Town Meeting Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 13th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for protection of the premises on Lafayette Avenue from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister, for payment of the town debt and interest,

for the Community Nurse, for the Skating Rink, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State Aid and for expenditure of other public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.

ARTICLE 3A. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize and instruct its board of Selectmen to replace, for pedestrian use, the walk on the north side of the bridge of the Boston & Maine Railroad, approaching the Holly Shoe Factory, provision for which has been made by said Railroad; and to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money for the same.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1945, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 1/100th of one percent of the Town valuation, for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

ARTICLE 8. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Littleton which has been made by this Division in accordance with the vote taken at the last annual town meeting. Exhibits and Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts of the selectmen, treasurer, tax collector, town clerk, trustees of trust funds, municipal court, overseer of the poor, road agents, library treasurer and park commission, for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944. The accounts of the Water and Electric Light Department of the town and the Littleton Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

Finances

The Net Debt of the town was reduced during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, from \$33,779.30 to \$20,152.86, a decrease of \$13,626.44. The average local tax rate was reduced from \$2.60 per hundred in 1943 to \$2.47 per hundred in 1944. The average tax rate for the whole state for the same years was \$3.03 and \$3.07, respectively.

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, are presented in Exhibits III and IV. A net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$2,775.65, and a net excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$975.99, resulted in a net budget surplus for the year of \$3,751.64.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody of and who receive or disburse public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from the depository banks.

General Comments

It is again recommended that consideration be given to the matter of taking tax deeds to property sold to the town for taxes, from which sales no redemption has been made within the two year period as provided by law. This would include unredeemed taxes from the sales on account of the levies of 1941 and

previous years. The unredeemed taxes for this period, as of December 31, 1944, were as follows:

The accounts and records of all the officials which were examined were found to be in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the prescribed methods.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, this report or a summary of its essential features should be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the town for the assistance rendered and information furnished while engaged in making this audit.

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the Annual Report of the Librarian is Herewith Submitted:

For the first time in three years of war the number of books borrowed from the Littleton Public Library in 1944 shows an increase over the previous year. As this 11% increase is distributed evenly over the various classes of reading, it may be attributed perhaps to a settling down into the ways of wartime living. Although work and voluntary activities directed toward the winning of the war are still in full swing, they have become habitual and are accepted as a matter of course; hence the partial return to normal leisure pursuits in which the public library plays its part.

Some of our library-minded townspeople started a new plan of presenting to the library a book in memory of a deceased friend. The idea of a book as a living memorial given either by an individual or a group is a fine one. Books this year were given in memory of Mrs. Irena Bowman, Mr. and Mrs. C. Tabor Gates, Mrs. Elsie Mullins and Mr. John B. Nute. It is expected that the idea will spread and that in the future some people will prefer to present a memorial book rather than to send funeral flowers. In each case the name of the person to whom the gift is dedicated and that of the donor are inscribed in the book. The library also received a portrait in oils of the late Hon. Evarts Farr, only Littleton man ever to go to the Congress of the United States. The picture has been hung in the adult reading room. The library is indebted for other gifts of books and money to many interested patrons.

The librarian attended the N. H. Library Association meeting at Concord for two days in June. Much

of the discussion there was devoted to the subject of the returning veteran and what can be done to assist in his readjustment to civilian life. An attempt was made to anticipate the demands that will be made on the small public library and what can be done to meet them.

It is interesting to know that in preparation for the monetary conference at Bretton Woods last summer the recreational director at the Mt. Washington Hotel turned to this library to provide leisure time reading for the conference delegates and their assistants. Fifty books were loaned and circulated widely.

Because the Book Week reading contest last year was so enthusiastically received, a similar one was used this year and proved equally as popular. The prize was awarded to the sixth grade at St. Rose of Lima School for having read the most books. A story hour was held during Book Week and another later in November. Miss Marion Goodwin, Bookmobile librarian, presented the stories.

It is hoped that the coming year will see a continuing increase in library use. Every effort will be made to serve the reading public as fully as possible.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the vote of the Commissioners of the Water and Electric Department of the Town of Littleton, an audit of the accounts and records has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission. We submit herewith our report consisting of Exhibits A to E and Schedules A to F.

Scope of Audit

The audit and examination covered the period of twelve months ending December 31, 1944. The examination consisted of:

- (1) An audit of the cash account, including all cancelled checks, bonds paid, and supporting data.

