Town Meeting Warrant

(As known January 20, 1953)

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary funds to lower the ceilings in the dining room and kitchen in the town building.
 - Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Pine Blister Rust reserve fund.
 - Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used for Rag Weed control.
 - Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Civil Defense expenses.
 - Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to provide for the disposal of rubbish and garbage and raise and appropriate money for the same.
 - Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for Vital Statistics, Littleton Hospital, and expenses of the Health Department.
 - Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 for the purchase of new equipment; any balance remaining in this account at the end of the year to be added to the New Equipment Reserve Fund.

- Article 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal, maintenance of highways and bridges, oiling of its roads, and for Town Road Aid.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,950.00 for the lighting of its streets for the ensuing year.
- Article 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the highway department.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for sidewalk upkeep and repair.
- Article 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Abbie Greenleaf Library and salary of its Librarian.
- Article 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.
- Article 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of its cemeteries.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120.00 to the White Mountains Region Association.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for maintenance of the Information Booth at the Town Building.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for legal expenses.
- Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to defray the town's share of the cost of Social Security.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following: \$2,500 to pay the amount maturing on the Town Building and Water Works bonds; \$1,000 on outstanding Bridge Construction notes; \$1,000 on outstanding Fire Equipment and Garage notes; \$1,000 on outstanding Gale Reservoir Construction notes; \$1,200 on outstanding Mittersill Road Construction notes; also the sum of \$1,367.87 to pay the interest on said indebtedness and on temporary loans.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for payment of the County Tax.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to request the State Tax Commission to reappraise the improved lands and buildings for the purpose of equalizing the assessments thereon as required by statute, and to raise the necessary funds for the accomplishment of this purpose.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to allow a discount for early payment of taxes.

Article 25. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE 1951-1952

Forty-one pupils were given complete physical examinations by the school physician, Dr. Ralph Parker. Visual examinations and hearing tests were done on all pupils.

The state dental hygienist was at the school in February and administered the sodium fluoride treatment to the pupils of the first eight grades.

The Toxoid Clinic was held in April and May. Six school children were immunized and one was vaccinated.

Patch testing was done on the upper classmen in May.

Registration Day was held in June. Five pupils of the incoming first grade attended and had been examined by a doctor as requested.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Franconia School District:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The total enrollment of your school last year was 141, with 38 pupils in Grades 9-12 and 103 in Grades 1-8. The average membership was 125.2 and the precent of attendance 94. There were 45 tuition pupils in the Academy, 17 in the high school and 28 in the elementary grades.

This year the total enrollment is 132, with 39 in Grades 9-12 and 93 in Grades 1-8. There are 35 tuition pupils enrolled at the present time, 6 high school and 11 elementary pupils are from Lisbon Town, 8 high school and 6 elementary pupils are from Easton and 4 high school pupils are from Sugar Hill.

Your school board has been very busy this year. In the fall they attended the State School Boards Association meeting at Concord. Later in the year a meeting was held with Commissioner Buley to consider union boundaries. The board met with the Littleton P. T. A. to discuss the advantages and disadvantages of a large area school. Regular monthly meetings and occasional special meetings are held. This hard-working board deserves the commendation and appreciation of the community.

The trust fund at Dow is not a large one but it is a distinct asset to the school. It furnishes extras that the school district alone might find inconvenient to purchase. This year the trustees bought a sewing machine, chairs for the auditorium, an overhead projector and other visual aids. They gave money for the athletic program.

For a detailed report of the school and its activities, I refer you to the most excellent report of Paul Farris, Principal at Dow Academy.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The second annual report of my administration as Principal of Dow Academy is hereby submitted.

FACULTY

The fall term opened with some staff changes. Miss Callahan, Mr. Cole, Mr. McLure, and myself returned to discharge our obligations. New teachers added this year are as follows: Miss Blanche Carr of Lincoln taught grades 1 and 2. Mrs. Alice Leavitt replaced her after the Christmas vacation. Mrs. Elizabeth Lowden of North Woodstock teaches grades 3 and 4. Mrs. Margaret Graham of Lancaster teaches Science and Social Studies, Miss Kathleen Frothingham of Portsmouth teaches the Commercial studies. Mr. Frank Wilbur of Danville, Vt. teaches English and French. Mrs. Irene Sinclair of Lincoln is handling the vocal music for the school. Mrs. Pauline Cole has replaced Mrs. Elizabeth Moore, who resigned during the Christmas vacation, as teacher of Home Economics. Mr. Merton Shores is teaching Shop.

