#### CLAYTON E. HALE

1919-1942

Son of Walter L. Hale, of South Wolfeboro, Clayton was born January 31, 1919, in Wilmington, Massachusetts. Member of the class of 1937, Brewster Free Academy. Four times President of his class; an outstanding athlete; Junior Councillor, Winnepesaukee Chapter, Order of DeMolay. Graduate of Boston University, class of 1941, with degree of Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. Enlisted as an aviation cadet April 28, 1941. Won his wings and commissioned second lieutenant, Air Corps, Army of the United States, December 12, 1941.

Clean, confident, courageous, eager for contact with the enemy, unafraid for the future—he lost his life in the service of his country, in the Far Eastern Theatre of the war, September 10, 1942. True to the best traditions of American youth, his example is a continuing inspiration to a host of Wolfeboro lads—"comrades in arms." Of such as he, is our hope of victory.



## WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1943

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### [L.S.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, two Auditors, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, Town Constable, and one Water and Sewer Commissioner for three years, one Library Trustee for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To elect one or more Highway Agents, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the purpose of cooperating with the State, and/or the Federal Government on joint projects.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to give a note to the Wolfeboro National Bank on the credit of the town not to exceed \$600.00 to hold the building at the Ski Slope known as the Abenaki Outing Club building, and pay the interest on same until one year after the expiration of the War.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to name the so-called Lake Front Park, the Cate Park, and invest \$3,000.00 of the funds left by the late Edward F. Cate to the Town of Wolfeboro for a public park, in United States War Bonds, the interest from said bonds to be used toward the maintenance of said park. The balance of the Funds with accrued interest to be used to retire the debt on the park and for additional improvements to said park.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report for the purposes specified, which include the following special appropriations:







## **REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE**

To the Legal Voters of the Town of Wolfeboro:

Your Budget Committee submits the following report and the budget of the Town of Wolfeboro, and the Wolfeboro Water and Sewer Departments, and the totals for the Wolfeboro Fire Precinct and the Wolfeboro School District, as well as certain charts and graphs showing various phases of town expense over the past few years.

#### **Public Hearings**

The Budget Committee held one public hearing at Carpenter School February 4, 1943, which hearing was duly advertised in the Granite State News January 29, 1943, as required by law.

#### **Town Debt**

During the year 1942 there was paid from the funds raised by taxation \$7,600.00 on the principal of the town debt, as appears in the Budget. In addition to this amount the Water Department retired \$3,000.00 of Water Bonds, and the School Board retired \$5,000.00 on the School Department. The School Building Bonds will be retired in 1944, and the Sprinkler Notes in 1945. A statement of all of the outstanding bonds and notes of the town appears on page 23.

#### School Budget

The amount requested by the School Board, and approved by the Budget Committee, is \$1,154.25 less than the sum provided for 1942. In spite of the fact that automatic raises in teachers' salaries is included, and the transportation costs will be more than last year, the cost to the town will be less. The chief reason for this is the new arrangement between Brewster Academy and the School Board. Cooperative courses in Commercial Subjects, Home Economics, and Manual Training have been arranged, and are being paid for with the funds accruing to the Town Schools from the Brewster Estate. These courses have made available to town students the sort of practical courses which have hitherto been obtained only out of town for their high school work this year, and the cost of tuition has been thereby reduced.

#### Water-Sewer Department

By virtue of an act of the Legislature, and with the approval of the Commissioners, the Water and Sewer Departments of the town are now combined. If the new budget is accurate and the anticipated income is in line with the figures submitted, this department should end its year with a balance on hand of \$15,000.00. This excellent showing will be the results of the continued efforts on the part of the Commissioners to collect old water and sewer bills. The new combined department will be able to collect sewer bills which were formerly uncollectible.

Expenses of the department have been held down as much as possible without injuring its efficiency. The combined departments will now carry the sewer bonds of \$3,000.00 per year, plus interest charges, thus relieving the tax rate of that load. The Commissioners are to be congratulated on the splendid showing they have made. The superintendent is to be commended for the faithful discharge of his duties, in keeping the water and sewer systems functioning steadily, necessitating his attention day and night.

