WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rollinsford in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, One Selectman and Overseer of the Poor for a term of three years, One Road Agent, and Chief of the Fire Department.
- ART. 2 To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 4. To see what percentage, if any, the town will vote to discount all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid on or before September first next.
- ART. 5. To see if the voters of the Town of Rollinsford will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

- ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Hundred Dollars (\$1600.00) for the purpose of extending the water-main on Broadway Extension, so called, in addition to that already laid.
- ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain parcel of wood and pasture land, deeded to the Town by George H. Yeaton, under date of August 16, 1939, and as recorded in Book 490, Page 286, Strafford County Records.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to establish Ordinances, with proper rules, regulations and penalties, governing the operation and parking of automobiles and all other vehicles while on the public highways of the Town.
- ART. 9. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

Appropriations will begin at eleven (11) o'clock sharp.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER AND FOREST FIRE WARDEN

CITIZENS OF ROLLINSFORD:

In presenting this report, it is my endeavor to explain and picture the true plain facts, as I see them, so that you citizens may know exactly the condition of your fire department, apparatus, and equipment, to the end that you may act according to your best judgment in rectifying old equipment and to make fire department appropriations for the future that will satisfy your demands for what you consider adequate fire fighting facilities for the town of Rollinsford. I know of no better way to present these facts to the public than to have them inserted in our town report which is delivered to and read, I assume, by every taxpayer in our town. For fire fighting we use what you give us. If we have what it takes we can fight your fires. If we don't have what it takes, well?

With the above in mind it is a pleasure, as well as duty, for me to present my annual report and therein a true picture of the activities for 1939 of your fire department. Also the real necessary suggestions relative to new equipment for better fire protection. Only by so doing may we look forward to the elimination of our serious fire hazards to the end that our town's citizens may feel secure in their homes, industries, and institutions in so far as the loss from fire is concerned.

You own, and pay to maintain and operate, a fire alarm system. It is a dry cell electric system with a chime whistle located at the plant of the Somersworth Foundry Co. The whistle is blown by steam from the boiler at the foundry. No steam, no whistle. In July

of each year this boiler is closed down from 4 to 8 weeks during which time we have no steam to blow the whistle for fires. During 1939 the steam was off six weeks. We all know that fire strikes without warning; most anything can happen during that time our whistle is dead for the want of steam. For a substitute alarm we used to depend on the ringing of the mill bell by the watchmen at the Salmon Falls mills, but that is out of the picture now for the watchmen at the mills have been eliminated. The mill bell was very poor, at its best, for a fire alarm because it could not be heard at any distance night or day. Our fire whistle is located on a privately owned plant and it must be expected that their boiler must undergo repairs, but that does not help the fire alarm situation and 4 to 8 weeks is much too long to be without any alarm when fire strikes. Don't you think so? The Foundry Co. collects \$50.00 minus 10 per cent yearly for steam to blow the whistle. The whistle and its equipment is owned by the town. It's a great handicap to the fire department and a serious deterrent to town lives and property to be so situated. It needs attention by the town's taxpayers for proper and immediate action. At present, I can only suggest a substitute alarm in the form of a siren, of some suitable model, installed in some convenient place, perhaps, atop the town hall.

At this time I feel it my duty to inform you that your White truck and pump is getting old. It is 18 years old this year. Purchased in 1922 it has served the town very efficiently and economically to date. It is a sad but plain fact that this truck has outlived its usefulness in service for fire purposes. The 350 gallon pump mounted on this truck is dying of old age and must be replaced. The tires and tubes are 13 years old. The motor is beginning to show its age as are numerous other parts. We have new industries located here and bright prospects for more to come. These new industries in many and various ways are bound to create fire risks and hazards with which your old White truck cannot cope.

The 350 gallon pump on this truck is not large enough. It never was. It should be at least of 500 gallons capacity. For the ordinary fire in town we have our hydrants and can depend upon hydrant pressure but for the large fire anywhere and especially in the suburbs where water holes, wells, cisterns, etc. call for a pumper, to wash out a fire, our pump is not equal to the task. Industries locating here and insurance companies, through their inspectors, are very inquisitive regarding the equipment and capabilities of the town fire department. The sooner this old truck is replaced with modern equipment the better for the town and its taxable property. Not only village property but farm property in particular. This is a sad but true picture which needs your immediate serious attention.

The Ford truck, or Engine No. 1, is going strong and a great asset in many ways for fire protection, but it has no high pressure pumper and is 10 years old. Both trucks' equipment is in good shape.

During the depression years, from which our town is now emerging, our tax rate in keeping with that of other cities and towns throughout the state was high, but now with new industrial plants located here and to a large extent employing those who were unfortunately on relief and with the new ownership of much real estate and tenement property which is being extensively renovated and rented to the satisfaction of many new and deserving tenants and citizens, the future prospects of our town look bright. Which means, that we desire that the prospects for better fire protection shall progress with the present and future developments so that these new industries and remodeled houses and tenements may be preserved as taxable property for town revenue. If the above is true, and we know it is, will it not pay to procure the necessary fire fighting apparatus and equipment to keep this property and the revenue therefrom intact. I honestly feel we cannot do it with what we have now. The menace of fire in every home is a challenge to common sense.

