

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STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the town of Goffstown qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
2. To choose three selectmen for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for all necessary town charges, for the support of schools, and for building new and repairing highways, sidewalks, and bridges, and for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of Rogers Free Library.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to decorate soldiers' graves.
8. To see if the town will require the Manchester & North Weare Railroad to erect and maintain a gate across the highway by the side of said railroad at a crossing just east of the railroad station and north of Frank E. Paige's store in Goffstown West Village, or to station a flagman there.
9. To see if the town will vote to build a new highway near the house of J. W. Watson, agreeably to the petition of Warren B. Richards and seventeen others.
10. To see what action the town will take in relation to discontinuing the old highway beginning at New Boston line near the house of J. W. Watson, thence easterly to the junction with the road leading to the house of Miss E. Fanny Butterfield, being southerly of the house of Mrs. Hattie Richards.
11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate two hundred dollars to set out trees and shrubbery in the cemeteries in town.

To the Taxpayers of Goffstown :

You will see by the annexed report that the cost of maintaining and keeping in repair highways and bridges is \$1,479.80 more than we expended the previous year, which is largely due to the very frequent heavy rain storms which badly damaged our highways by washing, which in some localities created large expenditures of money to make them safe for the public travel. Also a great trouble the past winter has been caused by ice being formed, which has been a source of great trouble and made quite an additional expense to the expenditures on highways. Also the hill in the village has been improved by grading and laying drain pipe, also the rebuilding of a part of the stone work near the bridge on account of its unsafe situation. The taxes of the fiscal year just closed were committed to Henry Moore for collection on condition that the whole list should be paid to the town treasurer on or before the twentieth day of February, which has been done, with the exception of the usual abatements, consisting of poor people, illegal overtax, and transients who have left town, to the amount of \$99.36. For this Mr. Moore has our thanks and we doubt not the thanks of all of you for his perseverance in the accomplishment of so desirable a result.

We earnestly recommend to our successors that the same policy in relation to the collection of taxes be pursued in future, believing it will be a lasting benefit to the town.

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
TRUSTEES OF THE ROGERS FREE LIBRARY.

The library has been open for the distribution of books every Saturday afternoon and has been well patronized.

We would call attention to the additions made to the library by purchase and gift.

Many of the books are of permanent value, like the History of the Nations and Biography of American Statesmen, and all have been selected with care. In this selection we have been aided by the kindness of a friend having access to the public libraries of Boston and of Nashua, and who furnished us with a list of books in great demand in those libraries. We also received a list prepared by the State Library Commission of the books recommended by them for the town libraries receiving state aid. We are also under obligations to the Rev. Mr. Wentworth for a valuable list prepared by him. We think few libraries of equal size contain so large a proportion of valuable and interesting books. We would be glad to receive from any one the name of any book they would like to have in the library, or any suggestion that might help us in the selection.

Of the money received from the town we have expended for books \$113.75, purchasing 116 volumes.

Near the close of last year we received from George M. Story the proceeds of an evening's entertainment for the benefit of the library, \$71.13, and have purchased therewith 72 volumes. To Mr. Story's efforts, and to those associated with him, we are again indebted for the proceedings of a similar entertainment, amounting to \$66.00, which will be more fully accounted for in our next report.

Miss Isadore Johnson continues to fill acceptably the position of librarian, assisted by Miss Fronie Richards. They have put covers upon the new books, numbered and arranged them on the shelves, and have looked after the rebinding of such books as needed to be re-bound, and have rendered other valuable services without extra compensation.

We thank the many friends who have contributed books and magazines to the library, particularly the Misses Rogers and Mr. Albert Wallace of Washington, D. C.

REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE INDEPENDENT DISTRICT.

To the Board of Education of the Town of Goffstown :

We submit the following report of the schools in the Independent District :

There are five divisions in the school, each of which has had thirty-two weeks of schooling during the year.

The year has been divided into three terms, two of eleven weeks each and one of ten weeks.

The number of different scholars attending during the year has been 215.

The number belonging to the district, 201.

The largest number attending any one term, 192.

The attendance in the different rooms has been as follows :

The numbers given for the first term are misleading. The crowded condition of the second primary required the promotion

of a class, and this made a like promotion necessary in each room, and consequently a double count is had. Instead of 250, the true number in attendance was 192.

Special effort has been made to secure a better record of attendance. Some improvement has been made, but we fear many of the parents and scholars are indifferent to its importance. The loss of a single recitation is a golden opportunity gone forever. A succession of them puts the scholar behind his class. He loses his ambition and his courage, finds his lessons hard and uninteresting, and when told that he must fall back a class and review his studies, he is too apt to criticise the teacher, perhaps the committee, and to receive in his faultfinding the sympathy and support of his parents. All this may be avoided, satisfactory progress made, and pleasant relations with the school and its officers maintained by simply practicing punctuality. This evil is most prominent in the intermediate and grammar grades. Here the percentage of absences is one twelfth, or three scholars from each room every day.

It is a pleasure to commend those who do well, and we ask attention to the list of those who have been present every day for one term or more.

Twenty-one three terms, twenty-three two terms, and thirty-nine one term — eighty-three in all.

Of these, Josie Hadley, Willie Hadley, and Mary Hadley come from C. C. Hadley's, and Annie Merrill from H. W. Merrill's, over a mile distant.

At the close of the spring term Mr. Pearse resigned as principal of the high school. Miss Lull withdrew from the grammar school, and Mrs. McQueston gave up her position as teacher of vocal music. Each had done good work, and had been with us several years. They bear away with them the respect and good wishes of the committee and the patrons of the school.

