Resolved, to adopt the article.

Art. 5. To see what action the town will take in respect to appointing three members of the finance committee for the ensuing three years.

Resolved, to elect the following as members of the finance committee for three years: Donald Galbraith, Walter O'Hearne, Ralph K. Weeks.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to accept trust funds received for perpetual care of lots in the cemeteries as follows: \$50.00 for lots of three graves or less, and \$100.00 or more for larger lots.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1000.00 in addition to the amount raised in the budget for the care of trees. (By request)

next, at eight o'clock in the evening, to act on the following
subjects:

Art. 1. To see if the town will vote to amend Article 1,
Definition of Zones, of the Zoning Ordinance of the town of
Charlestown adopted March 13, 1951, as amended, by remov-
ing and excluding from Zone A-1, as shown on the Zoning
Map, filed with the Town Clerk and dated March 12, 1957,
the premises owned by Agnes G. Smith situated on the west
side of the highway known as Route 11, and bounded on the
east by said highway, on the south by premises owned by
one Brackett and one Gates, on the west by the Connecticut
River and on the north by premises owned by one Johnson
and Zone C (Old Fort No. 4 Zone), and containing twenty
(20) acres, more or less."

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

September 16, 1958

Amend Article II, Section 2, Zone A-1, as inserted on March 12, 1957 in the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Charlestown under Article 13 of the Warrant for the town meeting for 1957, which section now defines the use permissible for properties located in Zone A-1, by inserting the following provisions: "and in agricultural or undeveloped territory, farms, truck-gardens, nurseries, or green houses, and accessory stables and poultry enclosures," so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

Article II, Regulations, Section 2, Zone A-1. The following uses shall be permitted: All uses allowed in Article II, Section 1, and in agricultural or undeveloped territory, farms, truck-gardens, nurseries, or green houses, and accessory stables and poultry enclosures.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Charlestown on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose the necessary town officers for their respective terms.

Art. 2. To consider the budget. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the maintenance of the poor, laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, street lighting and for the necessary charges arising within the town.

Art. 3 To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to deliver the inventory blanks at the time of taking inventory.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow on notes on the credit of the town such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 5. To see what action the town will take in respect to appointing three members of the finance committee for the ensuing three years.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to accept trust funds received for perpetual care of lots in the cemeteries as follows, \$50.00 for lots of three graves or less, and \$100 or more for larger lots.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to trade in the old grader toward the purchase price of the grader now being rented, and vote to raise and appropriate \$3160 to pay the balance.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4000.00 to install a new surface drain starting at Main St. and Olcott Lane and ending in Dickinson Brook.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1775.00 to be paid to the Water Commission for the 1959 rental of 71 hydrants at \$25.00 each.

By request.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 to be used to hire a visiting nurse on a part-time basis for a one year trial period.

By request.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1000 in addition to the amount raised in the budget for care of trees. By request.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 for police protection by giving the Selectmen authority to hire one (1) full time police officer at a salary of about \$4000.00 per year, and one (1) part time police officer at a salary of about \$2200 per year, also to purchase one (1) police cruiser fully equipped with siren and heavy duty generator, cost to be approximately 1850.00.

By request.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to elect three citizens for a term of one year, to serve without pay, and to work with the three Selectmen, to be known as "The Board of Police Commissioners." This Board to have full jurisdiction in enforcing the present rules and regulations, and in making any new rules and regulations which might be deemed advisable concerning the Police Department. This Board shall also have authority to pass judgement upon any complaints which might be received in connection with the Police Department. By request.

Art. 14. To see what action the Town will take regarding amended Article 8 passed at Town Meeting, March 1956, the article follows:

"To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to petition the Public Utilities Commission to require the Boston and Maine Railroad to remove obstructions from the right of way at the Bowen Mill Crossing so that motorists can see a train approaching at a safe distance."

Art. 15. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to petition the Public Utilities Commission to close the railroad crossing at lower Main Street leading to Lower Landing.

By request of Town Development Committee.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to remove part of the banks on the east side of the Bowen Crossing at South Charlestown, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for this project. By request of Town Development Committee.

Art. 17. To see what action the Town will take to select a committee to raise funds to assist hospitals in the area.

Art. 18. To see what action the Town will take in regards to restraining dogs from running at large in the Town.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Summer Street between the residences of Mrs. Florence Bingham and Lee W. Warren. By request.

