



TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. $\ \ \,$
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee under the authority of the municipal budget act. (This budget may be considered item by item or as a whole, but may not be increased more than ten percent in any item as a whole.)
- 4. To hear the reports of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.
- 5. *To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the repair of the hill, south of the culvert over the Aldrich Brook, on the Wentworth Road.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding on either Class V or Class VI roads or take any other action relating thereto to raise and appropriate money for the same.
 - 7. * To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the

sum of \$1,000.00 to put a permanent top on London Hill Road, so-called, from the railroad bridge toward Route No. 12.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote for Class IV and Class V roads; construction, reconstruction or betterment aid, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$701.94 which is 15% of the State apportionment, the state contributing \$4,679.63.
- 9. * To see if the Town will vote to adopt the zoning and building regulations as presented by the Committee in accordance with the vote made at the 1957 Town Meeting.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to what is required by law, for highways and bridges.
- 11. *To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00, the income from same to be used for the upkeep of the Laura and William E. Brown cemetery lot in East Westmoreland.
- 12. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord Fund.
- 13. * To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the old Route No. 12 road, starting from the east side of the new Route No. 12 by the Ox Yoke on to the Walpole Town Line.
- 14. * To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the road from (*) the barn of Roy Bosworth to the road leading to Olin Clayton, and from the Clayton barn to its junction with Route No. 12. (* known as the Old Post Road).
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for support of the Library.
- 16. * To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the road from above the barn of Alonzo Hudson to the Walpole Town Line, known as Wentworth Road

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for up-keep of cemeteries.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$94.00, (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means for calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the thirty-seven other towns of the Monadnock Region.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$505.00 for the Elliot Community Hospital in Keene, said amount being "Your fair share of the STAND-BY or READINESS TO SERVE costs".
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust Control in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation department.
- 22. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING

March 12, 1957

The moderator, Paul D. King operated the meeting by reading the warrant. It was announced that Article 1 could remain open for the duration of the meeting. The polls were closed at 6:45 o'clock p.m.

Articles 2 and 3 were taken up together, item by item. It was voted to raise and appropriate the following sums:

Article 4. It was voted to accept the reports of agents and auditors.

Article 5. It was voted to approve snow removal and sanding on either Class V or Class VI roads.

Article 6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$577.77 for Class IV and Class V roads.

Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for Summer and Winter maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article 8. It was voted to use the income from the Jotham Lord Fund for the support of the Library.

Article 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the Library.

Article 10. It was voted **not** to raise and appropriate any money for the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire.

Article 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the upkeep of cemeteries.

Article 12. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 13. A ballot vote was taken on this article and 143 ballots were cast; 80 favorable, and 63 unfavorable. Since a two-thirds favorable vote is required to borrow money, 96 favorable votes were necessary to pass, therefore the article was defeated by 16 votes.

Article 14. It was voted not to raise and appropriate any money for Elliot Community Hospital. Favorable 13, unfavorable 38.

Article 15. It was voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Edmond B. White to be held in trust, and the income to be used for the upkeep of the Perez White lot in the Pratt Cemetery.

Article 16. It was voted to discontinue the road leading from the residence of Mrs. Pearl Etz past the Henry Dutton place, so called, to its junction with the road leading from South Village to the County Farm, subject to gates and bars.

Article 17. It was voted to accept the sum of \$150.00 from James K. Snelling to be held in trust and the income to be used for the upkeep of the lot in South Village cemetery.

Article 18. It was voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Attorney Harry Watson to be held in trust and the income to be used for the upkeep of the Sumner Parker cemetery lot in Westmoreland, N. H.

Article 19. It was voted to accept the sum of \$300.00 from Attorney Arthur Olson from the Daggett Estate to be held in trust and the income used for the upkeep of the cemetery lot, in Westmoreland, N. H.

Article 20. It was voted by ballot to authorize the selectmen to appoint a committee to bring in proposed zoning regulations to be voted on in town meeting in March 1958. Favorable 90, unfavorable, 19.

Article 21. It was voted by show of hands to authorize the selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate the advisability of establishing a building code for the town.

Article 22. It was voted by show of hands **not** to authorize the selectmen, fire chief and members of the budget committee to consider the advisability of purchasing a used fire truck for \$2,500.00.

