#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year: the sum of \$1,500 for summer and \$1,500 for winter roads.

4 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 for interest and insurance or pass any vote relating thereto.

5 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.

6 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

7 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$750 to cover long term notes including P.W.A. Bond.

8. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$50 for Old Home Day Celebration.

9 To see if the town will raise for Town Road Aid the sum of \$592.50 to the State's \$3,038.14. Or the town to raise for State Aid Construction the sum of \$592.50 to the State's \$1,184. (Only one of these available each year).

10 To see if the town will raise \$700 for street lights.

11 To see if the town will raise \$300 for Blister Rust Control or pass any vote relating thereto. 12 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.

13 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$40 for the Monadnock Region Association.

14 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.

15 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency.

16 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the use of the town health officer and Board of Health due to the war emergency.

17 To see what action the town will vote in regard to wages to be paid, or pass any vote relating thereto.

18 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### **REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING**

#### **DEERING, N. H., MARCH 11, 1941**

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of Deering, N. H., was called to order by the moderator, Ralph H. Whitney, at nine o'clock in the morning. After the warrant was read it was voted to keep the polls open until six o'clock. It was voted to take up the articles following article 1 at eleven o'clock.

Article 1—Votes were cast for all officers on the Australian ballot as follows:

Selectman for years—Leroy H. Locke had 51 votes, Arthur O. Ellsworth had 85 votes and took oath of office.

Selectman for 1 year—Carroll E. Greene had 61 votes, Ernest Johnson had 74 votes and took oath of office.

Town Clerk—Marguerite L. Dutton had 113 votes and took oath of office.

Town Treasurer—Marguerite L. Dutton had 160 votes and took oath of office.

Highway Agent—Ralph B. Adams had 49 votes, Howard E. Whitney had 84 votes and took oath of office.

Overseer of Poor—Chairman of selectmen had 55 votes, Arthur O. Ellsworth had 65 votes and took oath of office.

Tax Collector—Arthur H. Jacques had 32 votes, Chester P. McNally had 100 votes and took oath of office.

Auditors—Louis J. Fisher had 48 votes, Harold C. Taylor had 60 votes; Eunice E. Willgeroth had 62 votes and Marjorie A. Holden had 78 votes and both took oath of office.

Library Trustee—Helen I. Taylor had 58 votes, Ida D. Hart had 60 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds—James W. Ellsworth had 45 votes, Jessie C. Colburn had 74 votes and took oath of office.

Constables—Albert H. Brown had 30 votes, Harold McLain had 40 votes; Charles H. Taylor had 76 votes and Harold G. Wells had 92 votes and took oath of office.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber—Herbert C. Spiller had 55 votes, Everett H. Abbott had 62 votes.

Article 2—Upon motion male by Leroy H. Locke it was voted to raise \$1,800.

Article 3—Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to raise \$1,500 for winter roads and \$1,500 for summer roads.

Article 4—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$400 for interest charges.

Article 5—Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to have selectmen deliver inventory blanks when assessing.

Article 6—Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to authorize selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$500 for long term notes.

Article 8—Upon motion made by Harold Wells it was voted to raise \$50 for Old Home Day.

Article 9—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$597 for first part of article.

Article 10—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$700 for street lights.

Article 11—Motion made by Howard Whitney to tar road as far as Porter's Corner. Upon motion made by Albert Holden it was voted to tar road as far as Kimball's corner and take cost out of the T. R. A. money.

Article 12—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted not to raise the sum of \$300.

Article 13—Upon motion made by Howard Whitney it was voted to authorize selectmen to buy 100 chairs.

Article 14—Upon motion made by Harold Wells it was voted to raise \$500 for Town Poor and Old Age Assistance.

Article 15—No action on this article.

Article 16—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted that selectmen assess the real estate.

Article 17—It was voted to raise \$2,089.90 for over-draft.

Article 18—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$40 for the Monadnock Region.

Article 19—Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to sell any property acquired by town at a public sale (auction) except that bought by George E. Willgeroth.

Article 20—Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to have the books audited by the town auditors.

Article 21—Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted to have constables, elected today, sworn in as police officers.

Article 22—It was moved by Chester P. McNally that the road agent and selectmen be instructed to keep within appropriation.

It was voted to adjourn without date.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March, 1942, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2 To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3 To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4 To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5 To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6 To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating · thereto.

7 To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8 To see if the district will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

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9 To see what action the school district will take to either sell or recondition for further use the Manselville school house and raise and appropriate money for same.

10 To see if the district will appropriate and raise a sum of money not in excess of fifteen hundred dollars for the purpose of building a school house in the West Deering District so-called, and authorize its School Board to borrow and pledge the credit of said district by note or a series of notes for the purpose of raising the whole or any portion of the sum so voted; and to elect a committee to supervise the construction of such building as may be authorized at the meeting; or take any other action in relation to the whole or any portion of this article.

11 To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to expend the five hundred seventy-five dollars to be paid by the insurance company for the loss of the former school house in said West Deering district in the purchase of books and equipment and to apply the balance remaining towards the amount appropriated under the foregoing article for the construction of any school house voted.

To the School Board and the Citizens of the Deering School District:

I am pleased to present a brief account concerning the schools of the district.

The following pupils deserve honorable mention for having maintained perfect attendance during the school year 1940-1941, for the number of periods indicated. The school year consists of thirty-seven weeks, and is divided into four periods. East Deering: Ronald Locke, entire year; Shirley Colburn, two terms; Florence Evans, three terms; Barbara Michie, three terms; David Titcomb, two terms; Jean Titcomb, three terms; Howard Whitney, three terms; Eleanor Gardner, two terms; Donald Johnson, one term.

West Deering: Jean McAlister, Irene McAlister, Everett McAlister, entire year of four terms; Robert McAlister, one term; Gordon Clark, two terms; Allen Kiblin, entire year of four terms.

#### GENERAL DISCUSSION

School opened in September with a registration of twenty-three pupils at East Deering, ten at West Deering, thirteen from the Manselville district at Hillsboro Grammar school, and nine attending Hillsboro high school, making a total school population of fifty-five. In order to maintain our national morale and prosperity, and to safeguard the democratic principles for which we have taken up arms, it behooves us as a nation to maintain our schools well filled, and our educational programs undisturbed. The lure of high wages caused by present day abnormal conditions must not cause American youth to leave school without taking advantage of the educational opportunities which America so generously provides.

The children of East Deering appreciate the sanitary improvements made during the summer vacation. The building should be further improved by painting the exterior and the interior. The ceiling should be renovated, and probably the floor too unless it can be so repaired as to keep out the cold winter drafts which oblige the children to wear their outer garments to keep warm. The water question is as acute as ever. The long dry spell made it almost impossible for the neighbors to spare any water for the schools. The schools should be provided with their own wells.

We all regret the destruction by fire of the West Deering school. The temporary arrangement which has been made to take care of the pupils from that part of the town is not permanent. Deering is a state aided town receiving substantial yearly amounts of money to help maintain the schools. Considering this fact the voters of the district should formulate some plan to provide schooling for the children in question, a plan which will conform with the limited amount of help which may be secured from the state. If the plan adopted by the school district requires a greater expense to provide schooling, than the state is in a position to approve, in that case the school district will have to bear alone the amount beyond which the state will not help maintain the school in question. In these times when the problem of meeting our taxes is so great anyway. it would pay for the voters of the district to get together on the most economical way to the town as a whole.
