At 12:30 o'clock P. M., the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Third. To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

Fourth. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Fifth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for town officers' salaries.

Sixth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for town officers' expenses.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$375.00 for election and registration.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of municipal court.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for expense of town hall and other town buildings.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for police department expense.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the forest fire department.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$375.00 for the Volunteer Fire department.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 for the Health department, including Vital Statistics.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 for maintenance of summer roads, \$1,500.00 for winter roads, \$300.00 for bridges and culverts, \$500.00 for tarring maintenance, and \$200.00 for repairs to tractor.

To the Citizens of Auburn:

We wish to call attention to the fact that, due to the critical paper shortage, and in compliance with the printer's request that we curtail our report wherever possible, we have eliminated the resident and non-resident tax lists from this report. For the information of those citizens who may not be aware of the fact, we wish to state that a complete inventory of all property assessed is on record with the Selectmen and Town Clerk, either of which record is always available for inspection.

We would also like to call attention to the final outstanding note payment of \$1,200.00 during the past fiscal year, making a total payment of \$4,200.00 in outstanding notes, together with \$506.09 in back interest since 1940 when these notes were transferred from 5 and 6% to a temporary basis at 1½%, and systematically retired. Along with the above payments, a careful check on appropriations and expenditures has afforded a steady decrease in the tax rate from \$3.60 in 1940 to \$3.00 in 1942 and 1943, and this year the balance sheet again shows a net surplus of a little over \$2,000.00, which is a material help on the following year's tax rate.

FOREST FIRE DEPARTMENT

Crises like the present test the quality and sincerity of everyone's patriotism and citizenship. The times make such unavoidable demands for universal cooperation in the many lines of essential regular and emergency public endeavor that the response given may well be assumed to be the real measure of one's love of country and his appreciation of the opportunities it offers. Ranking high in the list of public endeavor is the protection of our forests from fire. It calls for full and generous cooperation by each of us. Fire statistics indicate that better than 98 per cent of all fires in New Hampshire are man-caused. If human carelessness could be eliminated from the problem, the number of fires would drop to a mere minimum of less than 2 per cent of present figures and fire costs and losses would reduce in proportion. While this goal will not be achieved because of the perversity of human nature, the record can be vastly improved through individual discipline, alertness and cooperation.

Discipline calls for personal restraint from following unrestricted natural impulses to do as one pleases with regard to fire; alertness in cautioning others against imprudent and illegal burning and in promptly reporting fires to the local forest fire warden; cooperation in complying with laws, rules, and regulations governing the kindling and care of fires, smoking, safety of mechanical units using fire in and near woodlands and assisting the local warden in extinguishing such fires as may occur.

The possibilities of disastrous and expensive woods fires are constantly becoming more real. The hurricane felled an estimated one and one-half billion board feet of standing timber, much of which was never cleaned up. To this hazard

has been and is being added extensive areas of slash from additional hundreds of millions cut to produce vitally needed wood for war effort. With the stage so set, greater caution is increasingly necessary. It will pay substantial dividends in unburned forest areas and the saving of unnecessary fire expense.

The year 1943 was an extremely fortunate one because of favorable weather conditions. Many towns had no fires, some had minor fires while a few had expensive ones. The public controls the answer to the 1944 and future years' fire records. If the public is careful and cooperative the record will be good.

Your town warden is, perhaps, more perplexed and anxious during these war years than ever before because of increased forest fire hazards and diminishing supplies of available man-power. He looks directly to you to aid him. Will you? You can aid him most effectively by always securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit requirements; by being patient when he advises of departmental restrictions on permit burning or that he deems it unsafe to burn; and by giving him the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when he needs your help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.

ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

The greatest change in the educational program in Auburn resulted from the teacher turnover.

Miss Evelyn Conway was engaged as primary teacher at the Village school. Miss Conway had previously taught in several New Hampshire towns successfully.

Miss Adele Pinas was a successful teacher for several years in Northern New Hampshire. She was elected to the upper grade position in the Village School.

In December Miss Mary Valeska was released to take a position nearer home. Mrs. Eileen Harris was able to replace her.

The town was fortunate in a period of teacher shortage to be able to secure the services of experienced teachers for all vacancies.

The pupils have the advantage of having experienced teachers in all the schools and the resulting disruption is considerably less when experienced teachers can be engaged.

The present policy of adding as rapidly as possible new basal texts that offer definite advantages over the older books is and will continue to pay dividends in increased educational advancement of the pupils of Auburn schools. The reading system has been extended to include grade 4 and the type of material offered is such that the pupils gain valuable vicarious experience as well as gaining in reading ability.

The schools have continued to make their contribution to the war effort. Stamps are sold regularly in all schools. In addition to the contribution such a regular sale makes to the war effort it also builds a habit of regular savings which is of enduring value.

The physical school plant is in a good state of repairs. It seems advisable to think of the possibility of interior painting at the Village School. The walls have dried sufficiently now so that painting will be permanent and the walls are beginning to need some kind of treatment. This year the heating system at Severance School began to cause trouble. An up-

ward extension of the chimney to provide more adequate draft may be the solution.

BUDGET

The proposed budget shows an overall increase of less than \$100.00. Increases in some items are compensated by decreases in others. With the special appropriation suggested by the school board the overall increase would be \$300. The increase in estimated income of slightly over \$1500, however, more than counter-balances the increase so that the actual effect on the tax levy is a net decrease of approximately \$1200 including the special appropriation.

The increased income and the estimated \$125.00 for insurance are of interest. The increased amount of state aid indicated in the budget accounts for \$1000 of the increased income. Although it shows as \$520, it is actually a \$1000 for the increase also occurred in 1943-33 so that it is represented as part of the large amount of cash on hand. The other \$500 accrued mainly through a decrease in the high school enrollment. The estimated expenditure in insurance is a policy of equalizing insurance payments so that policies will be paid annually rather than once in three years. By carrying three small policies on the buildings instead of one large one the payments for insurance can be thus spread over a three-year period and the insurance item in the budget will be annually the same rather than quite high once in three years.

CONCLUSION

The citizens of Auburn have reason to be proud of the boys and girls who are pupils in their schools. They are working well under the guidance of their teachers and are achieving worthwhile results. They are living the lives of good school citizens and are acquiring much more than mere book knowledge.

School board, teachers, parents and pupils are seemingly motivated by the same desire—to accomplish all that is possible for the advancement of each and every pupil.

With groups who are so motivated, much is and can be accomplished and I appreciate the opportunity to work cooperatively with all to accomplish such a worthwhile objective.
