# **TOWN WARRANT**

State of New Hampshire

Carroll ss.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, County of Carroll, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kennett High School Auditorium at Conway, New Hampshire, March 10, 1959, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

Section a. Town officers' salaries

- b. Town officers' expenses
- c. Election and registration expenses
- d. Municipal Court expenses
- e. Expenses of town hall and other town buildings
- f. Police department
- g. Fire department
- h. Insurance
- i. Civil Defense
- j. Town office expense
- k. Health department including hospitals
- l. Vital statistics
- m. Town dump
- n. Town maintenance of highway, summer and winter
- o. Town Road Aid (TRA)
- p. Libraries
- q. Town poor
- r. Old age assistance
- s. Memorial Day
- t. Soldiers' aid
- u. Parks and playgrounds

- v. Damages and legal expense, including land damage
- w. F.I.C.A. (Social Security) town's share
- x. Interest on temporary loans and bonds
- y. Class IV Urban (to apply against principal of bond issue)
- z. Payment on bond issue
- a-1. Perambulation of town lines
- b-1. Blister Rust and care of trees
- c-1. County tax
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory blanks mailed to all taxpayers on the property warrant records in preference to having the Selectmen distribute the blank inventories at the time they take their inventory of Head and Poll taxes, the same to continue in effect until rescinded at some future town meeting.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the town such sums of money as may be needed. Such sums not to exceed the combined School, Town and County tax budget, in anticipation of taxes raised for Town, County and School purposes.
- Article 5. To see if the town of Conway will vote to have Pine Street Extension rebuilt to accommodate two-lane traffic with suitable provision being made for shoulders and a sidewalk, and that the sum of \$2,613.00 be raised and appropriated for the construction of said highway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Irving G. Kuntz and others. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums:
  - \$1,500.00 for the purpose of Artist Falls Bridge reconstruction;
  - \$1,000.00 for the purpose of Pequaket Bridge repairs; \$1,000.00 for the purpose of Washington Street drain-
  - \$4,500.00 for the purpose of road construction on Grand View Avenue;
  - \$ 500.00 for the purpose of surveying town streets.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the White Mountain Region Association for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter and advertising and otherwise publicizing the advantages of the Town in co-operation with the other forty-five towns in the Region. No recommendation by Budget Committee.
  - Article 8. To see if the town will vote to accept a parcel of land

for park use, said parcel being located and described as follows: A triangular lot in the Louise Wagg Potter Development in Conway Village, bounded on the North for 178.5 feet by Muster Road, on the South for 159.5 feet by Hillside Avenue and on the West for 79.6 feet by lot No. 32 in said development.

- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for the purpose of tarring River Street. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mrs. Priscilla A. Cravedi and others. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for additional police protection by the employment of a third police officer. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles V. Sturdivant and others. No recommendation by Budget Committee.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the general expenses of the information booth located in North Conway Village, and the sum of \$500.00 for the general expenses of the information booth located in Conway Village, and to pay said sums respectively over to the North Conway Chamber of Commerce and the Conway Chamber of Commerce to be expended for said general expenses of each such booth respectively. Agreeable to a petition signed by Marjorie M. Breon and others. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the installation of a fire alarm system for the use of the Redstone Fire Department, Redstone, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lionel Martin and others. Not recommended by Budget Committee.
- Article 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate toward the support of the Eastern Slope Region, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert E. Duncan and others. No recommendation by Budget Committee.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to accept the following street as a town road: Beginning at a stone post on Colbath Street, same being the Southeast corner of land of George Yeaton, thence along south line of said Yeaton to its junction with land of Theodore Hackett, thence in a southerly direction along the line of Theodore Hackett and Elsie Burgess, thence in an easterly direction along the line of land of Elsie Burgess and the north line of Wilfred C. and Mildred P. Tibbetts to land of Elsie Burgess, thence on the same course over land of said Elsie Burgess to Colbath Street, thence along the westerly side of Colbath Street in a northerly direction to point of beginning. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maurice B. Kimball and others.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to reappropriate the \$1,800.00 appropriated in Article 12 of the 1958 Town Warrant to be

used for a permanent War Memorial. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,750.00 for the purpose of placing the names of all veterans upon the above-mentioned War Memorial. No recommendation by Budget Committee.