Fire permits have been issued in the past with due caution by the fire warden and I feel that the townspeople have, to a great extent, answered my appeal to exercise care in the kindling of fires in the open and then only with the required permit. It still goes, you must have a permit to kindle a fire in the open lawfully. Permits will be issued if the occasion demands, so abide by the law and protect yourself. Grass and brush fires with their resultant damage have been very few for 1939. Keep up the good work. It is the cooperation of all working together to abolish fire hazards and thereby eliminate fires, that will accomplish the much desired results in Rollinsford. Let's cooperate. We can eliminate fires by keeping our chimneys clean. Cut out pouring kerosene into stoves when kindling fires. Dump your hot ashes in a fire-proof container out of doors and away from buildings. Keep matches in a fire-proof container and out of the reach of children. Cut your hay fields in season. Make sure your stove funnels and chimneys are tight and clean. Watch that cigarette butt and lighted match when you discard it, especially in fields, brush and woods.

The increase in firemen's salaries of \$100.00 voted last year was very much appreciated by your firemen and they are thankful for same. The telephone installed in the fire station has proven a real asset. It was installed at a cost of \$2.50 per month or \$30.00 per year.

Town residents owning hand chemical extinguishers are urged to have them recharged at least once each year. They will be recharged, at the fire station, free of all charge. Get in touch with the chief engineer. Keep your hand chemicals from freezing. One hand chemical may save your home if you keep it in proper workable condition. Take care of them. In the Rollinsford section of our town wherein much valuable property is located there is, in many instances, no water handy, for suitable pumper purposes. This can be rectified in localities where there is a brook which may be dammed up,

without much damage to the land owners, and made accessible to the truck for pumping at very little expense to one or more residents of such localities. Why don't you residents on farms in Rollinsford get together, if you have a brook somewhere near that the truck can get to, and see if you can't have a water-hole for fire protection if and when you need it. Do not wait until fire strikes. It's worth a try and may be the means of saving your home.

Our congratulations to our townspeople for the noticeable absence of open lighted candles and other past fire hazards during the last Christmas holiday season. We had no fires during this season.

In conclusion, may I remind you citizens and taxpayers of Rollinsford that your firemen and fire department are wholly dependant upon you regarding their future capabilities to function. If you desire proper and adequate fire protection you will insist upon the necessary apparatus and equipment, including a reliable fire alarm system for 365 days of the year, capable of answering your calls when fire threatens. Your present fire alarm system, apparatus and equipment is not efficient to guarantee you such service. Fore-warned, --should mean to you,--fore-armed.

We extend our thanks to all neighboring fire departments who have in any way assisted us in the past and we stand ready to return the favor when called upon so to do, provided, of course if we are equipped with the necessary facilities to cooperate.

Also our sincere thanks go out to all local citizens who have so willingly cooperated with us to make their fire service efficient. Their continued assistance and cooperation will be appreciated for better fire protection.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Rollinsford:

This is the twelfth annual report which I have the honor to make.

The statistics for the most part are for the school year ending in June, 1939, but the enrollment for the present year is given in the Table of Statistics.

Mrs. Agnes Webber resigned at the close of the school year 1938-39 and Mr. George Cross, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College in the Junior High School Curriculum, a teacher of experience, was secured as Principal. He teaches the Manual Training. To teach the Domestic Arts to the girls, Mrs. Barbara Brownell Clark of Dover and Berwick, Maine, was secured. She started the work well but was released on January first to take a full-time position at Coes-Northwood Academy. Mrs. Martha Thayer Evans of Durham, a graduate of the New Hampshire University has succeeded Mrs. Clark. We have spent a little more than the appropriation made for the Arts Courses, but the District has really saved money and profited by the work of the boys because they have made screens for the basement windows, a book case for one of the class rooms, also a screen door for the general supply room. Some of the money will be returned when projects are paid for. For any project taking more than two board feet of lumber must be paid for by the pupil. Both boys and girls have shown a great deal of interest in their work. About the same amount of money will be necessary for the next year as equipment must be purchased for the cooking classes.

The same testing program which has been used for for two years is being continued. The Metropolitan

Achievement Tests are given the last week in January to all grades above the third. A special reading test is given to the third grade at the same time. In June the Standard Graduation Tests are used. The Otis Group Intelligence Tests are used in the fall term and the Detroit First Grade Intelligence Tests are given to those entering the first grade.

Nine of the thirteen graduates of the 8th grade in 1939 entered high school in September. The graduation was made a class day and the diplomas awarded in the afternoon of the last day. This type of graduation was asked for by the class and a similar type is planned for this year.

The winners of the William Martel Post of the American Legion awards were Ernest Royal and Jennie Krupski.

As a memorial the Class of 1939 gave the school a year's subscription to the National Geographic Magazine.

The hot soup provided last year from money given by the Red Cross, supplemented by the amount received from those pupils who purchased the soup, enabled Mrs. Foxlow to continue through the cold weather. This year the same plan is continued, Mrs. Senechal making the soup. We are also making use of Surplus Products, provided from government surpluses.

Miss Margaret Thomas continues to be employed by the teachers to supervise the lunch and the "noon hour".

The Adult School taught by Miss Thomas under WPA auspices is "going strong". This year a class of young girls has been added and are doing work in Arts and Crafts. Her total enrollment is twenty-two.

Mrs. Deborah Benedict continues as school nurse and her report follows mine.

This year the school is issuing periodically a little school paper called School News. Its preparation means a lot of hard work, but it is valuable work which the public seems to appreciate.

Instead of attending the State Teachers' meeting in Keene, held in October, the teachers visited schools in Concord, N. H. They gave good reports and profited from the visits.

The School Board have given freely of time and effort to help the teachers carry on good schools. Their support is appreciated by all.
