You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the year ensuing and to make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Art. 4, Chap. 35, in regard to state aid for highways.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day and for the decoration of soldiers' graves.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Old Home day.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to return to the surveyor system for highways.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to reconsider the vote, to place the honor roll tablet in Gordon-Nash library, and place the same on a boulder on the common near H. F. Gordon's or some other suitable place, and raise \$125 additional for the same.
- 8. To see how much the town will vote to raise for the control of the white pine blister rust.
- 9. To transact any other business that may properly come before this meeting.





REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

New Hampton, N. H., Jan. 30, 1920.

To the Members of the Scoool Board and Citizens of New Hampton:

I herewith submit my second annual report in order to review a few of the most important events which have taken place during the past twelve months.

On March 28, 1919, the New Hampshire legislature enacted one of the most progressive educational laws on record. I will call to your attention three of the sections that directly affect New Hampton.

"Each school district in the state shall pay to the state treasurer on or before December first in each year, as its share of the expense incident to state wide supervision of the public schools, a sum equal to two dollars for each child residing in the district who was enrolled in the public schools in the last preceding year, and the selectmen shall annually assess upon the value of the ratable estate of the district a sum sufficient for this purpose."

This sum for New Hampton was \$296 for the past year. This will of course vary from year to year.

"In any district in which the money produced by a tax of five dollars on a thousand dollars of the value of the ratable estate in the district is insufficient to maintain the required elementary and special schools, and to purchase the required text-books, scholars' supplies, flags and appurtenances, the state board shall provide the balance of the money necessary from the money appropriated for that purpose by the provisions of this act." The five dollar tax is not sufficient to meet these conditions in New Hampton. The secondary tuitions, salaries of district officers and repairs over five per cent. are not included in this section.

"A standard school as that term is used in this act is one (1) maintained for at least thirty-six weeks in each year, (2) in a suitable and sanitary building, (3) equipped with approved furniture, books, maps, and other necessary appliances, (4) taught by an approved teacher, (5) directed and supervised by an approved superintendent, (6) with suitable provision for the care of the health and physical welfare of all pupils." By this section we were obliged to increase our school year about five weeks, purchase extra necessary appliances and elect a school physician. Dr. Borland of Meredith was elected to this position at a salary of \$50. Read carefully his report and you will notice that much needs to be done to improve the health of the New Hampton pupils.

Teachers:

Much has been said within the past year concerning the teacher shortage. It seems to me that the district should be informed on this important question. The latest report of the National Education Association states, that "There are 100,000 teaching positions, vacant or filled by teachers below standard in this country, a 20 per cent. decrease of attendance at normal schools and teacher

training schools. There are 650,000 teaching positions in the public schools of the United States; 35,000 vacancies and 65,000 teachers below standard. And the serious part of these facts is that the greatest number of these inefficient teachers are found in the rural schools. The states and towns that are paying the highest salaries have most nearly an adequate supply of teachers.''

From a report of nineteen superintendents in N. H. I have found that 19 per cent. of their teachers left the profession last year, 27 per cent. entered in September, 1919, and although a larger per cent. entered than left there was a 14 per cent. shortage. Thus one can see that New Hampshire was somewhat better off than the country as a whole. However there are from 70 to 80 schools closed now in this state, due to lack of rural teachers.

Six of the superintendents report that lower qualifications have been accepted, nineteen state that teachers' salaries have not increased in proportion to the cost of living, eighteen report that promising young men and women are not attracted to teaching as in the past. The directors of the two Normal Schools state there are only eighty who will graduate this June and there will be a possible one hundred who will return from other states in the fall. Every year four to five hundred teachers leave the profession. Thus N. H. faces a shortage of three hundred teachers before Sept. 1st.

What is the solution?

(1) The towns and state must provide a wage large enough to induce the most promising young men and women to the profession, (2) suitable living conditions

must be provided for our teachers, (3) a suitable building in which to teach, (4) a greater respect for the teaching profession should again reappear. Fifty years ago the ministry and teaching profession were respected by all. To-day I fear this is not true in many sections.

New Hampton has been fortunate the past year in securing an excellent corps of teachers and they should by all means be retained another year if they should so desire. I trust that the citizens will cooperate in every way to make this possible.

The present teachers are:

Village, Alice Goodwin, salary \$650, Gorham Normal Fiske, Emma Butler, salary \$650; Plymouth Normal Old Institution, Olive Hanscom, salary \$600, Plymouth Summer School

Hannaford, Dorothy Davis, salary \$600, Plymouth Summer School

Plaisted, Ruth Stafford, salary \$650, Plymouth Summer School

Winona, Marion Woodman, salary \$600, Plymouth Summer School

Repairs:

Our repairs have been made upon the Fiske school-house. The building was in such a condition it was thought wise to begin at the foundation and do a thorough job. Mr. J. C. Tilton was secured to do this work and the results speak for themselves. The foundation was laid over, hard wood floors were laid, the lighting was changed, the walls and ceiling newly plastered and tinted. New toilets were built adjoining the woodshed and a room

for Manual training and Domestic Arts was finished. A few new seats were purchased and the remaining number taken from the schoolhouse on the Ashland road. With a proper heating system installed this building will be one of the model buildings in this section of the state.

The coming year it will be necessary for us to change the lighting system in the Old Institution and the Hannaford Schools. As to the village school we have a problem for the district to solve. The building is in bad shape. The toilets are far from sanitary and can not be made so without tearing down and making proper vaults and caring for the ventilation. The lighting can never be made satisfactory for the building is so poorly located. A careful survey ought to be made the coming year and recommendations made to the district at its next annual school meeting concerning this serious situation.

Transportation:

Four pupils from the Warren Gordon district have been transported to the Fiske District by Arthur Walker. The Holland pupils have been transported to the Ashland schools by Mr. Holland. The new law states "The district shall furnish transportation to all pupils below the ninth grade who live more than two miles from the school to which they are assigned, or it may with the consent of the pupils' parents provide board for them in some suitable home near the school. Pupils who are to be transported may be required to walk any reasonable part, not exceeding one mile, of the distance from their homes to the school."

School Fair:

Under the supervision and the direction of the New Hampton Grange the pupils were privileged to have one of the most successful school exhibitions of farm products, sewing and canning. The exhibits were of an excellent quality and a large variety was displayed. As formerly the Grange gave prizes in silver. In the new school program school fairs are highly recommended for every rural community in the state.

Medical Inspection:

For many years the educational world has sought methods of improving the mind. Brilliant energy has been used on children with but meager results, due in many cases to physical defects possible to correct. It is impossible to successfully make a mental giant from a physical dwarf. There are five great reasons why medical inspection is essential, (1) as a measure of prevention, (2) the control of communicable diseases, (3) a remedy of incapacitating physical defects, (4) irremediable physical defects, (5) education of the public.

New Hampton has a number of pupils who could do from 25 per cent. to 50 per cent. more efficient work if these physical defects were removed. The school physician has made the following report:
