## Warrant

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday the 10th of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk for the year ensuing.
- 2. To choose by ballot and major vote one Selectman for the three years ensuing.
- 3. To choose by ballot and major vote one or more Auditors for the year ensuing.
- 4. To choose by ballot and major vote, Library Trustees for the year next ensuing.
- 5. To choose by ballot and major vote a Tax Collector for the year ensuing.
- 6. To choose by ballot and major vote all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
- 8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Old Age, Blind, and Disability Assistance for the year ensuing.

- 9. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required by law.
- 10. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of highways and bridges.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct its Selectmen to take such action regarding plowing or otherwise in keeping winter roads open in said Town for the year ensuing as in their judgment seems most conducive to the best interests of the Town and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purposes the sum of \$390.24 and the State will contribute the sum of \$2,601.60.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to empower and authorize the Selectmen to use the whole or a part thereof, of the surplus of money now in the Town Treasury for the purpose of lowering the tax rate for the year ensuing.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to elect two road agents to serve the Town for the year ensuing; also to fix the price per day for hiring manual labor, equipment and trucks for work on town roads.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$44.85 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 10 cents per \$1.00 (1-100th of 1%) of the assessed valuation of the Town for the previous year, for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter and advertising and otherwise publicizing the advantages of the Town, in co-operation with the other towns of the region.

- 16. To see what action the Town will take with reference to hiring the Colebrook Fire Precinct for the purposes of extinguishing fires, in said Town, and in event of favorable action to make necessary appropriation for the same.
- 17. To raise sums of money as may be necessary for the upkeep of the cemeteries.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur the debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes of the ensuing year and to pay such debts out of the tax money when it is received.
- 19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector Deeds.
- 20. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- 21. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purposes of cutting and removing the bushes from the side of the highways in such places as the Selectmen think most expedient.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents, auditors, selectmen, and all other officers and ratify and confirm the same.
- 23. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

# Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and the Citizens of the School District of Columbia:

#### Foreword

As time goes on with little apparent change in the tense political situation of the world, our attention is focused more and more upon our war potential as compared with that of the countries with a different philosophy of life. If this comparison were to be made from the standpoint of population alone, there would be grave cause for alarm. Our hope for security must lie then in an educational program in our schools of such a nature that the effectiveness of American manpower will be increased beyond that of any other nation. This means that the qualitative capabilities of our young people must be developed to the degree that they will later as adults more than compensate for any quantitative shortage in this respect.

Acknowledgement of this added responsibility of helping boys and girls to develop a competency which will stand them in good stead in case of an emergency, to the many already being carried by our schools, means that educational theory must go beyond the recognition of the importance of the problems, needs, and interests of the learner. It must help our youth to use the method of intelligence rather than of emotions when they come to grips with the many and varied social problems at different maturity levels. Assistance will need to be given in the clarification of value alternatives and in the understanding and practicing democratic way of life. In addition it will be necessary to set up learning experiences of a type which will best meet these needs, problems and tensions of young people; which will best illuminate for them the social realities of our times; and which will help them most to think through their basic convictions.

### **Teachers**

We are again very fortunate, as the shortage of elementary teachers grows even more acute, to have yeteran teachers in all our schools. Christie Kimball, an experienced teacher from Johnson Normal School, Vermont, has been employed to teach Grades 5-8 at the Grand Division School. The teachers who have returned to work with us this year and their respective schools and grades are Florence B. Hughes, Church, Grades 1-4; Ferne C. Fogg, Cone, Grades 5-8; and Mary S. Gray, South Columbia, Grades 1-4.

### School Nurse

With the shortage of nurses just as serious as that of teachers, it means much to have our veteran nurse, Mrs. Ethel S. Sturgis, continue to look after the health of the school children in this supervisory union. Concrete evidence increasingly indicates that the degree of success attained in academic school work, as in physical work, is determined to a very considerable extent by the overall health status maintained by the pupil.

### Enrollment and Attendance

The number of pupils enrolled in the schools in the district has continued to decrease again this year, as is indicated by a total enrollment of 77 in comparison to 81 last year and 88 the previous year. The average percentage of attendance for the four schools during the past year was 95.11 and the average number of tardiness per pupil was .34. A breakdown of this attendance and tardiness record for each school may be found in a tabulation printed on subsequent pages in this report.

In contrast to the decrease in the number of elementary pupils attending school within, there has been a marked increase in the number attending school outside the district, as there are 15 now en-

rolled at the Colebrook Elementary School as compared to only 9 last year. The explanation of this increase is the moving of more families into the section of the district from which the pupils attend the Colebrook School. There is some increase, also, in the number of pupils taking secondary work outside the district, as there are 25 enrolled this year in contrast to 23 last year, with 24 and 1 enrolled at Colebrook Academy and Stratford High school respectively.

### Grounds-Buildings-Equipment

a of him on the

The policy of providing facilities and equipment conducive to efficient school work has been continued during the past year. Work done on the buildings included painting, shingling, and miscellaneous repair work. The desks and chairs at the Church School were converted from the stationary to the movable type which makes for greater flexibility and adaptability of the work carried on in the classroom. And much needed new window shades have been put up in both the Grand Division and Church Schools.

With the big improvement made to the play-grounds at the South Columbia, Cone, and Church Schools during the summer, and since the one at the Grand Division School has been improved previously, all four schools now have more adequate areas for various play and recreational activities. The district expresses its deep appreciation to the State Highway Department for the work done at the South Columbia and Cone Schools, and to the Columbia Grange for the grading and ditching done at the Church School. Improvements in playground equipment are in the making, too, for plans have been made already to install swing and see-saw units at the Church School which, with those presently in use at the South Columbia School, means that two of the four schools will be so equipped.

Due to the frost action through the years in the

heavy clay soil upon which the Church School sets, the foundation of the building is in a serious condition. Indications are that, if the district plans to continue using this building for school purposes for an indefinite period, it will be expedient to put a new foundation under it in the near future.

### Notes on the Budget

The budget of the School Board is \$28,339.00 as compared to \$26,758.00 for this year. This amount is reduced by an estimated income of \$4,000.00 which leaves a balance of \$24,339.00 to be raised by taxes by the town. For the most part, the substantial increase in the budget for next year is explained, as will be noted in the budget breakdown found on subsequent pages in this report, by provision for increases in salaries, tuition costs, and repair expenses.

### Miscellaneous

With constant watch kept of the general health of the pupils through periodic examination and follow-up work where necessary, attention is given to that very important phase of the pupil's school life, namely, his or her physical welfare.

With a new Governor and Legislature, and with possible changes being made in both the formula and adjusted valuations of real estate plus steadily increasing enrollments, the amount of state financial aid to education to be distributed to the individual school districts for the next two years is very uncertain.

#### Conclusion

Again I wish to express my sincere and deep appreciation to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers and citizens for all the help and cooperation received in our work together to keep standards high in our schools.
