

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmot in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wilmot on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Highways.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Memorial Day.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and negotiate the extension or renewal of the notes securing such loans, when it is necessary.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$475.11, the State to contribute \$1,900.46 for Town Road Aid on Class V Highways.

or

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$475.00, the State to contribute \$1,000.00 for State Aid Construction on the Fourth New Hampshire Turnpike.

8. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$19.00 to purchase fire fighting

tools on a fifty-fifty basis with the State Forestry Department.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

10. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for hire of log-sites.

12. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in co-operation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the selectmen.

13. To see what action the Town will take on acceptance of offer by Luvia M. Carr of tract of land in Wilmot Flat called the Collins lot.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The increase in circulation of books as recorded in the Library statistics for 1939 is proof that our Public library is filling a definite place in the lives of our citizens.

At the Center the village numbers forty-six families. Of these, forty-one use the Public library. At North Wilmot only one family fails to do so. On Kearsarge Mountain the residents have access to books through the Mountain school where every child reads copiously. Wilmot Flat yearly shows growing appreciation of the pleasant reading room in the Grange hall building where Mrs. Ina Rayno is now in charge.

Once more the Center and Mountain schools vie for honors in reading, the Center pupils winning 505 points and the Mountain pupils 481. Though the Center children have read many other books at home it is estimated that the record for the highest reading average per pupil belongs to the Mountain school.

Our work has been made more interesting and our supply of books augmented by regular visits from the State Library Commission bookmobile. In addition to this service the Commission has granted us State aid in the form of fourteen valuable books. Among these are two of the finest nature books, Birds of America and The Garden Encyclopedia.

The Library extends all-year service to our resident families, special consideration to the three schools of the town during the school year and vacation privileges to our summer residents. The librarian often wishes she might share with the taxpayers of the town the many expressions of surprise and appreciation that so small a town should have such an excellent Public library. To the State Library Commission, the school teachers and the citizens who constantly lend enthusiasm to our efforts in behalf of education and good reading, the Library trustees and librarian would say: "Thank you."

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

The estimate of the amount required for Support of Schools is \$92.00 less than last year. Statutory Requirements, however, are \$336.50 more, caused by an increase of \$375.00 in estimated cost of high school tuition, with savings in other items amounting to \$38.50. Thus the total budget is \$244.50 more than last year with no items increased except high school tuition and flags.

But you will note that income estimated is \$45.52 less than last year with a larger estimated cash balance but a shrinkage in State Aid of over \$170.00—thus the total tax called for is \$290.02 more than last year.

The toilets at the Center School have been in a very poor condition for some time. Improving conditions there can no longer be delayed. An estimate of the cost will be ready to present at the annual meeting.

Report of School Nurse

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is my pleasure to present to you a report of the School Health Program from Jan. 1, 1939, to Jan. 1, 1940.

Sixty-three children were inspected. Two pupils were found with defective vision. One was taken to Dr. Shaw in Franklin and glasses were prescribed. This was financed by the Eye Conservation Fund through the State Department of Public Welfare.

Four children were taken to Bristol for dental work. The work done on three of these children was financed by the New London Post of the American Legion.

One child was taken to a physician for treatment of an arm injury. One child was taken to a New London physician several times for treatment.

The children were weighed and measured twice during the year. Frequent health inspections were made and health talks given several times during the year.

Arrangements were made for one child to be treated at the Orthopedic Clinic in Manchester.

The teachers are very cooperative and I feel the health program is improving.

The morning session will be from 8:45 to 12:00 and the afternoon session from 1:00 until 3:30. Teachers should use the time from 3:30 until 4:00 for individual help and for disciplinary cases. All others should be sent home.

Pupils in the first and second grade may be dismissed at recess both morning and afternoon.

Teachers are expected to be on duty, either in the building or on the playground, from 8:15 to 4:00.