Article 23. It was moved, seconded and carried to amend the article to read as follows:

"To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectment, fire chief and officers of the fire department and member of the budget committee to look into the advisability of purchasing a new piece of fire apparatus at a cost not to exceed \$12,000.00 and to raise and appropriate money for same." Yes 75, No. 56.

It was pointed out that this amended article would mean the raising of the entire \$12,000.00 in one year, and this would raise the tax rate to a high figure. A second amendment was then moved, seconded and carried to add the following to the above amended article after the word appropriate "Therefor \$2,000.00 for current year and to borrow \$10,000.00 to be amortized at the rate of \$2,000.00 each year starting in 1958, and authorize the selectmen to issue bonds or serial notes for the repayment of same. In the event the above is approved, the fire department budget will be decreased by \$450.00." A ballot vote was then taken on this amended article. There were 137 ballots cast, 81 favorable, 56 unfavorable. Since a two thirds favorable vote was necessary to carry this article, 92 favorable votes were necessary, therefore the article was defeated by eleven votes.

Article 24. It was voted to authorize the selectmen to erect a fence around the town dump and to designate what hours or days it will be open, and to appoint a caretaker, and to raise and appropriate money for the same. A sum of \$350.00 was voted to be added to the \$300.00 recommended by the budget committee for the Health department.

Article 25. It was voted to increase the road agents pay for plowing snow.

Article 26. It was voted to pay the Trustees of Trust Funds \$25.00 each and to raise and appropriate money for same.

Article 27. Under this article Mr. John H. Terry, Jr. presented the following: "I move that the complete re-

turns of all elections, including primary elections, be posted in four (4) public places in the town within 48 hours after the close of the polls, and be published in full in the town report." It was voted to approve and adopt this recommendation.

445 names on check list.

238 ballots were cast under Article 1.

Selectman for 2 years, Lyle R. McClenning, 116 votes, Robert L. Blood, 109 votes.

Town treasurer, Marjorie A. Hudson, 216 votes.

Tax Collector, Fenn B. Newell, 222 votes.

Trustee of Library for 3 years, Ellen A. Hall, 205 votes. Auditors, Theodora A. Gerould, 189 votes, Edna M. Paine, 171 votes.

Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years, Maude E. Messer, 209 votes.

Trustee of Trust Funds for 2 years, Hugh A. Shelley, Sr. 214 votes.

Constable, Arthur H. Hatt, 88 votes, David Adams, 9 votes.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Donald A. Paine, 30 votes, Howard E. Smith, 20 votes, Charles H. Kingsbury, 10 votes.

Fence Viewers: Selden B. Lund, 8 votes, Russell H. Wellington, 6 votes, Robert L. Blood, 3 votes.

Budget Committee member for 3 years; Lewis H. Cousens, 192 votes.

Budget committee member for 2 years. John F. Watkins, 114 votes, Robert M. Cox, 95 votes.

Briggs Fund Committee members (2), Helen F. Cousens, 201 votes, Marjorie G. Farrar, 193 votes.

The moderator declared those having the majority of votes cast, duly elected, the town clerk, tax collector, Selectman McClenning and Auditor Edna M. Paine were

then sworn in by the moderator Paul D. King.

A discrepancy between the total ballots cast (238) and the sum of votes tabulated for Dinkel and Dunn which totaled 253, having been discovered, a meeting was called by the moderator Paul D. King at which the moderator, the town clerk and the three selectmen were present. By order of, and under the direction of the moderator the ballots were opened and a recount made. The results were as follows:

April 4, 1957

The ballots cast at Town Meeting on March 12, 1957 for Town Officers were officially opened tonight in the recount of the votes cast for the office of Selectman for

two years, on application of Mr. Robert L. Blood, one of the candidates for that office.

The ballots were recounted and tallied by Moderator Paul D. King, Selectman Theodore H. Dinkel and Town Clerk Fenn B. Newell. Selectman Lyle R. McClenning was excused from participating in the recount as he was one of the candidates at the election. Selectman Donald A. Paine was ill in bed and could not be present.

