

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chesterfield on, Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to 6 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

1. Town officers' salaries	\$2,040.50
2. Town officers' expenses	800.00
3. Election and Registration expenses	800.00
4. Expenses of town hall and other town buildings	1,000.00
5. Expenses of police department	1,000.00
6. Support of the fire department	1,200.00
7. Forest fire expenses	500.00
8. Support of the board of health	400.00

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$10,000.00 for Town Road Maintenance.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 for Snow Removal.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$894.66 thereby receiving an additional \$5,964.40 from the State for Town Road Aid.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for street lighting.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Town Library system.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for Aid to Soldiers and their families.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Town Beach.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$125.00 for damage and legal expenses.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$173.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for interest on temporary loans.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$523.00 as the Town's proportionate share for support of the Elliot Community Hospital. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to finish equipping the new fire truck in West Chesterfield.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 by taxation in 1951, and the balance of approximately \$500.00 to be transferred from the cash surplus in the Town Treasury, in addition to the sum of \$3,967.82 already available to pay for construction of the West Chesterfield bridge and its approaches, thereby rescinding the vote on that part of Article 25, Warrant of 1950, pertaining to financing.

Article 26. To see if the Town of Chesterfield will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00), to the Mount Pistareen Grange the land purchased by the Town from the Fred Atherton Estate, on condition that said property shall be developed and maintained by the Mount Pistareen Grange solely as a playground or place of amusement for children, and provided that if the said Mount Pistareen Grange shall disband or shall cease to exist that said land shall revert to the Town of Chesterfield.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to have the one road agent elected by Australian Ballot beginning with the March 1952 Town Meeting.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the cash on hand as of June 30, 1951 of the School District, estimated by the District Officers at \$2,500.00, to the School District to be used toward the payment of principle and interest due June 1, 1951 on the loan for the New Central School Building.

Article 29. To hear reports of Standing Committees and act thereon.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to set aside the sum of \$1,500.00, acquired through sale of Town Property, as a reserve fund for the purchase of highway equipment.

Article 31. To see what action the Town will take in regard to laying out a road from the highway near the residence of Esther Carey to the residence of James Lusby.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$40.79, under clause III of the Will of Luella A. Carpenter, Late of Chesterfield to be added to the George L. Hamilton Trust Fund, the income only to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the George L. Hamilton burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$20.40 under clause IV of the will of the late Luella A. Carpenter, the income only to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Captain Ara Hamilton Burial lot in Chesterfield Village Cemetery.

Article 34. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting:

Given under our hands and seal, this 16th day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty-one.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH 1950

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 14, 1950.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 o'clock by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil and the Warrant read through Article 1. The Moderator then declared Article 1 in order for voting by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

At ten o'clock the rest of the warrant was read by the Clerk and the Articles disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by George E. Joslin that we allow a 2% discount on all property taxes paid by Sept. 1, and if for any reason the bills cannot be out by Sept. 1, the Selectmen should allow the discount if paid within two weeks of date bills are mailed; also that the Selectmen and the Tax Collector should work together to collect or abate the back taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ralph Dutton and supported by Agnes Chickering to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Harry E. Winn, Chairman of the Budget Committee called the attention of the voters to the report of the Budget Committee as given on pages 54, 55 and 56 of the Annual Report. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Rudolph Heins to accept this report. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

1. Town officers' salaries	\$2,040 50
2. Town officers' expenses	1,000 00
3. Election and registration expenses	1,000 00
4. Expenses of town hall and other town buildings	1,000 00
5. Expenses of police department	1,000 00
6. Support of the fire department	1,200 00
7. Forest fire expenses	600 00
8. Support of the board of health	400.00

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Walter Post to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by George Joslin to raise the sum of \$10,000.00 for Town Road Maintenance, reserving \$2,500.00 for oil and \$500.00 for repairing guard rail. Voted on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Robert Woodman to amend the article and raise \$2,000.00 for tar, \$500.00 for guard rails and \$8,000.00 for maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator as carrying in the negative. Voted by voice vote on first motion and that did not carry in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum of \$10,000.00, reserving \$2,000.00 for oil and \$500.00 for guard rails and the balance to be used for maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam which was supported to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 for snow removal. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ralph Dutton and supported by Robert Mitchell to raise the sum of \$842.70 thereby receiving an additional \$3,370.78 from the State for Town Aid. (T. R. A.)

