

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L.S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenland in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Greenland Central School in said Greenland on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

(The polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. to elect town officers. Discussion and action on the articles in the warrant will take place at 8:00 P.M.)

- 2. To hear the report of the Town Clerk on the result of the election of Town Officers.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The estimated amount for town charges is \$14,452.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the building, repair, and maintenance of highways and bridges. The estimated amount is \$5,500. for summer work and \$3,000. for winter.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62.52 against the State's \$416.79 for construction and maintenance of Class V roads.

- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450. for the extermination of moths and elm tree beetles.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700. for the support of the Weeks Public Library.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800. for the care of the cemeteries.
- 9. To see if the town will enact the following bylaws for the care, preservation, protection and use of the public cemetery in the Town of Greenland, (submitted by the Trustees of Trust Funds):

CEMETERY BYLAWS

- 1. The sale of lots in the cemeteries owned by the Town of Greenland shall be restricted to residents of Greenland and their families. Resale of lots or parts of lots is prohibited.
- 2. No interment shall be made in any lot until the price for said lot has been paid.
- 3. The price to be charged for any lot shall be computed at \$50.00 per grave, including grading.
- 4. Every monument or headstone shall rest on a well constructed foundation of masonry or comparable material at least two feet deep, and including an apron four inches in width around the base. Corner stones shall set level with the ground.
- 5. All markers must be set flush with the ground, except in the old section of the cemetery where they may be set in conformation with presently existing markers.

- 6. No hedges or curbings are to be permitted on any lot, nor will any trees or shrubs be planted thereon.
- 7. No tablets, markers or other devices of wood or other perishable material are permitted.
- 8. No person shall raise or lower the grade of any lot or cause the same to be graded or maintained at any level other than that established for the cemetery.
- No person shall leave any refuse on any lot, path or any other place within the cemetery other than at such place or places as may be designated for disposal of refuse.
- 10. All interments shall hereafter be made in a concrete or other imperishable vault.
- 11. All persons who hereafter purchase lots shall, at the time of the purchase, pay to the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town of Greenland such sum as may be set by the schedule adopted by said Trustees for the perpetual care of said lot.
- 12. There shall be in the Town of Greenland a Board of Cemetery Trustees, to consist of three members, one to be elected each year for the term of three years, which said Board shall have the care and control of the town cemeteries and shall make annual report of their doings to the town.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. for the guarantee of ambulance service by the City of Portsmouth.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. to be used in participation with Government Wild Life, New Hampshire Fish and Game Department, and the Water Resources Board for reconstruction of the dam at Winnicut River.

- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150. for the care of parks.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50. for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$525. for Civilian Defense purposes. This money to be expended at the discretion of the Civil Defense Director and the Selectmen.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,490. to be used with the \$1,000. raised in 1956 to purchase a police cruiser.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240. for the purpose of providing and installing a two way radio in the Tank Truck of the Fire Department. Said sum to defray one half the expense of providing and installing above equipment.
- 18. To transact any other business that legally may come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1956 the Fire Department answered a total of nineteen calls for fire. Sixteen of these calls were local, with only one causing appreciable property damage. This was the fire at Mr. Gauvins on Post road July 20, 1956 in which the barn was completely destroyed and for a time threatened the house and also the neighboring property. Prompt action by the local department and the quick response of Mutual Aid from Portsmouth, Rye, Newington, North Hampton and Hampton prevented further spread of the fire. The balance of the fires occuring were grass, chimney, flooded oil burners and one car fire.

Under the Mutual Aid System Greenland provided help to Stratham and Newmarket for a total of three calls.

The Fire Department has continued to add to its equipment as funds will permit and during the year purchased two new lengths of Hard Suction Hose to replace worn-out hose. Also purchased were two Chemox Gas Masks and three battery operated Hand Lanterns.

We wish to thank the townspeople and local organizations for their continued support, also a special thanks to the Fire Department Auxiliary for their efforts in raising funds to complete the hall at the Fire Station.

