

CONSTANCE GROVER SELECTMAN TOWN OF TROY 1984 - 1987

This past year, the Town of Troy was saddened by the passing away of Connie LaGrenade Grover, a Selectman in the Town of Troy. Connie was a true native of Troy who was born, brought up and made Troy her home during her lifetime. She was born on September 15, 1927, and resided for her younger and school years at the LaGrenade home on the east side of the common.

We remember Connie as being a very active person, a member of the "gang" getting involved in everything in town, and, as school kids in those days in Troy, we made our own fun, good and sometimes ending in a little trouble.

Connie always had a part in the school plays, the wonderful minstrel shows that were a yearly event during the war years, Charlie McGinness was always the interlocutor, the banjo players from Boston and everyone in black faces; the shows were great.

She was a leader and sometimes an instigator. A very active girl on Halloween helping to decorate the town, moving wagons and hanging them on flagpoles and on the roof of the Post Office. A real aggressive girl when we had the apple fights in the fall and obtaining apples from the apple man from Wilton; he always did loose a lot of apples. We believe that during these years we were great at out foxing the town police, "two-gun Earl Perham"; he never did catch the kids on Halloween.

Basketball in the Town Hall, pick-up baseball at the Oak Tree Lot, Connie was involved. Even to being thrown out of school for a day, Connie was right in there.

A smart, intelligent young lady, valedictorian of her class, President of the class of "45", and always helping someone who need help with English and math.

In the winter skiing on Three Hills, rubber bands from inner tubes holding the skis on, tobogganing from West Hill down through town to the Village Pond, she was always there.

Connie was a good example of the youth of Troy.

We know from later years that one thing she was proudest of was her five sons and three daughters. Connie saw to it that each one learned to swim at the Sand Dam in the program established by Dr. Sam Paul. They are great swimmers and Water Safety Instructors. A great achievement that she talked about the rest of her life, and she convinced others to take part and get involved in the programs.

For eighteen years Connie fought cancer with a positive attitude. Only she with her attitude and determination could beat the disease as long as she did.

Selectman, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Justice of the Peace, Notary Public, Bail Bondsman, student, friend of the library, etc., Connie was involved. Connie loved Troy and the people in Troy and encouraged



everyone to get involved. She strongly supported women to get involved to take public offices, school boards, to become a part of the American Process.

An avid hiker during the years to the end she was always climbing her beloved Monadnock Mountain.

Connie lived a full life; she was strong will, outspoken, but had compassion for people and spent hours encouraging young and underprivileged to get ahead, to read, to learn more, that life has a lot to give.

This writer could go on and on, but I believe that she said what she though and did what she thought was best for her family and her town. To her husband, sons and daughters, I can say Connie was a great person for the town, a wonderful person and a person who is sorely missed.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next at 10:00 AM in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Articles listed below and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 9th of March next at 7:30 PM to act upon the remainder of the listed warrant.

ARTICLE 1: To bring in your votes for one Selectman for three years and all other Town officers elected by ballot, as passed by Town Meeting or State Statues for the specified number of years.

ARTICLE 2: Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows:

Amendment #1: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article III: General Provisions, Section B by deleting the existing Section B language and inserting the following as Section B:

B. No new structure shall be erected or placed within limits of the town of Troy without a building permit from the Board of Selectmen, so as to ensure compliance with Town, State and Federal laws relative to water supplies, sanitation, fire, health and safety, unless said building or structure is less than two hundred (200) square feet and serves as an accessory use to an existing residence.

(Change makes it clear as to when a building permit is needed.)

Amendment #2: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article IV: Village District Section 2 by deleting existing Section 2 language and inserting the following as Section 2:

(2) Lodging, rooming and boarding houses; group homes; motels, hotels, bed and breakfasts, nursing homes and health care facilities for the elderly; and other accommodations for overnight guests, shall be allowed only by special exception granted by the Board of Adjustment when the Board determines that said use meets the requirements imposed by Article X, Section D; and the provisions of the Town of Troy Site Plan Review Regulations.

(Change expands the list of uses allowed.)

Amendment #3: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article IV: Village District Section 7 and 8 by deleting the existing Section 7 and 8 language and replacing them by inserting the following as Section 7, renumbering subsequent items accordingly: (7) Home occupation activities, including professional offices, shall be permitted only as Special Exception granted by the Board of Adjustment when said Board is satisfied that such use meets the requirements imposed by Article X, sections D and G1.

(Change simplifies procedure for obtaining a permit for Home occupations.)

Amendment #4: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article IV: Village District Section 9 by deleting existing Section 9 language and inserting the following as Section 9:

(9) Conversion of existing single-family dwelling to a twofamily dwelling or the conversion of an existing singlefamily or two-family dwelling to a multi-family dwelling shall be permitted only by special exception from the Board of Adjustment provided that the Board determines that such uses meets the requirements imposed by Article X and G3.

(Change makes requirements easier to understand.)

