### TOWN WARRANT

## To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dublin Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 12, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First: To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Selectman, Road Agent, Tax Collector, and Water Commissioner.

Second: To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, and committees for the ensuing year.

Third: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Fourth: To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and for any other purpose as mentioned in the budget.

Fifth: To see if the Town will vote to apply for State Aid Construction or State Aid on Town Maintenance for the ensuing year.

Sixth: To see if the Town will vote to lease the property, as offered by the Dublin Lake Club, for a bathing beach or take any action relating thereto.

Seventh: To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the Town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Eighth: To see if the Town will appoint a zoning commission to consist of five members, to recommend boundaries for zoning districts in said town and to recommend approximate regulations therefor, in accordance with the provision of Chapter 42, of the Public Laws.

Ninth: To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for the expenses of the zoning commission if the Town votes to appoint such commission under the preceding article.

Tenth: To see if the Town will vote to sell the land formerly used as a Town Dump or take any action relating thereto.

Eleventh: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase a truck and snow plow or take any action relating thereto.

Twelfth: To see if the Town will vote to adopt compensation for Town Employees or take any action relating thereto.

Thirteenth: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

Fourteenth: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Fifteenth: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Sixteenth: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to employ a police officer during the summer months, raise and appropriate such sum of money as will be necessary to defray such expense, or take any action relating thereto.

# REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

### OLD TROY ROAD

From the Marlboro line to the so-called "Farmer place" repaired the worst places, put one six-foot plank bridge below the ledges; graveled in places and cut brush to the golf course road.

### OLD MARLBORO ROAD

Graveled on the Houghton Hill and as far as Mrs. Aldrich's entrance; in places cut the brush and scraped this road three times during the season.

Mrs. Aldrich's entrance to the Charcoal road: Lowered the culverts; cut brush and trucked away to burn.

#### CHARCOAL ROAD

Graveled in places and blasted stones; cut the brush.

### GOLF COURSE ROAD

From the Charcoal Corner to Lake, graveled in places cutting brush and trucked away to burn.

### WEST SIDE LAKE ROAD

Patched the road; "tarvia" several times during the season. Cut the brush and low hanging limbs. Trucked away to burn.

#### SOUTH SIDE LAKE ROAD

From the outlet of lake to Wait Corner, graveled in places to the oiled road and scraped several times during the summer. Patched the road with tarvia. Cut the brush and low hanging limbs. Trucked away to burn.

# ROAD FROM OWL'S NEST TO MR. WHITING'S

Repaired the washout opposite Mr. Merryman's entrance; graveled the hill and cut brush.

#### OLD HARRISVILLE ROAD

Graveled in places; lowered culvert, and cut brush.

#### THE ROAD PAST CEMETERY

Graveled in places; cut the brush and alders on cross road from ice house to cement road; trucked away to burn.

### CHESHAM ROAD

Graveled in places.

#### UPPER JAFFREY ROAD

Graveled in places; cut brush and installed one new metal culvert from the No. 4 school to Jaffrey line.

### CROSS ROAD SHATTUCK ELM TO PAGE PLACE

Graveled in places; cut brush and repaired washout on the hill west of Page place and graveled the hill.

# THE SOUTH JAFFREY ROAD Thorndike Pond

Put new stringers and bridge plank at the Page meadow brook; graveled in places and cut brush and some trees to the Jaffrey line.

From the Page Place to Niemela Corner Cut brush and graveled in places.

From Niemela Corner Past Camp Iroquois to Jaffrey Line Graveled in places and repaired the washout on hill east of Camp Iroquois.

From No. 3 Schoolhouse to Polland Corner and Dublin Inn Club

Graveled in places and cut brush and trees.

From No. 2 Schoolhouse—Goldmine and Old Jaffrey Roads Replaced plank at iron bridge. New stringers and plank at brook at foot of Mr. Koskela's hill. New posts and railings at the two brooks on the old Jaffrey road. One culvert north of the line. Graveled in places and cut brush.

From Bond's Corner—East View—Monument Roads
Graveled in places. Cut brush and repaired washout on East
View road.

Scraped the roads and dragged several times. Cleaned the ditches and culverts. Repaired and painted the tractors and plows. There have been 9403 yards of road material used during the year.

# PERMANENT IMPROVED ROAD Pumpelly Hill

Starting at the Wait Corner to a distance up the hill opposite Mr. Shallcross' service drive, 800 lineal feet, a 21 foot road. Blasted and removed all the old stone culverts and rocks in road bed. The ditches laid up stone base. Installed five reinforced concrete culverts, 178 lineal feet. Headers laid up with stone. Blasted out long outlets. Cedar posts set at each end and painted two coats of paint. Used 252 yards stone, 588 yards gravel, 2100 gallons oil for the two applications. Cut the brush. Trimmed the trees and trucked the brush to burn.

# PERMANENT CONSTRUCTION Upper Jaffrey Road

Starting at station opposite the so-called Upton Avenue where road was started to be built, dragged and shaped, graveling center

of road and where the road had washed out during early spring. Starting at 2150 feet where the road was finished, cutting the curves this side of the No. 4 Schoolhouse brook, installing 128 lineal feet 12-inch, and 32 lineal feet 48-inch, reinforced concrete culvert. Blasted out the old stone culvert and replacing 32 feet of 48-inch. New cedar posts and double railing at each end All posts were set at each end of culverts and painted two coats of paint, black bottom, white top. Used 3850 yards road material, 750 lbs. dynamite, 750 electric caps. The road is graveled to station, 4450 feet, which is fifty feet beyond the brook toward Jaffrey. Dragged the road several times.

# E. R. U. ACCOUNT (Class V Roads) (Gravel Surface)

- No. 1. Merryman Road: From the old Harrisville road opposite Mr. Whiting's house, 1150 lineal feet to a driven stake, cut the brush and trees; widened road to 18 feet; installed one 15-inch reinforced concrete culvert 32 feet, and one 16-inch, 36 foot. Used 50 lbs. dynamite and 50 electric caps, installing culverts and blasting water outlets. Spread 123 yards town gravel.
- 2. Parson's Road: From MacVeagh corner, a distance of 300 feet to a driven stake, from the top of Parson Hill toward farm, 250 lineal feet to driven stake. Blasted water outlets and rocks. Used 50 lbs. dynamite and 50 electric caps. Spread 45 yards town gravel—52 yards Parsons—total of 97 yards.
- 3. Polland Road: From opposite Mrs. Bremer's house past Mr. Polland's to the junction of roads, 4216 lineal feet, widened the road in places; installed one 12 inch reinforced concrete culvert 24 feet. 25 lbs. dynamite and 25 electric caps. Spread 251 yards Grau's gravel.
- 4. Goldmine Road: Starting from the No. 3 schoolhouse to Latti corner, 5046 lineal feet, to a driven stake, widened the road; cut the curve back ten feet at foot of hill beyond Mr. Methley's pasture; blasted the ledge. Used 50 lbs. dynamite and 25 electric caps. Spread 333 yards town gravel, 463 yards Grau's, a total of 796 yards.
- 5. Old Crow Road: Starting at the junctions of road opposite Mr. Pickford's to the Jaffrey line, 4752 lineal feet, widened the road and cut the curve, filling base of meadow with stone north of Perry brook. Used 25 lbs. dynamite and 25 electric caps. Spread 515 yards town gravel, 396 yards Pickford's, 25 yards stone town bank, a total of 911 yards gravel and 25 yards stone.
- 6. Troy Road: Starting at the junctions of road at Golf Club to a driven stake opposite Mr. Weld's stable, 5410 lineal feet, widened the road, cutting the curve back on the right by Mr. Pell's meadow six feet. Cut the banks and curve six feet north of the

mountain brook at the brow of the hill. Used 75 lbs. dynamite and 75 electric caps. Spread 150 yards town gravel, 256 Platt's, 408 Mrs. Shonk's, 312 Grau's, a total of 1126 yards.

