run

Peterborough students are above the national average.

Boys are low in 50 yard dash and softball throw.

Girls are low in softball throw.

Social Studies

Sociology:

As a part of the program in the development of personal responsibility, the classes have investigated some of the desirable and undesirable aspects of our environment. Through the courtesy and cooperation of school officials and that of State officials, groups of students have visited both the State Prison in Concord, and the State Industrial School in Manchester. The Concord group was met at the Prison by Warden Hancock, and escorted through the prison by his deputy warden. The Manchester group devoted an afternoon in interviewing Dr. Morello, Director of the Industrial School. Both groups later presented reports to the classes to enable all the students to share their experience.

Warden Parker Hancock of the State Prison, graciously addressed the sociology classes in Peterborough, late in December. He spoke of the historical development of penitentiaries and of the specific purposes and societal values of such institutions. More than this, Mr. Hancock reinforced the aims of this phase of our study, for in his remarks, he emphasized the need for the development in

the individual of healthy social attitudes.

Visits to other institutions are being planned for the second half-year.

Civics:

The students in the Civics classes have become rather deeply involved in a study of local and state history and geography. A supplementary unit of work climaxed by the preparation of a comprehensive notebook of information pertinent to county and state history and organization and interest has been accomplished. A related unit

will begin shortly in which the classes will investigate the structure and operation of New Hampshire government.

Dramatics Club

Plans have crystallized for the presentation of a one-act play to a student assembly in early February. The cooperation of all has been solicited and received. A public presentation of a full-length production is being considered for late spring.

Guidance

This is the first year that the Guidance Office has been open on a 12-month basis and the results of this innovation have been very satisfactory. The added time during the summer permitted better ability and achievement grouping, with the expected result of far greater achivement by the high ability groups and far greater success by the lower ability groups, who were able to move at their own speed of learning rather than being dragged along by better students before they were ready. Many parent interviews were also held during the summer, when parents could discuss educational and vocational plans with the Counselor at their convenience.

Another result of the summer work was very obvious during the first weeks of school when it became apparent that there were fewer changes in courses being made by students. A far higher percentage of students were satisfied with their course choices and the resulting study load than has previously been the case.

The Guidance Office has been keeping a "log" of contacts this past year which provided some interesting information. This "log" can be broken down into areas shown below:

Last year our educational guidance services helped to place 38 students or 52% of the class of 1961 in college. Of this group, 85% were accepted at the college of their choice, and of the remaining 15% all but 3 were accepted

at their second choice college.

A new factor in the Guidance program is the help we are able to offer directly or indirectly to alumni. We were able to contribute in some way to the successful application of 3 members of our alumni to the Technical School at Manchester, and 2 members to four-year colleges for the first time. Of course, we continue to provide transcripts for transfer, the Guidance Office specializing in the processing of references and recommendations from faculty who knew the alumni as students.

Junior High

A new booklet was constructed this year dealing with the policies in the Junior High area. The present policies have been spelled out in detail to aid the students in Peterborough and outlying towns as to what is expected of the students and the disciplinary steps taken to in-

sure a real educational atmosphere.

One of the major academic events of the year for the students in the Junior High School was the Science Fair held in April. The students create a science project based on the science knowledge gained through the years and the imagination of the student. This provides an early foundation for future science work in keeping with the scientific process.

The trend is being encouraged for the students to receive recognition for scholastic achievement and a chance for school awards for academic work as well as

athletic.

Acceleration Program in Mathematics

Every since Sputnik, the schools of the country have been gathering their forces to improve their mathematics programs. Federal funds have been allotted for this purpose, these funds coming from money raised for national defense. We have been frightened into the need for better mathematics in the name of saving our country.