#### **Public Welfare**

Last year the cost of this item was approximately \$4,950.00. This year, in spite of an increase of \$500.00 in the old age assistance item, the budget approved figure is \$4,600.00 for Public Welfare, or a saving of \$350.00.

#### Highways

The amounts budgeted for summer maintenance. \$8,300.00, winter maintenance, \$5,200.00, and general expenses of the Highway Department, \$1,000.00 are exactly the same as last year. Town construction will be \$550.00 less than planned for last year, and State Aid construction will be \$540.50 less than was spent in 1942. Town Road Aid for Class 5 highways will be available this year. Eight hundred eleven dollars and seventy-one cents (\$811.71) spent by the town will make available \$3.246.82 from the State for Class 5 roads. From the highway budget, \$500.00 was approved for the completion of the Stoneham Road, \$1,000.00 for the completion of the New Durham road, and \$200.00 for the Beaver Pond Farm road. Tar and oil is hard to get, but if it can be obtained \$2,000.00 has been set up to pay for this item, for which \$1,565.12 was spent in 1942. The highway agent is commended for his skill in keeping the expenses of his department within the budget limits consistently year after year.

#### Precinct

The amount of the Precinct budget will be \$11,386.40 which includes the hydrant tax of \$2,375.00. The total Precinct budget will be less than 1942 because there is no request for emergency equipment such as was needed a year ago, and which is now on hand and ready for service.

#### Recommendations

We recommend the adoption of the article in the Warrant calling for the purchase by the town, by note, of the Outing Club building at the Ski Slope, interest on same to be paid until such time as said club is able to reimburse the town by paying off the note. Had it not been for the war, and the fact that many of the Outing Club members have gone into the service, this matter would not have come up. The committee urges that favorable action be taken on this matter to preserve this recreational center for our boys when they return from the service.

The committee also recommends that the new park on the water front be adopted as the Cate Park, and be so designated.







#### **REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN**

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro Town Library:

Gentlemen:

The report of the librarian for the year ending February 1, 1943, is herewith presented.

Much of the civilian life of today centers about the war. At the annual book fair held in Boston in October, there was displayed above the platform these words from the president, "Books are weapons." Elmer Davis as a part of his war service has issued a special pamphlet for librarians telling them what part the libraries must take in distributing material on the war, on the coming peace, and on the general reconstruction of the world.

Libraries are flooded with war material, which may always be found on the reading tables.

But a normal life must be lived in spite of war, and the same with a choice of reading. Many of the season's books are delightful, and good diversion for all. Many new books for young people have been purchased, the librarian bearing in mind the special new appeal for books on aviation. The aviator at present ranks in popularity, and even surpasses that of the Indian and cowboy.

It is too early to decide just how the gasoline situation may affect the work. Some books are sent and returned by mail. Where books cannot be returned on time, we have tried to be fair in the adjustment of fines. It may be better as the season advances to make some change in the hours of opening for "The Duration." An hour on Sunday morning and on weekday mornings would accommodate those who live at a

distance better than the afternoon hours. By shortening the latter, we could still keep to a twenty-five hour week.

During the Victory Book drive, the citizens through this library sent over 300 books for the men in camp.

As in all lines of civilian work there is a falling off numerically, as many persons seem to enter the library, but fewer books are loaned. There is more serious reading. More remain for reference work. Many books that a library of this size need not carry are borrowed from the State library.

The circulation for the year has been 20,887 of these classes: fiction 12,253, non-fiction 4,361, children's books 4,273. There have been 306 books added to the combined libraries; of these, 59 were contributed. Two hundred sixty-five new borrowers' cards have been issued.

The librarian would express her appreciation of the many who have helped to make the swiftly passing years so pleasant, and again she would thank her assistants for their loyal service. She also would express her appreciation to the Trustees for their cooperation and support.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE WATER DEPARTMENT

In the Water Department, due to government regulations, we have not been able to do as much new work as was planned.

We have tried each year to replace five hydrants but this year we could only replace one, which was broken off by an accident.

Our only extension was one two-inch main on Clark Road, to the extent of 250 feet.

