To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, County of Hillsborough, and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town and State Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Daniels Academy Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, March 12th, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects and any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

- 1. To choose all Town Officers for ensuing year.
- 2. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges for ensuing year.
- 3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating to same.
- 4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on property taxes or take any action relative thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to allow Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing same.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day, or take any action relative thereto.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Cemeteries or take any action regarding same.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of Highways or take any action regarding same.
- 13. To see if the Town will authorize selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 14. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Clinic.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to repair road near Pierce mill or take any action relative thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following legacies: \$100 from estate of Eldorus C. Shattuck for perpetual care of Charles D. Shattuck Lot in Pinegrove Cemetery; \$100 from Joseph B. Swett and Bertha A. Patenaude Heirs for perpetual care of Swett-Patenaude Lot in Pinegrove Cemetery.

- 1. Painting the interior at Grammar and Primary buildings under a Civil Works Appropriation project. Federal funds paid for the labor and the district for materials.
- 2. Wax surfacing of the floor of Grammar main room. This is much superior to the oil treatment, but any surface is very hard to keep clean on account of the soft coal and gravel that is inevitably tracked in from the yard.
- 3. Playground equipment has been put into good condition and added to in a small degree.

#### NEEDS

- 1. Repairs to side porch at Daniels Academy Building.
  Probably this and other repairs to the building such as the front porch should be considered in one project.
- 2. Painting: The exterior of the Primary building has not been painted for some years. Perhaps this can be done under a project

similar to the CWA of last year. However, this item is not as pressing as the items which follow.

- 3. Ventilation: None of the schoolrooms has a positive fully working ventilating system at present. This is distinctly a health proposition and should be provided for as such.
- 4. Heating at the Primary Building: This is closely related to the matter of ventilation mentioned above and they should be considered together.
- 5. Water: Conditions are bad at the Primary Building where the only supply is that brought in buckets or cans. Such a situation makes for a rather unpalatable drinking supply and is not adequate for washing and cleaning purposes. But most of all, it makes it impossible to have a flush toilet system which leads to the next item.
- 6. Toilets: This matter must be attended to without delay as the chemical toilet outfit installed at the Primary Building in 1924-1925 by the Selectmen in accordance with the vote of the district meeting which raised \$250 for the purpose has lasted about as long as any such outfit is supposed to last and must be renewed or replaced by some other system. A flush outfit in much to be preferred to any other and can be readily installed if a water supply is made available. Some action is imperative at this March meeting.

#### Conclusion

Even though a school plant is up-to-date in every respect and equipment complete and ample, yet in the final analysis the most important factor is the teacher as the following quotation by Mr. Joy Elmer Morgan, editor of the Journal of the National Education Association, shows: "The teacher is a prophet. She lays the foundations of tomorrow. The teacher is an artist. She works with the precious clay of unfolding personality. The teacher is a friend. Her heart responds to the faith and devotion of her students. The teacher is a citizen. She is selected and licensed for the improvement of society. The teacher is an interpreter. Out of her maturer and wider life she seeks to guide the young. The teacher is a builder. She works with the higher and finer values of civilization. The teacher is a culture-bearer. She leads the way toward worthier tastes, saner attitudes, more gracious manners, higher intelligence. The teacher is a planner. She sees the young lives before her as a part of a great system which shall grow stronger

in the light of truth. The teacher is a pioneer. She is always attempting the impossible and winning out. The teacher is a reformer. She seeks to remove the handicaps that weaken and destroy life. The teacher is a believer. She has abiding faith in the improvability of the race."

## Report of School Nurse

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools, Brookline, N. H.:

I herewith submit my third annual report of health work in the Brookline schools, it being the fifteenth year of this work.

The annual medical inspection was made in October by Dr. Abbott Winograd of Nashua, the nurse assisting. The School Physician's report gives a tabulated record of the defects found. Each year there is a smaller number of defects reported which shows that progress is being made in building up the health of our school children. It will be noticed that the number of deformities is unusually high. Nearly all of these children have a slight foot defect and if properly cared for now will avoid a more serious difficulty in the future.

Through the generous donations of various organizations and cooperation of parents a dental clinic was held in May as usual. Thirty-eight children received necessary corrections which is more than we have been able to accomplish before. I hope that the work can be carried on in the same manner again this year as the teeth show a marked improvement. Through a Child Health Recovery fund three had necessary dental corrections made at the Milford Dental Clinic this winter.

At present all visual defects have been taken care of. Five children had necessary corrections made in Nashua by Dr. Babbitt or Dr. Nutter which was made possible through the Department of Public Works and Child Health Recovery fund.

Eight children were vaccinated at the pre-school clinic in June. This leaves only two unvaccinated pupils in school who have not proper excuses and these are to be done in the spring.

The remainder of the cod liver oil allotment has been given out to those needing it. At present there is none available.

Milk is being furnished from a Federal fund to many undernourished children. Others bring it from home each day which is a better and more beneficial lunch than sweets. Teachers have been very cooperative in preparing a hot drink on cold days for the children who bring their lunches. It would be much better if it were possible for them to have it every day. Hearing tests were made with the audiometer last spring. This is a mechanical device which tests a group of children at one time. Only one child was found to have defective hearing.

Six children were taken to the County Hospital for nose and throat corrections.

The second toxoid clinic was held in May at which twenty-five school and pre-school children were immunized against diphtheria.

Several pupils were excluded from school with whooping cough during the fall, and one pupil for chicken-pox. As the result of good cooperation from the parents these diseases did not become epidemic.

Sixty-two school room visits were made during the year and many home visits for instructive and corrective work.

In closing I wish to thank the school officials, teachers, and parents for the splendid cooperation I have received this year.
