

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 9th day of March next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the ensuing year, and one member of the Park Commission for a term of two years.

2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expense.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Hospitals.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110.12, to obtain Town Road Aid, the State to appropriate the sum of \$734.12.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Civilian Defense.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1250.00 for the use of the Winnisquam Fire Department. 8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to care of trees and raise money for same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 for new equipment.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for partial participation to the Lakes Region Association, this money to be spent for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural resources and advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other towns in the Lakes Region.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,804.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be put in an existent Building Fund savings account for a Community Center. This fund to be contingent on the motion and amendment of the 1962 Town Meeting.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 to be used by the Road Agent in a program to resurface the streets and roads in Tilton. This program to be planned and administered by the elected Road Agent of the Town.

14. To see how much money the Town will vote toraise and appropriate for the purpose of having the State Tax Commission revalue all real estate property in the Town.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,645 as its share of the cost of reconstructing Bridge Number 128/158 on the N. H. Route 140. 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary funds to defray Tilton's share of the above Construction.

17. To see if the Town will vote to install three 1000 Lumen street lights at Northern Shores Development, Lochmere.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to purchase one half interest in the Dam and Water Rights of the former American Woolen Co., from the Public Service Co. of N. H.

19. To see what action the Town shall take in regard to amending Article X of the Zoning Regulations by adding the following:

The Board of Adjustment shall approve plans for the erection and alteration of structures only where such plans meet the standard of construction required by good engineering practice and safety and where the exterior surface of the building meets normal standards.

20. To see what action the Town shall take in regard to amending the Zoning Regulations by adding Article XI-A, as follows:

No person, firm or corporation shall strip, excavate or otherwise remove top soil, sand or gravel from Single Residence. General Residence or Apartment House Districts for sale, or for any use other than on the premises from which the same shall be taken except in connection with the construction or alteration of a building on such premises and excavation or grading incidental thereto.

21. To see what action the Town will take in regard to creating a Planning Board and to empower said Planning Board with all the powers which may be legally vested in Planning Boards as authorized under Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated as amended including the right to regulate subdivisions of land and the authority to establish an official map and to appropriate money for same.

22. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid Taxes as follows: Two percent if the Tax Bill is paid within thirty days from date of bill.

23. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed.

24. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all purposes for the ensuing year.

25. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.

26. To choose any other officers and agents for the year ensuing.

27. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls shall be closed not earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the evening. The business meeting will be held at 8:00 in the evening.

Having examined the accounts of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Trustees of Trust Funds Recreation Council, for the year ending December 31, 1964, we find them correctly cast and properly vouched.

REPORT OF POLICE CHIEF

1964 was a year of transition for the Tilton Police Department. This developed through the labors of the Police Committee, the excellent cooperation of the Board of Selectmen, and, most important, the desire of the citizens of Tilton to have at their disposal an efficient, up-todate police department.

Working conditions were improved by shortening the number of hours per work week, adjusting the salary schedule, furnishing uniforms and adequate equipment, and by providing coordination and definite policies within the department.

With a complement of three full-time officers we have been able to furnish more coverage, averaging 22 hours per day, at the same time, are able to have two-man coverage during those hours it is needed most. This coverage, coupled with our recently installed telephone answering set, has enabled the department to provide more, better, and faster service to the community.

Members of the department received their first formal training in September and October with a school conducted by myself. This consisted of basic material pertaining to the complex requirements of modern law enforcement and was the groundwork for the Area Training School to be conducted during March and April by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. In October Tilton's police officers received firearms training under conditions similar to those encountered by law enforcement officers. This course, known as the Practical Pistol Course, will be conducted again in May by Special Agents of the F.B.I.

Equipment has been purchased which now enables the officers to perform their duties efficiently and in a proper manner. Report and filing systems have been instituted. A simple accounting system has been devised so as to keep an accurate up-to-date watch on each dollar of the department's budget, thus insuring the taxpayers of getting maximum value for their tax dollar, and to provide the best possible assurance of staving within the budget.

There is still need for improvement in several areas. However, these are being studied and will be presented for your consideration only after I am certain that you will be offered the correct solution at the lowest possible cost.

