

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants in the town of Hanover in the County of Grafton, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in the town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Grange Hall in said Hanover on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First: To choose by ballot a clerk to serve for the term of one year.

Second: To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditor and other town officers and committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Third: To choose by ballot

*To serve for three years*

One selectman  
One Library Trustee  
One Trustee of Trust Funds

*To serve for one year*

One Treasurer  
Two Auditors  
Three Fence Viewers  
Two Surveyors of Wood and Lumber

A Prosecuting Agent to Prosecute Violations of the Liquor Laws and any other necessary town officers

Fourth: To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Fifth: To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate in all or part to be expended as may be necessary under the direction of the selectmen in coöperation with the state and federal agents engaged in the work of exterminating and preventing the spread of the disease commonly known as pine blister rust.

Sixth: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$70 or any part of it as is needed, for flags and suitable exercises on Memorial Day, to be expended under the direction of the George Ryder Post American Legion No. 71 of Hanover.

Seventh: To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to construct a building in the village of Etna, to house the fire apparatus already procured by residents of the village of Etna and vicinity for the protection of the locality.

Eighth: To see if the Town will authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds for the Town of Hanover to sell and to execute quit claim deeds from time to time covering the interest of the Town in certain school lots, so-called, located in different parts of the Town and now leased on long terms, such sales to be made at figures on which the annual rentals would represent income at 5 per cent.

Ninth: To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for the President and Vice-President of the United States.

Tenth: To transact any other business that legally may be brought before said meeting.

ABSTRACT FROM TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Hanover, qualified to vote in town affairs, at the Nugget Theatre in said town, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, 1923, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the meeting was called to order by Harry E. Burton, the Moderator, the warrant under which the meeting was called, was read by the Clerk, after which the meeting proceeded to the election of town officers, and transact other business as follows:

*Voted:* That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll Taxes provided for by law, the Town raise and appropriate the following amounts:

all to be expended in accordance with the Budget as presented by the Selectmen.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* That if in the judgment of the Selectmen it seems wise this year to rebuild that portion of the Trunk Line which might normally be done next year, authority is hereby granted to borrow, in addition to what has been raised otherwise, any amounts necessary for such rebuilding to a total of not exceeding \$6,000, the same to be on notes issued for not over one year.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* That the town hereby appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars to be used in coöperation with the State or Federal Government, or both, for the control of the Pine Blister Rust in the forests of this town. An amendment to the foregoing motion was made by J. L. Richards, that the work in Hanover be done between April 1st and June 1st and between September 15th and October 20th.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* To raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars for the maintenance of the sidewalk in the Village of Etna.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* That the next issue of the pamphlet prepared by the Selectmen of the Town of Hanover, containing a statement of the assessed valuation of real property in the Town of Hanover, be on or before August 1st, 1923, and every third year thereafter, or until this action shall be made nugatory by subsequent action, that this pamphlet be sent free of charge to all resident Real Property owners of the Town of Hanover.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* That the Town elect three Assessors for one year to act with the Selectmen in the assessment of Real Estate, and Edgar H. Hunter, Newton A. Frost and Thomas E. Ward were elected.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* That the Moderator, before April 1st, appoint a committee of three to investigate the desirability and feasibility of the so-called Town Manager Plan for the Town of Hanover, either alone, or acting in concert with other municipal organizations, that this committee shall report to the Selectmen not later than February 1st, 1924, and the Selectmen may in their discretion cause such report to be printed and circulated among the voters.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* That the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Town's obligations until the taxes have been collected and paid into the treasury.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* To accept the reports of the Town officers as printed in the Annual Report.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* That upon all taxes upon Real and Personal property a discount of five per cent be allowed the tax payers if paid on or before July 15th, 1923, and a discount of three per cent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before September 15th, 1923.