Article 17. To see what action the town will take on the following: Do you favor the continuation of the town manager plan as now in force in this town? Agreeable to a petition signed by Glenn H. Hale and others.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the town, an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P.L. 560, 83rd Cogress), and do whatever else may be required for an advance in the amount of \$21,000.00 to be made by the United States to the Town of Conway, to aid in defraying the cost of preliminary report and plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Conway and, further, to see if the town will make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of preparation of the report and plans.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for a Federal loan, interest free, from the Housing and Home Finance Agency, under the provisions of Public Law 560, 83rd Congress; further to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Federal Government to obtain said loan, the proceeds of which shall be expended by the Selectmen for an engineering study, plans, specifications and cost estimates of the sewage disposal requirements in Conway; said loan to be repaid only if and when construction of such sewage disposal project is undertaken by said town.

Article 20. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Conway:

Another year has passed. It is time again to report to you the progress and accomplishments at the library.

Figures are not particularly interesting. They do, however, serve to librarians as an evaluation of their work. You will notice that 520 books were added to the stacks this year. These include some replacements, some reference as well as current books of fiction and non-fiction, both adult and juvenile. Going back to 1954, we find only 260 books added

The record of services shows total loan of books, periodicals and pictures 16,996. The same earlier year, 1954, shows a loan of 13,431, making an increase of 3,565. In other words, the more is available for loan, the more will be borrowed.

Looking at the reference figures, we find in 1958 help has been given with 429 questions. The 1954 figures show 220. These reference questions are not simple questions, but rather questions that have required directions to the right source of information to the answer. This increase is due in great part to the methods of study now used — research by the individual.

Several attractive displays have been made at the library as well as outside. An entertainment provided by the Eleta Kindergarten and stories on film were shown by Miss Margery Stroud from the New Hampshire State Library. Throughout the winter months, a World Politics group has met in the Curio Room. Good discussions have been enjoyed and new friendships made. It is wished that more small groups would avail themselves of this room.

Gifts of books and periodicals, both memorial and otherwise, have been received. For these, the librarians and trustees are grateful.

## **Report of Conway Police Department**

#### **REPORT OF CHIEF — 1958**

Another busy year has been completed by this department. I make this report on a three-year basis.

#### Safety Program

During this past year, the Motor Vehicle Department presented the schools with a program of safety.

#### Probation — Children

This past year, we have had several cases involving juveniles. Most of these complaints have been handled through our own set-up. The records are not public property, nor do they become a record to be used for any purpose, except to relieve the Police Department of unnecessary complaints regarding the young boys and girls in this area. The persons involved will sign the true name of the offense for which they are being questioned about. This is a matter not of record against any person, but a means by which the Officers and the individual may work out problems for the advantage of the entire community.

During 1958, ten boys have been handled this way. They have to appear before me with their parents and are then told what they must do. For example, be allowed out only one night a week, go nowhere without their parents' permission, go to church on Sunday, report to someone once a week. The restrictions are not the same for everyone, because of the nature of the complaint and the boy himself. So far during the year, two boys have been placed in the Industrial School at Manchester. There are several whom we still watch over. It has been a pleasure to work with these young people and to be able to help them.

### Correspondence

This has increased over last year in many ways, and as in the past, I have tried to help anyone who sends for anything through the mail.

#### **House Guests**

During 1958, 52 persons were given a night's lodging at the Police Station. We have provided for those who asked for assistance, a number of breakfasts which amounted to \$8.00. In 1956, 70 were here and in 1957, 65.

### Warnings

It is still the policy of this department to issue a warning whenever possible. We are ever mindful that many people are in our villages for a first time. We try to help them so they will want to return. We do the same for the local people.

During the year, 15 persons were given medical attention as a result of these accidents Only four of these had to remain in the hospital for a day or more. One dog was killed by a car, and a horse.

This department is very grateful to Dan Noel for his work during this past year. His pictures have been very helpful in presenting cases to the Court and to the insurance companies on many of the accidents investigated by us.

#### Conclusion

The year 1958 has been a very busy one for me. The work has increased a great deal over the last three years. There being only two year-round officers and so much is being expected of us; for instance, the school district demanded an officer to be on duty in Conway when the high school and elementary schools close for the day. It is rather hard to have a man work for an hour or so, then go off duty for a short time and then return at 6 o'clock to work his night hitch. I mentioned in last year's report it will be necessary for another full-time officer. I am convinced we need one now. We try to cover as much of the town as a whole as we can. It costs money to run a car; yes, we are furnished with some gasoline, but we have to stand the cost of tires, repairs, insurance, etc. We are expected to be available every time the telephone rings.

During the year, we have had a lot of complaints where someone has broken windows, stolen gas, broken in here and there. All these things require a lot of time investigating. Sometimes it will take several days to clear up a certain complaint. I cannot personally be doing this kind of work and be on the street handling traffic. I get a call for an accident in some part of town, not knowing how long I will have to work on it; if there is personal injury, it involves many times an ambulance or a doctor and trips to the hospital. The records have to be made in every detail. We are constantly receiving requests from insurance companies for copies of accidents that we have covered. I can truthfully say sometimes it is so busy, that I do not have time to do office work that is so necessary.