Art. 20, To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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T. R. A. Report

Town road aid is for work on Class 5 roads, which are school bus and mail routes. The Town appropriated \$981.65 and the State contributed \$6,544.32. The work this year was done on the North Hemlock Road. The work is under the supervision of a State Highway Engineer from the Keene office. Mr. Kenneth Whitney was the State timekeeper on this job, and his reports show the following:

1. 87 trees over 6 in. in diameter were cut.
2. 1 mile of brush cut.
3. 5 culverts, 32 feet long of 12 in. diameter, were installed.
4. 1 culvert, 32 feet long of 15 in. diameter, was installed.
5. 1 culvert extension, 7 feet long of 3 ft. diameter, was installed.
6. 4,305 yards of gravel were used.
7. 44 guard posts were set.
8. 1 mile of "Farmers' Mix" was applied, hard topping the section of road from the Hill residence to the Hinkle residence.

Forest Fire Report

The following information is taken from a report of District Fire Chief Gerald Gross.

"Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money."

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as two hundred (\$200) dollars.

If you find it necessary to burn on your own premises,

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden, the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Superintendent's Report
Earl Putnam, Superintendent

This year was another dry year for the water dept. but we got by very well. Due to these dry years the dept. is studying new sources of storage and supply for the future.

The North Charlestown reservoir was dug out last spring and it improved it to a near 100%.

This spring we plan to do the same to the reservoirs of the town.

We replaced 500 ft. of old gal. pipe with new 2" cement lined pipe. We also put in 630 ft. cement asbestos pipe and one hydrant down Lovers Lane Road the users of the new extension are paying 6% of the total cost until paid. The reason for putting in 6" pipe is for the future as we plan to run it to the toll bridge to help the pressure on the Claremont Road. This year we are going to replace som $\frac{3}{4}$ " gal. pipe with 6" pipe on the toll bridge end of the line.

The dept. replaced 4 old services and put in 4 new ones.

Had one 6" main break on Paris Ave.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Charlestown, I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Teaching Staff

We are happy to be able to report very few teacher changes in our staff this year. The following instructors were hired to begin service in Charlestown this past September:

Mrs. Carol (Fenton) Guy was appointed teacher of Mathematics and Science in the Junior Department. She succeeded Mr. Blanchard who was with us only one year. Mrs. Guy is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and is living on Taylor Hill in Charlestown.

Miss Janice Moody is our new teacher in the Commercial Department at Charlestown High School. She succeeds Miss Carolyn Morrison who resigned to accept a position at Simmons College. Miss Moody comes from Union, Maine and is a graduate of Husson Business College in Bangor, Maine.

Mr. Donald Pruden was appointed instructor of Science in the High School. He succeeded Mr. Davis who left to accept a position in Laconia, N. H. Mr. Pruden was formerly employed at Jones & Lamson in Springfield, Vt. He graduated from Alfred University (Cum Laude) and lives in Saxton's River, Vt.

Mr Robert Filippone of Watertown, Conn., was hired as Music Supervisor for the towns of Cornish and Charlestown. Mr. Filippone is a graduate of New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, Mass. Four days of the week he devotes to Elementary school music and Instrumental and Vocal Music in the Charlestown Schools. One day a week is assigned to the Cornish School.

School Board Meetings

The School Board should be commended on the work accomplished during the past year. The members have carried on vigorously, with harmony, and the best interest of the town always in evidence.

In September Mrs. Marian Fisher resigned due to her change in residence. The Fishers moved to Groton, Conn. Mrs. Miriam Gates was appointed to replace Mrs. Fisher on the School Board.

The major part of the School Board business, since the opening of the school year in September, has fallen into three categories: the new Elementary School Plans, a teachers' salary schedule, and the preparation of the next year's budget. One and two meetings a month have been held at the Superintendent's office. It is hoped that in the near future

some sort of salary schedule can be put into operation in order that we may foster stability in our faculty, as well as attract well qualified teachers to our community. In preparing the new budget, the School Board has screened carefully our requests, with a view to keeping costs down and limited to the minimum essentials.

New Elementary School

Work is continuing on the plans and preparation for a proposed new Elementary School. This project will be presented at the March School District Meeting as a special article in the Warrant.

The Building Committee has held several meetings under the chairmanship of Mr. Horace Holden. Mr. Irving Hersey, the architect, has prepared plans and is ready to present facts and figures for the consideration of the taxpayers.

Preliminary grading of the athletic field and the school site was a major assignment this past year. This work has been completed and the location is ready for use at such a time as the citizens may deem appropriate.

Maintenance and Building Improvements

The maintenance work in the several buildings has been kept at a high level. We appreciate the efforts of Mr. Moulton, Mr. LaForge and Mr. Sawyer in carrying out their assignments in each building. During the summer all classrooms were thoroughly cleaned and several rooms were redecorated. Mr. Moulton has taken care of the many minor repairs which were necessary during the school year. Mr. Sawyer has also been able to help us as a spare driver on the school bus, Hemlock Route. The following is an outline of the work done this year:

State Aid

This year we may expect considerable more State Aid as financial assistance to the Town of Charlestown. Our State Foundation Aid will amount to approximately \$45,600. Our Building Aid figures a bit over \$4,000. The above mentioned incomes, together with miscellaneous incomes amounting to about \$500, will give us an estimated income in the vicinity of \$50,100 for the current year.