A police department is only as good as the people of the community want it to be. It is my aim to provide the maximum quality of police service, consistent with the requirements of the town, at the lowest possible cost. it is the policy of this department to enforce all laws in a strict, but fair, manner, with equal consideration for all. The Tilton Police Department is YOUR police department. It is the desire of every member of the department that each citizen avail himself of our services

In closing, I wish to thank the people of Tilton for the wholehearted cooperation they have extended the department.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy-both industrial and recreational—is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area -4,350.00 acres-is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out. A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to es-

cape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

TILTON-NORTHFIELD CIVIL DEFENSE

The Selectmen Tilton and Northfield Gentlemen:

The Civil Defense organization of our two towns has made steady progress during the past year.

The Warning System was erected in the early part of the year, partly by volunteer CD personnel and part by sub contracts to local concerns. Tilton road department also rendered valuable assistance. A malfunction in the horn's mechanical assembly required a complete factory replacement, which was carried out entirely at the manufacturers cost.

The horn is now functioning satisfactorily and is tested monthly in accordance with Federal directives. Reimbursement representing approximately 50 percent of the total cost, was received from federal CD funds.

A class conducted by a State official and designed to inform or instruct CD personnel, Firemen, Police, Scout Explorers and members of the public, in the perils and protection from the results of a nuclear attack produced disappointing attendance, particularly from leading members of the community and our public safety departments. However, I am pleased to report that should the occasion arise, we could fully man with qualified operators and instruments, three radiological reporting groups.

At the time of making this report, the writer and his assistant, Mr. William Southworth, are attending a State Police sponsored course designed for police officers and CD officials.

During the past twelve months two attack warning exercises have been carried out, one statewide, the other nationwide. Although we received our messages fairly quickly, it is planned to have this communication link improved in the near future.

Sundry small items of equipment have been purchased, mostly from government surplus sources, items that for the most part are of current use to the Police and Fire Departments. Of particular note was the aquisition for \$200.00 of a 30KW portable gasoline driven electric generator in 'as new' condition. An item that would be valuable in maintaining essential electrical services in the event of a major power failure.

Future plans call for the encouragement of instruction in our High School toward a better understanding by older students of the problems of nuclear radiation and the protection of the individual. Also, it is the opinion of the writer that in the not too far distant future, a radiation proof shelter be constructed beside the Fire House, to accommodate essential safety personnel and their instruments in the event of a nuclear attack against this part of the country.

TILTON-NORTHFIELD RECREATION COUNCIL 1964 Annual Report

The ninth year of operation has seen continued expansion of the program, and we feel, a tremendous improvement in public relations and cooperation.

Attendance at the center in the period of fourteen months, from October, 1963 to December, 1964, has more than tripled for all functions from free play to dances. Comparatively, the local population has not increased in the same ratio, therefore we feel the increase must be due to the well organized and supervised program directed by 'Pete' Sorette.

Speaking of 'Pete', his teen council has done a wonderful job in taking up where we, the taxpayers, have left off. They raised \$1689.00 during the last school year. The building fund has grown by their donation of \$100.00; we have a new Brunswick Pool Table at the center through their dedication and hard work. Also, they gave to the Olympic Fund, bought all their own records for the center and in addition, purchased small equipment for the center such as ping pong paddles, etc.

The swimming program was very successful and quite expensive due to the necessay purchase of much needed equipment such as a boat and rope to make markers for the swimming area. Raft and dock repairs had to be made. Through volunteer labor, this expense was kept to a minimum. The program was well received with an average daily attendance of 84 students and 167 graduates of the various classes. Bob Robitaille of Franklin was our director for the program, with Jane Falardeau and Dennis Smith serving as assistants. Dwight Barney was our bus driver. We were fortunate to secure a lease for the bus from the Tilton 49ers Drum & Bugle Corps, which saved \$110.00 from the previous year. Many thanks to all concerned for a job well done.

Our current project is to establish a recreation advisory council which would be made up for the most part, by representatives of the different organizations in town. There still is a definite lack of communication between the townspeople and those of us administering your program. We hope the establishment of this council will help to alleviate that situation.

As we live here in the heart of recreation country, we think our recreation program should be second to none, and we continue to work to that end.

In closing, we wish to thank Mr. Wayne Fenhoff for rebuilding our waterfront equipment; Mr. Richard Wadleigh of Wadleigh Marine for selling us our boat and other equipment for the beach at his cost; the School Board for their cooperation and understanding, and everyone who has helped us in any way what so ever.

During this period the nurse has made 1876 nursing visits and 339 cases were cared for.

Forty trips were made with patients to Doctors offices and clinics during this period.

Mrs. Thalia Coulter substituted for Mrs. French during February and March.

The nurse assisted at the blood bank mobile unit in February and August.