We have been working lately, one man on duty during the day and one at night. It means we have to travel from village to village. The night man covers most of the town at least once during his course of duty. I find that I have had to work both days and nights, and am working 60 to 80 hours a week. Real often I have been asked, "Do you

ever go to bed and sleep?"

Our town is continuing to grow and the flow of traffic is heavier than ever. We have no traffic lights anywhere in our town at any of the busy intersections to help and must be handled by hand. I feel that something should be done about this situation as soon as possible, looking toward the future. Certainly, if traffic can flow through our town freely, people will want to stop and shop, also more will plan to stay awhile.

In recommending a third officer, I would like to suggest that serious consideration be given to installing parking meters and the revenue go to pay the salary of that man. There are a number of things we ought to have to work with, but we try our best to do a good job just the same. We try to be courteous and helpful to everyone and real firm when the occasion arises.

I feel that the town should own its own police car. I have two radios and other equipment of over \$1,000 in value. If I should be out of town on my own, this equipment is of no value to the department until I return. I also suggest that anyone who would like to know more about this department, drop in anytime at the office.

We receive a lot of out-of-town calls asking us for all kinds of information. We are planning to install an answering device in the of-

fice of the police station.

Your police department is a very important part of the town, and with the proper amount of personnel and equipment, a much better

job can be done and more service rendered to everyone.

During the year I have had the full support of the State Police, Motor vehicle Department, and the Fire Departments. I wish to express my personal appreciation to Trooper Gary Waterhouse; we have worked together on many cases and have gone into Court together and received convictions. I have also had the co-operation of Deputy Sheriffs Bryant and Davidson.

I have had a pleasant year working under Acting Town Manager George Densmore and Town Manager Roy Kane, who came to us during the year. He has been very helpful to me and I know we will share the same co-operation for the coming year of 1959. To Carroll Hill and Thaddeus Thorne, thanks for your support and understanding during the year. It has also been a pleasure to work with President Earle Dwelly of the North Conway Chamber of Commerce and Mrs. Katharine Randall, Secretary, also the Chamber of Commerce of Conway.

#### REPORT OF OFFICE OF CIVILIAN DEFENSE

Selectmen of Town of Conway Center Conway, N. H. Dear Selectmen:

This is my second full year as your Director of Civil Defense. I started in 1958 with \$2,939.50 in the bank. Of this amount, \$2,644.23 was earmarked for radio equipment that was ordered in 1957. During this summer we received the radios. Instead of paying to have the radios installed, Erwyne Seabury, Chick Whitcomb and myself did most of the work. We instructed some of the men in the Fire Departments on installation of the radios and then checked them. That way, we saved ourselves a considerable amount of money. The radios are a great step forward in communications for the town. Tests partially completed show reception far exceeding our expectations. More tests are to be made to determine any dead spots in the area covered by the radios. The Police Department is using the radios constantly, thereby saving plenty of time in making contact with each other.

I am very sorry to announce that the Ground Observer Corps, with posts in Conway and North Conway, is being disbanded as of January 31, 1959. In my report last year, I stated that they were to be on a stand-by basis due to radar improvements in our defenses. The disbandment on January 31 is due to the same reasons. Of course, the G. O. C. will be reactivated in the case of an emergency and the De-

partment of Defense deems it necessary.

Besides the radiological group that we trained, we are having an auxiliary police course at Kennett High School in progress. There are 25 men taking the course under the direction of Corporal Smith of the State Police. The men will receive certificates on completion of the course. I have hopes of having uniforms and equipment in the near future. Auxiliary Police can be used in any emergency by the Chief of Police. These men will be used to protect persons and property in the event of a national emergency.

The Survival Project in respect to Conway will be completed during the first part of 1959. This is quite a comprehensive plan for Conway, showing the duties of approximately 22 different services in the Civil Defense setup for the town. Conway's Survival Plan and Manning Table was worked by the State Survival Group in Concord. We expect to have the heads of the services in the plan meet with the

State Survival Project Officials in the near future at Conway.

In 1958, I gave some talks on Civil Defense, its aims and purposes. Any group or organization that wishes to have me talk before them can contact me at HIckory 7-5054 and I will be more than glad to oblige.