7. Old Marlboro Road: The culverts were delivered for the one at the foot of hill by spring, 24 lineal feet of 14-inch and one 18-inch, 20 foot opposite the Sawdust pile. The total amount of gravel used on roads mentioned, 3304 yards; 275 lbs. dynamite and 260 electric caps. These roads were dragged and put in shape for winter.

### REPORT OF THE DUBLIN SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of the Dublin School District:

We herewith submit the one hundred and thirteenth annual

report of our school.

On February 19, 1934, Mr. Lawton Chase, who had given much counsel and aid to the District, died suddenly. His loss was keenly felt by the School Board, who wish to take this opportunity to express once more their appreciation of his splendid work.

His place as Superintendent was filled temporarily by Mr. Sin-

clair, who carried forward the plans laid out.

At the end of the 1933-1934 school year in June the State Board of Education brought about certain changes in the Supervisory Unions. The Dublin District now belongs to the so-called Peterborough-Jaffrey Supervisory Union which includes the towns of Dublin, Hancock, Jaffrey, Peterborough, Rindge and Sharon. Mr. Lewis S. Record, formerly Superintendent of the Jaffrey Union, was elected as Superintendent of the new Union. The Union office is still maintained in Peterborough.

Mr. Record has been very helpful and meets frequently with

the School Board.

The three members of the teaching staff have been retained for another year. Mr. Jesse V. Miller, Principal, teaches the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades, manual training, athletics, and nature studies. Miss Corinne Boucher, teaches the third, fourth, and fifth grades and Art. Miss Ruth McLeod teaches the first and second grades and singing.

Mrs. Mildred H. Whitcomb of Keene, an experienced singing teacher, comes for one half day each week and gives all pupils training which is followed up during the other days by Miss McLeod.

Miss Mary Grimes of Dublin spends two days a week giving remedial work to certain pupils in all the grades who, for one reason or another, need special attention. The Board feels that this work will help the youngest children to get ahead faster in subjects which are particularly difficult for them. The Board hopes that this procedure will relieve the teaching staff considerably and make progress for the classes as a whole somewhat faster.

The health of the School is watched by Miss Harris who has served as visiting nurse for several years. Dr. Clark is always

available and makes periodic examinations of the pupils.

Mr. Clifton P. Clukay has been appointed janitor.

During the summer, closet space was built in two of the rooms in the schoolhouse as storage space has always been noticeably lacking. The new equipment provides an abundance of book-case room and adds greatly to the appearance of the so-called museum room.

The entire building is in good shape with only a few minor needs

in the way of repair or improvement.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Dublin School Board:

Upon taking charge of the Dublin schools as a result of the rearrangement of the Peterborough and Jaffrey Supervisory Unions, I was glad to find such favorable conditions for school progress as exist in Dublin.

The three regular teachers in the Consolidated School returned this year, and the program for the present year has been con-

tinued along the lines of last year with but few changes.

Miss Mary Grimes, a graduate of Keene Normal School, was secured as a part time teacher, who has devoted most of her periods to remedial work. This type of work is needed in nearly all schools and is proving very helpful, especially in the lower grades.

It seemed best to secure a regular supervisor of music for the school year, and we were fortunate in securing Mrs. Mildred H. Whitcomb of Keene, who gives one half day each week to the Dublin schools. Mrs. Whitcomb is well qualified to carry on this work. She has for a number of years supervised the music in the schools of Troy, Fitzwilliam and Jaffrey.

The work in Health Supervision has been continued with Miss Margaret E. Harris as school nurse. The distribution of free milk was resumed during the month of November, and will con-

tinue during the school year.

During the month of October a study of problem children was carried on throughout the state, and I received valuable assistance in the local situation from your principal, Mr. Miller, in working out the blanks sent to us from the State Department of Education.

Achievement tests have been given in the upper grades, and intensive work has been carried on to keep up to the required standards.

A liberal supply of books has made the work more interesting to the pupils, and the teachers have been able to accomplish better results than would otherwise have been possible.

The present staff of teachers are doing effective work. I have

found them loyal and responsive.

I sincerely appreciate the helpful attitude of the School Board in their earnest efforts to give the children of Dublin the best that can be afforded.