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Rudolph Heins to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Town Library system. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Chickering and supported by Walter Post to amend the article and raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the poor and for Soldier's Aid. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Wakefield Dort to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for Old Age Assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ronald Guyette and supported by George Joslin to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Ralph Dutton to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Town Beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester Burnham and supported by Walter Post to raise

the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported to raise the sum of \$125.00 for legal expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ralph Dick and supported by Raymond Egan to raise the sum of \$175.00 for interest on temporary loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wakefield Dort and supported by Roger Spaulding to raise the sum of \$172.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ronald Guyette and which was supported, to observe Old Home Day. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by John Orr to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Rudolph Heins and supported by Ronald Guyette to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Mary V. Chickering and supported by Robert Mitchell to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase of a fire truck, completely equipped with 1,000 gallon tank, pump, and hose, similar to the one now in the Center Fire House, this truck to be stored and maintained in the West Chesterfield Firehouse. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Wakefield Dort to amend the Article and authorize the construction of a new bridge and approaches, at an estimated cost not to exceed \$16,500.00 on the State Aid Road near the residence of Shirley Bevis, one half of cost to be paid by the State of New Hampshire and one half by the Town. The Town to finance its share by using its West Chesterfield Bridge reserve fund of \$2,139.80, by raising \$2,110.20 by taxation in 1950, and the balance borrowed on serial notes of \$1,000.00 to be paid in 1951, 1952, 1953 and 1954. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by George Joslin to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative. Vote by standing vote on motion by Rudolph Heins and supported by Robert Woodman to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of carrying Liability Insurance on its Highway employees. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wakefield Dort and supported to authorize the Selectmen to maintain as high a water level on Lake Spofford as possible without damage to shore front property and appoint one of the board to be custodian of the gate house. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Rudolph Heins and supported by Walter Post to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ralph Dutton which was supported to instruct the Selectmen and the Town Moderator to appoint a committee to investigate the possibilities of zoning for our lake and town and to report to the town meeting of 1951.

Article 30. George Joslin made a motion to amend the Article to read "two of its old Cletrac Tractors." Raymond Egan made a motion to amend the article to read "funds received be put into new equipment if necessary." Robert Woodman made a motion to amend the article to read "funds received be added to snow removal fund." Walter Post suggested that the money go toward fire truck purchase. Roland Guyette suggested that the money be used to buy a truck. Roger Spaulding advised that the Spofford Cletrac be sold if we can get anywhere near what it is worth. None of these amendments were supported. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Roland Guyette to authorize the Selectmen to sell both of its old Cletrac tractors and snowplows. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported, to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mary Webb, this sum to be added to the George Webb Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the C. W. C. A. for care of the George Webb burial lot. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ralph Dutton and supported by Walter Post to accept the sum of \$400.00 from Adis Barrett Jackson, to be added to the Barrett-Jackson Trust Fund, the income to be paid to the C. W. C. A. for the care of the Barrett-Jackson burial lot. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Rudolph Heins and supported by Jessie Joslin to accept the sum of \$175.00 from Alice E. Jackson, to be known as the Bartlett-Humphrey Trust Fund, the income from same to be paid to the Spofford Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Bartlett-Humphrey burial lot in the Spofford cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 34. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ralph Dutton and supported by Floyd Fuller to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Paul D. and Norman D. Cobb, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of the Paul D. and Norman D. Cobb burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Paul D. and Norman D. Cobb Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 35. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post which was supported to accept the sum of \$200.00 from C. R. Lyle, to be known as the Cornelius R. Lyle Trust Fund. The income from same to be used for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Cornelius R. Lyle burial lot in Spofford Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 36. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported by Harold Putnam to accept the conditions as stated in paragraphs 3, 4 and 6. as contained in a copy of the will of the late Etta L. Hildreth, on file in the office of the Selectmen, and read by the Town Clerk in Town Meeting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 37. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Rudolph Heins and supported by Walter Post that the Firewards work with the Selectmen to spend the \$2,000.00 raised under Article 24 for the purchase of a fire truck. Vote declared by the Moderator as carried in the negative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester Burnham and which was supported that four extra men be appointed from the West Chesterfield Fire Department to work with the Firewards as a committee to spend the \$2,000.00 raised under Article 24 for the purchase of a fire truck. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester Burnham and supported that as much money as we used last