In my report of expenses for 1958, I reported an expense of \$184.-12 for equipment. Of this amount, \$116.12 is for helmets and C.D. car plates. The balance of \$68 is for equipment that I have been able to pick up as surplus to be used in emergencies. This consists of two

field ranges (new) complete with utensils, a value of \$402 for \$40, plus express charges of \$13. These ranges will feed approximately 100-150 each. I also got an under water cutting torch valued at \$75.50 for \$2.50; two sets of safety harnesses, value \$45.40 for \$1.50; 10 magnetic compasses valued at \$37.20 for \$2.50; three emergency tool kits valued at \$13.50 for \$1.50 and 10 gas masks valued at \$200 for \$20. All of this equipment, with the exception of the field ranges, is to be used to equip an emergency first aid and rescue truck that I am in hopes to be able to get. In the year to come, I hope to be able to pick up more equipment from the surplus agency in Concord. The total value of this equipment is \$773.60 for an outlay of \$68.

As of this writing, I have not as yet received two portable generators of 2500 volt capacity. I expect them momentarily. I am seeking a five K VA generator that can be used in case a section of the town is out of lights, when it is available in surplus.

I have several projects to work on for 1959 and also hope to have several training courses during the year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have helped in my efforts to form a good Civil Defense organization for the Town of Conway.

## FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Dear Mr. and Mrs. and Family:

Once again our region is covered with snow and the forest fire hazard has disappeared, but to your local forest fire warden it is just a time to check over his equipment and check the causes of the fires he has had. We know that our biggest cause of forest fires are careless people burning rubbish, brush or debris without a permit or in an unsafe place. When this fire gets away from them and help is needed to put it out, they then plead that they did not know a permit was required for the incinerator or this type burning. Well, the old saying, "ignorance of the law is no excuse" fits in here very well. The forest fire laws have been in the newspapers, on the radio, on television and are on some posters, and there should be no excuse for not knowing a permit is required for all outdoor burning. In this year's report, we are going to quote the law of the State of New Hampshire in regard to permits. This is found in Chapter 233 — Section 35 revised laws, State of New Hampshire.

Permits - 35b

No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or shall burn or cause to be burned any material, and no city or town shall kindle or maintain a fire or a public dump in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste, or cutover land or where fire may be communicated to such lands, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written permit from the forest fire warden of the town where the burning is to be done, unless the same is in the presence of the warden or his agent.

Liability for fires without permit - 36

Any person causing or kindling a fire without permit of the forest fire warden when such permit is required and any person by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, shall be liable in a civil action for the payment to the town or the state or both, of the expenses incurred by the forest fire warden or his deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.

Penalties - 38

Any person violating any provisions of section 35 shall be fined not more than two hundred dollars or imprisoned not more than sixty days.

## WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST CONTROL

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Forestry and Recreation Commission

Concord

October 29, 1958

Board of Selectmen Conway, N. H.

#### Gentlemen:

Last March, at its annual meeting, your town appropriated funds for continuing control of the White Pine Blister Rust in co-operation with the Forestry and Recreation Commission. Final returns to the Forestry Division indicated that 86 towns and cities did likewise.

Conforming to our yearly custom there has been prepared, and is attached herewith, a statement briefly summarizing expenditures of town, state and federal funds. The town contribution is used to employ labor, whose duties are the destruction of wild Ribes (Currant and gooseberry bushes), whether by hand-pulling or with the aid of chemicals. State and federal monies are spent in mapping pine areas prior to control measures; in scouting to determine the location of Ribes; purchase of chemicals and spraying equipment and transportation. These expenditures appear under the heading of "Co-operative Aid." In view of the fact that details of control work vary from town to town, it is not possible to report all in a brief statement. However, the District Leader in charge of the project in your town will be pleased to supply these details upon request, as well as to submit a map indicating those sections where this work was performed. His name and address appear below.

Success in state-wide control of the rust is evident today. Travel along highways or through woodlands do not disclose the large and frequent areas of infected pines as was the situation in the early days of this project. The destruction of millions of wild ribes is definitely reducing, very materially, the spread of this disease.

Since soil disturbances brought about by logging, fire or blowdowns may result in a regrowth of ribes within or adjacent to the younger stands of pine, periodic examinations of these disturbed areas is necessary to maintain the control already established. The fact that in such inspections, over large acreages, but few ribes are found, is a most encouraging condition from two angles. First, that protection to growing crops of white pine is assured, and secondly, that the cost of control is becoming less to towns as well as other co-operating agencies.

' Our goal, toward which we are working, is that time when the entire state control area will be on a maintenance basis requiring only minimum funds to sustain this condition.

# PROCEEDINGS IN ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING APRIL 5. 1958

Agreeably to the foregoing Warrant, the meeting of the School District of Conway was called to order by Burnham B. Davis, Moderator, at 2:30 o'clock p.m. on Saturday, April 5, 1958, who read the Warrant Certificate and oath of posting and certificate of authenticity of the check list and oath of same.

On motion of Frank Kennett, Jr., duly seconded, it was voted to take up Articles 1-5 simultaneously and proceed to elect by ballot the necessary officers and that the polls remain open for seven hours from this time.

#### Under Article 6Z

Moved by Ralph Grindle, duly seconded, that the sum of \$446,-

300.86 be appropriated.

Moved by Chester B. Lucy, duly seconded, that this motion of Mr. Grindle be amended by substituting the amount of \$405,728.05 and that the meeting proceed to consider the budget item by item. The procedural motion was carried and proceeded to take up the item of salaries of district officers, and on motion of Arthur H. Furber, duly seconded, it was voted that the sum of \$1,140.00 be appropriated.

On motion of Arthur H. Furber, duly seconded, it was voted that the sum of \$3,839.85 be appropriated for Superintendent's salary

(local share).

On motion of Arthur H. Furber, duly seconded, it was voted that the sum of \$1,894.00 be appropriated for tax for state-wide supervision.

On motion of Mr. Nichols, duly seconded, it was voted that the sum of \$3,655.14 be appropriated for salaries of other administrative personnel.

On motion of Mr. Carroll Hill, duly seconded, it was voted that

the sum of \$2,939.74 be appropriated for supplies.

Under the item of High School teachers' salaries, it was moved by Mr. Chester Lucy, duly seconded, that the sum of \$94,975.00 be appropriated. Mr. Robert Morrell moved to amend this motion by substituting the sum of \$106,975, duly seconded. On a standing vote, the count was Yes, 116, No, 231, and Mr. Morrell's motion was lost.

On motion of Mr. Wiggin, it was voted to amend the motion of

Mr. Lucy by substituting the sum of \$94,975.00.

It was then moved by Mr. Merrill that the vote to take up the budget item by item be reconsidered and the motion was carried and it was voted that under Article 6, the sum of \$405,728.06 be raised and appropriated for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District Officials and Agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Equalization Fund together with other income, the School Board to

certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue

and the appropriation.

Voted, on motion of Mr. Morrell, duly seconded, that the sum of \$2,900.00 be raised and appropriated to finish grading and seeding at the new elementary schools and for the construction of a sidewalk at the Conway Elementary School.

#### **Under Article 8**

On motion of Mr. Frank Kennett, duly seconded, it was voted by standing vote, Yes, 96, No, 49, to authorize the School Board to sell by sealed bids, or auction, the so-called Little Building located on the campus of the old Conway Elementary School and such obsolete equipment contained therein as cannot be used.

#### **Under Article 9**

On motion by Mr. Chester Lucy, it was voted that the sum of \$2,500.00 be raised, alleviate the situation of the transportation of pupils from the West Side and East Conway as decided by the School Board.

#### **Under Article 10**

Moved by Mr. Grindle to adopt the provisions of the article. The motion was lost.

#### **Under Article 11**

On motion of Frank Kennett, Jr., duly seconded, it was voted that the sum of \$1,700.00 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of two incinerators for the new elementary schools.

#### Under Article 12

Voted that the District thank the Budget Committee for their individual work on the committee.

Voted that the School Board be thanked by the District.

Voted that the business meeting under Articles 6 to 12 inclusive be concluded.

At 9:30 p.m., the polls were declared closed and the following officers were declared elected: A total of 731 ballots were cast.

## Report of Superintendent

To the Conway School Board:

We started the school year without a full complement of teachers at Kennett High School. It was not possible to secure the services of a home economics teacher, despite the fact that sixteen candidates were interviewed for this position. This was a most serious setback for sixty-five students whose major program was thereby curtailed.

Every effort will be made to regain this important program. But first consideration should be given to offering a balanced program of education for all youth and second, doing this within a defined salary schedule policy.

All other positions were filled with qualified personnel with the

exception of the Driver Education course, which could not be offered because of the lack of an instructor.

Program adjustments were made and the quality of education at Kennett High School continues on a high plane, due in large measure to the outstanding core of experienced and competent teachers.

Elsewhere in this report will be found a copy of "A Report On Visit to Kennett High School" made by some members from New Hampshire State Department of Education. In many respects, this report parallels very closely the recommendations made by Dr. James B. Conant in his report on "The American High School Today." Dr. Conant, scientist-statesman-educator, took two years to make this important study. He visited fifty-five of the most outstanding high schools in the country. He talked with two thousand teachers and several hundred high school students.

Some of Dr. Conant's recommendations that affect Kennett High School are as follows:

Guidance Counselor

One full-time counselor for every 250-300 students.

Ability Grouping

Place all students in their required courses in class sections according to their ability, subject by subject.

Divloma

No more attendance certificates. Diploma will mean completion of the required program.

Diversified Program

Enable all students not going to college to elect vocational courses

— Business Education, Home Economics, Agriculture, Industrial Arts,
etc.

Special Teachers for Slow Readers Program for Academically Talented

Would include four years of English, four years of Mathematics, four years of one foreign language, three years of science and three years of social studies, one of which shall be in American Government — a total of 18 courses requiring at last 15 hours of homework a week.

Highly Gifted Students

These students should be identified early. Guidance counselor to work with them closely. Special classes.

Summer School

Should be a tuition-free summer school for pupils to make up work and allow bright students to enrich and broaden their programs.

Foreign Language

Four years of one foreign language no matter how few students enroll. Speaking about the criticism leveled at high schools, some is based on fact and is constructive. Much is "irrelevant" and dangerously misleading because the "critics start with oversimplified assumptions." "All schools can be made as satisfactory as the best I have seen if citizens are prepared to support the required changes."

The National Defense Education Act of 1958 will make it pos-

sible for our schools to receive federal funds for the purchase of science equipment and audio-visual equipment for science, mathematics and foreign languages. The federal funds must be matched by local school districts on a fifty-fifty basis.

Title V, Part A, makes funds available for the establishment, maintenance and improvement of programs in testing, counseling and

guidance in secondary schools.

This Act will strengthen, improve and expand education in our community. It is possible to receive from Federal funds approximately

\$2,000 toward the salary of a guidance counselor.

Our elementary schools are providing a balanced educational program planned for all learners, recognizing that children learn at varying rates, in different ways, and reach different levels of achievement. We are attempting to develop in every child a respect for work and excellence in performance, an appreciation of learning and the ability to carry a task through to completion.

Our elementary school environment is favorable for teaching and learning. The classrooms in the new schools are spacious, well lighted, colorful, comfortable and safe in every respect. To insure maximum opportunities for learning, it is desirable to have classes of not more

than twenty-five in number.

Our elementary schools have a well organized testing program for testing reading, intelligence, achievement, aptitudes and interest of pupils. These test results are available to parents and children and are used in planning each pupil's program.

Currently all seventh and eighth grades, except the seventh grade from the John H. Fuller School, are housed in what we now call the Conway Junior High School building. It was developed to meet the distinctive needs of the early adolescent, to bridge the gap between high school and elementary school, improve the disciplinary situation and socialization opportunities, provide the conditions for better teaching and thus secure better education.

The students in the junior high school have several teachers instead of one. Each teacher teaching only her major field of interests. The pupils learn to work in a schedule that resembles the high school schedule and they must assume more responsibility in homework preparation. The students have been grouped according to ability as a means of individualizing instruction.

Conversational French is being offered to eighth grade pupils who probably will continue with the study of French in high school.

Educational television for New Hampshire is now a reality. Channel 11, with operating facilities at the University of New Hampshire, will begin broadcasting in April of this year. This project cost well over a half million dollars, but through some outstanding work by educational leaders at New Hampshire University, and through the generosity of hundreds of people in our state, Station WENH will bring television to the North Country through Channel 8. WENH will operate five hours a day, five days a week. Two morning hours will

be used for in-school features while the remaining three hours will be devoted to cultural and educational programs in the evening.

Television is a powerful means of communication. It has become an intimate part of most homes and has affected our whole way of living

It is estimated that some children spend as much time seeing and

hearing television as going to school.

There are, at present, several experimental educational television programs. There are also many studies under way to determine the best means of utilizing television as an integral part of the school system. Judging from what has already been done in the past decade, it is quite certain that television will broaden and brighten our educational horizons and will add startling new dimensions to our teaching and learning processes. Just how television can help reduce the teacher shortage is still a matter that needs further and continued study.

Some grading has already been completed at the John H. Fuller School. It is planned to continue with the grading at the Conway Elementary School in the spring. When money is available, the driveways and walks will be surfaced with asphalt. (An amount of \$8,100 has been included in next year's budget — \$2,500 for grading and \$5,600 for surfacing driveways at the new elementary schools.)

A great deal of credit should go to the North Conway PTA for their enthusiastic support of the John H. Fuller Library. This was their major fund-raising project and approximately \$400 worth of books will have been added to the library.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

### 1957-1958

The annual health services offered the children of the Conway schools consists of vision testing, hearing testing, physical inspections, and hair and skin inspections. Weekly visits were made to the schools and at this time, the teachers were given an opportunity to talk with me concerning the health of their pupils.