- (2) An examination of the distribution of purchases and labor to the Operating Accounts.
- (3) An examination of Current Assets of the Electric and Water Department, such as Accounts Receivable and Miscellaneous Charges.
- (4) An examination of the Customers' Deposits and Investment Funds.
- (5) A review of the Depreciation Reserve Accounts of the Electric and Water Department.
- (6) An examination of Outstanding Liabilities as at December 31, 1944.
- (7) An analysis of purchased power charges, and power sales for the period.
- (8) Various tests were made in keeping with our usual accounting procedure.

INVENTORY OF MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES

As stated in our report of December 31, 1943, we suggest that an inventory of materials and supplies be recorded on the records.

CUSTOMERS' DEPOSITS (Schedule A-4)

We examined the cards representing deposits made by customers. We advise that many of these be returned to consumers, particularly those who have established credit over a long period of time. We suggest also that accumulated interest be credited on consumers current bills, which is the general practice used by privately owned utilities.

REPLACEMENT FUND (Schedule A)

No change has taken place in this fund other than the addition of interest earned during the year in the amount of \$536.53, bringing the total of the fund to \$27,230.16. The amount was verified.

INVESTMENTS (Schedule A-3)

During the year this account was increased by \$15,000.00 representing the purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds—Series G.

CURRENT LIABILITIES

All recorded liabilities were examined. Unrecorded accounts payable were also examined but not included in the Balance Sheet other than the item of Federal Withholding Taxes. Unrecorded accounts totaled approximately \$2,607.59 of which \$2,439.06 represented power purchased in December 1944. Inasmuch as this same condition existed at the end of the previous year in the amount of \$3,101.60 we have

not considered it important to adjust the Balance Sheet and Operations for this difference.

Withholding tax information, in our opinion, has been properly recorded in the records.

Statement of Operations

Year Ended December 31, 1944

(EXHIBIT E)

Net profits for the year in the Electric Department, after giving effect to the pro-ration of certain general expenses charged to the Water Department, amounted to \$40,476.63. Certain expenses were prorated the same as in the previous year or 75% to Electric Department and 25% to the Water Department. The above appears to be a reasonable division.

During the year \$40,000.00 of the above profit was turned over to the Town of Littleton as its share of the contribution of \$50,000.00.

SURPLUS (EXHIBIT B)

Surplus was increased during the year by the sum of \$476.63 or from \$261,719.99 to \$262,196.62.

GENERAL

Additional information on power purchased and sales made are also included herewith.

For purpose of showing power purchased cost we have prepared Schedule E-1, which indicates a total kilowatt hour sum of 1,900,334 at a cost of \$21,826.56 or \$.011485 per kilowatt hour.

Sales during the year amounted to \$99,432.65, representing a kilowatt hour total of 2,847,696 or a kilowatt hour average sales price of \$.034917 per kilowatt hour.

INVENTORY OF MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES

This item increased during the year by \$97.80. No physical examination of this item was made by us as at December 31, 1944.

LONG TERM DEBT

Long term debt was reduced by \$1,340.00 during the period representing \$1,000.00 principal payment and \$340.00 interest. Cancelled bonds were examined.

OPERATING RESULTS

Net profits of the Water Department amounted to \$10,277.66 for the period. \$10,000.00 was distributed to the Town of Littleton and \$277.66 retained as an addition to the Surplus Account.

SURPLUS (EXHIBIT D)

Surplus was increased during the year by \$277.66 from \$323,970.17 to \$324,247.83.

General Comments

FIXED CAPITAL AND RESERVES

It would be desirable, as mentioned in our previous report, to analyze fixed capital on the unit basis for the purpose of allocating the reserve accounts properly. While no changes have occurred during 1944, if major changes should occur some difficulty will be encountered in arriving at values to be charged against the reserve accounts in cases where property has lived its depreciable life and is disposed of.

GENERAL ACCOUNTING SYSTEM

Other than some criticisms of the system in use, which we have outlined, we believe the records and accounts are in good condition, and portray fairly the financial condition of the Water & Electric Department on December 31, 1944.

CASH POSITION

The departments now enjoy a very healthful cash position even after the distribution of \$50,000.00 to the Town of Littleton.

PUBLICATION OF REPORT

The provision of Section 31, Chapter 211, Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety, but the inclusion of Exhibits and Schedules is optional.

CONCLUSION

During the course of our audit the Commissioners, other officials, and employees have assisted us in every possible way, for which we extend our thanks.

To the Citizens of Littleton:

We herewith submit the annual school report. The report includes a survey of expenditures and receipts from 1942-45 with a proposed budget and estimated receipts for 1945-1946; treasurer's report for the fiscal year July 1, 1943 to June 30, 1944; report of the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission; and written reports of the superintendent of schools and the headmaster of the high school.

A study of the four year survey immediately following this report will show that school appropriations have been reduced during a period of rising costs. There has been a deficit each year. The proposed budget for next year can be balanced by an appropriation of \$72,000.00. The deficit which has been accumulating over a period of years can be removed by an additional appropriation of \$4,000.00

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the request of the District an audit and examination of the accounts for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1944, has been made by this Division, a report of which is submitted herewith. Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended June 30, 1943 and June 30, 1944, presented in Schedule A, indicate a reduction in Net Debt during the year of \$5,506.02.

Receipts and Expenditures summarized in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts are shown in Schedule F. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of June 30, 1944, is set forth in Schedule F-1.

Comparative statements of Appropriations and Expenditures, Estimated and Actual Revenues for the fiscal year indicate a net overdraft of appropriations of \$681.00, and a net revenue deficit of \$705.55, with a resulting net budget deficit for the year of \$1,386.55. (Schedules C and D).

It is noted that at the close of the fiscal year, June 30, 1944, an advance of \$3,000.00 had been made to the School District by the Town on the following year's (1944-45) appropriation. This should be given consideration when next year's budget is made up.

It is also recommended that in the preparation of next year's budget revenues be estimated on a more conservative basis and appropriations, insofar as possible, be sufficient to meet ordinary requirements. This should prevent a budget deficit at the end of the year, as well as the necessity of having to use some of the following year's appropriation for current year's bills.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report relative to your schools.

The past year has brought several changes in faculty membership.

Mr. Leslie S. Cummings, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, receiving both Bachelor's and Master's degrees from that institution, with extensive experience as headmaster in Weare, Bethlehem and Sunapee, was elected headmaster of Littleton High School.

Mr. George E. Farrell, a graduate of Middlebury College, with previous teaching experience in St. Albans, Vermont, is teacher of social studies and physical education director.

Mrs. Ruby Keegan, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with experience as teacher in Tilton-Northfield, Tamworth and Goffstown High Schools, was secured as social studies teacher.

Mr. Roland S. Smith, a graduate of Gorham Normal School, with experience as shop teacher in Newport, N. H., and Bridgewater, Mass., is teaching woodworking.

Miss Evra A. Ward, a graduate of Massachusetts State College, with teaching experience in Wenham, Mass., assumed the vacancy in home economics.

Miss Charline Hawkensen, a Plymouth Teachers College graduate, with experience as teacher in Lincoln High School, is teaching commerce.

Miss Hilda K. Cate, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with teaching experience in New Boston High School, was secured as mathematics teacher.

Mrs. Ruth MacKenzie, a Keene graduate with teaching experience in Candia, filled the fourth grade vacancy in the Apthorp School last March. This year Miss Marion Colby is teaching Grade 4, and Mrs. MacKenzie Grades 2 and 3.

Mrs. Mildred Lakeway, a Plymouth graduate, former Kilburn teacher with recent experience in Lyman, was secured for Grade 4 in the Kilburn School.

Mrs. Doris S. Buswell assumed the position of music supervisor. Mrs. Buswell has had extensive training at The Stanstead Conservatory of Music, McGill University, and State Teachers College in Lowell, Mass. She has had several years of successful experience as music teacher in several Massachusetts and New Hampshire schools.

The enrollment last year as will be seen in the table at the end of this report was 623. This year 612 have registered as compared with 598 at the corresponding time last year.

Several repairs have been made this past year. The washout in the bank adjoining the Thom residence has been repaired at heavy expense. The fire exit trap door in the front stairway of the Apthorp School has been widened for greater safety, and the door between the home economics room and shop in the high school has been altered to open in the direction of fire exit travel. The auditorium curtain has been treated to

be fire resistant. These last alterations were recommended by Fire Chief James E. Hadley who has shown much interest in school fire precautions. Through the cooperation of the school shop, wooden locker boxes have been installed in both the boys' and girls' shower rooms. Storage cupboards in the shop are being re-arranged and painted. A new playground slide is being installed at the Apthorp School this spring. Through the generous cooperation of Mr. J. Beattie Richardson and the State Highway Department we were able to have the ocean wave repaired in the Apthorp playground.

Several improvements have been made in materials of instruction. A modern basic reading system has been supplied in the first six grades. New language books have been purchased in the first eight grades. These additions should assist in improving reading ability and use of the English language, both fundamental for school and life today.