The town dump which receives no attention, where waste material is scattered about without supervision of any description, soon becomes a community menace and a liability rather than an asset.

Many people still burn debris around their homes. A large number of such fires get out of control causing unnecessary damage and expense to the burner. Why burn at home? Make use of your town dump and eliminate the hazard of burning. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If however, you do burn on your premises:

- Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it. The warden won't refuse you if conditions are safe.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your dump freely—help keep it safe.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Greenland Central School in said district on Saturday the ninth day of March, 1957, at one thirty o'clock P.M. to act on the following articles:

The polls will be open for the election of District Officers at one thirty o'clock P.M. and may not be closed prior to seven o'clock P.M.

Article 1. To elect the following district officers:

- 1. District Moderator.
- 2. District Clerk.
- 3. One member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. District Treasurer.
- 5. District Auditor.
- Article 2. To determine and fix the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer and to fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the school district.
- Article 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 4. To see if the District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the District the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 to defray the District's share of the cost thereof.

- Article 5. To see if the District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
- Article 6. To see if the District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
- Article 7. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the District the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the District will designate the Chairman of The School Board as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- Article 8. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive any funds which may be forthcoming for educational purposes from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States.
- Article 9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to receive and expend any money that has been or will be allocated under Public Law 815 as amended.
- Article 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to expend any funds in addition to those previously budgeted, received under Public Law 874 as amended.
- Article 11. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to enter into contracts of up to a maximum of 3 years duration for transportation of school pupils.
- Article 12. To see if the District will establish a rate schedule for use of the school facilities by non-school activities.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Greenland, New Hampshire:

Herewith is my ninth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1956-1957 opened with the following personnel:

Mr. Eugene Haight, Principal and teacher of Grade 8; Mrs. Gwendolene Sanderson, teacher of Grade 7; Mrs. Arlene Dahl, teacher of Grade 6; Mrs. Marion Kenison, teacher of Grade 5; Mrs. Elinor Milbury, teacher of Grade 4; Mrs. Lillian Hodges, teacher of Grade 3; Mrs. Mary Varrell, teacher of Grade 2; Mrs. Margaret Blakeney, teacher of Grade 1; Mrs. Eleanor Henry, Music teacher; Miss Mary Shea, School Nurse; Mr. Harold Mataver, Handwriting teacher.

This list includes two additional teachers who supplement last year's staff and thus a teacher for each grade is provided. The new teachers are Mrs. Arlene Dahl Greenland and Mrs. Elinor Milbury of Hampton Falls.

The item of primary importance in the minds of all concerned is the excellent addition to the school plant. The citizens should be congratulated for their willingness to provide this very fine school plant for the use of the youth of the town. The building is of good construction and everything about it is attractive and conducive to an improved school program. Some of the features of the building program are worthy of note and from an educational standpoint are considered to be important requirements of a modern school building.

1. Each of the new classrooms has about 830 square feet of floor space which provides ample room for desirable activities.

- 2. A large first grade room was made out of the old auditorium area which is an excellent classroom for youngsters just entering school.
- 3. All but one of the classrooms in the original building have been greatly improved by being enlarged.
- 4. Ample green chalkboards and bulletin boards at heights which children can use are provided.
- 5. Full length windows which cover an entire wall in each of the new classrooms provide excellent natural light. Modern flourescent fixtures furnish the right type of artificial light.
- 6. The lighter shades of asphalt tile on the floor, the light pastel colors which decorate the walls and the natural wood furniture all help to lighten the appearance of the rooms.
- 7. The fine auditorium should serve as an excellent community center as well as an educational area for various school programs and functions.
- 8. Areas such as the principal's office, the teachers' room and the modern gang toilets are decided improvements in the school plant.

It is my sincere feeling that the School Board, the Building Committees and the architect have worked diligently on this project and have had only one interest in mind; namely, to obtain the best possible school building for the money that was available. I don't see how the many steps that had to be taken prior to the start of construction on the building could have been speeded up any more than was done. Apparently it is too much to expect to build a plant of this proportion in any shorter period of time than six months. It has been a pleasure for me to work with these people on the project.