Amendment #5: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article VI: Rural District Section 11 by deleting existing Section 11 Tanguage and inserting the following as Section 11:

(11) Conversion of existing single-family dwelling to a twofamily dwelling or the conversion of an existing singlefamily or two-family dwelling to a multi-family dwelling shall be permitted only by special exception from the Board of Adjustment provided that the Board determines that such uses meets the requirements imposed by Article X and G3.

(Change makes requirement easier to understand.)

Amendment #6: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article VI: Rural District Section 9 and 10 by deleting the existing Section 9 and 10 Tanguage and replacing them by inserting the following as Section 9, renumbering subsequent items accordingly:

(9) Home occupation activities, including professional offices, shall be permitted only as Special Exception granted by the Board of Adjustment when said Board is satisfied that such use meets the requirements imposed by Article X, sections D and G1.

(This change simplifies the procedure for obtaining a permit for home occupation activities.)

Amendment #7: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article VII: In dustrial District Section B. by replacing language pertaining to Minimum stories with the following language pertaining to Maximum stories and replacing language pertaining to Minimum of open lot to the following language pertaining to Minimum of lot left as open space: B. Maximum stories (buildings) 2 1/2 Minimum of lot left as open space 25% (This change removes unneccessary language)

Amendment #8: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article IX: Administration and Enforcement by deleting the existing Section B and inserting the following as Section B.

B. It shall be unlawful to erect and use any 'structure, alter the size of any existing building, remove or demolish any existing structure or relocate any building in any district within the Town of Troy without first obtaining a building permit from the Board of Selectmen or their agent, unless such structure is less than two hundred (200) square feet and serves as an accessory use to an existing residence.

(This change adds the requirement for a permit to demolish existing structures and clears up the requirement for a Building Permit where expanding the square footage of a building by addition or remodeling.)

Amendment # 9: Amend the Troy Zoning Ordinance Article VIII: Non-Conforming Uses and Non-Conforming Lots of Record by inserting the following as Section D:

- D. Non-conforming Lots of Record (Grandfather Clause).
 - a. In any district in which single-family detached dwellings are permitted, such a dwelling and customary accessory buildings may be erected on a vacant lot which was a lawful lot of record as of the date of the zoning regulations making said lot non-concorming. Such buildings may be erected even though the lot does not conform to the area or frontage requirements of this ordinance.
 - b. The applicable district requirements for setbacks and other requirements not involving area or frontage shall still apply to non-conforming lots of record.
 - c. No structure or building shall be erected on a nonconforming lot of record unless the septic system requirements of both the State of New Hampshire and the Town are complied with.

(This change insures a pre-existing lot prior to zoning is grand-fathered in as a building lot.)

Amendment #10: Amend the Zoning Ordinance Article X: Board of Adjustment Section G (3) by inserting the following as item a:

a. The property has received Site Plan Approval from the Planning Board.

(Change just adds this sentence.)

ARTICLE 3: Are you in favor of the adoption of the following Amendments as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows: These are additional definitions to be added to Article XVI; Definitions, and will be added alphabetically and renumbered accordingly.

- 1. BED AND BREAKFAST (GUEST HOUSE) FACILITY. An existing residential building that is used as a residence and which contains not more than six (6) sleeping rooms, with or without individual sanitary facilities, for rental accommodations for tourists, for durations less than two weeks, which serves breakfasts to guests and may serve other meals to guests. An accessory building to a residence is not a Bed and Breakfast.
- CONVERSION APARTMENT. The remodeling of a single-family dwelling unit into two or more separate dwelling units, or, the conversion of an existing two-family dwelling unit into three or more separate dwelling units.
- 3. DWELLING. A Building designed or used as the living quarters for one or more families. The terms "dwelling", "singlefamily dwelling", "two-family dwelling" or multi-family dwelling" shall not be deemed to include "motel", "hotel", or "group home", "boarding house" or "nursing home".
- 4. DWELLING TYPE:
 - a. Single-Family. A dwelling unit accommodating a single family, detached from any additional dwelling units, with two side yards.
 - b. Two-Family (Duplex). A building having two (2) dwelling units each with its own exterior entrance and containing no more than two families. The dwelling units may be either semidetached with one (1) family living on each side of a common party wall or stacked with one family living over the other.
 - c. Multi-Family. A building containing three (3) or more dwelling units and designed to be occupied as a residence by three (3) or more families living independently of each other and each having its own exterior door or entrance from an interior hall. For the purpose of this code Townhouses (Row Dwellings) shall be considered multifamily dwellings.
 - d. Townhouse (Row Dwelling). Three or more dwelling units accommodating three or more families which are attached side by side through the use of common party walls and which may have side yards adjacent to each end unit.
- DWELLING UNIT. Any building or portion thereof which is designed and used exclusively for residential purposes of one (1) family, and includes complete kitchen and bathroom facilities.
- 6. FAMILY.
 - a. An individual, or two or more persons related by blood or marriage or adoption, living together in a dwelling unit; or
 - b. A group of not more than four persons who need not be re-

