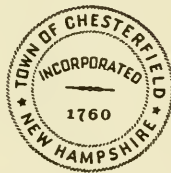

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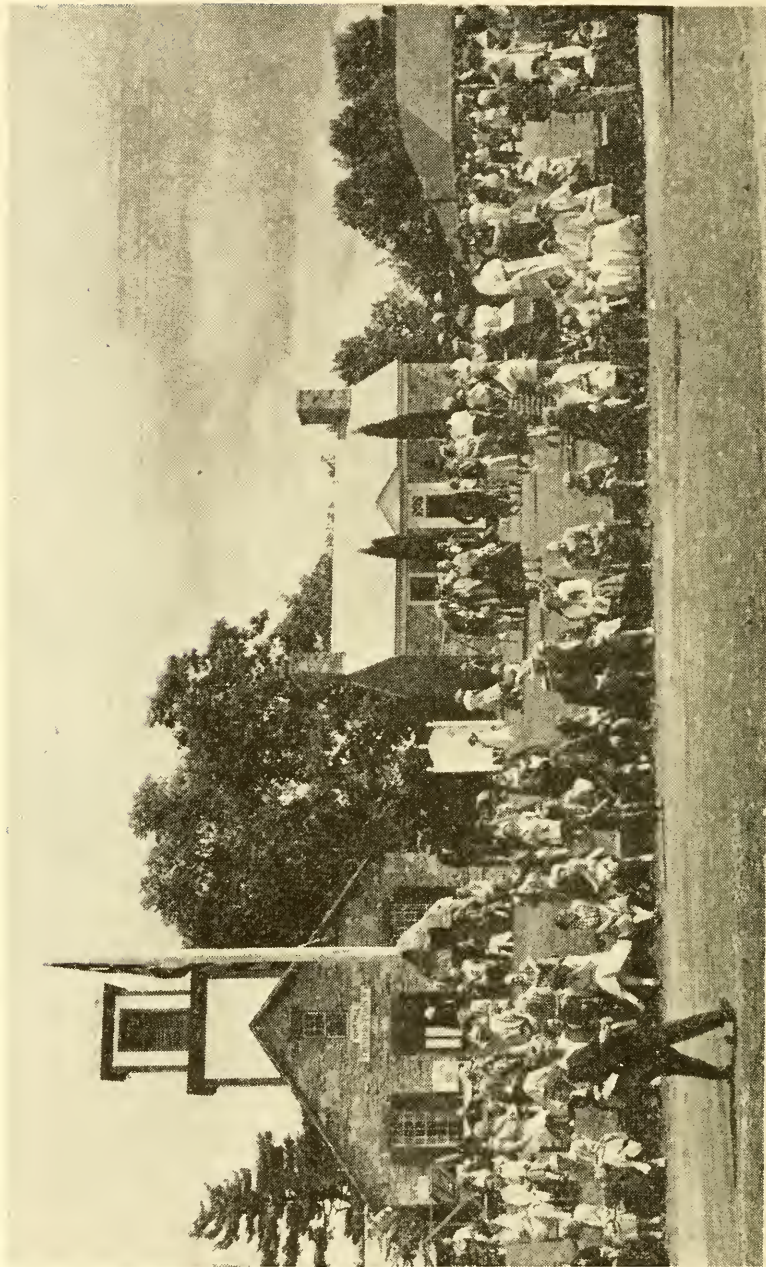

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to 6 P. M.; to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

1. Town officers' salaries	\$2,085 50
2. Town officers' expenses	1,200 00
3. Election and Registration expenses	1,000 00
4. Expenses of town hall and other buildings	1,000 00
5. Expenses of police department	1,000 00
6. Support of the fire department	1,200 00
7. Control of white pine blister rust	400 00
8. Forest fire expenses	500 00
9. Support of the board of health	400 00

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$12,500.00 for Town Road Maintenance.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 for Snow Removal.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,800 for Street Lighting.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$894.52 thereby receiving an additional \$5,963.47 from the State for Town Road Aid.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Town Library System.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Support of the poor.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for Aid to Soldiers and their families.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Parks and Playgrounds.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Town Beach.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$125.00 for damage and legal expenses.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$179.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 for interest on temporary loans.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Power Loader to cost approximately \$6,000.00 and to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 as the first payment, the balance to be paid in five yearly payments, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the money for the same.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to sell or trade Grader Plow and Truck V Plow.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day.

* Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as Authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

* Article 26. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the Officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

* Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

* Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 as the Town's proportionate share for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.

* Article 29. To see if the Town will vote the necessary money and vote on the following changes:

1. To extend Mountain Road north to junction of Route 9, through property owned by B. H. Tyrrell known as Riverside Cabins, right of way to be deeded to Town of Chesterfield without cost.

2. To appropriate the necessary sum of money for construction of said extension and culverts.

3. To abandon present road from junction of Gulf Road and Mountain Road by the Cabins to junction of Route 9.

* Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purpose of laying out a road from the Swanzey Road to the so-called Zinn home.

* Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate sufficient funds to surface the Gulf Road where necessary, and to strengthen bridges and guard rails to withstand the heavy truck and other traffic which travels this road under present day conditions.

* Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of resurfacing with gravel the Jackson Hill road as far as that amount will go, doing the parts in poorest condition first.

* Article 33. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money, not to exceed \$3,000.00, which amount together with \$2,000.00 given to the Town by the Chesterfield Community Club, is to be used for the installation of Automatic forced air oil heat, running hot and cold water in the kitchen, and modern plumbing facilities (ladies' and men's toilets) in the Chesterfield Town Hall.

* Article 25 through and including Article 33 not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Gladys Puffer Thomas and Evelyn L. Winn to be added to the Clara J. Puffer Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for perpetual care and improvement of the Warren C. Puffer burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Norman G. Colburn, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of Norman G. Colburn burial lot in

Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Norman G. Colburn Trust Fund.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Norman G. Colburn, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of East one-half of Hiram Morgan lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as Colburn-Morgan Trust Fund.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Norman G. Colburn, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of George Colburn and Charles Davis burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Colburn-Davis Trust Fund.

Article 38. To hear reports of Standing Committees and act thereon.

Article 39. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, 1951

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday March 13, 1951.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil at 9:00 o'clock and the warrant was read through Article 1. The Moderator then declared the balloting in order under Article 1 for all necessary Town Officers by Australian Ballot.

At 10:20 o'clock the Moderator again called the meeting to order and the rest of the Warrant was read by the Clerk. The Articles were disposed of as follows:—

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Robert Woodman to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as last year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by George Joslin to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Harry E. Winn, Chairman of the Budget Committee, in the absence of the Secretary, gave a brief history of the Budget Committee meetings. He stated that a meeting was called in the Spring of 1951 for \$500.00 needed for snow removal. \$1,000.00 needed for a washout in the fall was taken care of with money on hand so it didn't change the tax rate. He praised the present Budget Committee and thanked them for their cooperation and then referred to the report of the Committee as given on Pages 51 to 54 in the Annual Town Report. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome

and supported by Harold Putnam to accept this report. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion by Arvid Pearson and supported by Charles Alden to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

1. Town officers' salaries	\$2,040 50
2. Town officers' expenses	800 00
3. Election and registration expenses	800 00
4. Expenses of town hall and other buildings	1,000 00
5. Expenses of police department	1,000 00
6. Support of the fire department	1,200 00
7. Forest fire expenses	500 00
8. Support of board of health	400 00