year for chloride be earmarked for chloride from Road Maintenance money raised this year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Harold Putnam that at the next meeting of the Selectmen they abate all so-called back taxes listed in uncollected taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Raymond Egan and supported by Ronald Guyette that we go back to Article 30 and amend the article and use funds received from the sale of Cletracs to be earmarked for purchase of new highway equipment as needed. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Robert Mitchell to adjourn, leaving balloting for town officers open until six o'clock. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

At six o'clock the Moderator declared the ballot box closed and a count of the ballots cast resulted as follows:

For Town Treasurer. Alice L. Spaulding had 200 votes, Warren G. Alien had 2 votes. Alice L. Spaulding was declared elected.

For Tax Collector. Donald C. Emery had 202 votes, Rudolph Heins had 13 votes, Martin A. Duffy had 1 vote. Donald C. Emery was declared elected.

For Fireward. J. Louis Humphrey had 191 votes, Winston H. Cray had 3 votes, Stanley L. Spaulding had 1 vote, Walter J. Post had 1 vote. J. Louis Humphrey was declared elected.

For Auditors. Sedley F. Dunlap had 147 votes, A. Wilson Homestead had 100 votes, Dorothy C. Spaulding had 127 votes, Virginia Parker had 1 vote. Sedley F. Dunlap and Dorothy C. Spaulding were declared elected.

For Budget Committee. Robert E. Woodman had 164 votes, Harry E. Winn had 11 votes, Arvid Pearson had 8 votes, Paul M. Penning had 6 votes, Paul E. Welcome had 6 votes, James O'Neil had 5 votes, James C. Fisher had 5 votes, Henry J. Plante had 3 votes, Chester M. Burnham had 3 votes, William R. Gallagher had 3 votes, Shirley G. Bevis had 3 votes, Ralph Dutton had 3 votes, Floyd M. Fuller had 2 votes, Sedley F. Dunlap had 2 votes, Marie Joslin had 1 vote, Clifford W. Tuttle had 1 vote, Richard G. Chickering had 1 vote, Lyle Chickering had 1 vote, Grace Welcome had 1 vote, A. Wilson Homestead had 1 vote, Clinton Farrington had 1 vote, David Parker had 1 vote, Hadley Winn had 1 vote, Jessie Farrington had 1 vote, Henry Chickering had 1 vote, Clifford Chickering had 1 vote, Kenneth Wiggin had 1 vote. Robert E. Woodman and Harry E. Winn were declared elected.

For Trustee of Trust Funds. Viola V. Tuttle had 217 votes, and Chester M. Burnham had 1 vote. Viola V. Tuttle was declared elected.

For Sexton. William F. Nilsson had 89 votes, Harry M. Pierce had 115 votes, George W. Goodridge had 1 vote, Clinton Davis had 1 vote. Harry M. Pierce was declared elected.

For Spofford Constable. George N. Eager had 26 votes, Leonard R. Michaud had 104 votes, Donald A. Wellington had 89 votes. Leonard R. Michaud was declared elected.