In the high school program first year algebra has been moved from sophomore to freshman year to make possible a four year curriculum in mathematics. Beginning French has been moved from junior to sophomore year to allow opportunity for three years of French whenever there are enough interested pupils to warrant a third year class. Blueprint reading and drawing work have been added to the shop curriculum. Old books have been replaced and several new sets supplied in some courses. An encyclopedia has been purchased for the study hall. Physical education and pre-induction courses have been continued.

The medical inspection report of last year showed 567 pupils were examined and the following defects noted and reported to parents: Underweight 150, defective vision 44, cardiac disease 5, deformity 2, defec-

tive teeth 115, diseased tonsils 11. The school nurse reported corrections as follows: Underweight 64, defective vision 19, diseased tonsils 10. The audiometer test was given in Grades III to XII inclusive. The tuberculin patch test was given to 179 pupils, with five cases x-rayed. The following clinics were held: dental, vision and tonsil. Special physical examinations were given the members of the athletic teams.

The penny milk program is again being carried on this year. A lunch of hot cocoa or soup is served at cost during the winter to noon pupils.

An O. S. Y. A. canning course was conducted last summer with Mrs. Rachel C. Hogan as instructor.

The high school is indebted to the Harry Lewis Heald family for providing an annual award at graduation to that boy who has been outstanding in his contribution to the school and to the community.

The kindness of Mrs. Deveda L. Cushing in assuming direction of graduation music last June when we had no music teacher was much appreciated.

Schools continue to be affected in many ways by war conditions. The most serious effect is the acute shortage of teachers. Even though the majority have stuck to their important work of teaching, keen competition among school districts to secure good teachers has made it ever more difficult for smaller schools to fill vacancies. Salaries have increased and will continue to rise as long as present conditions exist. Looking beyond the immediate danger to our children's educational welfare, we must realize that effective education is the bulwark of democracy in the future. When our young people leave our schools to take their places in society we want them to be well equipped to face the competition of modern living. Under these

circumstances we must be financially able to secure and keep the best teachers available.

We have been very fortunate in being able to keep our school operating with reasonable standards of efficiency. Cooperation on the part of school children, parents, teachers and citizens has helped to make the most of what we have and to do the best job possible in the face of many difficulties. All such efforts of those various individuals have been very much appreciated.

Headmaster's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is with pleasure that I present to you my first report as headmaster of Littleton High School. Owing to the fact that I have been headmaster for only a portion of the year the content of this report will, of necessity, include only that part of the year covered by my services.

REGISTRATION

The registration as of the present time shows an increase of 9 pupils more than were in attendance at the same time last year. The senior high school shows an increase of five while the junior high school accounts for four. This increase is due to the fact that only 11 pupils have withdrawn for various reasons as against 22 for the same period last year. The causes of the above withdrawals are:

Entered armed forces	2

THE CURRICULUM AND TIME-TABLE

No change was made in the time-table and only one change was made in the curriculum. Algebra was offered this year to freshmen who showed by tests and past records that they would benefit more by tak-

ing this course in the ninth grade than by taking a year of general mathematics. Those pupils who preferred the course in general mathematics were permitted to pursue that subject. This change permits a pupil to complete the mathematics requirement in three years and thereby elect another subject before graduation.

THE WAR PROGRAM

The war program as previously set up has been continued. This program includes pre-induction courses in machines and practical electricity, aeronautics and physical fitness.

THE TEACHING STAFF

Eight new members were added to the teaching staff to replace a similar number that resigned to accept other positions. Littleton High School was fortunate in that a full staff of qualified teachers was obtained in spite of serious wartime shortages in the teaching profession.

EXTRA-CURRICULA ACTIVITIES

All athletic programs are being carried on but on a somewhat curtailed program as a result of existing conditions. Football, basketball, baseball and winter sports are offered for those who desire to participate. A creditable orchestra and glee club are sponsored under the direction of Mrs. Buswell, the director of music.

GRADUATES OF 1944

Of the 42 graduates of June 1944, 12 have entered the armed forces and 4 have entered post-secondary institutions.

CONCLUSION

In closing, I wish to state that if any progress has been made, it has been possible because of your help and cooperation and that of the teaching staff that has worked diligently and in a spirit of service. I cannot close this report without expressing my appreciation to the members of the school board, to Mrs. Roger Howland, clerk, and the people of Littleton for their cooperation and support since my arrival in Littleton. To the pupils in my school, I add my personal gratitude for the splendid spirit of loyalty that has been in evidence at all times.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