lated by blood or marriage or adoption, living together as a single housekeeping unit in a dwelling unit and sharing common facilities as considered reasonably appropriate for a family related by blood, marriage or adoption; in either case exclusive of usual servants.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town expenditures.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to support public services as recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums as necessary to support Town Departments as recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the care of the cemeteries. Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend \$10,000.00. \$9,000.00 to come from Trust Funds.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 to continue the update of the Comprehensive Plan and to continue planning assistance to the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise \$156,000.00 for the Water/Sewer Department. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant of \$30,000.00 that the Town will receive from the State for the calendar year 1988 for maintenance, construction, and reconstruction of Class IV and V highways. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to close out the Revenue Sharing account and place the closing balance into the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund. The amount is approximately \$1,200.00 which will be added to funds for purchase of a new cruiser when voted. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote a sum of money \$162,345.00 for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of New Hamp-shire and FHA will be \$122,405.47. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer the Capital Reserve Fund established for the revaluation of the Town of Troy. Recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$20,000.00 for the purchase of a new one-ton Dump Truck with plow. \$10,000.00 to come from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund. This is to replace the present 1984 one-ton truck and plow. The 1984 truck to be sold by bid process with the proceeds of the sale to go into the Highway Dept. Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for the installation of a new well for the Water Department and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$100,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Town Officials to

issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water/Sewer Commissioners to withdraw from the Troy Water Department Capital Reserve Fund the amount determined by the Water/Sewer Commissioners to be applied to the issuance of bonds and or notes for the installation of a new well, to reduce the amount needed to be borrowed. Recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount listed below to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund of each Department listed for the purpose of purchasing vehicles or additional equipment when voted by the Town. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

Fire Department \$6,000.00

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$12,000.00 from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund to purchase a 1975 International Tanker with front end pump from the Town of Peterborough. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purpose of establishing programs and the continued study and development of plans for a Youth Center in the Town of Troy. The Selectmen, Moderator and Budget Committee chairman will appoint six (6) residents of Troy to a committee to over see the Youth Center Study Committee. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negoiate with Eugene Beauregard to acquire the parcel of land Map 11 Lot 2A .11 acres on the east side of Dort Street extension at the Sewer Plant gate and to further adjust the land between the Town Road, Dort Street extension and land of Eugene Beauregard. Upon acquisition this .11 acres parcel is to be added to Town owned Map 11 Lot 5. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to zone the remainder of Map 11 Lot 5, as Industrial. This is town land acquired by Tax Deed in May 1986. Only a portion of the land has been zoned Industrial by prior vote of the Town. Recommended by Planning Board and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, transfer and convey property described as the Timothy P. Brown Map 11, Lot 5, partially zoned Industrial and to be totally zoned Industrial, located on Dort St. on recommendation of the Industrial Development Committee and approval of any other committees involved in the Town of Troy, if it is in the best interest of the Town. Recommended by Planning Board and Selectmen. **ARTICLE 23**: To see if the Town will vote to zone Map 13 Lot 7 as Industrial. This is Town land acquired by Tax Deed and is designated as Town Forest. It is zoned as Business District.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, transfer and convey property described as Town Forest Map 13 Lot 7, to be zoned Industrial, located off Route 12 South on recommendation of the Industrial Development Committee and approval of any other committees involved, it is in the best interest of the Town.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, transfer and convey property described as the Webb Hayes Map 11 Lot 2 Lot, which was purchased by the Town in 1978 and is located off Dort Street.

ARTICLE 26: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to close out the Sewer account with the EPA and the State of New Hampshire and accept a sum of money that will be returned to the Town. To use that sum to close out the Sewer Construction account and turn the remaining money over to the Water/Sewer Commissioners to be invested and to be used for future capital products related to the Sewer Department.

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote and authorize the Water/ Sewer Department to withdraw the Capital Reserve accounts now established for the Water Department and for the Sewer Department that are in Capital Reserve accounts and to place them in separate accounts with the Town Treasurer where they can be invested and used as needed in an emergency. Recommended by Selectmen.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to classify Mackey Road as a "Scenic Road" as provided under RSA 231. Recommended by Selectmen and Conservation Committee. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town of Troy will abolish the Resident Tax. Not recommended by Selectmen or Budget Committee. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Troy Ambulance Service "TEASI" to construct a building to house the ambulance and provide a meeting room on Town land behind the Town Hall. The old town barn will be taken down. There is no estimated cost to the Town as the project will be done by a fund-raising effort by TEASI and others who wish to participate. The process required by our Zoning Ordinance of Site Plan Review and the Board of Adjustment will be followed prior to the mechanics of fund raising. Recommended by Selectmen.

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer any unencumbered funds from the Welfare Department appropriation to the Capital Reserve Fund, at the end of the current year. This money to be used only for any large welfare case that should come up in the future. (By Petition) Not recommended by Budget Committee or Selectmen.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the conservation fund for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the N.H. Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said donated funds and state matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the conservation commission. Recommended by Conservation Commission and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any unusable vehicles or equipment, of any of the departments of the Town, or to take any action thereon. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to reopen a section of road at the end of the Town maintained road on South Main Street from the present Road Closed to Gates and Bars sign for a distance of 1,200 feet. Only one house will be built on the Lepisto Property and that will have a 200 foot frontage on this road. Culverts, if needed, will be put in by the owner.