For Center Constable. Henry C. Chickering had 69 votes, J. Louis Humphrey had 4 votes, Raymond Rowe

had 2 votes, Sedley F. Dunlap had 2 votes, George S. White had 2 votes, William F. Nilsson had 2 votes, Roger C. Spaulding had 2 votes, Ralph Dick had 1 vote, Stanley Spaulding had 1 vote, Floyd Fuller had 1 vote, Paul Penning had 1 vote, John Prout had 1 vote, Lee Avery had 1 vote, A. Wilson Homestead had 1 vote, William M. Gilson had 1 vote, Leonard Michaud had 1 vote. Henry C. Chickering was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Stanley L. Spaulding had 207 votes, Shirley G. Bevis had 1 vote, Paul Welcome had 1 vote. Stanley L. Spaulding was declared elected.

Question (a) Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town? Yes had 116 votes, No had 45 votes.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the thirteenth day of March, 1951, at three o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years, and a member for 1 year.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of school, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization funds together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see what action the district will take to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed six thousand four hundred sixty-three dollars (\$6,463) which, with the unexpended balance of the 1950-1951 appropriation, will be sufficient to pay the principal and interest on debt, due June 1, 1951.

10. To see whether the district will vote to petition the Tax Commission for an audit of the accounts of the school district by the division of Municipal Accounting.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand twenty dollars to insure the new school building for sixty thousand dollars on a three-year budget basis—\$1,020.00.

12. To see what action the school district wishes to take in the disposal of the three school houses and what method to use, if any, and to apply the proceeds from such sale to payment of the debt of the new school building.

13. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The school year 1950-51 has been one with a record of successes and disappointments for those concerned with the schools of Chesterfield. The successes have been momentous; the sale of \$77,000 worth of school bonds, the excellent water supply obtained at the new school site, the purchase of a large playground area and the start on the construction of the new building. The disappointments have largely been centered around the slow progress on the new building due to the critical shortage of steel brought about by the Korean situation and the rearmament program.

Chesterfield does find the new school delayed but is fortunate indeed that the adjourned meeting of 1950, authorized the construction and enabled the school board and building committee to obtain a bid within the funds available. A delay of only a few weeks in obtaining bids would have resulted in an increase of costs beyond the funds voted and the probable loss of the entire project for some years to come. It was also possible in June to place orders for school equipment such as desks, chairs, lunch-room tables, steel folding chairs, a refrigerator, kitchen equipment and playground equipment at a saving of from 10% to 20%. Despite the fact that the orders were placed in June, it was not until January 1951, that the electric fixtures were delivered. With all the difficulties however, success is in sight, and before the close of the school year, classes will be in session in the new building.

This is a period of transition, change and reorganization of the school program in Chesterfield. It is a time when constructive criticism, patience and forbearance will help in the establishment of an educational program in Chesterfield which will be the pride of the community and the joy of the children.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Health inspection showed the following defects:

Pupils in grade 1 to 5 inclusive were examined by Dr. Cramb in May 1950.

59 pupils were examined

9 pupils showed slight heart murmurs

25 pupils showed need of dental care

7 pupils were advised to have their family physician examine their nose and throat conditions.

In September 1950, pupils in grades 5 through 8 were examined by Dr. Cramb.

101 pupils were examined

8 showed slight heart murmurs

56 were in need of dental care

11 were advised to have nose and throat examination, by their family physicians

All pupils were given special hearing and vision tests during the school year.

7 pupils with eye defects had these corrected

23 pupils had dental care

2 pupils had tonsil and adenoid operations.

In May 1950, a tuberculosis patch test clinic was held.

128 pupils were tested

2 pupils reacted

3 pupils were X-rayed

During April 1950, the Federal Dental team gave fluorine treatments to 136 children. These treatments consisted of a complete cleaning of the teeth and three applications of sodium fluoride. The P. T. A. provided transportation to the clinic which was held in Marlboro.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

I herein submit my report concerning the elementary music in the schools.

