LACONIA, N. H., Feb. 23, 1887.

The County Convention assembled at the County House, agreeably to the call of the County Commissioners, the following gentlemen being present: H. F. Rublee, Gust A. Copp, Gilford; John Webster, Geo. F. Sanborn, Meredith; Sylvester J. Lamprey, Laconia; Geo. L. Mason, Centre Harbor; J. J. Burleigh, Sanbornton. Mr. Rublee, of Gilford, was chosen chairman, and Mr. Sanborn, of Meredith, clerk. On motion of Mr. Lamprey, of Laconia, it was voted to authorize the County Commissioners to purchase a tract of land containing ten acres adjoining land belonging to the County farm, for a sum not to exceed \$1,750.00. On motion of Mr. Sanborn, of Meredith, voted to adjourn.

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

I herewith submit my annual report:

During the year past seventeen indictments have been found by the Grand Jury. Three persons have been sentenced to state prison and are now serving their term of sentence.

At the March term, twelve indictments were found for the violation of the liquor law, two of which were nol prossed by direction and under the authority of the Attorney General. The other parties indicted pleaded guilty and each paid a fine of fifty dollars and cost.

At the present time no case is pending on the State docket, and I leave the office with no old business for my successor. There are no cases on the civil docket in which the County is interested as a party.

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

Gentlemen :—The healthy location of the Farm, together with the perfect arrangement of the house in way of ventilation, drainage, etc., have not only added to the pleasure, comfort, and convenience of all the occupants, but also limited the amount of sickness so that during my term of service there has been comparatively little serious illness. In all cases of sickness they have carried out all my wishes in a careful, thorough, and pains-taking manner, so that the patients, although the subjects of charity, could not have been better cared for had they been in their own homes and surrounded by near relatives.