At this writing, the Greenland School District has received notice that about \$8,400.00 is being reserved by the Federal Government under Public Law 815 to be used for the purchase of equipment for the new school. To date one tenth of this amount has been received. As soon as possible the necessary furniture will be ordered for the various rooms and areas.

For about one half of this school year the teachers, students, and other school personnel have been working under severe handicaps. I would like to congratulate all concerned for the manner in which they have accepted make-shift arrangements and have proceeded to make the best of everything under these trying conditions. I can only state that the new plant has been well worth waiting for.

The Parent-Teacher Association continues to make contributions to the school program.

The Trustees of the Parish House should be commended for allowing the first grade to use their facilities for the first semester.

Mrs. Laura Allen and her assistant Mrs. Isabelle La Rose deserve much credit for the excellence of the Hot Lunch Program.

Mr. Burton Brackett as janitor has taken a great deal of interest in the building program and he has done much to facilitate the use of the temporary classroom areas during the period of construction.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

I again express appreciation to the citizens, the members of the School Board and the teachers for their continued support and cooperation.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I am again privileged to submit the annual report of the Principal of Greenland Central School.

Twenty-one students graduated from Central School in June, 1956, which is the largest graduating class on record.

Last spring the Eighth Grade went on a class trip to Provincetown, Mass., presented a one-act play, and served a supper. A weekly class in Ballroom Dancing was held for Grades V-VIII. An average of thirty-six pupils attended.

The boys played eight baseball games, winning one. The girls played two softball games with North Hampton.

School opened in September to the accompaniment of the sound of heavy machinery, pneumatic drills, saws, hammers, and shouting men. Teaching was difficult then and I think the teachers and children deserve much credit and commendation for their spirit and cooperation during that time.

Now that the building is practically completed we are all looking forward to the day we can occupy it and "spread out" a little.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

There have been no major outbreaks of communicable diseases in Greenland since my last report. The health of the children has been very good on the whole. The major health objective in the protection of the school age children has again been polio inoculation.

The planned physical examinations by a physician has had to be postponed until the facilities are available in the new school addition. These will begin before spring. Parents will be notified of the dates for the examination of their children and it is hoped that as many parents as possible will be present.

Several children are attending the new speech classes held at the Health Service office in the Exeter High School.

I would like to thank the teachers and the parents for their help during the past year.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

For many children entering the first grade, the musical experience that they have in the school are among their first. It is true that radio and television give children the opportunity of listening to music, and this is good if the music is good. Fortunate are those children who have had a musical environment in the home during their pre-school years.

The importance of the classroom teacher in the school music program cannot be over-emphasized, for it is she who can provide richness in the lives of the children, as daily musical experiences for the pupils must be provided by her. Much help can be given her with a record player and some good records.

As music educators stress the importance of bodily response to music, much is done, especially in the lower grades, with this type of musical experience. Responding to music through various types of rhythmic activities, action songs, singing games, dancing and work with rhythm band are examples of this type of activity.

As many children have not found their singing voices when they first enter school, work to obtain this result is important.

In the third grade, work with tonettes is begun. This is valuable as a beginning for note reading, and also often gives the pupils an interest in studying another instrument later on. A clarinet instructor recently told a new pupil that he thought that her work with the tonette in school had been a big help to her in learning to play this new instrument. It is true that the tonette and the clarinet have similar features.

Learning the fundamentals of music, note-reading, part-singing, dancing, listening to music and music appreciation are also part of the music program.

At the graduation exercises in June, musical selections were rendered by the pupils of the seventh and eighth grades.

In the fall, because of the addition of two new teachers, it became necessary for the music teacher to spend a full day at Greenland, instead of one-half day, as she had previously done.

Previous to the Christmas holidays, the students of the seventh and eighth grades presented a short Christmas musical program at the December P.T.A. meeting.

In closing, I wish to thank Mr. Hoyt, the members of the School Board, the P.T.A., the teachers and the parents for their co-operation.
