TOWN WARRANT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE,

ROCKINGHAM, S.S.

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on the second Tuesday in March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1.. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the alterations and amendments of the constitution proposed by the constitutional convention shall be approved.
- 3. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the maintenance of the poor, for the laying out and repairing of highways, and building and repairing bridges, and for other necessary charges arising in said town.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to substitute an iron bridge for the wooden one now over the Ford-way, so-called, and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Upton Post, No. 45, Department of New Hampshire, Grand Army of the Republic, to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.
- 6. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to extend the limits of the Derry Fire Precinct so as to include all the territory covered by the Derry Water Works Co., and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a team for the use of the town, said team to consist of two horses, harness and a dump cart.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to Macadamize the main traveled road from West Derry to East Derry.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to curb the sidewalks on each side of Broadway in West Derry from the corner of Maple street to the Boyd place on the North side, and from Pillsbury street to Pine street on the South side, and establish the building lines and width and grade of sidewalks.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a stone crusher and road roller.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct the Selectmen to purchase all the existing sewer or sewers owned by the West Derry Sewerage Association or arrange with them for necessary additions to the same and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to expend an additional sum, not exceeding five thousand dollars, for the purpose of furnishing and completing the Adams' Memorial Building and pass any vote relating thereto.
 - 13. To see if the Town will vote to issue bonds in

accordance with Section 9, Chapter 43, of the acts of 1895, for the purpose of liquidating the town debt, and defraying the cost of any improvements to be made under articles 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 in this warrant and to pass any vote relating thereto.

- 14. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will consent to change of ownership of the John Robins farm, said town owning a mortgage on said farm, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will accept the location of the hydrant near the Southeast corner of the Perkins, Hardy & Co. factory, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 17. To see what action the Town will take relative to a renewal of a contract with the Derry Electric Light Company, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 89, Session Laws, 1901, relating to the powers and duties of towns in certain appropriations.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to widen and straighten Maple street in said Town, beginning at Horne's block on said street, and extending to a point at or near the residence of George Clark.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to lay out, construct and maintain a concrete sidewalk, beginning at the junction of Broadway and Maple street, and running on said Maple street to a point near the residence of George Clark.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to locate an electric light on the corner of Perkins & Hardy's shop on Maple street.

- 22. To see whether the Town will vote to purchase the water works of the Derry Water Works Company, and if so, to see whether the town will vote to issue bonds to raise the money to make said purchase.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to place an arc light at or near the corner of Oak and Exchange streets.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to locate and maintain an electric arc light at or near the iron bridge over Horne's brook on Broadway in West Derry.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to construct a concrete sidewalk from the residence of John Low on the West side of Birch street to the highway leading into Nortonville.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to locate and maintain an electric light at the corner of Birch street and the highway leading to Nortonville.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to lay out, construct and maintain a concrete sidewalk, beginning at a point at the junction of High street and Broadway, and running on the Westerly side of said High street to a point near the house of George Clark.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to establish and maintain an electric light at or near the corner of Franklin street and Warren avenue.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to construct a concrete sidewalk from the corner of Pearl and Franklin streets to Warren avenue, on the Northerly side of said street.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to reconsider the vote whereby the town voted to continue the highway district system, and pass any vote relating thereto.

31. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for any articles embraced in this warrant.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

The board has received but few complaints from the unsanitary condition of buildings this year.

Disturbances between neighbors cannot be settled by the board, but when any unsanitary condition is found to exist, we shall endeavor to correct the same.

The chief duty of the board has been in looking after the contagious diseases which have appeared in town from time to time.

There have been three cases of diphtheria, ten of scarlet lever, two of typhoid, and several of measles. The people failing to report the the latter as too insignificant makes it impossible to have a correct report. Although the law is as emphatic on the importance of reporting measles as any other disease, and the penalty is as severe for failing to do so, as is shown by the following law:

When any householder knows or has reason to believe that any person within his family or household has either of the following diseases, viz: cholera, smallpox, typhus fever, yellow fever, diphtheria, membraneous croup, scarlet fever, typhoid fever or measles, he shall within 24 hours give notice to the local board of health, unless a physician has been called, in which case the physician will give the notice and by so doing relieve the householder of all responsibility in the case.

"Any person or corporation failing to comply with the above shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$200, or be imprisoned not more than six months or both."

Any person can readily see that they are liable to the penalty as set forth above by failing to report any of the diseases aforementioned, and it is only the leniency of the Board that has saved several from being brought up for their carelessness.

- 7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise for the support of schools in addition to the sum required by law.

- 8. To see what action the District will take with reference to paying the first of the four notes, amounting to \$1370.00, maturing Aug. 5, 1903; and the interest on all four notes, amounting to \$219.20, and to see if the District will hereafter pay the Broadway Savings Bank of Lawrence, Mass., their interest semi-annually, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the District will vote to instruct the School Board to contract for a new heater for the West Side School, with the unexpended school money.
- 10. To see if the School District will cause its meetings to be held hereafter at the East Side School building at West Derry.
- 11. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of insuring the School buildings of the District.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to employ a Superintendent of Schools, or to unite with one or more Town Districts for the purpose of employing a Superintendent for the Public Schools of such Towns, under the provisions of Chap. 77 of the Session Laws of New Hampshire, 1899, and to raise money to carry such a vote into effect.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

In compliance with the law of the state, the School Board respectfully presents its annual report together with a statement of the receipts and expenditures for the financial year ending Feb. 15, 1903.