ARTICLE 36: To see if the Town will vote to encourage the people in the Town of Troy to recycle the refuge that is taken to the dump. The Landfill to be set up so that specific areas are designated for recyclable materials. With the present problems and fast-rising cost of landfills in New Hampshire and the country, we will need everyones cooperation to do our best to save space, protect the environment, the water table and to keep cost down. It is possible that in the future recycling will become mandated; we need everyones help.

ARTICLE 37: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31-05B. ARTICLE 38: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon.

ARTICLE 39: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE 40: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreements with the Southwest Regional Planning Commission, the State office of Emergency Management, the State Planning Commission, and other State agencies, when money becomes available for feasability studies, grants, and agreements in the best interest of the Town. This to be done by the Selectmen, with the approval of the Town Budget Committee, after consultation with the Conservation Commission, Planning Board and Industrial Development Committee. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 41: To hear reports of committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.



REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Between July 1986 and June 1987 we experienced fewer fires than norman. Troy had only four brush fires for the year.

The number of Forest Fires for the State of New Hampshire was down from 840 in 1986 to 403 in 1987.

Enforcement of a State Timber Harvest Regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry Officials, however your assistance is needed. If you know of a logging operation and suspect a Harvest Law is being violated, call your Forest Fire Warden or Deputy Warden and report it.

Contact your Board of Selectmen for information on the new Timber Tax Law.

At our first meeting in September we hosted guests from Fitzwilliam and Jaffrey and discussed the New Hampshire Land Trust and our mutual concern about the land around these rural Monadnock towns. In October a representative from the New Hampshire Land Trust came to speak to us about the Trust and how it will operate and guests from Fitzwilliam were also at this meeting. In November we brought together a good-sized group including members from our Planning Board and the Selectmen and heard an informative speaker from the Cheshire County Conservation Commission. We were told of the great importance of securing an ordinance through town meeting to protect our small amount of wetland in the Town of Troy which is only 11%. We are one of the few towns in Cheshire County that does not have an ordinance to protect this very valuable resource and have much work to do with education about this.

Commission members have attended several all day sessions of the Monadnock Crossroads Program at the Harris Center in Hancock. These sessions have proved very valuable to educate us about the New Hampshire Land Trust and the very important subject of water resources which is fast becoming a major problem for southern New Hampshire. This subject has a direct effect on the Town of Troy and our industrial development which we certainly need as a Tax base.

Our commission is very concerned with the current issues of pure air, pure water and preserving whatever we can of the natural wonders of our town. We hope to have some conservation education in our schools and intend to have a series of hikes in the spring inviting townspeople to join us.

Conservation is of great concern all over our nation, and all through New England and we are concerned here in Troy. We are most fortunate to have the Harris Center and the Cheshire County Conservation Board to help us in our efforts and hope all citizens in Troy will become conservation minded and support our efforts. Our meetings are posted and all are urged to attend.

ANNUAL REPORT OF TROY ANIMAL CONTROL

Troy Animal Control has seen a substantial increase this year in the number of dogs having to be placed in the Monadnock Region Humane Society.

The main reason for this increase is that dog owners are failing to license their pets. The dogs are then either allowed to run unrestrained or break free from restraint. When complaints are received on these dogs, Animal Control officers have mo means by which to identify them. Dog owners are then required to pay a fee to the Humane Society when they retrieve their pet.

Owners are required to have their dogs vaccinated against rabies before licensing. We also urge cat owners to have their pets vaccinated.

If dog owners continue to ignore the law and neglect to have their pets licensed, we may find it necessary to take more drastic measures in an effort to have them comply.

We strongly encourage pet owners, other than those wishing to breed their animals, to have them spayed or neutered.

There was a litter of unwanted puppies abandoned at the dump this summer and it is not known whether all the pups were recovered, though not by any lack of effort on the part of Charlie Adams. This is an extreme example of cruelty by an irresponsible dog owner and we are sure that most people rightly find this act despicable. We would just like to point out that both cruelty and neglect are chargeable offenses and urge anyone who knows of an abused animal to report it.

We commend Animal Control Officers Charles Adams and Danny Breen for doing such a fine job and for the care and compassion they've shown for the poor animals left to fend for themselves.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board continues to meet on the first and third Wednesday of each month at 7:30 P.M. in the town hall. Any interested residents are encouraged and welcome to attend the meetings.

1987 proved to be an eventful and fruitful year for the Planning Board. This past year we reviewed four subdivisions applications, processed three of them, the other being held in abeyance pending property line resolution. We also reviewed six requests for Site Plan Reviews which were all approved.

Numerous meetings were attended by various members to keep abreast of the latest trends in planning board functions. Noteworthy of these were the Law lecture Series held at Keene State College during June and July. Other series of lectures held at Keene State were concerned with Water Resource Development Plans. This was culminated by charts constructed by the members showing the potential aquifers in the town of Troy. These two efforts should help the Planning Board in their decision making process. For the fact remains, that the supply of water at this time appears to be limited.