There have been less than a dozen new customers added during the last year, due to the new building laws.

The reservoir was drained and cleaned with very little repairing necessary.

On Factory street we have a new storehouse and garage combined, which has been much needed for several years.

In regard to leaks we have been very fortunate, not having any bad ones.

The road at Beach Pond we have tried to repair some each year.

Once more I wish to thank the Water Commissioners and Mr. Abel Haley for their full cooperation.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE SEWER DEPARTMENT

In the Sewer Department we believe that all houses, except one, within one hundred feet of the public sewer are now entered. One new house which is still unfinished will be entered in the spring.

Practically all of the roof and cellar drains have been taken from the sewer system, which gives much better results at the treatment plant as well as reducing our electrical expense.

At the treatment plant we have added a much needed building for tools and supplies.

We have had very little trouble on our pipe lines during the past year as the whole system is flushed at least once each year.

Through the cooperation of the State Board of Health the expense of treating the Imhoff Tanks has been cut more than fifty per cent.

Again I wish to thank the Sewer Commissioners and Mr. Abel Haley for their full cooperation.

### THE AMERICAN RED CROSS CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL REPORT

Due to war conditions, the National Red Cross program has been enormously expanded this past year and the work of the 3,750 chapters greatly speeded up. A complete reorganization and the adoption of a workable set of by-laws has greatly facilitated the work of Wolfeboro Chapter. We now have the set-up requested by National Headquarters. All our old committees, and several new ones, are functioning smoothly and efficiently and a great deal has been accomplished. For instance:

Over 1,500 garments of various kinds produced, some for War Relief, some for our Armed Forces, and some to remain here for possible Disaster Relief. We have also made 50,000 surgical dressings.

Our Canteen Corps and Motor Corps are composed of women who have taken the necessary training and have been duly qualified. Both Corps are well organized and fully equipped.

We now have five very capable "lay instructors" in First Aid who have qualified over 200 in the Standard First Aid course, 21 in the Advanced course, and about a hundred in the shorter course for Air Raid Wardens.

Our bathing beach ("Sandy") had, as its life guard a fully qualified water safety instructor who not only gave swimming instruction, but administered First Aid, and on one occasion, rescued two persons from drowning.

Two classes of Nurse's Aides have taken the exacting instruction required, and have received their certificates. The hospital reports that they have been of great assistance. As the connecting link between the boys in the service and the "folks back home," our Home Service Committee has proven a great morale builder, and has brought comfort and happiness to many.

Our Disaster Relief Committee is fully organized and ready for any emergency.

Our newest activity is our Junior Red Cross, organized last spring under the capable chairmanship of Mrs. Fred Stackpole, and with the cooperation of the teachers in both Carpenter and Brewster schools. It was a group of juniors who turned in nearly \$200 on Tag Day last August. The juniors have also collected an amazing amount of rubber and scrap, and have accumulated a tidy sum in War Bonds and Stamps. We are very proud of our more than 400 juniors and are grateful to their teachers for their cheerful cooperation.

Notwithstanding conditions, our children's Christmas was carried out as usual, and many kiddies made happy.

The Chapter is grateful for the support and cooperation of all our people, and hopes this spirit may continue "for the duration"—and beyond.

## HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

On the whole, Wolfeboro has had an exceptionally There have been no major epidemics. healthful vear. A small number of the usual cases of whooping cough. measles and chicken pox in children have been reported. Only one case of scarlet fever, and that in an adult who had a prompt recovery, occurred. Three cases of meningococcus meningitis (spinal meningitis) were treated at Huggins Hospital; all these had a prompt, uncomplicated recovery. Two of them were young men from the Ossipee district who presumably contracted the disease while at work in Portland. Maine: and the other was a young school boy from Brookfield, N. H. Dr. Louise M. Paul, Health Officer of Wakefield, N. H., and Mrs. Dorothy Bennett, R. N., district nurse, took nose and throat cultures on all persons who had had contact with this latter case. Such material was analyzed through the facilities of Huggins Hospital laboratories under the competent supervision of Dr. Louise M. Norton, Pathologist. All individuals who showed a positive culture were given treatment and/or isolation. Because of such prompt and efficient management of the situation, no doubt an epidemic of this disease among the school children and adult population of Sanbornville was prevented.

