— 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 to be used by the Board of Trade for advertising and to raise and appropriate money for same.

— 7. To re-phrase the affirmative vote taken on Article No. 10 at the March 10th, 1959 regular meeting of the Township of Carroll, Carroll, N. H., held at the Town Hall to read as, to wit:

To see if the Town of Carroll will vote to replace the 1½ inch water line between the residence of Paul Lemieux and the Cherry Mountain Water Line, with a 6 inch feeder line and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for this purpose.

To this amount of \$10,000 shall be added the balance unexpended from the funds for relocation of the Route 3 water line of \$2,518.10.

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The unusually heavy rains last fall caused costly damage to the road leading to the Little River Dam as well as completely filling the reservoir with rocks and gravel.

The concrete wings on the present dam are not high enough to divert the high waters we can expect each year at Little River.

The run-off of high Water is also slowed by converging tributaries just above the dam. It would be well to close off these tributaries by bulldozing to make one main stream which would flow straight toward the face of the dam rather than toward the wing.

Our income from water rents is sufficient for normal maintenance. The cost of any extensive repairs or construction would have to be met by money raised by the Town.

It is worthy of discussion whether the Water Board and Road Agent should have a tractor with blade, shovel and back-hoe attachments. This equipment would pay for itself if we were called upon to lay new lines as well as being necessary many times to maintain the present system. It is very expensive and often difficult to hire this equipment when it is needed.

The Water Board thanks Mr. and Mrs. Michael J. Thompson for their donation of 1650 yards of gravel used in rebuilding the road and covering pipe at Little River Dam.

In the Spring, we had a rather serious outbreak of fungus in the school which responded well to treatment, but now we are again beginning to see it and have embarked on a new course of treatment and hope to follow it through more closely.

In May, a Well Child Conference was held for preschool children. Sixteen children attended, 11 vaccinations were done, 17 Patch Tests given, 5 Polio injections, and 6 Triple Toxoid Boosters.

In June and July, an adult Polio Clinic was held, sponsored by the local P. T. A. Twenty-seven injections, 27 second injections and 1 third injection were administered.

In December, a Polio Clinic was held at the school and 43 Immunizations given: 1 first injection, 2 third injections, and 40 fourth injections.

Several children have taken advantage of the Pediatric Clinics in Littleton sponsored by the New Hampshire State Department of Health, and also the Orthopedic Clinics in Berlin.

It has been a pleasure to work with the Citizens of Carroll, and at this time I would like to thank them for their cooperation, and I sincerely hope they will call on me if I can be of any service to them.

# School Board Report

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To the Citizens of the Town of Carroll:

The annual report of the School Board of the School District of Carroll is duly submitted.

We have been very happy in the way our school has been functioning this year.

We have been very fortunate in being able to have Mrs. Lucille Dorr of Whitefield as substitute music teacher. Mrs. Dorr is getting along very well with the children and is very cooperative with the teachers. We were sorry to lose Mrs. Ruth Wentworth, music supervisor, who resigned due to ill health.

We have improved the appearance of the school a great deal. There are new tile floors in both the elementary classrooms, and in all the classrooms upstairs. We have also purchased new light fixtures for all classrooms and halls. The light fixtures that were replaced were given to the town for the new fire house. The classroom for Grades IV-VI has been newly painted, and new window shades have been added. We have purchased new teacher desks and chairs for both elementary classrooms. We have ordered a new hopper for the boiler. The hallway was painted again this year. A new fire alarm system has been installed.

Skiing lessons at the Roland Peabody Slope have been made available again to the children where they receive expert instruction. We wish to express our appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Donald Marshall for their efforts in promoting the ski program. As Mr. and Mrs. Marshall are unable to continue with this program, Mrs. Mary Monahan has kindly taken over the responsibility for which we express our thanks.

We wish to thank Mr. Bernard Bouchard of Bethlehem for transporting the children to the Roland Peabody Slope for their ski lessons each Wednesday.

We regret very much losing our Helping Teacher, Miss Blanche Witherell, who resigned her position due to ill health.

We wish to thank Mrs. Anna Evans for her efforts as school nurse of the Twin Mountain school for the past year. Mrs. Evans resigned her position as school nurse, effective January 12, 1960, as time did not permit her to carry on this extra duty. Dr. William Wilson, school physician, has examined every pupil in the school this year. We appreciate his interest in the pupils of our school.

