Town Meeting Warrant

(As known February 5, 1952)

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to paint the outside of the town building.

Article 4. To see what action the town will take in regard to moving the town switch for the fire siren and raise and appropriate the necessary amount of money for the same.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Pine Blister Rust Control.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used for Rag Weed control.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for expenses incurred in connection with dogs.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to provide for the disposal of rubbish and garbage and raise and appropriate money for the same. Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for Vital Statistics, Littleton Hospital, and expenses of the Health Department.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purchase of new equipment; any balance remaining in this account at the end of the year to be set up as a New Equipment Reserve Fund.

Article 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal, maintenance of highways and bridges, and for Town Road Aid.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the lighting of its streets for the ensuing year.

Article 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the highway department.

Article 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Abbie Greenleaf Library and salary of its Librarian.

Article 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.

Article 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day. Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used for Community Activities.

Article 19. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of its cemeteries.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 10c per \$1,000.00 of the assessed valuation of the town.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for maintenance of the Information Booth at the Town Building.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Civil Defense expenses.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for legal expenses.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for sidewalk upkeep and repair.

Article 25. To see what action the town wishes to take regarding reconstruction of the bridge leading from Main Street to Dow Avenue and raise and appropriate any necessary funds for this purpose.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following: \$2,500.00 to pay the amount maturing on the Town Building and Water Works bonds; \$1,000.00 on outstanding Bridge Construction notes; \$1,000.00 on outstanding Fire Equipment and Garage notes; \$1,000.00 on outstanding Gale Reservoir Construction notes; also the sum of \$965.00 to pay the interest on said indebtedness and on temporary loans.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 for payment of the County Tax.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to defray the town's share of the cost.

Article 29. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to allow a discount for early payment of taxes.

Article 31. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Business meeting for consideration of the articles of the warrant will be called to order at 8 o'clock P. M.) to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary officers for the school district for the ensuing year.
- 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 5. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
- 6. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social

Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951.

- 7. If the foregoing article is adopted to see if the school district will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire.
- 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Visual examinations and audiograms were done on all pupils.

Immunizations and one vaccination were done at the Toxoid Clinic in April.

Registration Day was held June 5th with good attendance. Nearly all children had been examined by their family doctor and preparations were made for their entrance into the first grade in the fall.

To the School Board and Citizens of Franconia:

I herewith submit my ninth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in the Franconia District.

The total enrollment of your school last year was 141, with 44 pupils in Grades 9-12 and 97 in Grades 1-8. The average membership was 124.4 and the percent of attendance 95.1. There were 43 tuition pupils in the Academy, 15 in the high school and 28 in the elementary grades.

This year the total enrollment is 128, with 36 in Grades 9-12 and 92 in Grades 1-8. There are 43 tuition pupils enrolled in your school at the present time. Six high school and 15 elementary pupils are from Lisbon Town, 8 high school and eleven elementary pupils are from Easton and 3 high school pupils are from Sugar Hill.

There are two changes in the teaching staff this year. Mrs. Arlene Fisher, Grades 1 and 2 and Mr. Paul Farris, Principal of Dow Academy and teacher of Social Studies. A complete report of Mr. Farris' work follows.

Mrs. Lena Shores is again in charge of the school lunch program. As one of the pupils put it "The meals are scrumptious." The program is sponsored by the Greenleaf Civics Club and is growing every year. Mrs. Shores is ably assisted by Mrs. Helen Herbert.

The State Champion "Class C" Cross Country team was an outstanding athletic achievement this year. In addition to winning 8 dual meets, the team made an excellent showing at the New England Tournament at Burlington, Vermont. Much credit is due the boys who participated and to Mr. Charles Pierce, their coach, for the very excellent work.

We expect that the State Board of Health's Dental Service Division will hold a clinic in Franconia in February. Children will be given fluoride treatments by two dental hygienists. Mrs. Mary Peckett helped Miss Simeneau secure this service.

The help of the Trustees in starting the Ernest Poole Memorial Library, replacing and repainting the playground equipment and the donation of the new bicycle rack is greatly appreciated.

Your school board is carefully surveying the program of studies in an attempt to line up a more beneficial program. In order to make these changes economically, we must take time and attack the problem carefully.