Communicable disease control is exercised, as far as possible, by the exclusion of children showing signs of illness. The teachers are on the alert at all times to note any deviations from the normal condition of the pupil. In the following paragraphs, I will summarize some of the important activities of the School Health Services.

The physical examination program is carried out under a plan recommended by the leading authorities on school health. Health education authorities agree that an examination every four years is adequate. Grades one, four, seven and ten are examined each fall at the Memorial Hospital. The examination includes urine and blood tests—the teeth are checked by a dentist. The pupils out for sports are examined at Kennett High School.

The bi-annual orthopedic clinic is held at the Memorial Hospital each spring and fall. The children of Conway and the surrounding communities are privileged to have the services of Dr. Halfman of Laconia, a specialist in Orthopedics. The physical examinations are done by Dr. Ursula Saunders, Director of Crippled Children's Services of the State Board of Health.

The Orthopedic Physiotherapy Clinic is held three times a year as a follow-up to the Diagnostic Clinic.

In May, 1958, 375 pupils had the patch test for tuberculosis. Twenty-one of these were followed up with a chest X-ray.

Three pre-school conferences were held in May and June. Sixtyeight children were inspected and given vision tests. At this time, parents had the opportunity to talk with me about any problem they wished to discuss. The State Dental Hygienist examined the children's teeth and talked with each parent about dental hygiene.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to everyone who has helped to make this program possible.

## REPORT ON VISIT TO KENNETT HIGH SCHOOL

## CONWAY, N. H.

### MAY 1, 1958

On May 1, 1958, the following members of the State Department of Education visited Kennett High School: Messrs. Paul Quimby, Roland Kimball, Howard Swain, and Dr. Alice Baumgarner.

The purpose of the visit was twofold: first, to clarify what action, if any, is necessary in order to qualify Kennett High School as an Approved High School under the Minimum Standards for New Hampshire Secondary Schools, which will go into effect September, 1958; second, to identify aspects of the school plant and program which are in need of attention if Conway is to offer an effective high school program.

It should be kept in mind that the Visiting Committee did not have as one of its objectives an analysis of all signs of effective instruction and administration for which Kennett High School should be commended. Such an objective would require a much more thorough evaluation and a much longer visit than the Department can provide at this time.

Other recommendations and suggestions were presented verbally to Superintendent David Appleton, and Principal William Robbins. Although they are not detailed here in this report, it is hoped that each will be given reasonable consideration.

The staff of our department is available to assist in any appropriate manner as the school takes steps to implement suggestions as preented in this report.

## Action Necessary Under Minimum Standards

1. Although the school is becoming overcrowded, the administration is reminded that it would not be acceptable to discontinue the present library and to use the space for a classroom. (Note regulation cited on page 13 of the Minimum Standards bulletin.)

## **Action strongly Recommended**

- 1. The Program of Studies should be reviewed to determine whether it is meeting the needs of the students as effectively as possible. The following areas should be given particular attention:
  - a. The business program should be reviewed as follows:
- 1. Bookkeeping is now offered to grade 10. A more appropriate grade level would be grade 12 where the study is closer to the time of actual use by the student.
- 2. The Program of Studies for 1957-1958 states that two years of Shorthand are offered in grade 10 and 11. A more appropriate

grade level would be to offer the first year of Shorthand to grade 11. A second year of Shorthand ordinarily is considered necessary only if the sufficient time is not allotted to Secretarial Office Practice class to provide for continued development of transcription skills.

3. A course in Personal Typing should be set up distinct and separate from the regular business typing course. Such a course should

be a semester or less in length and for partial credit.

b. The foreign language program should be reviewed as follows:

1. A school of this size should be offering a full program in a modern foreign language as well as a classical language. There appears to be both a teacher and student interest for a third year of Latin; many schools have found that a third and fourth year of Latin can be offered in alternate years.