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Paul Penning to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by George Joslin to amend the article, raising \$10,000.00 for Town Road Maintenance, earmarking \$2,000.00 for oil and \$500.00 for fence posts. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 for snow removal. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by George Joslin to raise the sum of \$894.66 thereby receiving an additional \$5,964.40 from the State for Town Road Aid. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Paul Welcome to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Walter Post to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Town Library System. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Robert Woodman to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Paul Penning to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for Old Age Assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Paul Penning to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by George Joslin to raise the sum of \$500.00 for aid to Soldiers and their families. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Robert Woodman to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Town Beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham and supported by Walter Post to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Walter Post to raise the sum of \$125.00 for damage and legal expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Paul Welcome to raise the sum of \$173.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$150.00 for interest on temporary loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported by Edward Williams to observe Old Home Day. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Mr. Cooper asked for the support of all townspeople and all organizations to help in planning for and in carrying out this observance.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Harry Winn to pass over the Article which concerned raising the sum of \$523.00 as the Town's proportionate share for support of the Elliot Community Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by William Worthley to raise the sum of \$300.00 to finish equipping the new fire truck in West Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Clifford Chickering to raise the sum of \$1,000 by taxation in 1951, and the balance of approximately \$500.00 to be transferred from the cash surplus in the Town Treasury, in addition to the sum of \$3,967.82 already available to pay for construction of the West Chesterfield Bridge and its

approaches, thereby rescinding the vote on that part of Article 25, Warrant of 1950, pertaining to financing. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Marjorie Morse to authorize the Selectmen to sell, for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) to the Mount Pistareen Grange the land purchased by the Town from the Fred Atherton Estate, on condition that said property shall be developed and maintained by the Mount Pistareen Grange solely as a playground or place of amusement for children; and provided that if the said Mount Pistareen Grange shall disband or shall cease to exist that said land shall revert to the Town of Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester Burnham and supported by H. Claude Mowry to have the one road agent elected by Australian Ballot beginning with the March 1952 Town Meeting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Herbert A. Cooper to transfer the cash on hand as of June 30, 1951 of the school district, estimated by the District Officer at \$2,500.00, to the School District to be used toward the payment of principal and interest due June 1, 1951 on the loan for the New Central School Building. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. The Moderator, James O'Neil, reported for the Zoning Committee that not much had been accomplished as yet and he recommended that they be continued.

Wakefield Dort, reporting for the Historical Committee, stated that work was needed at the Stone Memorial, landscaping, etc. and he recommended that signs be placed on the common pointing the way to the Memorial. They also hope to mark the site of the first house in Chesterfield this year.

It was voted to accept both of these reports.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion by Paul Welcome and supported by Dexter Thomas to amend the article and that the Town be given authority to purchase a Dump Truck with the \$1,500.00 acquired through sale of Town Property, or any part of it. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Harold Putnam that the three Selectmen act as a committee to investigate the cost to build and maintain a road from the highway near the residence of Esther Carey to the residence of James Lusby and bring back a report at the next meeting; and in the meantime the Selectmen to authorize the Road Agent to plow out the road next winter. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Donald Emery and supported by George Joslin to accept the sum of \$40.79, under clause III of the Will of Luella A. Carpenter, late of Chesterfield, to be added to the George L. Hamilton Trust Fund, the income only to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the George L. Hamilton burial lot in Spofford Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Arvid Pearson to accept the sum of \$20.40 under clause IV of the will of the late Luella A. Carpenter, the income only to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Captain Ara Hamilton burial lot in Chesterfield Village Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 34. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Agnes Chickering that the Town instruct the Selectmen to authorize the plowing of the Earl Walston and Bill Zinn Roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported that the Selectmen be given authority to place the

Veterans' Memorial Fund now in the Town Treasury in a trust fund to collect interest while they are deciding how to use it. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wakefield Dort and supported by Edward Williams that the Moderator appoint a committee before April 1, Article 29 of Warrant for 1950, to investigate the possibilities of zoning for our Lake and Town and report back to meeting of 1952. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

No other business appearing, the meeting was adjourned leaving the balloting for town officers open until six o'clock.