Upon motion:

*Voted:* To adjourn.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Hanover, March 13, 1923, the following votes of those present and qualified to vote for Senator, were by them in open meeting given in to the Moderator, and said Moderator, in said meeting, in presence of the Selectmen and Clerk, sorted and counted said votes, and at the close of the poll made a public declaration of the whole number of tickets given in, with the number of votes for and against the amendment, as follows:

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN OF HANOVER

The Selectmen of the Town of Hanover herewith present their Annual Report.

During the year the maintenance work has required the replanking of nearly all the bridges, placing new stringers on four bridges, rebuilding the abutments of two bridges on the Rudsboro Road, and a start on widening the worked part of many highways which have become so contracted as to prevent proper drainage. Considerable work in this direction was expended on the road connecting the Hanover Center-Lyme Center Road with the Dartmouth College Road and this work will be continued during the coming year. In addition it is planned to cut brush which on many roads has encroached seriously on the highway.

New work has included the construction of a concrete bridge on the Etna-Hanover Center Road near the Thornton property, the location of a new road, Dorrance Place, and a change in the location of the easterly end of Webster Avenue. Plans are under way to replace with concrete the bridge on the Etna-Hanover Center Road near the Paine house just before the Rudsboro Road is reached. It will be necessary also to rebuild the bridge near Goose Road in the eastern part of Hanover.

The Trunk Line and State Aid Roads outside of the Precinct were in such poor condition that it was decided to commence the resurfacing of them in 1923.

During the summer of 1923 about 3600' feet of water-bound macadam was laid northerly from the Precinct Line, near Professor N. E. Gilbert's property. It is proposed to resurface in the same manner the continuation of this road to the top of Jones Hill and also the road for one mile southerly from the foot of County Hill to the end of the

present waterbound macadam. These surfaces will be covered with heavy oil and sand. The road northerly from the foot of County Hill to the Hanover-Lyme town line is to have gravel applied to its surface. After the road is rolled an oil and sand top coat will be added.

A beginning was made in 1923 to resurface with gravel the Lebanon-Hanover State Aid Road from the Precinct Line to the Lebanon Line. This work will be continued and after it is completed a coat of oil and sand will be applied.

These repairs are needed so badly that it is proposed to do them all this year, and next year to curtail the work to maintenance. Part of the cost of resurfacing is to be paid from receipts this year and the remainder carried on a note to be paid next year.

For use in the above work it is proposed to buy a motor truck and a 5-ton tractor. The truck will be useful later in general highway maintenance. The tractor will be of service for road machine work, snow-rolling and other maintenance and construction work.

As given by the report there is in the Treasurer's hands a balance of \$2,659.18 with practically all bills paid, and a balance of Current Assets over Current Liabilities of \$6,058.64.

During almost twenty years of use the building has needed very little repairing. A few slate which had fallen from the roof have been replaced recently. The fire-proof vault which was built originally for the safeguarding of town records, etc., has been fitted with proper shelving only during the past year under direction of

the selectmen. Mr. Trumbell's bill for this, and for the repairs on the roof and restoration of the front walk, remains to be divided as to liability of the library trustees and of the town in adjusting the cost.

### TRUSTEES

The Trustees believe that it is necessary at this time to call the attention of the townspeople to the present status of the library, its history and need of more liberal support.

It is well known to the older citizens that the building was made possible by the sale of the old town farm to the Hanover Water Works Co. The construction was carefully done under close supervision, giving a pleasing exterior and an interior which is conceded to be unusually attractive in appearance, and so well finished that there has been little or no deterioration in all the twenty years of its use. By careful management a fund of \$500 for maintenance was reserved out of the proceeds of sale of the farm, and the same care on the part of Mr. Horace F. Hoyt, so long treasurer of the Board of Trustees, resulted in the gradual increase of this fund to about \$700, so that this is now practically, although not necessarily, held by the town trustees as principal. In addition there is a fund of \$100 given by the late D. T. Ross, the interest of which is available for purchase of books.