Other

The work of Mrs. Decker as Assisting Teacher has been a great service and help to the regular teachers in the Holden School. Through special group instruction we are able to give individual help to those children who are in need of special attention. This remedial teaching plan has been expanded this year, so that Mrs. Decker has been scheduled

one day a week at the Farwell School. This arrangement gives equal opportunity for the children in North Charlestown.

It has been my intent this year to spend a great deal more time, and place more emphasis, on the health program in the schools. With this in mind I have been able to more fully appreciate the good work of Miss MacIver, our School Nurse, and realize in full the importance of her work in preserving the health and well being of the children in our community.

The transportation of school children has been provided entirely through the use of rental buses. This plan has proven very satisfactory, and at a reasonable cost. New or reconditioned buses are supplied each year by the School Bus Rental Company of Framingham, Mass. This insures us equipment which is both safe and comfortable.

We are completing our first year in the new Supervisory Office in the Post Office Building. These facilities are convenient and have provided more adequate space for carrying on the work of the Supervisory Union. Provision for a full time secretarial staff has enabled us to keep the office open from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., each school day. Mrs. Bradish and Mrs. Ripley share the secretarial work of the six towns under our supervision.

There will be a slight decrease in our total school enrollment this next year, as was the case this current year. Our peak enrollment came at the opening of school September 1957. We are expecting about forty-six first grade pupils to enroll at the Stucco School next Fall. The anticipated enrollment at the High School building should be approximately 290 pupils, with about 253 pupils in the Holden School.

In behalf of the Charlestown School Board, I wish to thank the townspeople for their wonderful support throughout the school year. I, personally, appreciate the cooperation of the teachers, School Board, and other school department personnel. I have thoroughly enjoyed my work, and the interest shown by all has done much to give to our children the educational experiences of which we may be proud.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

During the past year Immunization Clinics were made available to all school children as well as the pre-school children. Salk Vaccine, Triple Toxoid (a combination of Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough) and Small Pox Vaccinations were given. Attendance at these clinics could be better. We still have a number of children who have not had Salk Vaccine despite the large number of Salk Vaccine Clinics we have had. I do hope that our spring clinics will take care of this.

The Tuberculin Patch Testing program was carried out with the children in the odd numbered grades and newcomers who had not previously had the test. This test is given to determine whether or not a child has ever had a contact with Tuberculosis. If the test reaction is positive, then the child has a chest X-ray through the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association Chest Clinics.

Hearing and vision testing was done in all grades. The hearing defects were very few and all of those children with a hearing problem were seen by their family physician. The number of corrections of vision problems was excellent. Where a family was unable to assume the expense of eye care and glasses the local service clubs and the State Welfare Department assisted.

Examination with the Wood's Light for the detection of Scalp Ringworm was done in the elementary grades. There were no suspicious cases found. Scalp Ringworm still seems to be a public health menace in this state, as well as in the neighboring states.

The children were weighed and measured and a general inspection was carried out by the school nurse. By far the outstanding problem was the need for dental care. Outside of the State Matching Fund there is very little assistance available for dental care.

All of the above mentioned programs are carried out yearly. These programs serve a dual purpose. First and very important is the finding of defects and the correction of them. Second and equally as important, it is a teaching program from the standpoint of the child. We strive to help the

child realize the importance of good health, as well as teach him to assume the responsibility of maintaining good health and well-being.

Success in carrying out the school health program is dependent on many people. I would like to express my appreciation to you who have helped so much—the parents, the medical advisors, the School Board, the Superintendent, the Principals, the teachers and the custodians. Thank you.

CHARLESTOWN HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

One aspect of education which has been emphasized this year is guidance—the procedure whereby students are helped to help themselves. Educational guidance has resulted in more pupils electing subjects on the basis of their future plans instead of trying to avoid courses which involve work. The prescribed curricula, that is, the college, commercial and general programs, help the student to realize what combination of courses are necessary to fulfill his objectives. The planning of a student's program is accomplished on an individual basis with members of the faculty conferring with each student. Tests of aptitude, ability and achievement are given in grades 7-11 and are used as a basis for educational and vocational guidance.

The school maintains contact with many higher institutions of learning and also with many prospective employers. The purpose of this contact is, on the one hand to acquaint these people with the type of training students are receiving at Charlestown, and on the other hand to find out what schools and employers are requiring of high school graduates and also what opportunities they have to offer our students. Due to the emphasis placed on guidance a greater number of students have demonstrated interest in continuing their education after graduation from high school. Three of our seniors have already been accepted to four year colleges, and one has been awarded a partial scholarship to a two year secretarial school.