Then came Dr. Conant's report on the schools of the nation, and we were shocked by his statements concerning the waste of the brain power of the pupil who is gifted intellectually. "Accelerated Courses" and "Advanced Placement Programs" sprang up all over the country. One example of this is the summer program at St. Paul's School in Concord, N. H. This program was started with

funds given by the Ford Foundation, but it is presently aided by money from the Fund for the Advancement of Education and the National Science Foundation, the latter a tax supported organization. Since the beginning of the program in 1958, ten boys from Peterborough High School have participated. (This program which offers, not only mathematics, but also some of the physical and social sciences, and modern languages, was last summer offered to exceptional girls from New Hampshire high schools.) These ten boys are now in various colleges; many in more advanced classes than other college freshmen because of their work at St. Paul's School.

But if the intent of "Advanced Placement" and "Accelerated Courses" was merely to compress the traditional mathematics program into a shorter time, these traditional topics were found to be inadequate to keep up with the rapid changes of the space age; and the social sciences as well as the physical sciences were calling on the mathematicians for help with their data; even the needs for translations of foreign texts were handled by electronic machinery which needs the mathematician to

program it.

So "Acceleration" and "Advanced Placement" underwent scrutiny to determine the most effective course to pursue, with the result that more committees were set up. One of these committees was called the "School Mathematics Study Group," commonly known as S.M.S.G. Federal tax dollars supported this group in the name of "National Science Foundation." This Foundation also supports teacher attendance at Institutes, Summer School programs, and programs for a whole year's work at an approved college, not only for the participant in the pro-

gram, but for his dependents as well.

Here, at Peterborough High School, the impact of some of these trends had its effect when six freshmen were selected for a course in "Accelerated Mathematics," and a year ago fifteen freshmen started the same type of program. These two groups used traditional text books, but no attempt was made to rush through all the topics in order to start the second year work earlier. We explored areas of interest to the pupil; we had challenging arguments and discussions about the nature of numbers; we read books for mathematical background. The result of this freedom from prescribed routine was that we studied many topics in the first year that are traditionally reserved for more advanced grades; and we probably omitted some topics that are usually presented to freshmen.

Beginning last September, the freshmen and sophomores in the "Accelerated Program" began using the

"School Mathematics Study Group" materials, and the present juniors who started the acceleration program their freshman year, were combined with the class in senior mathematics. They seem not at all handicapped by having had high school mathematics for a year less than the rest of the group. It is probable that this group which will be left when the seniors graduate will be taking Calculus next year.

So an acceleration has come about, after all; the content and emphasis in many areas have changed; and perhaps most important of all is the fact that pupil attitudes toward mathematics have improved. The new program, whatever the reason for its inception, has resulted in better students studying better mathematics with enjoyment and appreciation.

This year has been a successful one from many points of view. It requires the efforts of many individuals and groups to make a program run smoothly and efficiently. Mr. Foote, the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, the secretaries, the teachers, the custodians, and the pupils should be commended for their professional attitude, service, and desires to give the Town of Peterborough a good school system.

3. Report of the Supervisory Staff

A report of this nature must of necessity be limited to three or four areas. This year we should like to direct your attention to the improvements and extensions in our high school curriculum, the class for special instruction, our plans for broadening the foreign language program, and the need for extending our guidance and individual testing program to the elementary grades.

In March of 1959, an unusually capable group of eighth graders were encouraged to move along at a slightly accelerated rate with the basic premise that by the time of high school graduation the members would be completing work beyond the average graduate. The next spring, under the direction of Miss Florence Hancock our mathematics program was accelerated for the academically capable student. We expect that when the program is in full operation certain units of college work will be completed in the senior year.

As mentioned in Mr. Clark's report, we have also added certain subjects to our curriculum in order to be of greater service to the terminal student.

At the annual school district meeting, funds were provided for a class of special instruction. In September the class opened with 12 children, four of them from Peterborough, and the remainder on a tuition basis from neighboring towns. This unit, we believe, is the first regional group in this field of instruction. Although the program is more expensive to operate than our regular program, the funds provided by other school districts and by the State of New Hampshire will reduce the per pupil costs of our own youngsters to a reasonable figure.