The recount taken in the presence of candidates Mc-Clenning and Blood, Mr. Blood's attorney, Howard B. Lane and Constable Arthur H. Hatt, and various spectators, resulted in a tie vote; 111 votes for each candidates.

Two slips of paper, one bearing the name of Lyle R. McClenning and the other bearing the name of Robert L. Blood were prepared by the moderator and placed in a hat and held by the moderator. The town clerk then drew from the hat one slip bearing the name of Lyle McClenning, thus breaking the tie according to the New Hampshire Law. Therefore unless and until an appeal from this recount is made to the Superior Court of Cheshire County within five days from today, Lyle R. McClenning remains the legal selectman for the two year term as declared by the moderator on March 12, 1957.

- 1. To see if the legal voters residing in said district will vote to establish a village district or fire precinct for the purposes set forth in a petition filed with the Board of Selectmen by and others, which is attached hereto.
- 2. If Article 1 is adopted to choose a name for the district.
- 3. If Article 1 is adopted to choose necessary officers to hold office until the first annual meeting of the district, to wit: Moderator, Clerk, Board of three Commissioners, Treasurer, Auditor, and such other officers and agents as the voters may judge necessary for managing the districts affairs.
- 4. To see whether the district will vote to elect at its first annual meeting one commissioner to serve for one year, one to serve for two years, and one to serve for three years, and at every annual meeting thereafter elect one to serve for three years.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the Board of Commissioners and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray district charges for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate toward the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action thereon.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate, the same to be paid by the district into the general funds of the Town of Westmoreland toward the purchase of a new fire truck.

State of New Hampshire **PETITION**

To the Board of Selectmen, Westmoreland, New Hampshire

We, the undersigned legal voters and inhabitants of that part of the Town of Westmoreland situated within two (2) road miles of the Town Hall and First Station at South Village, so-called, in said town, hereby respectfully petition the Board of Selectmen of said Westmoreland as provided—Section 1, Chapter 52, Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire and represent as follows:

- 1. There is occasion for the establishment and laying out of a village district or precinct in that part of the Town of Westmoreland described above, for the following purposes: The extinguishment of fires, the purchase and maintenance of fire equipment, the maintenance of activities for the promotion of better fire protection and any or either of the purposes provided by law for the establishment of Village districts.
- 2. That the boundaries of the proposed district or precinct should coincide with the boundaries of the fire district established by the New Hampshire Board of Fire Underwriters for the purpose of establishing insurance rates in the said village, to wit: All taxable property within two road miles of the fire house at South Village.

Wherefore your petitioners respectfully pray:

- 1. That the selectmen shall cause a record of this petition and their doings thereon to be recorded in the records of the Town of Westmoreland.
- 2. That the selectmen shall forthwith call a meeting of the legal voters residing in the district described

herein to see if they will vote to establish the district and if so to choose all necessary officers therefor.

- 3. That the Selectmen shall call the said meeting and give notice thereof as town meetings are called and warned, excepting that the warrant shall be posted at two or more public places in the district.
- 4. And, in the event the voters shall vote for the establishment of said district or precinct, that the selectmen shall fix by suitable boundaries, a district including all property located within a distance of two road miles from the fire house at South Village, or as may seem to them convenient for the purposes stated.

SPECIAL MEETING

April 27, 1957

A special meeting of the legal voters residing within two road miles of the Town Hall and Fire Station at South Village, so-called, in the Town of Westmoreland, N. H. was called to order by Selectman Donald A. Paine at 2:07 o'clock p.m. this day.

Selectman Paine read the warrant.

Article 1. It was moved, seconded and carried that this article be decided by a ballot vote. There were 49 ballots cast; 47 favorable, 1 unfavorable and 1 blank ballot.

Article 2. After a brief discussion the name "Westmoreland Village district" was adopted by a voice vote. There were no unfavorable votes.

Article 3. The following officers were nominated from the floor and unanimously elected by voice vote: Moderator, John H. Terry, Jr., Clerk, Fenn B. Newell, Board of three Commissioners, Royal E. McGirr, David G. Clapp and Gertrude N. Makinen.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the election of treasurer and auditor and any other officers be laid on the table until the next meeting.

Article 4. Moved, seconded and carried by voice vote.