This latter instance once again impresses upon us how very fortunate we are to have such a thoroughly modern, well-equipped, and ably staffed institution as Huggins Hospital in our community. The individuals who have worked for, and those who have given bequests to the hospital surely are gratified at the good they are doing. The supply of graduate nurses everywhere remains limited because of the war and the needs of the armed services for such professional personnel. The volunteer work of Nurses' Aides and others has helped immeasurably in this situation.

I should again like to emphasize immunization, or the prevention of disease. A splendid young mother of three small children was taken from our midst by the dread disease Tetanus, or Lock-jaw. The germ which causes it cannot grow in the presence of oxygen. It, therefore, occurs mainly in deep puncture wounds of the skin; introduced by a rusty nail, dead branch or other such sharp, contaminated object. Once the germ has produced its powerful poison and such gets settled in the nervous tissue, there is little, if any, hope of cure. However, the disease can be prevented. The administration of antitoxin immediately after the puncture wound will prevent Tetanus in practically 100% of the cases. Furthermore, a person can be immunized for life by inoculations of Tetanus Toxoid which will enable him to build up materials in his own system to prevent the occurrence of the disease should one of the germs be embedded in his tissues. All members of the armed services receive this as well as other immunizations. The soldiers on the home front who may be exposed should likewise see to it that they, too, are similarly protected.

All of the children at Carpenter, South Wolfeboro, and Tuftonboro schools were immunized against diphtheria last spring. The value of this as a preventive measure against such a dread disease is unquestionable.

Regular analyses of milk samples from various distributors, and of the water supply have been made. In all instances these have measured up satisfactorily to the high standards set up by our State Board of Health. All cattle have been regularly tested for tuberculosis and Bang's disease by our able veterinarian, Dr. M. D. Hale. These careful routine procedures are of inestimable aid in preventing disease, and in maintaining the health and well-being of our people.

# REPORT OF PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS COMMISSION

The commission performed its usual functions during the year which were maintaining and supervising the Bathing Beach, the Skating Rink, the Ski Slope, and the Parks.

## **Bathing Beach**

The bathing instructor, Richard Marden, gave instructions to twelve boys and girls who received Junior Life Saving Certificates.

Beginners' lessons were given to five children, Minor First Aid was rendered to forty-three people, and emergency First Aid was given to two cases which later required the services of a physician. Two people were rescued from drowning.

Attendance at the beach was 2,389.

## Skating Rink

The skating rink was operated during the winter although the attendance was not as large as usual. The commission believes that this project should continue for the benefit of our young people who may enjoy skating with safety.

#### Ski Slope

We did not operate the ski slope this year as most of the young people who enjoyed this sport are away. We do not intend to open the slope until after the war.

#### Park

During the year we completed the Lake Park and built the new wharfs at a total cost of \$2,855.87. This park is a beauty spot and a much needed and appreciated improvement. There is a debt of \$2,400.00 remaining on the park which is being paid at the rate of \$600.00 per year. The commission recommends that the town adopt this park as the Cate Park, and apply the funds left the town for a public park by the late Edward F. Cate, as follows:

"Invest \$3,000.00 of the fund which now amounts to \$5,678.98, in United States War Bonds, the interest from said bonds to be used to help maintain the park. The balance of the fund to be used to retire the outstanding notes and to make further improvements in the park, and that the park be named the CATE PARK."

## FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those forced to remain at home. Here, team work becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by wholehearted cooperation between citizens and leaders.

The forest fire warden is, by law, the designated local leader in forest fire matters. He exercises his prerogatives and discharges his duties as such under the direction of the State Forester. There was never a time when the warden needed each citizen's good will and cooperation more than he does now. With manpower waning, fire prevention, through efficient preparation, care with fire and compliance with necessary regulations become a vital duty of citizenship.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember

1. That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

2. To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not to throw lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches from moving vehicles.

3. To notify your local warden promptly of any fires you see.

4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.

5. To be fire-minded; be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden prevent forest fires. This is patriotism at work.

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