Acting under authority given by the Town School District, at a special meeting holden on the 26th day of April, 1902, the loan required for enlarging and re-furnishing, was placed as follows; \$4110.00 was borrowed of the Broadway Savings Bank last August 5, 1902, at 4 per cent annually.

A request for payment of the interest semi-annually, came to hand Feb. 16, last, and to meet that request a clause is inserted in the Warrant, Article 8.

The above loan is made up of three notes, due in 12, 24, and 36 months from August 5, 1902.

To raise the \$1370.00 due in August, and to raise the interest due on the whole loan, (\$219.20), Article 8 is inserted in the Warrant. \$1370.00 was borrowed in Derry on two notes of \$685.00 each, with interest at 4 per cent annually. They are dated August 13, 1902, and are due in 48 months.

Owing to the erection of so many new houses, together with all the other improvements going on last summer the School Board found it difficult to borrow money at a low per cent, and to get work done in Derry.

Fortunately for the district, after the chairman of the School Board had spent many days in the vain quest of money at four per cent, the second member of the committee, Mr. Davis, was able to report a probable opportunity of placing a loan with the Broadway Savings Bank at 4 per cent.

Acting under the authority of the Town School District at its last regular meeting, the fifty dollars derived from the sale of a corner piece of the West Side school lot, has been spent in grading said lot.

In conformity with the vote of the district to secure extra school room accommodations, passed at its last regular meeting, the chairman of the School Board took great pains to find out the merits of the various styles of school furniture in actual use.

After thorough investigation, he became confident of the claims of the Chandler adjustable chairs and desks. He bought fifty-six primary seats and desks for one room, and forty-nine intermediate seats and desks for others.

The example of the School Board has been followed and the adjustable chairs and desks have been placed in the new rooms at the East and West Side school houses.

The insurance on our school buildings will need to be renewed the present year, and a larger appropriation will be necessary.

As regards our schools, the seven out district schools began September 8th, last and finished the fall term, December 19, 1902.

Their winter term began Monday Dec. 29, 1902, and ended Feb. 13, 1903, rounding out thirty-six weeks of school. No. 1 school at East Derry was the only exception, as it was closed by the Board of Health the second day of the fourth week of the winter term, on account of the prevalence of scarlet fever in the neighborhood.

Yet it is true that No. 1 school made good progress, and the same might be said of most other schools.

Perhaps a suggestion in regard to the No, 9 school might be in place just here. Considering the extra accommodations at the East Side school building, your committee would earnestly recommend that it be closed, and the pupils be carried to and from the East Side school. For obvious reasons, there would be great advantage to the pupils and therefore to the parents and the town.

The fall term of school at West Derry did not open until October 6th, 1902, on account of the unfinished condition of the East and West Side school houses.

The influx of pupils was so large that one entire grade, the 7th was taken from the principal's room and placed in the next lower room.

That necessitated a similiar change in every room, and a transference of pupils who lived on the west side of the railroad track, to the West Side school, where the accretion of pupils was not so large.

On October 9th, a new primary room was started at the East Side school house, and on Monday, October 13th, a new primary room was started at the West Side school house,

As the furnace for the new room at the West Side school was not completed until the middle of November, the School Board procured oil stoves to warm that room until the furnace was completed.

Although an accident to the new steam heater cost the Town School District \$154.63, and although that heavy cost had to be paid out of the regular school money, nevertheless your committee would recommend the purchase of a new heater, with the incoming term, if possible. Both for prudential and economical reasons this recommendation is made.

As a consequence of the delay in completing the building work, the West Derry schools will continue in session until March 13th next, in order to get a full 56 weeks of schooling.

It will be noticed that the unexpended balance in the treasury, Feb. 13th, when the books were closed, was \$2663.66, of which sum \$1835.65 is for regular school purposes. From this amount, the expense of keeping the West Derry schools open from Feb. 13th, to March 13, must be deducted.

It has been thought best to give below, the orders drawn up to Feb. 13, 1903, the date of closing the books, and then insert the probable expenses up to March 13, 1903, as well as the amount of orders as yet undrawn.

After this is done, there will be few, if any, outstanding bills March 13, as some pains has been taken to find out as nearly as possible, what amount will be available for the district, should they decide to buy a steam heater for the West Side school house.

It will be in order here to say that Wednesday, March 4th 3 p. m., word came from the Auditor, Lewis W. Bly, for me to send my report to the printer without being audited, as he wants them at once. I had hoped to see him again, as I had already seen him twice previous.

Much interesting matter must necessarily be omitted, and your committee therefore presents to the Selectmen and citizens, and voters of the Town School District, the following accounts:
