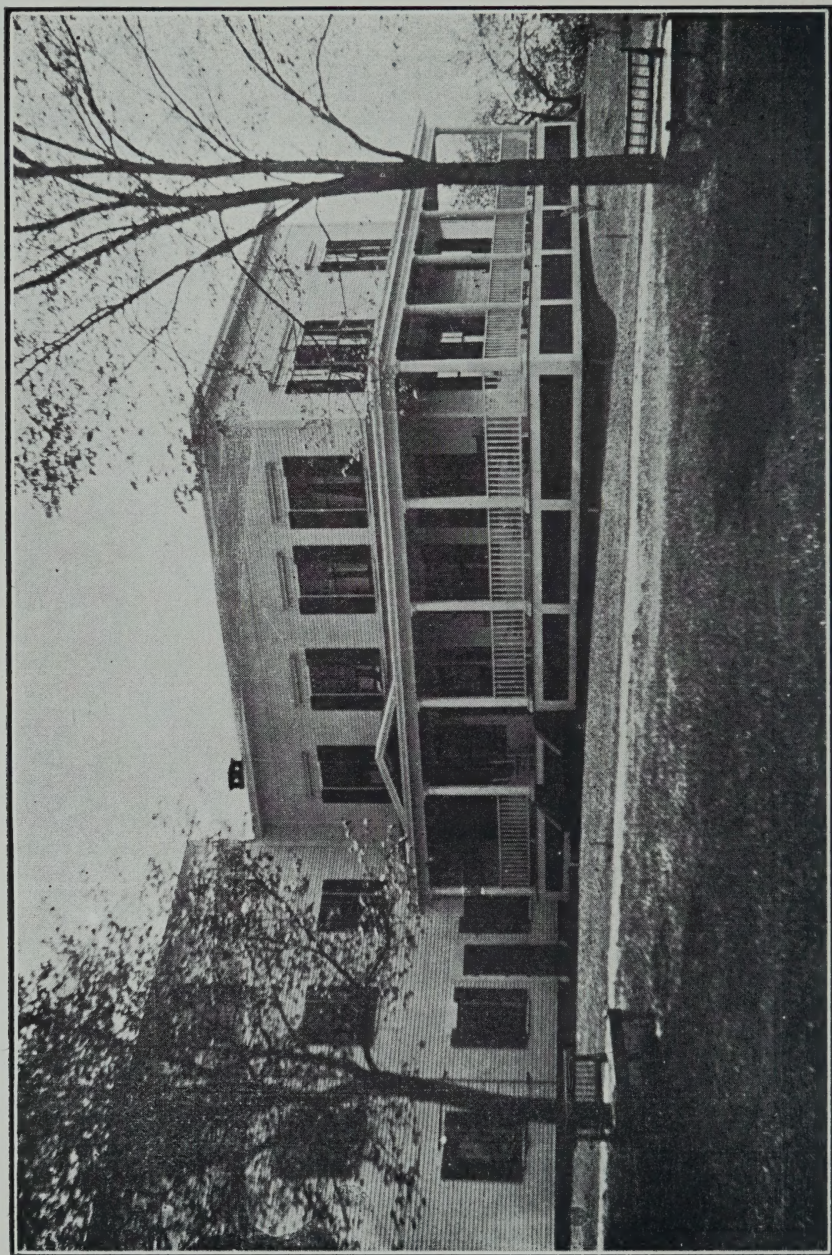

## Commissioners' Report

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*To the Citizens of Sullivan County:*

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their annual report for the year ending December 31, 1916, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Jailer, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician and Auditors for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1916.

Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam continue in charge as superintendent and matron with the same good results as for the past ten years.

The convention of 1915 authorized the issue of County Bonds to the amount of twenty thousand dollars, to take up a like sum of outstanding notes bearing interest at five per cent.

The bonds were issued on Jan. 1, 1916, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent and one thousand dollars payable each year, beginning with Jan. 1, 1917.

We wish to thank the selectmen and overseers of the poor, in the towns, for their assistance in caring for the



poor, and to all others who have aided us in our duties,  
we extend our hearty thanks.

They are not suitable cases for a general hospital, and in fact there is no other place in the County where they could receive care, even though they were not dependent.

Mr. and Mrs. Putnam and their helpers have always been very faithful and deserve much credit for the way they care for those who come under their attention.

## Solicitor's Report

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*To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:*

Gentlemen:—There is nothing of an exceptional character to report. There have been disposed of in the superior court eleven cases of violation of the liquor laws, several cases of breaking and entering where the offences took place in Claremont over a year ago, five cases of larceny, and one case of statutory rape. Most of the smaller offences have been disposed of in the municipal courts.

The non-support act of 1913 is inadequate. If a derelict husband is convicted and is unable to pay the fine, the worst that can happen to him is to go to the county farm or county jail. Both these institutions are attractive and well managed places,—for this kind of a prisoner too attractive. For such they make a desirable winter resort. A bill is pending in the general court to make the state prison the place of confinement in these cases. The idea is to put some teeth into this law.