The chief aim of the music program is to develop love and appreciation of good music and the desire to participate spontaneously in group work, both vocal and instrumental. A comprehensive course is offered, starting with the first grade and carrying through the eighth grade which deals with all fundamentals as well as with expression in ensemble work, tone production and rhythmic forms.

There is no lack of enthusiasm in my work with the pupil groups and this enthusiasm should carry through to community activities in the later life of the pupil.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Town Hall, Chesterfield, N. H.

March 14, 1950

Meeting was opened at 2:05 p. m. by Moderator Harry Winn. Warrant was read by the clerk.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

A motion was made by Walter Post and seconded that the clerk cast one ballot for Harry Winn to serve as Moderator. Carried in the affirmative.

Clerk cast one ballot for Harry Winn and declared Harry Winn elected as Moderator.

He was sworn in by Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

A motion was made by Mrs. Agnes Chickering that the moderator cast one ballot for Mary Virginia Chickering to serve as clerk for the ensuing year. Motion seconded and carried in the affirmative.

Moderator Harry Winn cast one ballot and declared Mary V. Chickering to be elected as clerk.

Mrs. Imogene Chickering gave the oath of office.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Mrs. Pauline Record was nominated by Margaret Nurse.

Mrs. Elsie Cross was nominated by Roland Guyette.

Mrs. Clara Wellington was nominated by Robert Woodman.

Mr. Joseph James was nominated by I. C. Bradley Jr.

Motion made and seconded that nominations be closed. Carried.

Mr. Woodman made the motion that the nominees state their views on some of the school problems such as a new school and transportation. This was seconded and carried in the affirmative.

Those nominated did this.

The nominations were then voted on and all were declared carried in the affirmative by the moderator.

Paper ballots were cast with the following result: Mr. Joseph James 23, Mrs. Elsie Cross 26, Mrs. Pauline Record 48, Mrs. Clara Wellington 56. There were 153 votes cast. 77 votes were necessary for choice. As none of the candidates had a majority a second balloting took place. 155 votes were cast. 78 necessary for choice. Mr. Joseph James had 8. Mrs. Elsie Cross had 16. Mrs. Pauline Record had 52. Mrs. Clara Wellington had 79. Mrs. Clara Wellington was declared elected as a member of the School Board for three years.

Oath of office was given by Imogene Chickering.

Mrs. Wellington thanked the people and asked for support for the School Board.

Mrs. Agnes Chickering requested that it go on record that the town thank Mrs. Pauline Record for her hard work and sincere endeavors in her years as member of the school board.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mrs. Hubner, duly supported and carried, that the clerk cast one ballot for Evelyn Winn to serve as Treasurer, the clerk cast one ballot and the moderator declared Evelyn Winn elected as Treasurer. She was sworn in by Imogene Chickering.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Mrs. Agnes Chickering made the motion to pass over this article. Seconded and carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

This article was passed over on motion of Mrs. Anna Hubner, seconded and carried.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in the warrant.

Mrs. Agnes Chickering made the motion that the Town Auditors serve as school auditors. Seconded and carried in the affirmative.

There was a discussion concerning the Building Committee. Paul Welcome made a motion that the Building Committee be given a vote of confidence. Seconded and carried in the affirmative.

There was more discussion concerning the proposed school and the Building Committee.

Mrs. Margaret Nurse made a motion that the Building Committee be the same for another year. Seconded. As the vote was protested a written ballot was taken. Yes for the same committee. No for a different committee. Result was 80 Yes, 54 No. The moderator declared the vote favorable for the same committee to serve for another year.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

I. C. Bradley Jr. made the following motion: That the school district raise and appropriate \$38,537.00 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said

appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusively of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

Motion seconded and carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. To see whether the district will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for the transportation of elementary school pupils living one mile or more from school.

A motion to pass over this article was made by Paul Welcome, supported and carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for a drilled well on the sit of the proposed new school.