During the past five montsh we have been at work revising the Planning and Land use regulations and at the present time we are in the process of updating the Comprehensive Plan (Master Plan), which is mandated by the State to be updated every five years. Our goal is to complete this effort by the end of the year.

This being my first year as Chairman has been a learning experience in coping with the various regulations that come with the territory.

I would like to thank all the members of the Planning Board for their diligence and putting up with all my foibles that accompany a first time Chairman, a special thank you to Irene Tucker, our secretary, for a job well done. Also, on behalf of the Planning Board, many thanks to Chet Priest for his many years of counsel and advise while serving on this board.

SOUTHWEST REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

As 1987 comes to a close and we begin to look ahead to 1988, I would like to take the opportunity to discuss some of last years accomplishments and explain what planning services will be available to assist you and your planning board in the coming year. Hopefully this information will prove helpful as you prepare your planning board budget for the upcoming town meeting.

Upon coming to the Southwest Region Planning Commission in November, 1986, the Executive Committee and I pledged to make the Commission more responsive to the needs of member towns. Our efforts have greatly improved our capacity to undertake such comprehensive projects this past year as assisting to revise several outdated zoning ordinances, update master plans and develop capital improvements programs and growth management ordinances for a number of towns. At the same time we have increased our ability to respond to smaller technical problems confronting planning boards as they deal with increasing growth pressures. In our attempts to improve these capabilities, the planning staff attended over four hundred meetings since January, 1987. This rigid schedule of meetings has allowed us to effectively deal with regional issues as well as meet with each member town at least once in order to assist with specific problems.

It is our intent to continue offering the highest quality assistance in the coming year. Membership dues in the Commission have remained unchanged for the past several years and will continue to do so. Dues are calculated on a per capita cost of \$0.95, based on current population figures provided by the Office of State Planning. According to this formula your town's dues for 1988 will be \$2,017.80, or \$0.95 X 2124 (your current population estimate from OSP).

Your membership should prove mutually beneficial in that town dues provide the financial foundation with which the Planning Commission can maintain an office and core personnel, while allowing you to participate in available programs at reduced or no cost.

ANNUAL REPORT

In 1987, Home Health Care and Community Services continued to provide home care and community services to the residents of Troy. These services have been supported to the greatest extent possible by Medicare, Medicaid, other insurances, Cheshire County funding, grants and patient fees. Services that could not be covered by other funding have been supported by your town.

The following information represents a projection of Home Health Care and Community Services' activities in your community for 1987. The projection is based on actual services provided from January through September 1987, and an estimate of useage during October, November and December.

in addition to the above listed activities, regularly scheduled blood pressure clinics, clild health clinics, telephone and office consultations were made available to your residents throughout the year. Town funding, in part, supported these additional services.

FINANCIALREPORT

The actual cost of services provided in 1987 with all funding sources is projected to be \$59,226.00.

The total cost of services provided for a partial fee, or at no charge to residents in 1987 is projected to be \$12,007.00 for home care and \$2,303.50 for meals-on-wheels.

We recommend an appropriation of \$13,500.00 if you wish to continue home care services at the current level. We also recommend an appropriation of \$2,650.00 for the meals-on-wheels program. Thank you for your consideration.

MONADNOCK FAMILY & MENTAL HEALTH REPORT

AGENCY HISTORY

Monadnock Family Services was organized in 1959 following a joint study by the Cheshire County Community Services Council and the League of Women Voters (Keene and Peterborough). Originally named Monadnock Area Family Service, the agency was organized through a merger of the Bureau of Public Service and the Keene Mental Hygiene Association. The service operated in this form through 1966, expanding in a five year period to a staff of two full-time social workers with psychiatric and psychological consulting support.

In 1967, following a study during the previous two years, a community mental health clinic service was organized providing direct psychiatric and psychological services. This program added two psychiatric consultants, a clinical psychologist and one social worker to the agency staff.

Now, in 1987, Monadnock Family Services has grown from providing only outpatient services in its early years to providing a much broader range of services in response to community needs. MFS operates out of four district offices; Keene, Peterborough, Winchester and Walpole. We serve the 38 towns of the Monadnock Region. Our services now include the following:

Counseling Services for Adults Adolescent and Children's Treatment Elderly Services and RSVP Psychological Testing Emergency Services Parenting Programs

Housing Client Service Management Partial Hospitalization Vocational Services Volunteer Center

KEENE and WALPOLE DISTRICT OFFICES

The Keene and Walpole District Offices of Monadnock Family Services provides outpatient services for children and adults living in the town of Keene, Alstead, Chesterfield, Fitzwilliam, Gilsum, Marlborough, Marlow, Nelson, Roxbury, Stoddard, Sullivan, Surry, Swanzey, Troy, Walpole and Westmoreland. Included among these services are individual, group, family, and marital psychotherapy, as well as twentyfour hour crisis intervention. In addition, the Keene District Office provides special services for the Elderly, Vietnam Veterans, Sexual Abuse victims, and Pregnant teenagers and adolescent parents.