At six o'clock the Moderator declared the ballot box closed and a count of the ballots cast resulted as follows:

For Auditors. Dorothy C. Spaulding had 25 votes, Sedley Dunlap had 21 votes, Warren G. Allen had 8 votes, A. Wilson Homestead had 7 votes, Virginia B. Parker had 6 votes, Paul

Penning had 4 votes, Walter Post had 3 votes, Henry Chickering had 2 votes, Clifford Tuttle had 1 vote, Charles Alden had 1 vote, Grace Welcome had 1 vote, Clinton Davis had 1 vote, Dorothy Chickering had 1 vote, John Ball had 1 vote, Winston Cray had 1 vote, Stanley Spaulding had 1 vote, Viola Tuttle had 1 vote, James Fisher had 1 vote, George Joslin had 1 vote, Harold Putnam had 1 vote, Floyd Grover had 1 vote, Ed Williams had 1 vote. Spaulding had 59 votes, Richard Chickering had 2 votes, Shirley Bevis had 2 votes, Bernard Chickering had 2 votes, Clifford Amidon had 2 votes, Fred Stoddard had 2 votes, Robert Mitchell had 1 vote, Ernest Grover had 1 vote, William Hall had 1 vote, Dr. Lovell had 1 vote, Paul Welcome had 1 vote, Richard Amidon had 1 vote. Stanley L. Spaulding was declared elected.

Question (a) Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town? Yes had 68 votes. No had 38 votes.

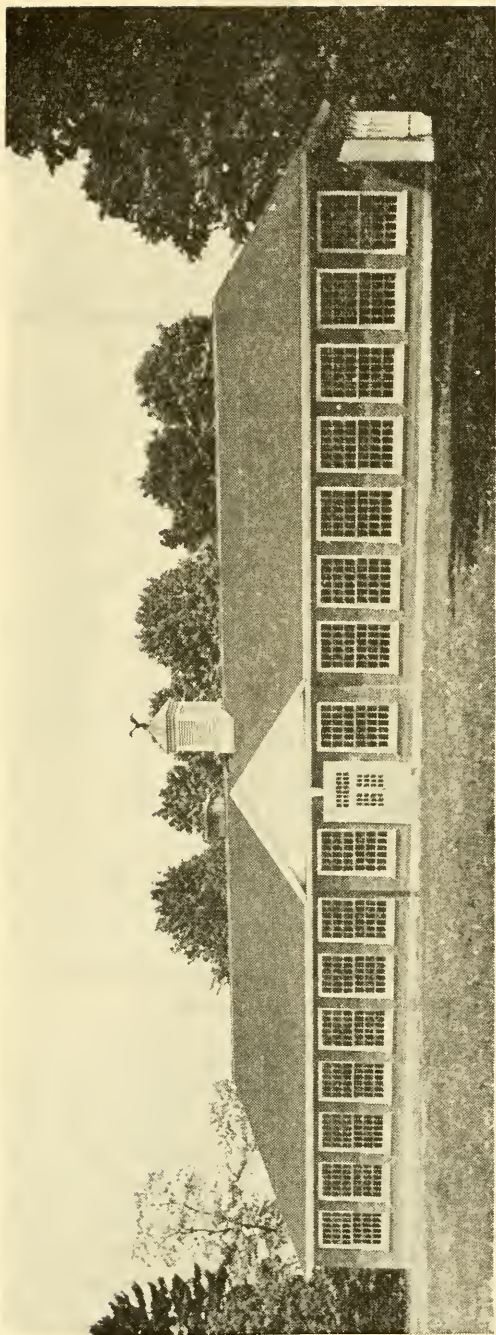

(SCHOOL WARRANT)

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Chesterfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March 1952 at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand seven hundred six (\$2,706) dollars as a deficit appropriation to be made available before June 30th, 1952, to meet the additional costs of transportation, insurance and janitor services.

10. To see what action the district will take to authorize the use of the balance of the well appropriation for construction costs of the new school, as requested by the state tax commission.

11. To see what action the district desires to take regarding the disposal of the old Chesterfield school building.

12. To see what action the district desires to take regarding the balance on hand in the building fund account.

13. To take any other action which may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The big achievement, overshadowing all others concerned with education in Chesterfield in 1951; was the opening of the new central school. For the first time, all children of the community go to school in one building and over 170 children reported for the first day of school in the new structure.

The benefits of warm, comfortable, attractive rooms with excellent lighting facilities, ample work space and modern facilities are of prime importance; but the real benefits will be measured in improved educational achievement, resulting from the situation where all of the primary grades have the advantage of their own teacher and where no teacher has to instruct more than two classes. A measurable improvement in scholastic ability should become apparent due to this change from the four grades per teacher arrangement of the past to the present one or two grade arrangement.