Up to within a year ago the allowance available for the library, through the selectmen was about \$220; but, under a new interpretation of the law, the apportionment was reduced to about \$184, which is an abrupt reduction of about 14 per cent, or nearly one-seventh of an already inadequate

amount for maintenance and purchase of books needed and demanded by the readers. It is self-evident that less than \$250 (see treasurer's report) for operating this town library through an entire year is pitifully and ridiculously small, and constitutes a reproach upon the intelligence and interest of the people. It is true that the Howe library in Hanover village is available to all townspeople, but that is geographically in a corner of the town not conveniently accessible to a large part of the farming districts.

Although all books that could be discarded have been removed from the shelves, these are now much overcrowded, and one or two new bookcases have been needed for more than a year. There is constantly an insistent call for more books, especially for those suitable for the young people. Selections are made only after advice from competent judges, or after scrutiny by one of the trustees.

## REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TOWN MANAGER

Your committee has considered the question of the appointment of a manager for the town and precinct of Hanover strictly from the standpoint of local conditions and needs. It should be pointed out that the situation is distinctly different from that of the compact industrialized community. The town is on the whole a thinly settled community with a relatively low taxable valuation and under any conditions the burden on the precinct is bound to be disproportionately heavy.

Your committee is of the opinion that the appointment of a manager would have to justify itself either on the ground of saving in expenses or a sufficient increase in the efficiency of the public service. The actual administrative outlay at the present time is so small that in view of the fact that a manager could not be secured for less than three or four thousand dollars per annum, with the likelihood of an increase in overhead which always goes with the creation of an additional office, the appointment could hardly be justified on this ground. The question of increased efficiency is not so clear, but your committee feels that whatever improvement might come from the presence of an officer giving full time to the supervision of the town's affairs, would not be sufficiently great to justify the increased expense. Your committee wishes to point out in this connection that in the College community there is available a considerable body of expert knowledge and experience which might be further utilized by the town. Several members of the College staff have given considerable service in the past.

Your committee believes that in view of local differences and the size of the areas involved, any merger with adjoining towns would be undesirable.

While continued growth in the size of the town and in the number of required services in the future, may render desirable further consideration of the plan, your committee is of the opinion that its adoption is not warranted at the present time.

A meeting of the legal voters of the village Precinct of Hanover was called to order by Frank A. Musgrove, Moderator, at eight o'clock P. M.

The warrant was read by the Clerk.

Article 1: Frank A. Musgrove was elected Moderator for one year.

Article 2: Ira W. Leavitt was elected Clerk for one year.

Article 3: Voted to accept and place on file the reports of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer and Auditor.

Article 4: Alfred W. Guyer was elected Treasurer for one year. Roy B. Brackett was elected Auditor for one year. Arthur P. Fairfield was elected Precinct Commissioner for three years.

Article 5: Voted that the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars for expenses as itemized in the budget for 1923-24.

Article 6: Voted to pass over article six.

Article 7: Voted that the Precinct Commissioners be instructed to order, as provided by Chapter 60 of the Laws of 1891, that all dogs be muzzled or restrained from running at large for the period of thirty days from March 20, 1923; and that the Commissioners be requested to take such steps as may be necessary during the coming fiscal year to enforce the existing requirements of law respecting the licensing and collaring of dogs.

Voted, that the Moderator, before April 1, 1923, appoint a committee of three to investigate the desirability and feasibility of the so-called town-manager plan, as applied to the Village Precinct of Hanover, either alone or acting in concert with other municipal organizations: that this committee shall report to the Precinct Commissioners not later than February 1, 1924, and that the Commissioners may in their discretion cause such report to be printed and circulated among the voters.

Voted that the Precinct Commissioners be and hereby are authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the Village Precinct before the taxes are raised, collected and paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Precinct.

Voted that upon all taxes on personal property and upon real estate paid on or before the 15th day of July, 1923, a discount of five per cent be allowed the tax payer, and that upon taxes on personal property and real estate paid on or before the fifteenth day of September, 1923, a discount of three per cent be allowed the tax payer. Voted that the thanks of the Precinct be extended to the Hanover Improvement Society for the use of the Nugget Theatre for this evening.

Meeting adjourned at 8.25 P. M.