2. Every encouragement should be given students to elect at least three years of French if they take the course at all. Unless a fourth year of French is added to the program, or language study is offered in elementary grades, students should begin their study of French in grade 10. Currently some students are completing their study before grade 12 and there is an undesirable lapse of time before the language is used for college entrance or college placement.

c. The two-track sequence in Mathematics for both college preparatory and general students is an excellent program. A similar program should be considered for Science so that non-college sections

would be available for Biology, Chemistry, and Physics.

d. The English language arts program would be strengthened if local courses of study or written curriculum guides were developed

by the Department of English for grades 7 through 12.

e. Fine Arts education is centered entirely in music activities at present. The intent of the Minimum Standards regulations is to encourage schools to provide for Vocal, Instrumental, and Visual Arts. Thus, student interest already apparent at Kennett High School in Visual Art indicates a need for one or more courses in art. A full-time art teacher is indicated for the Conway School District.

f. Physical Education is being offered only to girls this year. The lack of any organized instruction in health and physical education for boys is a serious weakness of the program for a modern secondary

school.

g. The social studies program would be strengthened by the addition of a history course for grade 10 students; a course in European History would be a desirable addition.

2. Attention should be given to instructional equipment and fa-

cilities. The following points were noted:

a. A clear need exists for developing an additional, multi-purpose science room for use by General Science and Biology classes. At present, there is definite overcrowding in some biology divisions and a standard classroom is used for overflow in other classes; this means that the science facility is inadequate at present and will present even more of a critical problem as enrollments of the school increase.

b. An immediate inventory should be made of all biology and

physics equipment and a long-range plan of procuring adequate instructional equipment should be set up. Both of these areas are currently deficient.

c. If a truly comprehensive homemaking program is to be developed, the facility should be completely reorganized and there should

be an addition of appropriate equipment.

d. The classroom and shop space are inadequate for the Vocational Agriculture program. A complete inventory of equipment should be made and a long-range purchase program developed to bring the facility up to standard.

e. Auto mechanics is limited by space.

- f. Instruction in foreign languages would be more effective if a tape recorder were obtained for that department. In addition, the present tape recorder, which is currently inoperative, should be fixed or traded for a new one.
- g. Several classrooms that now exist are unsatisfactory. There is a lack of bulletin board space, lack of blackboards, lack of storage space, lack of sound proofing, etc. Some improvements could be effected under existing conditions, but it is urged that no further partitioning of rooms be considered.
- 3. Certain administrative arrangements should be re-examined to determine whether a more effective arrangement can be found:

a. Teaching loads appear to be excessive in light of the following

items noted by the Visiting Committee:

1. Many class sections include over 30 students (social studies has sections numbering 40, 35, 39; English 35, 38, 35; physical education 39, 34; mathematics 38; French 32). As a matter of general practice, class enrollments should provide for about 25 in most classes with slightly less in some classes such as foreign languages, shop subject, and other special fields.

2. The total pupils handled by several teachers in a single day is extremely high, several carrying a daily pupil load of over 150. As a matter of general practice, a maximum daily pupil load should be 125 with the number considerably less than this for certain subjects.

3. In addition to the large classes and high pupil loads, most

teachers are carrying a large number of extra-curricular duties.

b. Every opportunity should be explored to schedule music activities during the regular school day. Except for band, all music activities meet after school at present.

c. The homemaking facility is partially used for cafeteria purposes during classes before and after the noon lunch period. This use is not

appropriate and disrupts the class.

d. Although some homogeneous grouping has been done, class sections have been determined largely by curriculum choice rather than by ability grouping. With sufficient administrative help, more effective use of the testing program could use reading and writing achievement as the basis for grouping in such subjects as social studies, English and Science.

4. Several services that are a part of the modern secondary school

are either limited at Kennett High School or missing entirely. Attention should be given to the following points:

a. For a school of this size, at least two full-time guidance counselors are indicated. At present, not one period has been assigned for guidance work, although as a matter of general practice one period per day for every fifty pupils is usually allotted to guidance in most secondary schools.

At present, the principal is expected to administer the entire guidance program, including maintenance of records, testing, cumulative folders, occupational files and counselling. It is inappropriate for a principal of a large school to devote so much time to guidance; it is highly appropriate that more guidance be available for the students of Kennett who come from thirteen different communities and several more elementary schools.

At least one full-time counselor is an immediate need for the school. The district may wish to investigate the state subsidized pilot guidance program.

- b. Administrative services would be more effective with the following action:
- 1. An assistant principal should be appointed to provide necessary administrative assistance, as well as to act as the responsible head of the school during the principal's absence.
- 2. Department heads should be designated for all areas to provide for co-ordination of routine administrative matters (e.g., requisitions, inventories) as well as to assume leadership in developing written curriculum outlines for all subject matter areas.
- c. Considerable progress has been made by teachers and students in developing the library facility. This service should be made much more effective by the appointment of a full-time librarian who would continue the work of sorting, classifying and cataloguing the book collection. An annual appropriation considerably in excess of the recommendation of the American Library Association (\$1.50 per pupil) should be budgeted by the school district until such time as the collection begins to approximate the standards for a secondary school library.