At this point Richard G. Delano presented the following motion:

"I move that the Commissioners be instructed to petition the Superior Court for permission to hold a special Village District meeting for the purpose of taking necessary action to purchase needed fire protection equipment."

This motion was adopted by voice vote.

Richard Rhodes then presented the following motion:

"I move that the meeting be adjourned until Saturday, June 1, 1957 at two o'clock in the afternoon to coincide with the special meeting if the Superior Court permits it."

This motion was adopted by voice vote and the meeting was adjourned at 3:15 o'clock p.m.

SPECIAL MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the county of Cheshire in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Saturday, the first day of June, 1957, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Fire Chief to purchase a new fire truck at a total cost not to exceed twelve thousand (\$12,000.00); the town to raise and appropriate the sum of nine thousand (\$9,000.00) contingent upon the action of the Westmoreland Village District in raising and appropriating the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) to be applied against the purchase price of said Fire truck. The town to raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the current year and to borrow eight thousand (\$8,000.00) to be amortized at the rate of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) each year starting in 1958 and authorize the Selectmen to issue bonds or serial notes for the repayment of same.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town a conditional quit claim deed from the Westmoreland School District conveying all of its right, title and interest in the old schoolhouse in district number 9, so-called, and the land appurtenant thereto; and to take such measures as may be necessary to acquire a clear title to said premises, for the purpose of establishing a public library and historical museum as a permanent memorial to the soldiers, sailors and marines of all wars who have served from the Town of Westmoreland, or take any action thereto.
- 3. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the 8th day of March, 1958, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To chose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officers, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of erecting in that part of town known as South Village an elementary school and furnish and equip the same, and the grading of the lot and the acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for its location; to accept and use such funds of the district as are now available, and gifts which may be received to reduce the amount of the appropriation; and that the District vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds

shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, and any amendments thereto.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper and advisable in connection with the construction of the new elementary building and for the purchase and furnishings for the same or to take any action thereon.
- 10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, (using the proposed Budget "A" figures) for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 11. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools (using the proposed Budget "B" figures) for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to receive and use in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States gov-

ernment or any department or agency thereof, or from any state or private agency.

- 13. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Keene School District.
- 14. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Walpole School District.

SCHOOL MEETING

March 9, 1957

Agreeable to the warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the clerk as the moderator had resigned. John Terry was elected moderator for the meeting, with the clerk casting one ballot, Mr. Terry was then sworn in. Following this, the moderator read the warrant and the articles were then acted upon.

- Article 1. John Terry was elected moderator for the ensuing year with the clerk casting one ballot.
- Article 2. Dorothy Rhodes was elected clerk for the ensuing year with the moderator casting one ballot.
- Article 3. Robert W. Moore, Jr. was elected school board member for the enusing three years. (Robert Moore, Jr. received 61 votes, Thomas Barrett, Sr. received 52 votes, Carl Barrett received 1 vote and one ballot was blank.)
- Article 4. Marjorie Hudson was elected treasurer for the ensuing year with the clerk casting one ballot.
- Article 5. The motion was made, seconded and voted to take Article 5 up with Article 8.
- Article 6. The motion was made, seconded and voted that Article 6 and Article 7 be taken up after Article 21.

Articles 5 and 8. The motion was made, seconded and voted that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,131.10 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the school

board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes of the town.

Article 9. The motion was made, seconded and voted that Article 9 be taken up after Article 21.

Article 10. The motion was made seconded and voted that the district vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to receive and use in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any department or agency thereof, or from any state or private agency.

Article 11. The motion was made seconded and voted that the district authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Keene School District.

Article 12. The motion was made seconded and voted that the district authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Walpole School District.

Article 13. The motion was made seconded and voted that the district authorize and empower the Westmoreland School Board to sell by means of a public auction any right, title and-or interest that the School District has or may have in and to the land and-or buildings of the Depot School so-called.

Article 14. The motion was made seconded and voted that the school district accept as a gift a sum of four hundred dollars, or what ever it may cost, from the Westmoreland Corner School Historical Association Inc., for the purpose of clearing the title to the Corner School property formerly known as District No. 9; and to return to the association any unused portion of the above amount not utilized for the purpose stated.