Monadnock Family Service is also continuing its alcohol and drug abuse prevention project in the Fall Mountain School District, Keene Junior High and Keene High School. This project provides consultation to teachers, administrators, parents and students around ways to address the problems of substance abuse and chemical dependency. The staff of the Keene and Walpole District Offices are all trained professionals who are committed to meeting the mental health needs of the communities they serve.

TROY SENIOR CITIZENS REPORT 1987



Evidence from past Town Reports indicate that an Industrial Development Committee has existed since 1979. However, no meeting minutes have been located prior to 1985. The committee welcomes new additions Claire Drake and Buzz Bowers as it would any other interested persons. John Callahan Sr. dicided to relinquish his position as committee chairman and was replaced by Robert Hall. John will remain active as the present chair need to "pick his brains" and utilize John's community contacts which result from long and dedicated service.

As with any volunteer committee that requests budget allowances this committee has been asked as to what do we have to show for our expenditures. Citizens should know that the committee had two very strong industrial client dealings under negotiations that failed to materialize through no fault of the committee. One of these concerns may reopen its Troy exploration when their company's internal affairs are resettled.

Representatives of the committee have attended an Economic Development Seminar on the University of New Hampshire campus that resulted in 30 face to face contacts with other community and state industrial development workers. Meetings have been held in Concord and Troy with members of the State Division of Economic Development. The most recent meeting resulted in the filing of community profile data sheets of Troy and explicit site analysis sheets to be placed in the Concord office files. A meeting was held with the Executive Director of the Keene Industrial Corporation and Troy site information was supplied to that office.

Site improvement was conducted on the Route 12 Mattala Lot, trees cut, abandoned well filled in, and scrap metal piled for collection. Some 300 (?) feet of 1 inch roadside fence cable was abandoned by the state on this site and the committee would welcome a taker. Lot surveys have disclosed disputed ownership of a 40 acre parcel in Troy that could up the town owned industrial acreage to about 100 and substantially increase the possible revenue that might be realized.

The thrust of the 1988 efforts by this committee will be to prepare complete site analysis data for client perusal along with completion of necessary surveys and appraisals. Any amount of legal effort is expensive and these expectations are reflected in the committee budget requests. Citizens of Troy should be reminded that this committee represents a searching body only and serves to recommend selected industrial growth. It is our intent and mandate to work closely with your Planning Board to ensure that the nature and composition of industrial expansion is in keeping with our unique environment or habitat at the base of that old mountain of ours.

- 2. This copy of the U.S. Constitution is flanked by a well-worn 50star American Flag and a Bennington American Flag.
- 3. Flanking the 2 Flags are 2 "sign-posts." One "sign-post" shows the place and dates of the creation of the U.S. Constitution and also the progression of the Ratification of the U.S. Constitution, by the original 13 states. The other "sign-post" is comprised of certain observations about the formation of the U.S. Constitution.
- 4. There is a large framed copy of the Declaration of Independence.
- 5. Copies of the Articles of Confederation, Mayflower Compact, Magna Carta and Declaration of Independence (all laminated in transparent plastic) are displayed.
- 6. There is a "Soap-Box", signifying free speech, available for any orator, or would-be orator.
- 7. The final articles in the exhibit are:
 - (a) A framed copy of the famous Christy painting, showing the signers. This is on a stand, and flips over to show a half-size copy of the U.S. Constitution.
 - (b) 2 framed sheets of paper, separate from but, go with this stand and show who each signer is; also facts about them and the U.S. Constitution. These framed sheets can be viewed from both front and back.

- 1. On the Common at the Troy Arts Festival, July 25, 1987.
- 2. Little Monadnock Post #10289, V.F.W., September 14, 1987.

Wendell Hawkins noticed that there was \$7500. included for an Administrative Assistant and asked what their duties were.

Selectmen Matson said that the duties included about all the paper work in the town hall, making applications for grants, assess and reappraise property, takes care of people and their questions.

Hawkins: Who is this person. Matson: Me Hawkins: You are adminstrator by your own decision and Selectmen by vote of the town. Matson: You are correct. Hawkins: It would lighten your load as Selectmen if this position were to go to another person. Matson: That's right if you want to hire a person for \$22,000 to

25,000 which a survey done by the Municipal Association indicates that towns are paying for this position.

Mr. Hawkins thanked Mr. Matson for his time and explanation.

Janet McCullough noted that the Welfare budget had not spent all of the monies appropriated to them for the 1985 and 1986 years and made a motion to amend the Welfare budget to \$15,000. Amendment defeated.

Elmer Gladding Welfare Officer stated that the new rules of county and state could take all the monies appropriated. Recently we had two cases taken to court and if we had lost them, they could have cost us \$100,000. each case. The hospitals are now trying to get each town to reimburse them of any Welfare cases and if they win, it could easily exceed the \$21,000.

Bill Matson said that the state had not billed us for the entire year of 1986 as of yet. They are behind some three months in billing the towns. Also the county budget has more than doubled because of cut backs by the state which leaves the towns paying more than in the past years.

Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the care of the cemeteries. Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend \$11,000. \$10,000. to come from Trust Funds. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 for the purpose of sealing the roads in the Town that were paved at the completion of the Sewer Project and to seal other Town roads up to the expenditure of the appropriation. This appropriation will only be used for the said purpose of road sealing.

John Satas asked how the roads will be sealed and Buzzy Mitchell stated that they plan to use Liquid Asphault.

James Callahan asked how much money was needed to repair before the sealing can be done. Buzzy Mitchell stated that all pot holes would be patched and the manholes would be fixed before any sealing was done.

Jim said that the sealing had no reference to repairs. Some of those repairs are in relationship to manholes falling in with relationship to the sewerage system.

Buzzy said that we would have to look at that with the sewer department. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$9,800.00 to be used by the Troy Industrial Development Committee. The expenditure of money to be used by the committee with the approval of the majority of the Selectmen for expenditures involved in promoting the development of the Troy Industrial Park. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

Fred Lawrence wanted to know what the extra monies would be used for. Iver Olsen said that in addition to printing and mailing brochures they wanted to improve the town owned land by cutting brush and picking up trash etc. on the property, to make it more attractive to prospective buyers. You need to spend money to make money. Fred Lawrence motioned to amend the article to read \$2500. After discussion from Edward Lang the amendment was defeated. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$10,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Funds for the Highway Department to be used for the purchase of equipment and property, as it becomes available, if it is deemed necessary and advisable by the Selectmen. Recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

Janet McCullough asked the Road Agent if he had plans to purchase equipment this year. Buzzy stated that all he could say was that if something came up in surplus they wanted to purchase it. Dump trucks, equipment like that. Bob Harkins asked just what do you mean by "property?" Buzzy stated that in the past they had land crushers, bull dozers, Surplus Govern-

ment property. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to put up new signal lights in front of the Fire Station. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$8,000.00 for the purchase of a computer system to do the computerization of the Tax Bills, Resident Taxes and Water/Sewer bills. The computer can be used in the future to include other operations beneficial to the operation of the Town. The present computer operations are being done by Southwest Regional Planning Commission which will cease to operate after June 1987. The Selectmen feel this is the route to go. Recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

George Dubina wanted to know what other operations besides tax bills would be computerized. Selectmen Matson said that at present tax bills, Resident tax bills, water sewer bills and labels to put onto envelopes were being done. The Selectmen want to have Erve Doyle and Dave Rollins sit down and come up with best quality and cheapest way to go.

Carl Cummings asked if the system we plan to use was an approved system and Bill Matson said we would be using the same disk and plan that is mandated by the State of N.H. Mr. Doyle stated that we will be using a program that has been used before. It is just that we think we can purchase the hardware at a better price than has been quoted. Janet McCullough wanted to know if we would still be appropriating money to Southwest Regional Planning. Gerry Callahan stated that the \$2021. appropriated was for the dues for the town to belong to the commission. Bruce McCully asked why the figure of 8000. had been arrived at and not 5000 or 10,000. and will we have the assurance that the software package is something that has been used before or is it going to be similar to the Southwest system that they have been running or is this going to be something that does the same thing but uses a different software or different hardware. Mr. Doyle stated that we hoped to use the same package that Swanzey is now using, but will look into using hardware locally sold so we have the service at hand. We can save about 2000. if we buy our hardware and use just their package. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000. to be placed in the existing Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town of Troy. The revaluation to be done by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration State of New Hampshire. This appraisal to start in 1988 and be completed in 1989. The estimated total cost of the revaluation is \$41,623. An article will be in the Town Warrant in 1988 to authorize the withdrawal of the Capital Reserve Money to pay for the revaluation when completed. Recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

Ron Jacques wanted to know if this is required by the state? Our taxes went up without the revaluation, what will happen when the revaluation is done. Mr. Matson said that whether we have itor not our taxes will be going up because of costs being pushed on us by the State of New Hampshire and the Federal Government. Between this last year and this year the equalized evaluation has gone from 59% to 46%. There are many houses in this town that are undervalued because of improvements which have not been given to the Selectmen and no notation was made on the Property Inventories which are sent out each year. Janet McCullough asked Mr. Matson if he was our appraisor and was he a member of the appraisors association. Mr. Matson stated that he was not a member of the Department of Revenue Administration Appraising Division, but as a classified worker of the town and Selectmen am an assessor by law. Each year we go to assessing school for a week to keep up with new laws and current ways of doing the assessing. Marie Rouleau made the statement that taxes will go up. Troy was not represented very well at the School Meeting on March 3, and articles voted at the school meeting mean an increase of 17+% on our taxes. She got a round of applause. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enact an ordinance to set parking regulations for all roads in the Town of Troy during the winter months. This ordinance to be enacted from a study and recommendations of the Town of Troy Highway Safety Committee and the Police Department. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to reconvey a certain tract of land indentified as Map 11, Lot 5 on the tax maps to Timothy Platts Brown, the former owner, upon payment by him of all past due taxes and costs of such conveying. By Petition.