We want to express our appreciation to the Parent-Teacher Association and the citizens who worked toward the improvement of our school. The Parent-Teacher Association is sponsoring square dancing two nights a month for the children in Grades IV through Grade VIII. Mrs. Marguerite Ayling is in charge. It is hoped that Mr. Tapply, square dancing instructor, will be able to join us occasionally.

We wish to express our appreciation to Mrs. Mary Young, Principal, Mrs. Eileen Worsley, and Mrs. Frances Hutchinson for their efforts and cooperation in making our school program successful.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to Mr. Harold Truell, Superintendent of Schools, for his continued interest, guidance, and cooperation.

We extend a cordial invitation to all parents and townspeople to visit the school at any time.

# Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of the Town of Carroll:

My seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools in the Town of Carroll is submitted herewith.

Supervisory Union No. 31

The Supervisory Union No. 31 is composed of the towns of Carroll, Lancaster, and Whitefield. The duties of the Union, as a whole, are to select the superintendent of schools, special teachers, supervisors and the Union secretary. The school nurse is engaged separately by the individual towns. The superintendent's salary for the school year 1958-1959 was apportioned as follows: Carroll 5.4%, Lancaster 29.6%, Whitefield 16.5% and the State share 48.5%. The salary of the elementary supervisor, secretary, and office expenses of the Union for the school year 1958-1959 were apportioned as follows: Carroll 10.5%, Lancaster 57.5% and Whitefield 32%. These percentages are based on two factors having equal weight as follows: (1) Average Daily Membership of District, and (2) District Valuations (adjusted). The following chart might be of interest to show you how these percentages are derived:

The basis for the apportionment shall be one-half on the average membership for the previous school year and one-



half on the equalized valuation as determined by the State Tax Commission every odd numbered year on the basis of data from the preceding year.

Due to ill health Miss Blanche Witherell, helping teacher- was unable to continue her duties in the Supervisory Union No. 31 for the school year 1959-1960. During the last seven years, Miss Witherell served as an Elementary Supervisor and Curriculum Coordinator in the Carroll, Lancaster, and Whitefield school system. The work Miss Witherell did during her stay here was outstanding. Special programs of educational merit were sponsored in the schools during her period of service.

#### **School Personnel**

The Carroll School District received the resignation of Mrs. Gardner Wentworth as teacher of Music, effective September 1, 1959. Mrs. Wentworth's health during the summer was such that it necessitated this action. Mrs. Lucille Dorr, Whitefield, New Hampshire, was employed as substitute to teach Music until a regular teacher of Music can be found. As the Music Supervisor teaches only one-half day each week in the Carroll School and, whereas the requirements for a Music Supervisor is similar to that of other public school teachers, it has been very difficult to find a Music Supervisor to fill this position up to this time. Mrs. Dorr is doing very well during this period of change.

The assignment of teachers for the school year 1959-1960 is as follows: Mrs. Frances Hutchinson, teacher of Grades I-III, Mrs. Eileen Worsley, teacher of Grades IV-VI, and Mrs. Mary Young, teacher of Grades VII-VIII and Principal of the entire school. Mrs. Lucille Dorr is teaching Music until a substitute for Mrs. Wentworth can be found.

#### **Enrollment**

The following table of present and future enrollments will show, to some degree, what the elementary attendance for the Twin Mountain School may be for the next five years. Whereas, we may expect a more or less constant enrollment in our elementary grades, we must be cognizant of the fact that the high school enrollments varies continually.

According to the census table presented above, it appears that the Carroll School District will have approximately sixteen pupils enroll in Grade I as of September 1, 1960, whereas, only four enrolled in Grade I as of September 1, 1959. A further study shows, that with this exception, the enrollment in Grade I for future years remains approximately the same as in the past. Of course, this can change rapidly according to migration of families. At the present time there are twenty-nine pupils enrolled in Grades I-III; twenty-three pupils enrolled in Grades IV-VI, and ten pupils enrolled in Grades VII-VIII. During the school year 1960-1961 according to all figures available, there will be twenty-six pupils enrolled in Grades I-III, twenty-six pupils enrolled in Grades IV-VI, and fourteen pupils enrolled in Grades VII-VIII, making an anticipated enrollment of sixty-six pupils in Grades I-VIII for the school year 1960-1961 against a present enrollment of fifty-four pupils for the school year 1959-1960. From present information it would appear that the enrollment in Grades I-VIII for the school year 1960-1961 will be greater than it has been in these grades for several years.