Three immunization clinics sponsored by the State Health Department in cooperation with the District Nurse Association and the School Health Department were held in the American Legion Hall October 8, November 9, and December 7. Eighty-four children received toxoid for the prevention of Pertussis, Diphtheria and Tetanus. Sabin oral polio vaccine was given to twentyfive children and twenty-seven children were vaccinated for small pox. Dr. Robinson was the physician attending at these clinics. Nurses assisting were Mrs. Virginia Knowlton and Miss Rosemary Hawkins from the State Health Department, Mrs. Kay Hewitt, School Nurse Mrs. Lurline McCook, Mrs. Alice French, Miss Leata Kennedy and myself. Clerical workers were Mrs. Marjory Robert and Mrs. Norma Lamanuzzi.

At Thanksgiving time Mr. Bernard Chapman and I distributed food from the Sunday School of the Congregational Church. Also food baskets were donated by the Salvation Army to two needy families.

At Christmas time the school nurse and I distributed toys donated by the Episcopal Church, the Lion's Club, the Rotary Club and the Girl Scout Troop. Through generous gifts of money from the Emblem Club in Franklin, the teachers at the Tilton - Northfield schools and two personal donors we were able to purchase additional gifts which we wrapped and delivered.

The Elks, Salvation Army and the American Legion provided many well filled baskets of food which were delivered to needy families.

On behalf of the District Nurse Association I extend sincere appreciation to the American Legion for the use of their hall for our Fall clinics.

At the end of my first half year as your district nurse I wish to thank the Executive Board of the District Nurse Association for their support. Mrs. Alice French for her kindly counsel and advice, the selectmen, the residents of both towns and the friendly cooperation of my patients.

REPORT OF THE

TILTON-NORTHFIELD SCHOOL BOARD

The Board voted last June to use the balance of the Building Fund Account plus federal aid to purchase an electricityelectronics laboratory for the training of vocational pupils for the new state technical institute courses and for the college preparation of pupils in our physics and general science high school courses. Our district was the first in the state outside of the cities to establish this course. It could also lead to interest of small electronics firms to locate in this area.

The proposed budget for 1965-1966 will show three special expenditures: (1) An increased amount for salary increases for teachers to meet the competition from other communities and to retain the best teachers. (2) An amount to cover the cost of interscholastic athletics not covered by gate receipts. (3) Part of the salary of the cafeteria director in order to improve the lunch program and avoid deficits.

All taxpayers will probably be pleased to know that the Board does not plan to request a bond issue for an addition to the Sanborn School this year. The census shows small first grades with an enrollment of 70 to 88 commencing September 1966 with three teachers needed for the first grade instead of the present four. There are now four teachers in the first and second grades and it will be necessary to retain these two positions as they progress through the six grades.

The high school does not face any space problem since the building was constructed to house one hundred additional pupils over the present enrollment.

The High, Union and Sanborn Schools are in excellent maintenance and the following renovations were made:

Tilton-Northfield Junior-Senior High School

- 1. Four new doors installed in the gymnasium
- 2. Four classrooms painted

- 3. The baseball backstop was increased in height to reduce window damage
- 4. The roof was repaired in the original school
- 5. The ventilators were painted
- 6. The enrance to the gymnasium was painted and the wall repaired
- 7. The custodians have saved the district large sums annually by doing a great deal of maintenance and repairs throughout the year, including the renovation of school furniture by sanding and refinishing

Union and Sanborn Schools

- 1. The renovation of one entire classroom in the Union School, including floor leveling cover, a new tile floor, wainscoting, and painting in accordance with the Board policy of improving completely one classroom a year
- 2. Two classrooms painted by contractor and two by custodians (Union)
- 3. Stairway, stairwell, side door, basement entrance, one ceiling, boiler room, incinerator and four corkboards painted (Union)
- 4. Floors in six classrooms and four stairways sealed (Union)
- 5. Temporary repairs to Sanborn roof
- 6. The custodians have saved the district large sums annually by doing a great deal of maintenance and repairs throughout the year, including the renovation of school furniture by sanding and refinishing
- A new fence installed at the schools, including a gate to reduce trespassing by pupils on neighboring property

The following equipment was purchased:

Tilton-Northfield Junior-Senior High School

1. 32 foot ladder

Union and Sanborn Schools

- 1.Floor machine
- 2. Wet and dry pick-up machine
- 3. Window washer
- 4. Electric motor for ventilators
- 5. Gravely tractor with leaf mulcher
- 6. New wheelbarrow and lawn tools

The summer program at the elementary schools included morning recreation, athletics, arts and crafts for approximately one hundred pupils daily. This program has been operated by the Board for over twenty years. The instrumental music program for seventy pupils was maintained for the second year. The new introduction was remedial and special reading for fifty pupils. This program is to help children with special problems.