One hose cart with a thousand feet of serviceable hose.

One hook and ladder truck with one fifty foot extension ladder and two thirty-five foot extension ladders.

One Gamewell Fire Alarm system, complete with ten boxes and an alarm indicator and tester and a Universal Fire Alarm box at the telephone central station. Also there is a steam alarm whistle on the college central heating plant.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

*To the School Board of Hanover Town School District:*

I submit herewith my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

### *Teachers*

The most important factor of the school is the teacher. A good teacher will produce good results under almost any conditions, and however limited the equipment of her school may be. A poor teacher will accomplish but little of value however well equipped with appliances and devices her school may be. It is important, moreover, that good teachers be retained for some time. Frequent changes of teachers tend to interrupt the continuity of the work, and necessarily to lower the standard of attainment. The District has held its teachers well. It is to be expected that some changes will occur each year. Three new teachers were required this year. The teachers are all working with a great deal of zeal, and are showing fine professional spirit.

### *Buildings*

The building at the Arvin school was very greatly improved at relatively small expenses. From a building almost unfit for use, it was changed to quite a model school room. A new floor, new desks, new blackboards, a jacket for the stove, the toilets attached to the building and entered only from the school room made this building our most up-to-date one-room school building. The entrance was changed to the south side, and a half acre of land was purchased for a play ground.

Slate blackboards were also put in the Center school, and additional slates were put in the rooms at Etna. These slates had been used at Hanover, and were placed at the

disposal of the District. Hence the only expense involved was for transportation and putting them in.

The stoves in the primary room at Etna, the Center, and the County Road were jacketed. This has added very greatly to the comfort and serviceableness of these rooms.

Thus very considerable real improvement has been made in the school buildings. The buildings at the Center and County Road should next be completely renovated. It may be advisable to undertake the improvement of but one a year, and do that one well.

### *Finances*

The financial statement for the year ending June, 1923, shows a large cash balance. It seems advisable to plan for some balance on account of the possibility of unexpected expenses, but it does not seem advisable to carry an unnecessarily large balance. As far as can be judged at this time, the balance at the end of the year in June, 1924, will be about the same as for last year. Hence it would seem to be wise to appropriate \$2000 of the unexpended balance towards the expenses of the coming year, and I so recommend.

The amount of State aid received this year is practically the maximum, and we shall be entitled to very nearly the same for the coming year. But for this aid, our schools would have to be seriously curtailed, or a very heavy burden laid upon the taxpayers.

### *Attendance*

The attendance at the various schools has been fair, good in some and poor in others. The poor record in some schools is invariably caused by some one or two families who are inclined to ignore not only the law but the vital interest of their children. Irregular attendance means a great deal more to a child than merely losing a certain amount of work, bad as that may be. It invariably tends to cultivate a spirit of disregard for legal requirement, and consequent-

ly a trait of character that does not promise good citizenship. It is hoped that we may have the complete co-operation of parents to the end that the children may not only gain all the good the schools can offer in the way of studies, but that they may cultivate those qualities that make for good citizenship.

### *Work of the Schools*

While as much attention as possible is given to purely cultural subjects, the emphasis in our school work is placed, and I think very properly so, on the fundamental subjects. In the Fall, tests in spelling and arithmetic were given in all eighth grades in the state. The arithmetic test was the old test first given in 1846 in Springfield, Mass. At that time it was given to ninth grade pupils whose average age was nearly two years more than the average age of our eighth grade pupils. The average score at that time was 29.41. The average score made by the nearly 5,000 eighth grade pupils in New Hampshire last November was 49.26. The average score attained by our eighth grade pupils was 61.11. To check up this result, I later gave a standardized test in this subject in four grades, and found that our pupils were all well above the standards given. No special emphasis is put on arithmetic. Other subjects are quite as important, and receive their share of attention.

### *Conclusion*

I think we may be pleased with the general good condition of our schools. There will always be opportunities to make improvements, and that is largely our care. I hope for the continuance of the excellent spirit of co-operation that generally prevails among all concerned.
