THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Rumney Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Cemeteries.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common and the daily raising and lowering of the flag.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post No. 76, American Legion, for Memorial Day and other partiotic purposes.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$285.81 to secure from the State \$1,905.37 to be expended for Town Road Aid.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed \$600.00 for tarring on the T. R. A. Road at Stinson Lake.

13. To see if the Town will vote to paint and repair the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for same.

14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in co-operation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the operation of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth, N. H.

16. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to Civil Defense and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the raising and appropriating an amount of money toward the erection of a New Hampshire Marine Memorial at Hampton Beach.

18. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal Advice.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its tax collector's sales.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

21. To see if the Town will vote to allow a two per cent discount on all taxes paid within fifteen days after presentation of bills.

22. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing games of Beano be adopted in this town.

23. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

BE A GOOD CITIZEN — COOPERATE

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the State of New Hampshire in 1955—235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. District and local wardens issued 959 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things—while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

REMEMBER

1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT TO THE RUMNEY SCHOOL DISTRICT

Herewith submitted is my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

It has been a pleasure during this past year to work with the various committees that were appointed to build the school in Rumney which you voted at your last School District Meeting. I am very sure you have taken a step which is a wise one and which you will not regret. I can assure you that the people on your committees are doing their utmost to see that for the money you have appropriated, Rumney will have a school which will be a credit to the town. In my opinion, however, you should not be too hopeful of being able to occupy the building in September. It has been my observation, as I have seen a number of school buildings erected, that they are seldom completed in the allotted time. On this basis, I am recommending to your School Board that you do not hire a sixth teacher for the school year 1956-1957. My feeling is that strong criticism, justly so, might result if a teacher were under contract and had to be paid during a period of several months when there was no place to teach. However, I expect that for the 1957-1958 school year, an extra teacher will have to be employed.

The schools are continuing this year with the same competent staff of regular teachers who were employed during 1954-1955, and in my opinion they are all doing fine work.

During the Spring term last year, achievement tests were given and the results indicated your children on the average were at or above national norms. As this is being written, achievement tests and some mental maturity tests are being ordered for our annual Spring testing program. Beginning next September I shall plan to administer achievement tests twice each year, in the Fall and Spring, so that the Fall test may be used by the teachers for diagnostic and remedial work throughout the year.

Mrs. Lovett, your former school nurse, resigned in June and we were able to replace her with Mrs. Helen Fisher. Mrs. Fisher is a capable, experienced school nurse, who, in my opinion, is doing a fine job.

Miss Meyer, your music supervisor, also resigned and she has been replaced by Mr. Joseph Malfa. Mr. Malfa is a Boston Conservatory of Music and Boston University graduate, who has had music supervisory experience in New York State. He is particularly strong in the instrumental field and does very satisfactory work with vocal music and music theory. He gives of his time freely, far beyond the demand that normally should be made of him.

We are using for the first time this year, the new arithmetic and language series which were adopted last Spring. In the future you should begin to see an improvement in these areas as the same series of books is being used from grade to grade and articulation is at a maximum. We are next going to work on some type of social studies adoption where there is more emphasis and materials for the elementary and intermediate grades. After this has been done and the area of grade school science has been improved upon, I feel that our curriculum will be in excellent condition.

I have enjoyed working with the people of Rumney and its teachers for the past year and wish to extend my thanks for their cooperation and help. As your Superintendent of Schools I want you to know I am willing at all times to give advice or counsel on educational matters. As your new school is about to be constructed I shall do everything possible to see that you obtain the best educational plant possible for the money you have to spend and that within the limits of the budget the equipment and supplies for it will be of the best.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent as per the following quotation:

“REPORTS. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union.”

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is pro-rated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is pro-rated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1954-1955 received a salary of \$5825 which was made up as follows: \$2500 paid from the per capita tax and \$3325 pro-rated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$750 for travel within the union was also pro-rated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

Superintendent's salary for 1954-1955 based on the above figure is reconciled as follows: \$3325 paid by the various districts, plus \$2500 received from State per capita tax, equals \$5825 Superintendent's basic salary. This, plus \$750 travel allowance allocated as indicated above, totals \$6575—amount received from State Treasurer for salary and travel of the Superintendent of Schools.

SUMMARY OF WORK FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR

Subject: Music Grades 1-4 No. of Children 21

Textbook: Singing and Rhyming

School: Montview

Most of the songs have been taught by rote: "Helping Mother Bake a Cake," "Home on the Range," and "Mister Punchinelle" are thoroughly enjoyed. Rhythm has been used to emphasize the meaning of the song words, and various instruments have been used to emphasize rhythm. They are able to read the note values and note syllables with confidence and ease.

Subject: Music Grades 1-2 No. of children 29

Textbook: New Music Horizon 3 and Our Song.

School: Rumney Village

Most of the songs are by rote and note in the above texts for this musical minded group. An excellent class to work with because of their rapidity of learning songs with so much ease. Songs like "My Morning Song," "Music on the Air," and "Three Blind Mice" are easily mastered in one day.

Rumney Village School Grades 3-4

No. of children 32

Textbook: Merry Music

Another excellent class for music ability. "Old Folks At Home," "Busy Milkman," and "Praise and Thanks" are easily sung at half the lesson period. About 95 percent of the class have found their singing voices which seems to stimulate interest in their younger brothers and sisters across the hall. Elementary knowledge of theory is easily digested by this keen group.

Subject: Music Grades 5-6 No. of children 31
Textbook: Our Land of Song
School: Rumney Depot

A very good singing class with much ability in the music knowledge. Rhythm has been used and stimulated by the use of singing and dancing games. Many of the students are able to sing different kinds of intervals, e.g. a 3rd, or a 4th, or a 5th or an octave with comparatively little effort.

Instrumental work has helped them with their understanding of this difficult task. This group, like all the others, would sing songs all day long if it were permissible.

Subject: Music Grades 7-8 No. of children 31
Textbook: Sing Out
School: Rumney Depot

Another keen group for singing out familiar songs and in two part singing their voices just ring out with joy. Some music appreciation with the story of the lives of Beethoven, Bach, Mozart, Chopin and Schubert was covered with examples of their music. Chiapaneca's "Here Comes the Band" and other songs of "The Holy City" calibre have been great successes.

Instrumental work in this school: 3 violins, 1 trumpet, 1 accordion.

To the Voters of Rumney School District:

The following is a report of activities carried on for your town for the year 1955, by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing.

In the months of May and October 1955 children of the first and second grades of school were transported, through the cooperation of the Superintendent

of Schools, School Board and school buses, to Plymouth to take part in the Salk Polio Vaccine Clinic, financed by the National Polio Foundation and conducted by the N. H. Department of Health in cooperation with the School Board, School Nurse, and Local March of Dimes Chairman. Much credit is due school personnel, Plymouth doctors and nurses for making this program a success, also anyone else who gave assistance. Thirty-six children from various schools in Rumney took part in this program.

In December the N. H. Department of Health through the Dental Health Services started a series of fluorine treatments and cleaning for preschool age children. Fifteen preschool children from West Rumney and seventeen preschools from Rumney started this series of cleaning and four fluorines. This is continued in 1956. My deepest appreciation for the use of West Rumney school building and Rumney Village Grange Hall to make it possible to render this service to your town.

Many home calls have also been made in town on mothers, infants and preschool age children. Arrangements have been made for preschools to attend special clinics as necessary.