Robert Tucker stated that he felt that we should not return the property to Mr. Brown and he wondered if we did, were we setting ourselves up for a yearly article on the Warrant to do just this. Wayne Kennison said that this was voted not to return to Mr. Brown at a special town meeting and he does not think we should do so at this time.

Article defeated.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of weter/Sewer Commissioners to transfer \$25,000. from unencumbered runds from the operation of the Sewer System to the Capital Reserve Fund (created under Article 20 of the 1984 Annual Meeting of the Town of Troy) to provide for capital improvements and capital equipment pretaining to the sewer system or the sewage treatment plant. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enact an ordinance to establish weight limits for the bridges in the Town of Troy. This ordinance to be enacted from a study and

recommendations of the Town Highway Safety Committee and the Police Department.

George Dubina asked who would be watching the trucks go over these bridges. Selectmen Callahan stated that it would be the Police Dept. when they are passing those points. When the railroad tracks were removed, it put the responsibility of the bridges on the towns, and now we have an invested interest in preserving these bridges. Bob Tucker asked if there wasn't something we could do about the logging trucks going over our roads and tearing them all up. Mr. Callahan stated that at the last Selectmen's meeting they had agreed to drop the road limit to 30,000 lbs. There are signs going up stating this and there is an article coming out in the Sentinel. If the roads get too bad, the selectmen will lower the weight limit to what they feel is necessary. Fred Lawrence asked what expertise we are going to use to determine what weight these bridges will hold. Gary Lang asked if the Cement trucks going over the roads would be stopped from making their rounds to the new homes being built. Callahan stated that the reason for posting road limits was to shift the responsibility from the town to the companies doing the hauling of materials. He also stated that last fall State Engineers were in the area and suggested weight limits for the bridges. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to adopt RSA 72:37, Exemption for the Blind. This State Statute was updated in the 1986 session of the Legislature and is mandated to be on the Town Warrant. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to adopt RSA 41:45a which combines the office of Tax Collector and Town Clerk. This article is necessary to be in line with State Statutes. Previously this article was passed but included "and Selectmen's Secretary." We have to remove "and Selectmen's Secretary" to be within the Statutes. Recommended by Selectmen.

Janet McCullough asked when we passed an article including Selectmen's Secretary to Town Clerk/Tax Collector. She has been back through the town reports from 1974 on and can find nowhere did we vote for same. Selectmen Matson stated that after Connie Grover left Town Clerk, the Selectmen added the office of Tax Collector through the budget process. We was unable to give us a date as to when it was done. Article passed as read.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:05b. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select-

men to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to extend Memorial Drive a distance of 175 feet. The cost of acquiring the land for the road extension, the construction of road, extension of water and sewer lines will be born by the owners of Map 13 Lots 85, 86 & 87. If passed, this article does not approve Map 13 Lots 85, 86 & 87 as building lots. Each lot will have to go through site plan review and meet the requirements of the Town of Troy Zoning Ordinances for building permits.

David Rollins asked what the Selectmen's recommendation was concerning this. Matson stated that the Selectment had been asked by a small developer if it were possible to extend the road. They told him it would have to be put onto the Warrant for a Town vote. Herman Schierioth said he was the unhappy owner of this land and he had been paying taxes on it for 12 years. When Zoning went in, it took his right to build away from him and now the land was worthless. John Satas is in favor of the extension and feels it will be valuable to the Town. It means if houses are built that the neighbors will not have mobile homes near them. Gary Lang asked if these were one acre lots, and callahan stated no possibly 1/2 acre. Gary stated that for 10 years we had not allowed anyone to build on anything that was not one acre or larger and he did not feel we should start now. He stated that the subdivision was never recorded as a subdivision before Zoning came in and should not be allowed to be built on now. Ron Jacques stated that the Site Plan Review should be struck from the article. Therefore an amendment should read each lot will meet the requirements of the Town of Troy Zoning Ordinances for building permits. Amendment passed.

Fred Lawrence made a motion for additional information to amend the article to read: To accept the extension to Memorial Drive of 175 feet upon approval of the Selectmen and Town Road Agent upon completion of the road to State Specifications. Amendment passed as read.

Therefore the entire article reads as follows: To see if the Town will vote to accept the extension of Memorial Drive a distance of 175 feet, upon approval of the Selectmen and Town Road Agent upon completion of the road to State specifications. The cost of acquiring the land for the road extension, the construction of road, extension of water and sewer lines will be born by the owners of Map 13 Lots 85, 86 and 87. If passed this article does not approve Map 13 Lots 85, 86 & 87 as building lots. Each lot will meet the requirements of the Troy Zoning Ordinances for building permits. Article passed as amended. **ARTICLE 26**: To hear reports of committees, agents or officers heretofore chosen to take any action relative.

Fred Lawrence made a motion that a Committee of 5 be appointed by the Selectmen to study the feasibility of a building to house all of the town equipment. The Committee to come forth at the 1988 Town Meeting with recommendations. Motion passed.

Meeting adjourned at 9:45 PM.