The Band grows larger each year. There are 18 members. Dow Academy and Lincoln High School hold their rehearsals together each week. We hope to have the band outfitted in new uniforms by next spring.

The building is old and needs many repairs and changes so we can run a good school program. To give you a better idea of the problems facing the school board, a few of the things done during the past year are listed.

- 1. New stair treads on basement stairs.
- 2. New stair treads on entrance steps.
- 3. Replaced cement floors in basements.
- 4. New toilets and new plumbing in both basements, including new floors in toilets.
- 5. New hot and cold water lavatories in both basements. Painted basements.
- 6. Repaired and painted hallway in gymnasium.

- 7. Completed installation of new shades on all windows.
- 8. Overhauled and repaired the projector.
- 9. Repaired two ceilings.
- 10. Hardboard at ends of gym.
- 11. Refinished all desks.
- 12. Drinking fountain in hall.

Many thanks to Mr. Farris, Mr. Shores, the Dow Academy staff and the school board for their cooperation. I enjoy working in your community.

CURRICULUM

Driver Education, a practical course in learning how to drive, has been added to the curriculum for the year 1951-52.

The possibilities of expanding the shop facilities by removing it to the shed where there is more room is under consideration. Also, we should like to expand the shop program to include grades 9-12 as well as 7-8. This would involve some expense as well as changes of teaching assignments. The student interest in the program is high.

Under consideration is a plan to introduce a course in Vocational Occupations. This exploratory and practical course could be developed to a point of high personal value to each student. On-the-job observation, experience, and training would be of positive value to all concerned. The whole-hearted cooperation of town industries, merchants, professions, and civil employees would be desirable and necessary should the program be set up and carried through.

ACTIVITIES

The music program under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. McLure is progressing at a steady and expanding pace. Our music supervisors are doing a fine job. Spring concerts are being planned for the entire music department.

Athletics are conducted ably by Miss Carlin, Mr. Cole and Mr. Pierce. Dramatics are directed by Mr. Crosby, assisted by Miss Marden. Mr. Crosby also directs the Yearbook. The magazine drive this fall netted a sufficient amount to assist enlarging our film and book libraries.

LIBRARIES

With the aid of the Trustees and of the magazine drive, our film library is expanding to a point where it is playing a prominent role in our educational system. Guided visual-education is a definite asset to any school.

The Trustees donated funds for the beginning of a library for the school. We have about 300 selections in our library as a result of the fund and generous donations of books by clubs and by individuals. A new dictionary and two sets of encyclopedias have been donated to Dow. We still have some money left to spend for books. This, plus the promise of donations of books and money, has given us a fine start towards an adequate library for our students. We do have need for a room specifically set aside for library purposes.

GUIDANCE

The cumulative index record file started by Mr. Charron is being continued and expanded. Information sources concerning each child will be tapped in order to help us to understand and guide each one. Parental cooperation is of prime consideration in this field.

Our testing program is expanding. The New Hampshire University Testing Bureau is being utilized. We hope to expand in our own use of its services. We have purchased tests and are making valuable use of them. The tests given by the New Hampshire Employment Service will be administered this spring to help guide us in placing our graduates in some constructive employment.

HEALTH

The school nurse, Miss Simeneau, and the school physician, Dr. Ralph Parker, have cooperated to help make our school a healthy body of students.

There is need of more dental aid—perhaps a dental clinic.

FACULTY

It is my belief that Franconia has a fine and capable group of teachers for their school. We are effectively guided by our Superintendent, Ronald A. Perham.

BUILDING

This building, despite its age and need for repairs and changes, is in very good condition. It is kept neat and clean at all times. Our custodian is very capable and cooperative. His constructive influence is felt in many ways by the faculty and the students.

GENERAL

The Student Council, a new organization at Dow Academy, has been founded by the students. It is a step in the direction of student self-government. It is hoped by all that it will prove a success.

I should like to express my sincere appreciation to the School Board for their whole hearted cooperation and assistance. It is a pleasure to work with them and for them. May I also express my sincere appreciation to the Trustees of Dow and to the people of the town for their cooperation and assistance.
