

TOWN WARRANT**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 for highways and bridges for ensuing year: the sum of \$1,500 for summer and \$2,000 for winter roads

4 To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$400 for interest charges on long and short term notes.

5 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.

6 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

7 To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$500 to cover long term notes, \$250 P. W. A. Bond, \$250 long term note.

8 To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$50 for Old Home Day celebration.

9 To see if the Town will raise for Town Road Aid the sum of \$604.50 to the State's \$2,751.11, or the town to raise for State Aid Construction the sum of \$604.50 to the State's \$1,208. (Only one of these available each year).

10 To see if the Town will raise for electric light lines already constructed the sum of \$700.

11 To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to tar the Gould Hill Road from Archie Cote's to Lillian Porter's, or take any action thereto.

12 To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$300 for Blister Rust Control or take any action thereto.

13 To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$100 for chairs for Town Hall.

14 To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$500 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.

15 To see what action the Town will vote in regard to sheds by Deering Center Church.

16 To see if the Town will vote to take any action in regard to taxing real estate.

17 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,089.90 for overdraft of 1940.

18 To see if the town will raise \$40 for Monadnock Region Association.

19 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

DEERING, N. H., MARCH 12, 1940

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of Deering, N. H., was called to order by the moderator, Ralph H. Whitney, at nine o'clock in the morning. After the warrant was read it was voted to keep the polls open until five o'clock in the afternoon.

Article 1—Votes were cast for all officers on the Australian ballot as follows:

Selectman for 3 years—Arthur O. Ellsworth had 73 votes, Harry G. Parker had 76 votes and took oath of office.

Town Clerk—Wendell D. Putnam had 20 votes, Robert W. Wood had 56 votes, and Marguerite L. Dutton had 68 votes and took oath of office.

Town Treasurer—Wendell D. Putnam had 19 votes, Robert W. Wood had 55 votes, Marguerite L. Dutton had 61 votes and took oath of office.

Highway Agent—Howard E. Whitney had 128 votes and took oath of office.

Overseer of Poor—Chairman of Selectmen had 76 votes.

Tax Collector—Robert M. Card had 43 votes; Chester P. McNally had 95 votes and took oath of office.

Auditors—Ernest Johnson had 49 votes; Louis J. Fisher had 55 votes; Carroll E. Greene had 57 votes and took oath of office; Marjorie A. Holden had 77 votes and took oath of office.

Health Officer—Eugene Chamberlain had 1 vote; Thor Olson had 1 vote; to be appointed by Selectmen had 22 votes.

Constables—Andrew Normandin had 38 votes; Sherrod B. Ashby had 44 votes; Hobart D. Kiblin had 51 votes; Harold S. Titcomb had 56 votes; Harold G. Wells had 71 votes.

Library Trustee—Jessie C. Colburn had 49 votes; Louise L. Locke had 62 votes.

Trustee of Trust Funds—Mabel L. Wood had 91 votes.

Sealer of Weights and Measures—Herbert C. Spiller had 39 votes; Robert W. Wood had 65 votes.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber—Herbert C. Spiller had 30 votes; Ernest Johnson had 38 votes; Harold C. Taylor had 64 votes.

Article 2—No action was taken on this article for the time being.

Article 3—Upon motion made by Albert Brown it was voted to raise \$3,500 for highways and bridges.

Article 4—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise the sum of \$400.

Article 5—Upon motion made by Albert Brown it was voted to deliver inventory blanks.

Article 6—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to authorize Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes.

Article 7—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$750.

Article 8—Upon motion made by Albert Brown it was voted to raise \$50.

Article 9—Upon motion made by Chester Durrell it was voted to raise \$604.50 for the first part of the article.

Article 10—Upon motion made by Leroy Locke it was voted to purchase a Mack Truck and Snow Plow and wing. The cost was not to exceed \$1780 and \$510.

Article 11—Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to dismiss the article.

Article 12—It was voted to raise \$200 for electric light lines.

Article 13—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$301.80. Upon motion made by Leroy Locke it was voted to raise \$479.76.

Article 14—Upon motion made by Ed. Colburn it was voted to dismiss the article.

Article 15—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to dismiss the article.

Article 16—Upon motion made by Chester McNally it was not voted to dismiss the article.

Upon motion made by Albert Brown it was voted to raise overdraft of \$857.28.

Article 17—Upon motion made by Edwin Colburn it was voted to dismiss the article.

Article 2—Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$1800.

Article 18—Upon motion made by Ed. Colburn it was voted to dismiss the article.

It was voted to adjourn without date.

GENERAL DISCUSSION

Individual desks have replaced the double seats in both schools; electric lights have been installed at East Deering. Electric lights will be installed at West Deering as soon as power is available. At this writing plans are being made to install septic toilets at East Deering. All of which shows that progress is being made.

Like the rest of New Hampshire one-room-schools one of our crying needs is plenty of water both for drinking and washing purposes. The least which we can do is to dig wells workable the year around in close proximity to the school houses. In order that our children may practice the principles of good health which we teach, both schools should be provided with sinks, and water boxes over them to furnish running water for the children to wash with. At present an entire school uses the same wash basin.

The schools should also be provided with suitable shelves for the children's lunch boxes. The floors and the entries are not suitable places for this purpose.

The school board and the superintendent cannot furnish the improvements called for unless the school district gives us some encouragement and funds to do with.

I wish to remind you of the suggestions made a year ago regarding the consolidation of schools. Why not elect a representative committee of the town at the March meeting to make a study of this question, and report their findings and recommendations to the school district? Why not put the educational system on the same level of consideration as our improved highways, the dam, electric light, and our homes with their rapid adoption of modern improvements?

More is being done in our schools than just teaching the fundamentals. A great deal is being accomplished in the way of citizenship, health, guidance, games and appreciation of patriotic and religious holidays, and for the social life of the school, all aiming at laying a truly American cultural background and way of life.