In spite of the fact that there are differences of ability within this class the program has shown steady development throughout the year. Mrs. Pope, the classroom teacher, and the women volunteers, who come in daily to assist her, are to be commended for their part in helping make this program a success.

In our budget for 1962-63, we are proposing a teacher position in remedial reading and elementary guidance. At the present time we are not able to operate a remedial program in the junior-senior high school, although our English instructors are continuing developmental reading within the limitations of their regular program. Our guidance program in grades 9-12 has gained in its effectiveness, but the guidance director is limited in his contribution in the junior high school. Our proposal will provide needed service in both of these areas.

We also hope to begin formal French in grade 7 next fall for such pupils as can handle an extra subject. Our present program beginning French in grade 9 will be continued. In brief, we will have one group beginning as seventh graders and the other group as ninth graders. Such a program will allow certain pupils an opportunity for additional subjects as juniors and seniors.

In closing our annual report we would be remiss if we fail to mention the spirit, enthusiasm, and dedication shown by our teaching staff. We are sincere in our statement that we seldom have had the privilege of working with a group with such high professional spirit.

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Peterborough School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1960 and June 30, 1961, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$25,471.68 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$9,797.32, less a revenue surplus of \$8,404.51, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,392.81. It is noted that by vote at the annual meeting in March, 1961, the District authorized the expenditure of revenue received in excess of budgetry estimates during the 1960-61 fiscal year.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1961, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1961, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

Exhibit H presents a statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Peterborough. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1961, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1960-61 School Tax.

It is noted that during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of the School District increased from \$142.44 to \$614.12, as indicated herewith:

PART VI. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

A. HEALTH

Changes are everywhere about us. Changes in our society, in our educational systems, and in our school health program. In 1894 when school medical services were first offered, reportedly in Boston, the greatest emphasis was on the control of communicable diseases. Through immunization and the development of present-day medications the seriousness of contagious diseases has been largely eliminated. School health programs have gradually broadened to include all aspects of health as defined by the World Health Organization: — "Physical, mental and social well-being."

What should you expect from your school health program? "School Health Services" published by the Joint Committe on Health Problems in Education of the National Education Association and the American Medical Society states that a partnership of education and medicine is essential and suggests the following functions:

- 1. To appraise the health status of pupils and school personnel.
- 2. To counsel pupils, parents, and others concerning appraisal findings.
- 3. To encourage the correction of remediable health problems.
- 4. To assist in the identification and education of handicapped children.
- 5. To help prevent and control disease.
- 6. To provide emergency service for injury or sudden illness.

These are broad statements that involve the entire health team of which the classroom teacher is the key person. It is she/he who knows the children best and is quick to sense changes in behavior or appearance that may indicate a need for referral to the guidance counselor or nurse.

The responsibility for a child's health rests, of course, with his family and the school health program in no way interferes with that responsibility. It offers a supplement to assist parents, adds to the child's knowledge of healthful living and encourages him to gradually assume responsibility for his own health.

Another change — or perhaps exchange is a more descriptive work — took place in September, when Miss Gladys Newhall joined the staff of the Lexington, Massachusetts school health program and a Public Health nurse from the neighboring town of Winchester, Massachusetts came to Peterborough.

The statistics offered below cover the school year 1960-61 and are from a report prepared by Miss Newhall.

The last four months of 1961 were a time of learning in a new situation and of getting acquainted with a family of eight hundred children and fifty adults. Plans for the future include more home visits, and there are two projects in the infant stages:—

- 1. An experiment in group health counseling with twenty girls who have a weight problem.
- 2. Daily practice with children with speech difficulties. This is being made possible through the cooperation of the teachers and assistance from Mr. Richard E. Allison, Speech Therapist at Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center.

During the past year many generous individuals and organizations have given time and financial aid to the program. It is deeply appreciated. May I thank Dr. Mahlon Mason, School Medical Officer, for his leadership and the Peterborough Consolidated School personnel for their warm friendly acceptance of an "outlander."