Paul Penning moved that we pass article as read. Seconded. Carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. To see what sum of money, not in excess of 5% of the assessed valuation of the district, the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of acquiring a site for and constructing and equipping a new central grade school building, said building to include six classrooms and an assembly room and other facilities for a modern school, and for this purpose to authorize the school board to issue and sell notes or bonds in the name of and on the credit of the district, under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, as amended, and of chapter 55 of the 1949 session laws of New Hampshire; and to see if the district will vote to delegate to the school board authority to fix the time and place of payment of the principal and interest of said notes and bonds, and interest thereon, and the principal amount of each note or bond, and to sell the notes or bonds, and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable.

George Joslin moved to lay article 11 on the table until Monday, May 15th. Seconded and carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000) to be placed in the custody of The Trustees of Trust Funds of the school district along with other funds already appropriated and reserved for a new central school in accordance with the statutes pertaining thereto.

On motion of Mrs. Grace M. Welcome and supported this article was passed over.

Article 13. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to deposit the 1949-50 balance of the Mulligan Fund and the 1950-51 receipts of the Mulligan Fund in the custody of the trustees of trust funds of the School District, along with other funds reserved for a new central school, in accordance with the statutes pertaining thereto.

Paul Welcome made a motion that this article be accepted as read. Seconded and carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

Paul Welcome made a motion that the Building Committee look into the water and well situation on Mr. Dutton's land. Seconded and carried in the affirmative.

George Joslin made motion to recess this meeting until May 15th. Seconded and carried in the affirmative.

Kenneth Wiggin moved that: The School District of Chesterfield raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed 5% of the assessed valuation of the district for the purpose of constructing and equipping a central grade school building, said building to include six classrooms, an activities room and other facilities for a modern school, and for this purpose to authorize the school board to issue and sell notes or bonds in the name of and on the credit of the district, under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, as amended, and of chapter 55 of the 1949 session laws of New Hampshire and to see if the district will vote to delegate the School Board authority to fix the time and place of payment of principal and interest of said notes and bonds, the interest thereon, and the principal amount of each note or bond, and to sell the notes or bonds, and to take such action with respect thereto as may be necessary and advisable. Seconded by Paul Penning.

Kenneth Wiggin moved that we vote on the article and that the ballot box be opened. Seconded by Mrs. Marjorie Norse. Motion voted on and declared carried in the affirmative by the Moderator.

Mrs. Grace M. Welcome read the report of the building Committee. She introduced the following people: Mr. Charles Bowlby, Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Irving W. Hersey, Architect, Mr. Paul Farnum, Chief, Division of Administrative Services in the State Department of Education, Concord, Mr. R. E. O'Bryan, contractor and low bidder last August.

Mrs. Welcome made the motion that these men be permitted to speak to the School District Meeting as requested. Motion seconded and carried in the affirmative.

Before any ballots had been cast Walter Post moved that Article 11 be amended to read "\$77,000" instead of "5% of the assessed valuation of the district." Walter Deselle seconded the motion. It was voted on and declared carried in the affirmative by the Moderator.

This made the motion under Article 11 as amended: That the School District of Chesterfield raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$77,000.00 for the purpose of constructing and equipping a central grade school building, said building to include six classrooms, an activities room and other facilities for a modern school, and for this purpose to authorize the school board to issue and sell notes or bonds in the name of and on the credit of the district, under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, as amended, and of chapter 55 of the 1949 session laws of New Hampshire and to see if the district will vote to delegate the School Board authority to fix the time and place of payment of principal and interest of said notes and bonds, the interest thereon, and the principal amount of each note or bond, and to sell the notes or bonds, and to take such action with respect thereto as may be necessary and advisable.

Voting by printed paper ballot then took place.

Ronald Guyette made motion to close ballot box. Seconded and carried in affirmative.

Ballot box closed and votes counted. Number of ballots cast 314. 2/3 vote necessary 210.