I find the faculty a conscientious and capable group of individuals who are stimulating and cooperative.

CURRICULUM

The shed beside the gymnasium has been improved and with further improvements it is hoped that in the near future our shop will be moved from the gym to this location. It affords more space and better facilities for an improved shop course.

Driver Education is being continued this year and is proving its practical value to all concerned.

World Affairs, taught by Mrs. Graham, is a new subject offered for the first time this year. Other courses not offered as a regular part of our curriculum will be available next year to interested and capable students. Correspondence courses are approved by the State Department of Education and are of great value to small schools if properly supervised.

Work is being done towards changing the curriculum to better fulfill the needs of our students. This will not be at a sacrifice of the fundamentals of education. Now in the planning stage, it requires the cooperation of school, home, and community.

The school day is as follows: 8:25 A. M. to 12:15 P. M. is the morning session composed of four 55 minute classes. 1 P. M. to 2:50 P. M. is the afternoon session composed of two 55 minute classes. The longer periods are to provide time for supervised study. The last period in the day is what we call an activity period. It is used for Band, Glee Club, and other extra-curricula activities. The schedule is so arranged that no classes are missed because of the athletic program.

ACTIVITIES

For the first time the ski program is under the direct control of the school. Mr. Cole is the supervisor and is doing an exceptional job in this respect. We feel that it is run better than ever before, thus resulting in greater benefits for the students. A Physical Education program is being instituted at the same time and in conjunction with the ski program. Plans are underway for a continuation of this program for the rest of the year.

This year the school annual will again be printed by the Courier, after a lapse of a few years. Under the direction of Mr. Wilbur, we feel the yearbook will be bigger and better than ever.

Mr. McLure is continuing his able work in directing and improving the band.

Mrs. Sinclair devotes a full day to Glee Club and chorus work for the entire school. Present plans call for an operetta in the spring. We feel that her work is very satisfactory.

We have dropped out of the Ammonoosuc Basketball League this year. Little interest was shown by the boys in the sport, although some faithfully stuck it out. These few are now playing for Twin Mt., since Twin was plagued with injuries and issued a call for assistance. Such an experiment as a team composed of mem-

bers of rival schools is a valuable cooperative experience for all concerned.

The girls have so far enthusiastically played a few games and have more planned. Capably coached by Mrs. Graham, they have performed very well.

The ski team under the direction of Mr. Cole shows much promise and it appears they will make good showings in the many meets that are scheduled. This is a sport which is natural for this area. It has a great carry-over value beyond school.

The Dramatics Club, directed by Mr. Wilbur, has successfully performed one play and another is planned for the spring season.

HEALTH

Last spring dental fluoride treatments were administered on a voluntary basis to many students. This was a worthwhile project. Dr. Ralph Parker has performed physical examinations again this year. Miss Irma Simeneau has returned as the school nurse and is effectively cooperating in keeping the school children in good health. There is still need of more work being done in the field of dental health.

GUIDANCE

Our guidance folders are being used to a fuller extent and progress is being made in the direction of helping students choose courses and careers. Much more, however, remains to be done in this field.

LIBRARY

Through the generosity of the many friends of the school, both in giving books and money, the library has expanded very favorably. It is more widely used and steps have been taken for getting more sources of reading and reference matter for our students.

MARKING SYSTEM

The new system was instituted this fall. The aim of it is to give a more complete report to the parents of their child's progress at school. It is, we hope, a more meaningful report both to the child and the parent.

ADMINISTRATION

May I express my appreciation to the staff of the school. It is a pleasure to work with them. They are the backbone of our nation. It is my opinion that they are doing a very commendable job.

It is a pleasure to work for and with Mr. Ronald Perham, your Superintendent of Schools. He is very cooperative and is sincerely interested in doing the best possible for the students and the school.

It is a privilege to work for and with your school board. They are honest, sincere, and conscientious. They keep a close check on your school. They constantly keep the best interests of the school foremost in their thoughts and actions.