Mr. James M. Curran was elected principal to succeed Mr. Pearse. He is an experienced teacher, a graduate of Dartmouth, a good scholar, a quiet but exacting teacher. He assigns a lesson, the scholar recites it, and his success or failure is recorded on the class-book. This record is a silent monitor constantly pleading for better work, and a comparison of the two terms'

examinations shows that better work is being done. The school-room is quiet and orderly, and we anticipate good results from his labors.

We have experienced great difficulty in procuring a teacher for the grammar school. Two were elected who received better offers elsewhere and declined our call. Then Miss Carrie Hoitt accepted with the understanding that she might leave if a school in Manchester was offered her. She taught one week, when the offer came and she left. Miss Hoitt is a good teacher, and it is not her fault that Manchester can pay her more than we can. We next engaged Miss Moses, and were much pleased with her work. She had had experience, was a normal school graduate, and was a lady of more than common ability. Her health, however, compelled her to resign, and after two weeks Miss Lillian Metcalf, of Ashland, Mass, was engaged to succeed her. Miss Metcalf taught the balance of that term and through the winter term, and declines to return. Miss Metcalf was a good scholar and an earnest teacher. She found the school badly broken by the many changes made in it, and could not bring it up to the standard she had formed for it. Our sympathies are with the teacher, and we would gladly have retained her. The school is in an unsatisfactory condition, and it needs the earnest co-operation of the parents and committee to eradicate its evils and restore it to its proper place.

To maintain a high standard in the school we must have good teachers; and "good" means superior. Such teachers are in demand elsewhere, and we can only have them by paying as much as other places pay. To that end we must come, or content ourselves with inferior schools.

We are fortunate in being able to keep with us such competent teachers as Misses Worthley, Warren, and Hunter. We must not speak too highly of them. Our commendation might be gain to them but loss to us. We will simply say, we are satisfied and hope they are.

Miss Mabel Austin has been employed as teacher in vocal music, and has acceptably filled the place. She is a graduate of the school, and an experienced teacher of music.

Drawing has now been taught in the school two years, and fair results have been secured.

An examination of the text-books shows them in fairly good condition. A few have been roughly handled, and should be paid for by the scholars. A list of prices would help us in this matter, and we again ask to be supplied with one.

We thank you for the promptness with which you have met any call from us for books and supplies, and we hope that we are now so well supplied that less will need be expended during the coming year.

REPORT
OF THE
SCHOOL BOARD OF THE TOWN DISTRICT
OF GOFFSTOWN.

In submitting our yearly report we wish to thank the citizens of this town for their kindness in voting an extra sum for the support of schools this year. We are very glad to have you realize that parsimony here would be folly. Your committee have tried to be faithful and prudent in the use of these funds.

We claim a reasonable success in our schools for the past year. Every child in this town desiring an education has a chance to get one. We have endeavored to place competent and faithful teachers in charge of schools. From the scholars we have required obedience to these teachers, and yet without making cast-iron rules, as we realize that different scholars need different regulations. Little ones should have more freedom of movement than larger ones. They ought not to be obliged "to sit, stand, speak, and move like jumping-jacks when the strings are pulled;" and yet, while allowing a reasonable liberty to the scholar, it is a necessity for the maintenance of good order that just rules should be obeyed. This cannot be done without the help of the parents. We wish they were as willing to give the teacher a moral support in government as they are to pay her salary. A child is corrected for a fault. He goes home, giving his side of the affair, telling perhaps the truth and nothing but the truth; but to tell the whole truth about his wrong-doing is not human nature. The father, without hearing the defense, condemns the teacher and removes the child from school. We beg parents not

to criticise teachers harshly, or talk about them before their families. Anything that brings contempt upon a teacher destroys her power for good.

Would you know of the work done in our schools, visit them. The mothers do, but "the fathers, where are they?" Perhaps using their leisure in sitting on the sharp edge of barrels in our country stores. Instead of doing that run into the schools now and then for a little while. You will always be welcome. Much of the responsibility for the school should be placed where it belongs, in the home. The acorn planted in the ground grows up into the light. Spreading out into the sunshine it becomes a home for the singing birds, while the tired laborer rests in its shade. It is a blessing to all around it. But from the same acorn goes another growth down into the earth, ever further from the light into perpetual darkness. Its rootlets reach out into the filth and slime and vileness that drain down from the world above. Only thus can it exist.

There are in our many homes influences that lead the children to take either an upward or downward growth like this. In that house where the laws of God and of our land are respected, it is natural for a child to grow up to be a blessing to the world, but from the home where such laws are lightly regarded, where profanity abounds and "Filthy communications corrupt good manners," they go forth to carry an evil influence. Those who associate intimately with such children "Lower to their level day by day, what is fine within them growing coarse to sympathize with clay."

The consequences of evil training are felt not alone in the school but in state and nation. Bad children grow up to be bad men and women. The state educates them expecting them to become useful members of society. If they do not, it is an injury to the whole country, for "a nation can be strong only in the intelligence and virtue of its citizens." A boy determined to lead a bad life better grow up to know but little, for "The educated scoundrel is more dangerous to society than the ignorant villain."

In some respects the labors of the school board are hard and often thankless. Frequently we give time or money where no

charge is made, and it is because we so earnestly desire the prosperity of our schools that we beg the co-operation of the parents.

Some are always ready to help. We thank them very much, and are glad to say that we have in town many bright, studious, and beautiful children whom it is a pleasure to know and a joy to help in any way.

Knowing that many skip these pages, we wish to return our sincere thanks to all who have taken the trouble to read what we have written.