Article 15. The motion was made seconded and voted that the school board be authorized to work jointly with a committee chosen by the Westmoreland Corner

School Historical Association Inc., to employ such council as they may deem fit and to seek court ruling as to the rightful owner of the aforementioned property.

Article 16. The motion was made seconded and voted to rescind the vote taken under Article 12 of the school warrant of 1955, relative to deeding the Corner School property.

Article 17. The motion was made seconded and voted that in the event the court rules that the Corner School property belongs to the School District, to deed said property to the town of Westmoreland, with the provision that the Westmoreland Corner School Historical Association Inc., has the use of the property and maintain the same as long as the association exists; also with the provision that the building may be used for school purposes at any time if the need should arise.

Article 18. The motion was made seconded and voted that the School District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 to clear the title to land on which the East Westmoreland School sits, and that the School Board be authorized to clear the title.

Article 19. The motion was made seconded and voted that the school board be instructed to send the seventh grade pupils to Keene or Walpole as tuition pupils if the school board decided that over crowded conditions in the Westmoreland schools warrant this action.

As it was obvious that all the school business couldn't be finished at this time, the motion was made seconded and voted that the meeting be adjourned until Monday evening, March 11, at 8 p.m. Motion carried.

March 11, 1957

The meeting was called to order by the moderator on Monday evening, March 11, at 8 p.m. The remainder of the school warrant was then acted upon.

Article 7. Charles Adams was elected auditor for the ensuing year.

Article 20. The motion was made seconded and voted that the district vote to establish a capital reserve fund for the financing of all or part of the construction and equipping of a new elementary school, or remodeling of present school facilities, such reserve to be created in accordance with R.S.A., Chapter 35 and any amendment thereto.

Article 21. The motion was made seconded and voted that the district vote to authorize the school board to transfer to the capital reserve fund a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 of its unencumbered surplus funds remaining on hand at the end of the school year 1956-1957.

Article 9. The motion was made seconded and voted that the \$1,000.00 of the \$1,500.00 reserved for renovation of the Corner School be transferred to the School District treasury; the balance of \$500.00 to be held in reserve until title to Corner School property is established. If it is found that the property belongs to either the school district or the town, then the \$500.00 is to be paid to the treasurer of the Corner School Historical Association to be used to install suitable toilets in the building. If the property is not found to be the property of the district or town, then the \$500.00 is to be transferred to the school district treasurer.

In a voice vote it was carried in the affirmative. The vote was protested and a ballot was called for.

Yes—68 No—35——Motion carried.

Article 6. Reports of committees were heard. Marjorie Hudson gave a report on Hot Lunches, which was accepted and placed on file.

Charles Adams read the auditors' report.

Cameron Paine read a report of the Co-operative School Committee. The motion was made seconded and voted that the clerk be instructed to write a letter to the chairman expressing the thanks and appreciation of the district for the work done by the Co-operative School Committee.

Reports were made by the Town Building Committee, Mrs. Ruth Churchill, Mrs. Annie Shelley and Robert Cox.

The motion was made seconded and voted that we continue with the co-operative school study.

The motion was made seconded and voted that the school building committee be instructed to investigate the possibilities of building a new six room school in Westmoreland. In particular to investigate the cost of construction, the ideal location, the necessary size, and the best means of raising the necessary funds, and that when we adjourn, we adjourn until Monday, June 24, 1957, at 8 p.m.

The clerk, moderator, treasurer, and school board member were then sworn in.

June 24, 1957

The adjourned school meeting was held at the Town Hall on Monday, June 24, 1957, at 8 p.m. The moderator called the meeting to order. The clerk read Article 6 of the warrant which was to be acted upon.

Members of the building committee, Mrs. Churchill, Mrs. Shelley and Robert Cox, gave reports relative to the building of a new school. Mr. Keach, superintendent of schools, and Mr. Norman Randlett, architect of Laconia, were given permission to explain features of the building program. Mr. Randlett explained the designs, which he had on exhibit. Questions were asked concerning the plans, which would be built at the rear of the present school. Mr. Keach explained the financing of a new school.

The motion was made seconded and voted that the school board be instructed to appeal to the Superior Court for a special district meeting to be called for the purpose of raising the necessary funds to build a new school.

