



WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.

- (a) Town Maintenance.
- (b) Plowing and sanding roads.
- (c) General expenses of highway department.

4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$220.38 for class 5 road construction.

5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for public welfare.

(a) Town Poor.

(b) Old Age Assistance.

6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the Town Library.

7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Patriotic purposes.

(a) Old Home Day.

(b) Memorial Day.

8. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town, by the issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00, in anticipation of taxes for the year 1944, said notes to be expressly payable from said taxes within one year from date of issuance and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.

9. To see what sum the town will vote to appropriate, not to exceed the sum of \$5,000.00, such sum to be appropriated from our accumulated cash surplus, for the construction of future town buildings.

10. To see what sum the town will vote to appropriate, not to exceed \$3,000.00, such sum to be appropriated from our accumulated cash surplus, for the construction or repairs of town bridges.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey at public or private sale, any or all property acquired by tax deed.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Given under our hands and seal, this twenty-first day of February in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-four.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

During the past few years, the town expenditures have fallen short of appropriations to such an extent that our cash balance in the treasurer's hands has been built up to over \$11,000.00. Therefore, it seems wise for the town to appropriate some of this money for future use. Accordingly, we have incorporated two articles in the Town Warrant, which, if agreed upon, would reduce this balance to such a sum as would be nearer the required amount needed to carry on our regular business.

One of the outstanding incidents is the fact that Mr. Clarence E. Hyde, has generously provided the use of his power-driven fire pump for any fire which occurs. This town is indeed fortunate to have such an apparatus which is so greatly needed for the protection of our homes, establishments, and summer residences.

Agreement concerning the removal of the Old Meeting House cemetery from its old position in the Blackwater Valley to the new cemetery grounds located on Corser Hill have been concluded with representatives of the War Department.

The outlook for the coming year is not too bright in regard to road construction due to existing shortages of labor and material, but we shall continue to carry on as best we can until the war is won.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Crises like the present test the quality and sincerity of everyone's patriotism and citizenship. The times make such unavoidable demands for universal cooperation in the many lines of essential regular and emergency public endeavor that the response given may well be assumed to be the real measure of one's love of country and his appreciation of the opportunities it offers. Ranking high in the list of public endeavor is the protection of our forests from fire. It calls for full and generous cooperation by each of us. Fire statistics indicate that better than 98 per cent of all fires in New Hampshire are man-caused. If human carelessness could be eliminated from the problem, the number of fires would drop to a mere minimum of less than 2 per cent of present figures and fire costs and losses would reduce in proportion. While this goal will not be achieved because of the perversity of human nature, the record can be vastly improved through individual discipline, alertness and cooperation.

Discipline calls for personal restraint from following unrestricted natural impulses to do as one pleases with regard to fire; alertness in cautioning others against imprudent and illegal burning and in promptly reporting fires to the local forest fire warden; cooperation in complying with laws, rules, and regulations governing the kindling and care of fires, smoking, safety of mechanical units using fire in and near woodlands and assisting the local warden in extinguishing such fires as may occur.

The possibilities of disastrous and expensive woods fires are constantly becoming more real. The hurricane felled an estimated one and one-half billion board feet of standing timber, much of which was never cleaned up. To this hazard has been and is being added extensive areas of slash from additional hundreds of millions cut to produce vitally needed wood for the war effort. With the stage so set, greater caution is increasingly necessary. It will pay substantial dividends in unburned forest areas and the saving of unnecessary fire expense.

The year 1943 was an extremely fortunate one because of favorable weather conditions. Many towns had no fires, some had minor fires while a few had expensive ones. The public controls the answer to the 1944 and future years' fire records. If the public is careful and cooperative the record will be good.

Your town warden is, perhaps, more perplexed and anxious during these war years than ever before because of increased forest fire hazards and diminishing supplies of available man-power. He looks directly to you to aid him. Will you? You can aid him most effectively by always securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit requirements; by being patient when he advises of departmental restrictions on permit burning or that he deems it unsafe to burn; and by giving him the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when he needs your help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.

GENERAL STATISTICS

From the above statistical table it may be noted that three half days were lost during the school year. This was due to weather conditions. Although the number of pupils registered is larger than that of the previous year, the average membership is slightly lower. The percent of attendance has improved. The tardiness per pupil has slightly increased and should be reduced this year. The number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools was 65. Of these 56 attended schools in the district and nine went to school in nearby districts.

The general improvement in the health of the pupils as noted in the accompanying report of the school nurse, Mrs. Katherine Brown, is very gratifying to all concerned. As a further aid to health, lunches are being furnished to the pupils of the Corser Hill school this year. The materials for this purpose are furnished by the Federal Government through the Food Distribution Administration without cost to the district. As it is impossible to prepare adequate lunches at the school building Mrs. William Phelps volunteered to do this work at her home and carry the food to the school. A small sum is paid for the service by each pupil receiving lunches. We greatly appreciate Mrs. Phelps' interest and in behalf of all concerned wish to thank her for the very valuable contribution which she is making to the promotion of the health of the pupils.

At the Putney Hill school Mrs. Nola Wibel volunteered the same service, but the school on account of the lower number of pupils was unable to raise the small sum required.

For the coming year we would suggest that provision be made for preparation of hot lunches outside the school either by raising and appropriating an adequate sum at the annual district meeting in March, or that the necessary funds be secured by some local organization by means of parties and entertainments. In many school districts lunches are aided by organizations sponsoring canning projects within the district. A sum of about \$110.00 would be needed to supply lunches to the pupils of both schools for eleven weeks during the winter months.

When the new central school house is built in this district adequate provision should be made for a school kitchen where hot lunches may be prepared for all the pupils, and a lunch room with tables where pupils may sit.

The general scarcity of teachers is increasing. It is especially difficult to find teachers for one-room schools. Salaries demanded are also rising. Consequent adjustments will be needed in the school budget.

A dental clinic could not be arranged due to the fact that so many dentists have left for service and those remaining are greatly over worked.

Dr. Putnam gave all students the tuberculin and Schick tests with negative reactions in each case which was most gratifying.

During the summer four were admitted to the Margaret Pillsbury General Hospital and received tonsil operations at the clinic under the treatment of Dr. More.

One child was treated at optical clinic during the summer. Two others received care at Hanover.

Forty-five visits were made at homes in behalf of the health of the children.

We appreciate the cooperation of the parents and give them the credit for the general health improvement which is very noticeable at our examination at the opening of the 1943-44 year.

We strongly urge each parent to arrange for dentistry for every child until such time as a clinic is again available.