Other more obvious advantages to the pupils are the opportunities to meet together in the auditorium for music, plays, visual education and play; and to have the benefits of an excellent lunch program. The teachers certainly enjoy the pleasant working conditions and the opportunity to meet together to discuss educational problems and plan for improved instruction.

Chesterfield is one of those fortunate communities which was able to construct a new school building before the recent heavy increase in costs and before the government limited the use of steel for school construction. I see no reason to believe that the community will not continue to enjoy the benefits of the new building for many years and that from an educational standpoint, these benefits will continue to increase.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

I herein submit my report concerning the elementary music program in the school. The aim of the music program is to develop a love and appreciation of good music and the desire to participate spontaneously in group work, both vocal and instrumental. A comprehensive course is given, starting with rote singing in the first grade and covering the prescribed fundamentals in each grade through the eighth. An opportunity is given for each pupil to play in a rhythm band in the lower grades and in a tonette band in the intermediate grades. Folk dancing also is part of the music program as well as is music appreciation.

Musical programs presented during the year consisted of a minstrel show prepared by the upper grades for a parent-teacher program; a Halloween program; graduation music by the Glee Club and a Christmas Musicale. An operetta is now in process of rehearsal to be presented early in the spring in the school auditorium.

The pupils are enthusiastic and appreciative of all phases of the music program. I find the record library available in the Union office, to be of real benefit to the pupils of the schools.

LUNCH PROGRAM REPORT

I hereby submit the following school lunch report:

The lunch room opened on October 29, 1951. During the month of November we served 2,765 type 'A' meals and 23 type 'B' lunches. The bills for the month totaled \$882.99 and the receipts were \$889.79, leaving a balance of \$6.80. During the month of December: 1,920 meals were served. The Chesterfield program now serves a larger percentage of pupils than any other program in the school union.

Free foods, supplied by the Agricultural Department have been a great help. So far the value of such foods has been approximately \$800 and they included: Peaches, peanut-butter, turkeys, apples, honey, tomatoes, tomato paste, dried eggs, dried milk, prunes, orange juice, beans, and cheese. These foods are allocated from Concord and distributed through the school superintendent's office.

The Maple Farms Dairy has assisted the program by lending us a milk cooler. Mr. Cherrie has been most helpful in building a towel rack, dollies for the large storage units, a table with wheels etc. The potato peeler, electric mixer, dicing machine etc. have been great time savers.

The object of the program is to serve a well balanced meal at cost to the children. The meals now cost 20c but a weekly ticket at \$1.00 must be bought so that planning is facilitated. On special days we serve turkey, chicken or roast pork. The children cooperate very well in eating what is served and there is little waste of food. We try to keep the lunchroom decorated with pots and flowers and we require good table manners.

CHESTERFIELD CENTRAL SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

School opened Sept. 17th in the new building with an enrollment of 174. Some of these pupils have transferred to other schools because they have moved out of town, while others have left for the winter. The present enrollment stands at 160.

Much time and effort have been directed toward organizing a well rounded school program. The full benefit of this program may not be reaped during the first year of adjustment to a new social and physical environment. However, the experiences we are undergoing are proving valuable as a basis for further study and consequent improvement.

The safety patrol that was organized the first week of school has proved its worth on both the playground and school busses. A pupils' court has just been set up to give the boys and girls opportunities to pass judgment, make decisions, and take a more responsible part in the school program. Consolidation has not only made provision for a new modern school building, but it is giving the children of the entire town of Chesterfield the valuable opportunity of working, sharing, and playing together. What has been gained from this experience during this first half year of school amounts to more than meets the eye.

Last fall the seventh and eighth grades, with the help of the second grade, raised seventy dollars by putting on a Halloween party in the school auditorium. The net profit received

from selling magazines during November amounted to forty-four dollars. After repairing the radio victrola and buying badminton shuttlecocks there is a balance of one hundred and ten dollars on hand. This will go toward paying the expenses of the eighth grade class trip next spring. The plan is that each year the seventh will help the eighth grade to raise money for their class trip.