In a voice vote, the no's carried. This vote was challenged. A standing vote was called for. The no's still carried.

The motion was made seconded and voted that a ballot vote be taken to find out how many are in favor of

building a six room school in Westmoreland village to house grades 1-8.

Yes—59 No—44 Motion carried.

The motion was made seconded and voted that a ballot vote be taken to find out how many are in favor of having the school board petition the Superior Court for a special meeting so the money for the school can be raised.

Yes—56 No—30 Motion carried.

Cameron Paine, before making the following motions, explained that they were formalities to carry out the votes of the school meeting in March. They in no way effect the original votes.

The motion was made seconded and voted that Article No. 17 be reconsidered for the purpose of offering an amendment that will authorize the School Board to execute and deliver a quit claim deed of the Westmoreland Corner School property to the town of Westmoreland in accordance with the vote at the special town meeting on June 1.

The motion was made seconded and voted that the district authorize the School Board in the name and on behalf of the Westmoreland School District to execute, acknowledge and deliver a quit claim deed to the Town of Westmoreland, conveying all of the right, title and interest of the School District in and to the Westmoreland Corner School, so-called, with all of the land appurtenant thereto, in accordance with the description contained in a deed to be presented and read in full at this meeting and including the reservations and provisions contained therein, and to rescind such part of the action previously taken as provided for seeking a court ruling to perfect the title to the Corner School property.

The motion was made seconded and voted that the action taken under Article 14, as amended be rescinded. Meeting adjourned.

October 26, 1957

Agreeable to the warrant, the legal voters having met

at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the moderator, who read the petition to the Superior Court, the consent from the Superior Court to hold a special school meeting, and the recommendation from the budget committee. After the reading of the warrant, the articles were acted upon.

The motion was made seconded and voted to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last meeting.

Article 1. The motion was made seconded and voted that the district vote to transfer the proceeds (\$3,100.00) of the sale of the Depot School (so-called) to the capital reserve fund.

Article 2. The motion was made and seconded that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for the purpose of erecting in that part of town known as South Village an elementary school and furnish and equip the same, and the grading of the lot and the acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for its location; to accept and use such funds of the district as are now available, and gifts which may be received to reduce the amount of the appropriation; and that the District vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated: and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, and any amendments thereto.

Ruth Hatt, a member of the school board, appointed the following to be ballot inspectors; Walter Dunn, Hugh Shelley, Lois Leach and Carl Barrett.

By a ballot vote—yes—91 no—73.

Not having the necessary two thirds vote required in case of a bond issue, the motion was not carried.

Article 3. This article was not acted upon as Article 2 was not carried.

Article 4. The moderator explained that he felt some action should be taken at this meeting as the court had said an emergency existed.

The motion was made seconded and voted that another committee of three be appointed to study the school situation, and to look into the possibility of adding to the Village School and the East Westmoreland School and also any other possibilities. The committee and school board also to determine whether there is a possibility of negotiating a longer than one year contract for Junior High tuition students in Walpole or Keene and to report at the next regular meeting. The amendment was made seconded and voted that the committee be elected from the floor.

The motion was lost in a voice vote.

A ballot vote was called for but was objected to. A show of hands was called for, which was agreeable to the one calling for the ballot vote.

Yes—7 No—42 The motion was not carried.

The motion was made seconded and voted that the meeting be adjourned to Saturday, November 23, at 2 p.m. to reconsider Article 2 of the warrant. (The moderator explained that a two thirds vote would be necessary to carry the motion.)

By a show of hands, Yes—40, No—16. Motion carried. An objection was made to the motion as so many had gone home.

November 23, 1957

The adjourned school meeting to reconsider Article 2 was held on Saturday afternoon, November 23, 1957, at 2 p.m. The moderator called the meeting to order.

The motion was made seconded and voted that we reconsider Article 2, that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for the purpose of erecting in that part of town known as South Village an elementary school and furnish and equip the same, and the

grading of the lot and the acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for its location; to accept and use such funds of the district as now available and gifts which may be received, to reduce the amount of the appropriation and that the District vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, and any amendments thereto.

The same ballot inspectors as before helped with the counting of the ballots.

Yes—101, No—59. Not having the necessary two-thirds vote, the motion was not carried.