#### **High School**

Since the Carroll School District voted to tuition all students attending Grades IX-XII at a special School District meeting held June 17, 1958, the majority of High School students have attended the Littleton High School. At the present time there are eighteen students attending Littleton High School, one student attending Whitefield High School, one student attending Berlin High School, and one student attending the Lincoln High School. The tuition rate to be paid at these schools for the school year 1959-1960 is as follows:

Littleton \$360.00 per pupil, Whitefield \$325.00 per pupil, Berlin \$360.00 per pupil, and Lincoln \$403.90 per pupil. For the school year 1960-1961 the anticipated tuition rate is as follows: Littleton \$380.00 per pupil, Whitefield \$325.00 per pupil, Berlin \$380.00 per pupil, and the Lincoln tuition rate has not been established for the school year 1960-1961 at the time of this writing.

### Insurance

Your School Board, in conjunction with the Lancaster and Whitefield School Boards, once again offered to all pupils in those towns the opportunity of participating in a Special School Child Accident Policy for \$2.00 per year. This amount is an increase of \$.50 over last year's cost due to the increased number of accidents that are accruing each year in the schools nationwide. This is the seventh year that the pupils attending the Carroll schools have had this opportunity. Previous to this time the expense of an accident was borne directly by the parent.

This insurance has been changed from the Peerless Insurance Company to Mutual of Omaha as the cost is not as great for this type of insurance with the latter company. This year it is possible for a student to obtain additional year-around coverage at a cost of \$10.00 per year.

This policy became effective September 15, 1959 and will continue until September 15, 1960. Fifty out of fifty-eight pupils and teachers took advantage of this opportunity. This shows that approximately eighty-six percent of the entire student body participated in this project.

### State Wards, Handicapped and Foster Children

By law, handicapped children, who are unable to attend school, have the privilege of being taught at home for a period of not less than two hours per week. It is the responsibility of a school district to pay the tuition of its foster children and state wards to the school district in which they are residing. For the school year 1960-1961 it is expected that the tuition for foster children and State wards will be at the rate of \$262.00 per elementary pupil and \$399.00 per high school student. One cannot tell how much the expense for this item might be. There could be a greater demand for this service than we now anticipate. Referring to the budget for 1960-61, it would be noted that a sum of \$300.00 has been requested for this purpose.

If you have a child who is handicapped and cannot attend school, feel free to contact the office of the Superintendent of School as he may be in a position to give assistance.

### **School Milk Program**

At the present time the Milk Program, which was begun during the school year 1957-1958, is still being continued. Pupils are permitted to purchase milk in one-half pint bottles at a cost of three cents each. As the cost of milk is six cents per bottle, the Federal Government pays the other three cents. However, effective March 1, 1960, the Federal Government is paying only two and one-half cents per one-half pint bottle of milk. This means that it will be necessary for the children to pay a little more for their milk, or perhaps some civic organization, such as the Parent-Teacher Association, would assist in this project. Napkins and straws are already being donated to the program. This program permits all pupils to enjoy the opportunity of purchasing milk at a very reasonable cost. During the school year 1958-1959, there were 8,154 bottles of milk purchased by the pupils at the Twin Mountain School. It is hoped that all pupils will participate in this program.

### **Repairs**

Kindly refer to the report of the School Board for information relative to the repairs that were made during this past year. At the present time your school building is in excellent condition.

### **National Defense Education Act**

Congress passed the National Defense Education Act to become effective July 1, 1958, giving aid to all educational institutions in the fields of science, foreign languages, and mathematics. As many legal questions had to be answered, it was impossible for the New Hampshire schools to receive any aid until the school year 1959-1960. At that time, the allotment for the Carroll Public School was \$89.76 for the school year 1958-1959 and \$95.37 for the school year 1959-1960, making a total of \$185.13 for these two years. According to the Act, if the School District of Carroll wishes to receive this aid, the amount of \$89.76 allotted for the school year 1958-1959 must be spent by June 30, 1960. The amount which has been allotted for the school year 1959-1960 of \$95.37 may be used during the school year 1959-1960 or the school year 1960-1961.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Twin Mountain Parent-Teacher Association who have worked very hard during the past school year to help the school program. A good active Parent-Teacher Association is an asset in any school. The purpose of this organization is to bring the home and the school in a closer relationship.

Our appreciation also goes to Mrs. Anna Evans, School

Nurse, for what she has done during this past year for the school children. We also wish to thank Dr. William W. Wilson, School Physician, for his cooperation and service given during this past year.