Everyone is enjoying the new building with its modern facilities. The auditorium has more than proved its worth as a cafeteria and recreation room.

The pupils have made a good adjustment to the new school. The school staff has had the backing of a competent school board. Supt. Bowlby has kept us adequately supplied with materials, and has done much in helping to formulate administrative policies. The teachers have been cooperative in helping to carry out the administrative policies of the school. We are most fortunate to again have Mrs. Wilson to supervise our music department. Mr. Cherrie is providing us with excellent janitor service, and the hot lunch program under the direction of Mrs. Cooper is a huge success. At this writing we have much to be grateful for. The opportunities ahead of us are numerous.

March 13, 1951

The School District Meeting was opened at 3:03 p. m. by Harry Winn, Moderator. The warrant was read by Mrs. Mary Virginia Chickering, Clerk.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

A motion was made by Floyd Fuller and seconded that the clerk cast one ballot for Harry Winn for Moderator. Motion carried.

The clerk cast one ballot for Harry Winn, and declared Harry Winn elected Moderator for the ensuing year.

He took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

The following were nominated: Mrs. Virginia Chickering, Mrs. Agnes Chickering, Mrs. Eleanor Pierce, Mrs. Grace Welcome, George Joslin, Doris Parker, Laura Winn, and H. Claude Mowry. All but H. Claude Mowry refused to serve.

Mr. Harold Putnam moved that the clerk cast one ballot for Mr. Mowry to serve as clerk for one year. Motion supported.

The clerk cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry, and the Moderator declared H. Claude Mowry elected clerk for the ensuing year.

He took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years and a member for one year.

Mr. Woodman nominated Mrs. Agnes Chickering to serve as a member of the School Board for three years. Seconded by Mrs. Grace Welcome.

No other nominations were made.

Mr. Paul Penning moved that the clerk cast one ballot for Mrs. Agnes Chickering for a member of the School Board for three years.

Motion was seconded by James O'Neil. Motion carried.

The clerk cast one ballot and the Moderator declared Mrs. Agnes Chickering elected a member of the School Board for three years.

Mrs. Imogene Chickering administered the oath of office to her.

Mr. Arvid Pearson nominated Harold Putnam for a one year term as a member of the School Board. Seconded by Paul Penning. No other nominations were made.

Mr. Pearson moved that the clerk cast one ballot for Harold Putnam to serve as a member of the School Board for one year.

The clerk cast one ballot and the Moderator declared Harold Putnam elected a member of the School Board for the ensuing year.

Mrs. Imogene Chickering administered the oath of office.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Floyd Fuller nominated Evelyn L. Winn for treasurer. Seconded by George Joslin.

Floyd Fuller moved that the clerk cast one ballot for Evelyn L. Winn for Treasurer. Seconded by George Joslin. Motion carried.

The clerk cast one ballot for Mrs. Evelyn L. Winn for Treasurer and the Moderator declared her elected Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Mrs. Imogene Chickering administered the oath of office.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Mrs. Agnes Chickering moved that we pass over Article 5. Seconded by Harold Putnam. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Mrs. Grace Welcome gave the School Building Committee's Report.

Mr. Harold Putnam moved that the Committee's report be accepted and a rising vote of thanks be given the Building Committee for its excellent work. Motion was seconded by James O'Neil, and unanimously carried.

Mrs. Margaret Nurse moved that the same Building Committee be kept until the new school building be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Putnam. Motion carried.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Mrs. Grace Welcome moved that the town Auditors audit the school accounts. Seconded by Rev. Herbert Cooper. Motion carried.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the public schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization funds together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

George Joslin moved that the district raise and appropriate \$51,349.95 for the school budget for 1951-52. Motion was seconded by Mrs. Margaret Nurse.

Mrs. Grace Welcome moved that the above motion be amended to read "that the balance on hand on June 30, 1951 be deducted from the \$51,349.95, and that sum be the 1951-52 budget". Seconded by George Joslin.