All students receive some occupational information in

connection with their regular course work. In addition, individual conferences help each pupil explore vocational opportunities related to his interests and abilities. Representative from various fields have been invited to talk at student assemblies. Also the school has arranged for seniors to observe and in some instances participate in occupations in which they are interested.

In addition to improved performance in course work, there also has been an increased interest in the school's music program. The junior-senior high annual Christmas concert was well received by the audience and showed evidence of enjoyment on the part of its participants. One innovation this year is the organization of a Dixie Land Band which meets for rehearsals after school hours. Also, a separate junior high chorus has been formed to encourage more participation in vocal music at the junior high level. The senior chorus, the orchestra, and the band provide a rounded music program.

The seventh and eighth grades have completed one semester of a How to Study Course designed to increase proficiency in study habits. During the second semester these pupils will be given an opportunity to practice their newly acquired skills during the supervised study period. In March, achievement tests will be given to measure the effectiveness of this program.

1958 saw the Charlestown High School basketball team the winner of the State Class S title. According to the NHIAA ruling, Charlestown, which now has more than 60 boys enrolled in grades 9-12, moved up to class M. Despite the greater competition in this class our team has a fine record to date and is assured of a chance to participate in the play-offs for the class M title.

The cross country team sent one member to the New England Cross Country meet in Rhode Island. Participants in this meet represented the best cross country runners in the six New England States.

All teams and cheerleaders have been outfitted in new uniforms. This was made possible by contributions from townspeople, local merchants and the hard work of the athletes.

In the area of home economics three of our students have achieved distinction, one in the Cherry Pie Baking

Contest, the second in the McCall Teen Fashion Board, and the third as high scorer in the Betty Crocker Homemaking examinations.

In industrial arts stress is on woodworking and mechanical drawing. At an open house held last Spring many fine pieces of workmanship in a variety of wood finishes were on display. Many of our students have expressed interest in electricity, automotives, welding and sheet metal work. However, lack of equipment has prevented this department from meeting the interests of these students.

The school committee has purchased for the school library 50 new books. These books were selected on the basis of teachers' recommendations and cover a wide variety of fields. The students eagerness to borrow these books is evidence of the worthwhileness of this purchase. The Silsby Library, using the teachers' suggestions as a guide, also purchased new books. Students are entitled to use the Silsby Library facilities during their study periods.

Due to the Federal subsidy, milk is sold to school children at a cost of 3c per half pint or is included in the cost of each hot lunch served. Last year approximately 11, 250 half pints of milk were served during the noon hours. In addition to the milk, each lunch is planned to meet 1-3 of the daily nutritional requirements of protein, vegetables or fruit, bread and butter.

The combined efforts of the school personnel, the school board, the superintendent, the health officers, the parents and the community have resulted in a school program which is successfully meeting the needs of the students.

HOLDEN SCHOOL - PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The formative years of a child's life are undoubtedly a foundation upon which all of his future learning will depend. Many times not enough emphasis is placed on the elementary schools because the end result or the finished product is not visable in the immediate future. The child's progress has little meaning until he has completed seven or more years of schooling and then the emphasis is placed on the remain-

ing years loosing sight of the formative past which was so necessary in developing skills, habits and background, the essential tools, that the child needs as a stabilizer to complete his formal schooling.

For the first time in the history of the Holden School ability grouping has been incorporated in every grade except the first. This practice has proven successful in attempting to give each child more concrete instruction geared more closely to his own ability to understand the subject matter. This method is by no means an end in itself, but it is a step in the right direction.

The Remedial program has proven very successful since it was introduced a few years ago. Many children are profiting from this program every year. As reading is quite complex and all phases of reading have to be considered, tests are administered to diagnose the weaknesses of these children. Once these weaknesses are evident, the remedial teacher instructs the children on these particular skills. The results of this program have been most gratifying.

Again this year the P. T. A. has continued its project to obtain more library books for the elementary pupils. Since the start of this project over a year ago, we have purchased over \$200 worth of library books. At present we're in the process of ordering more books for every grade level. Our major concern is to interest the children in recreational reading —reading for enjoyment. Once this desire matures into a habit then reading becomes a meaningful pleasure. The children are deeply appreciative for the financial assistance which the parents have given in making this project possible.

The interest of the parents during the past year has been most gratifying. It's through this continuous cooperation that your children will obtain a well-rounded education that they so rightly deserve.

The Mother's Club cooperation has enabled the school to purchase a record player which was very necessary. The interest of the club is greatly appreciated by the teachers.

I would like to express my appreciation to the School Board, administration and the teachers for their cooperation during the past year.