The Katherine M. Johnson's Estate contribution of five thousand dollars was received in December 1964 and has been placed in a savings account. The interest, in accordance with the will, will be used for an annual scholarship for a high school graduate, commencing with the Class of 1966.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The Tilton-Northfield School Board conducted the business of the district for the best possible interests of education, with a few examples listed:

1. Completed the financial year, for the twelfth in a row, with a balanced budget and all outstanding bills paid.

2. Used the balance of the building account, and federal aid under the National Defense Education Act, to purchase an electricity/electronics laboratory to train vocational pupils for the new state technical institutes and college bound pupils in modern physics and general science, and for positions of employment in electronics firms which may locate in the area.

3. Authorized the purchase of textbooks for the new mathematics system for Grades 7-12.

4. Authorized the purchase of modern mathematics books for Grades 3-6.

5. Conducted a study with all teachers of the union on a new standard reading program and purchased new books for Grades 1 and 2, with the plan of completing the series in the next few years.

6. Operated the annual summer program at the Union School under the direction of Mr. Lansing Reinholz, High School teacher, assisted by two high school girls, Kathleen Davidson and Carol Hilliard—in recreation, athletics, arts and crafts.

7. Conducted for the second year the instrumental music summer program under the direction of Mr. Thomas Vento.

8. Maintained an excellent remedial reading program for approximately fifty pupils under the teaching of Mrs. Cass; the seven summer weeks enabling many pupils to correct reading defects.

9. Arranged for the construction of additional library shelving for the high school library.

10. Purchased over fifteen hundred dollars worth of new library books in addition to the ones received from the Friends of the Library and the American Legion Auxiliary.

11. Sent Physical Education Director Donald Piper to two clinics conducted by the New Hampshire State Athletic Association.

12. Started soccer as a new fall sport for about thirty boys at Tilton-Northfield High School.

13. Sent Guidance Director Miriam Hill to a New England Guidance Clinic.

14. Sent Principal Robert Libby to the New England meeting of Secondary School Principals.

15. Authorized the attendance of Commerce Teacher Roberta Stearns at the New England Commercial Teachers' Annual Meeting.

16. Approved the attendance of Social Studies Teacher Lansing Reinholz at a Social Studies meeting at the University of New Hampshire.

17. Approved the attendance of Mrs. Marian Stucker at the University of New Hampshire to complete requirements as a qualified school librarian.

18. Sent French Teacher Virginia Tripp to a Language Teacher Meeting at St. Anselm's College.

19. Sent Industrial Arts Teacher and fifteen boys to the Annual Vocational Contest at New London, where the pupils won many awards for their exhibits.

20. Purchased new science modern textbooks for Grades 5-6.

21. Introduced Mechanical Drawing and Blueprint Reading as a new course, especially for pupils planning to enter engineering courses in college.

22. Purchased new social studies books of a standard series for Grades 1-2.

23. Sent the high school chorus to a regional chorus festival at Peterborough.

24. Conducted excellent Open House occasions at the elementary schools and high school for parents and interested citizens.

25. Approved a Union School and High School Science Fair with a large citizen attendance.

26. Added two teachers at the high school and one at the elementary school to take care of increased enrollment.

27. Contracted for the painting of six rooms and the gymnasium entrance at the high school and two rooms at the Union School.

28. Contracted for one new tile floor at the Union School.

29. Installed four new wood doors at the high school gymnasium.

30. Repaired the junior high and Sanborn School roofs.

31. Purchased all school supplies on the low bid arranged by the towns of the old supervisory union.

32. Sent all office equipment of the Tilton-Northfield share of the Division of the old supervisory union to the high school.

33. Elected Mr. Corey McAllister as Principal of the Union and Sanborn Schools after the requests of Miss Rita Martin and Mr. Robert Candon to be released from administration but continued as teachers. 34. Accepted with regret the resignation of Mr. Elmer Simmons as Head Custodian of the Union and Sanborn Schools, after a long and very successful career in the Tilton-Northfield Schools.

35. Purchased all equipment, repairs, cafeteria supplies, milk, oil and other services on bids.

36. Approved Principal Robert Libby attending the National Principals' Convention.