On a voice vote the amendment was declared lost.

On the consent of Mrs. Margret Nurse, Mr. Joslin withdrew his motion.

Rev. Herbert Cooper moved that the district raise and appropriate \$38,486.95 for current expenses for 1951-52. Motion seconded by Mr. Woodman. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Mr. Woodman moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,600.00 to cover the capital outlay, debt and interest for 1951-52. This sum to be used as follows: \$200 for new equipment, \$5,000 for payment on principal of debt, and \$1,400.00 for payment of interest on debt. Seconded by George Joslin. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. To see what action the district will take to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed six thousand four hundred sixty-three dollars (\$6,463.00) which with the unexpended balance of the 1950-51 appropriation will be sufficient to pay the principal and interest on debt due June 1, 1951.

Mr. Woodman moved that the School District authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to \$6,463.00 for a period of one year, this sum together with the unexpended balance of the 1950-51 appropriation will be enough to pay the principal and interest payment due on the debt on June 1, 1951. Then at the 1952-53 School District Meeting it is to be determined how to dispose of this debt. Seconded by Joseph James.

A vote was taken and the motion declared lost by the Moderator.

Mrs. Grace Welcome moved that the School District raise and appropriate \$6,463.00, less the unexpended balance of the 1950-51 appropriation to pay the principal and interest on debt due June 1, 1951. Seconded by Rev. Herbert Cooper. Motion carried.

Article 10. To see whether the district will vote to petition the Tax Commission for an audit of the accounts of the School District by the division of Municipal Accounting.

Mr. Burnham moved that the article be accepted as read. Seconded by Mr. Putnam, and carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand twenty dollars to insure

the new school building for sixty thousand dollars on a three year budget basis . . . \$1,020.00.

Mr. Walter Post moved that the School District insure the new school for \$35,000.00 on a 100% loss basis. Seconded by William Zinn. Motion was lost on a voice vote.

Mrs. Margret Nurse moved that the district raise \$1,020.00 to insure the new school building for \$60,000.00 on the three year budget basis. Seconded by Mr. Dutton. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. To see what action the School District wishes to take in the disposal of the three school houses and what method to use, if any, and to apply the proceeds from such sale to payment of the debt of the new school building.

Mr. Woodman moved that the school district be empowered to sell the three (3) schools and the land on which they are situated at public auction, at an appropriate time. Seconded by Mr. James.

Mr. Walter Post amended the motion to read "that the District keep the Chesterfield Center School until the next School District Meeting". Supported and carried.

The motion was carried in the affirmative as amended.

Article 13. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Harold Putnam moved that Mrs. Anna C. Hubner be given a 100% vote of thanks for her devoted and faithful services as a member of the School Board, and that the clerk send Mrs. Hubner a copy of the motion and a letter of thanks. Motion seconded by Mr. Woodman, and unanimously carried in the affirmative.

Mr. Smith representing the contractor of the new school building, gave a report on the progress of the new school.

Mr. James O'Neil moved that the meeting adjourn. Seconded by Mr. Kenneth Wiggin, and carried in the affirmative.

Mr. Roland Guyette moved that the Article be voted as read. Seconded by Walter Deselle.

Mr. Woodman amended the motion to read, "that the deed named in Article 2 include a clause to require the Mt. Pistareen Grange, in the event of disbanding or no longer wishing the use of the building and land, to offer to sell the same back to the School District of Chesterfield, at cost plus improvements, plus interest on the investment, less depreciation." Seconded by George Joslin. Amendment carried in the affirmative."

The motion, as amended, was carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. To see if the School District of Chesterfield will, in event of an affirmative vote on Article 2, above, authorize

the Chesterfield School Board to apply the proceeds from the sale of the Spofford School to the payment of bills incurred in completing the Central School building.

Mr. George Joslin moved that the article be accepted as read. Seconded by Walter Deselle. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Rev. Herbert Cooper moved that the meeting be adjourned. Seconded by Mr. Putnam. Motion carried in the affirmative.