Our appreciation goes to the members of the Twin Mountain School Faculty for the fine work which it has done during the past school year. It is the desire of the members of the faculty to give of their best to the pupils under their supervision. Parents, having questions concerning their children's progress, should not hesitate to contact these teachers. Our thanks goes to Mr. Edward Jordan, School Custodian, for the fine work which he is doing. The teaching faculty appreciates having a clean, wholesome school building in which to work.

May we also take this opportunity to thank the bus drivers, Mr. Michel Perry and Mr. Wellington Boynton, for their fine work and interest in getting the bus pupils to school safely.

The cooperation of the school personnel, including the School Board, makes for better public relations as well as increasing the efficiency of the school staff. The Carroll School Board endeavors to give to the citizens of the town of Carroll the best educational opportunities possible for its children. We express our sincere appreciation to each of its members for maintaining such a fine atmosphere in which to work.

We suggest to the citizens of the town that they make an effort to visit the Carroll school as often as possible.

# Principal's Report

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Carroll, New Hampshire  
January 1, 1960

## To the Citizens of the Carroll School District:

I would like at this time to submit my annual report of the activities of the Twin Mountain School.

It is encouraging to observe the progress of the improvement in the children's ability to master their subject matter. The children are reading well and are increasing their mastery of the techniques involved. Special emphasis has been placed on oral and silent reading, phonics and social reading. Special emphasis also is being placed on regular and insistent drill in arithmetic.

Mrs. Hutchinson returned to teach the Primary Grades, Mrs. Worsley the Elementary Grades and Mrs. Young Grades Seven and Eight. These teachers have all attended many educational meetings in the various towns.

Several of our students left during the months of October and November to attend schools where their parents had employment. We are looking forward to having them back with us soon.

Our Halloween Party was a tremendous success. It was a very difficult task for the judges to select the winners. During the months of November and December some excellent murals were done by the various grades. Our Square Dances are being continued under the able guidance of Mrs. Edmund Ayling. These are sponsored each month by our Parent-Teachers' Association. The children are awaiting the annual festival held in Lancaster each year. Those who attended last year were certainly a credit to our School.

Mrs. Lucille Dorr of Whitefield was engaged to handle the music instruction this year, and she was most helpful in the planning and presentation of the Christmas Program. Members of the Primary Room presented "Santa's New Helpers". The costumes were most effective. The Elementary Grades presented "Christmas in the Southland" and the Seventh and Eighth Grades produced "Candle in the Window". All children had the opportunity to participate in some phase of the production.

The Community Christmas Party, organized by the vari-

ous groups of the community was a huge success. The School enjoyed having a part in it.

The Ski Program has been continued and over half of the children are taking advantage of this excellent opportunity to learn to ski and improve their skill. Some of our students are in the advanced groups. It would be well worth a trip to the Roland Peabody Slope some Wednesday afternoon to see how well our children do. Bus transportation is provided by Mr. Bouchard of Bethlehem and is made available by the School Board and the Parent-Teachers' Association.

Practically all the children are taking advantage of the Milk Program which is partially supported by the State Department. Many of our children are even getting extra bottles of milk each day.

We have missed our Family Nights with Mr. Tapply of the National Recreation Association. We hope that he will find it possible to visit us soon as his visits were enjoyed by young and old alike. In the Spring the students and townspeople presented him a watch in appreciation of his many services .

Our children had their physical examinations recently. Dr. William Wilson was the examining physician. We have had made available to us a Child Health Clinic and Polio Clinics for pre-schoolers and adults, as well as our school children, through the efforts of our School Nurse, Mrs. Evans, and Miss Eleanor Kenney, Coos County Nurse.

The children have taken several field trips. Members of the Primary Grades particularly enjoyed their trip to the Weather Station at the home of Richard Fahey. The study of birds and their habits is being continued. A Stamp Club has been organized and boasts a membership of sixteen avid collectors. Officers have been elected, and meetings are conducted according to parliamentary procedure.

The School Board has provided us with all the latest teaching aids. We have enjoyed our new social studies books and our new wall maps. These are used to supplement the daily class work, and we have had access to some excellent films secured at a nominal cost to the School.

We all miss our association with Miss Blanche Witherell, helping teacher, who found it necessary to resign because of ill health.

On behalf of the staff and the students, I wish to express our thanks to all of you, to Mr. Truell, the School Board, the

Parent-Teacher Association, Mrs. Smith, Mr. Jordan, Mrs. Dorr, Mrs. Evans and Miss Kenney, who have all helped make our School a better one.