The motion was made seconded and voted that the district raise and appropriate a sum of \$56,750 for the purpose of erecting in that part of town known as South Villiage an elementary four room school and furnish and equip the same, and the grading of the lot and the acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for its location; to accept and use such funds of the district which are now available, and gifts which may be received to reduce the amount of the appropriation; and that the district vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes and bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes and bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, N. H. revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, and any amendments thereto. The amendment was made seconded and voted with the original motion that the school board be authorized to send the 7th and 8th grade out.

Yes—38, No—27. Motion lost.

Donald Paine, a member of the budget committee, reminded the group that only the original article, (Article 2) had been recommended by the budget committee.

Meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

The following is my report for the year ending June 30, 1957.

- 155 pupils had vision tests given by the school nurse.
 - 4 pupils had vision exams by eye doctors.
 - 78 pupils had hearing tests given by the school nurse.
 - 99 pupils were weighed and measured by the school nurse.
 - 99 pupils were given inspections by the school nurse.
 - 26 pupils were found in need of dental care.
- 165 pupils attended Polio Clinics.
 - 8 pupils attended Pre-registration Clinic.
 - 20 pupils needed follow-up on Smallpox vaccinations.

One of the many aims of the school health program is to establish GOOD HEALTH among its children and community.

To define—GOOD HEALTH—a state of complete physical, mental, and social well-being and the foundation of joyous, zestful living. Let's hope we all find it this coming year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Super-intendent of Schools:

An ambitious program to strengthen the curriculum was begun this year. A three-day Language Arts Workshop was held October 9, 10, and 11 for the purpose of studying current information about content and methods with particular emphasis on oral and written communication. Dr. Alice Crossley, Associate Professor in Education at Boston University; Miss Nell Sefton, Educational Consultant of the World Book Company; Mrs. Marie Capron, State Elementary Supervisor and Mr. Normand Pacquette, Head of the Claremont English Department were speakers and consultants.

Our objectives are:

- 1. To develop a syllabus outline for Grades 1-8 that will serve as a basis for progressive improvement.
- 2. To develop an English syllabus outline for Grades 9-12 that will serve as a basis for progessive improvement.
- 3. To develop a planned program of integration of the language arts with other high school subjects.

As a follow-up of the Workshop two committees are working on syllabi; one for Grades 1-8, the other, for Grades 9-12. In addition six meetings of all the teachers are being held to work with the committees.

The forecast of enrollment given in the December 31, 1955 town report gave an estimate of 110 pupils for 1957-58 for grades 1 through 7. The actual enrollment September 20th, 1957 was 126, an increase of 16. The increased enrollment made it necessary to send the 7th grade pupils

to Walpole as tuition pupils since facilities in the Westmoreland schools were inadequate to house the total of 126 pupils. In fact they are inadequate to serve the present enrollment of 104 as it is necessary to have 31 and 32 in two rooms that should not have more than 25 pupils.

The School Board and Education Committee have spent innumerable hours studying the educational needs of the community and have made their recommendation of what should be done to care for the educational needs. Accompanying their recommendations the combined committees have given their reasons for the recommendation they made with supporting data.

At two district meetings the voters of Westmoreland have come very close to voting the two-thirds vote necessary to carry out the recommendation. The result is that the Westmoreland children (grades one through six) are attending schools that are below acceptable standards. This is taking place while Westmoreland is receiving over \$6,000.00 in State Aid and an anticipated \$8,000.00 for 1958-59, which sums are for the express purpose of equalizing educational opportunity.

Westmoreland voters will have another opportunity to make an investment in their youth at the March, 1958 school district meeting. There were members of the Education Committee who did not believe there was a need for increased facilities. After study they changed their minds. The voters should have some faith in the people who have worked so hard to do the job that the voters requested them to do. If you are unwilling to accept the findings of your representatives visit the schools of Westmoreland and then compare what you find with the facilities that are available in nearby towns.

The total budget voted at the March, 1957 meeting for 1957-58 is \$50,281.10. The anticipated income at that time was \$10,392.15 which would result in \$39,388.95 having to be raised by taxation. However, changes in income which are listed below resulted in the district having to raise the smaller amount of \$36,274.17 which is \$3,614.78 less.
