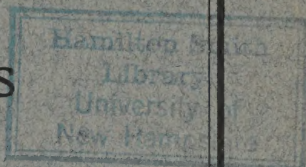

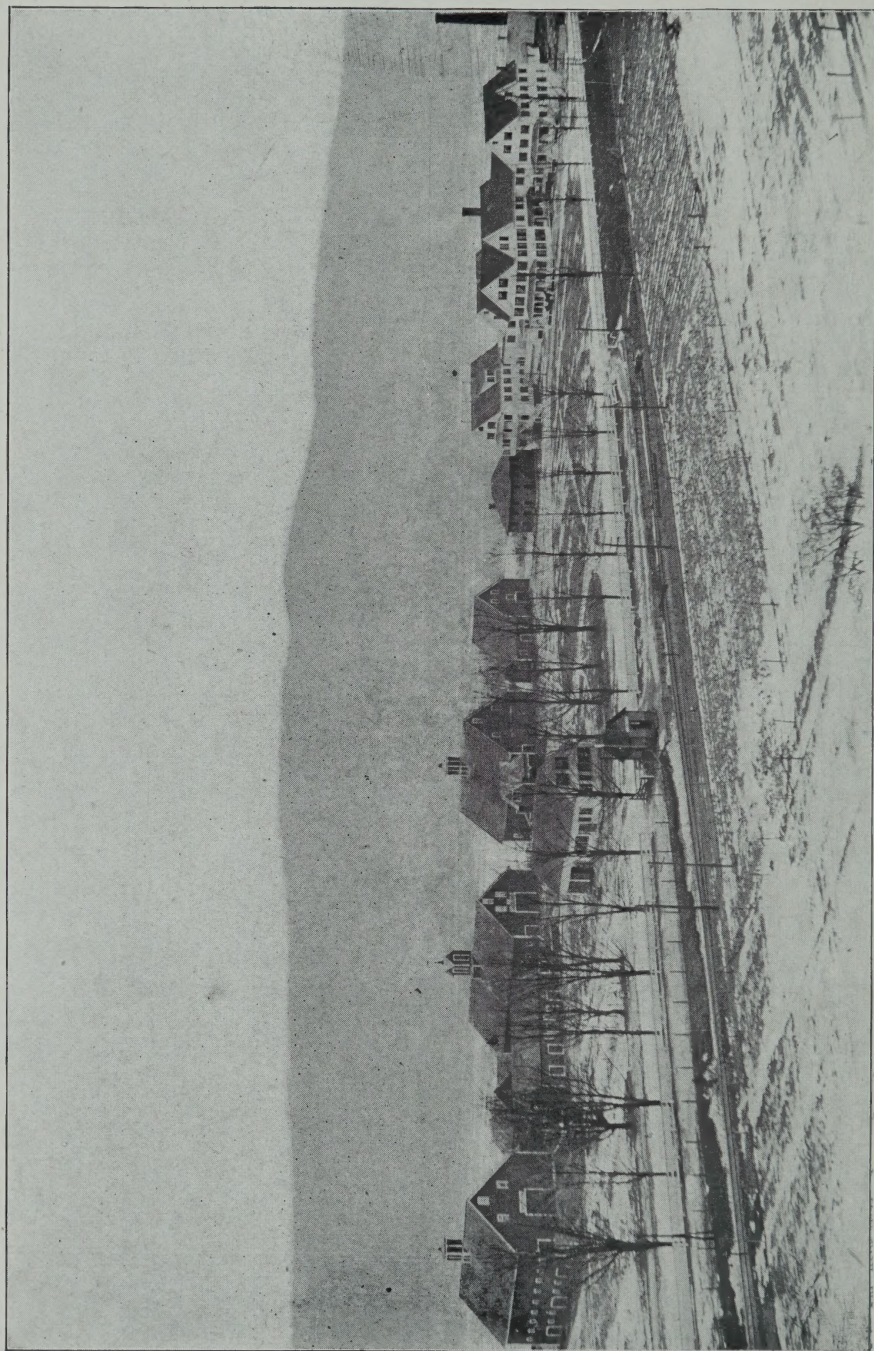

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

Your Commissioners herewith present their report together with reports of the Sheriff, Solicitor, Clerk of the Court, Jailer and Treasurer and the Auditors and Superintendent, Physician and Chaplain of the County Farm for the year ending December 31, 1918, and a statement of the financial standing of the County at the close of the year.

Mr. and Mrs. Phillips continue as Superintendent and Matron at the Farm and Miss Hemeon is still in charge of the Hospital. These officials as well as competent assistants are entitled to the highest appreciation for their excellent management and work at the County Farm.

The property of the County is in excellent condition. The farm is under a high state of cultivation and produces abundant crops. The herd of cattle is somewhat larger than ever before, numbering one hundred and sixty-four head on the first of January and is of the same high quality as in former years.

Owing to largely increased costs of labor and supplies during the last two years, our surplus has been reduced during these years, by about nine thousand dollars. This was unavoidable, owing to the fact that appropriations were made on a basis of prices existing more than two years ago.

You are cordially invited to inspect the property of the County and we trust that our management has been such as to meet with your approval.

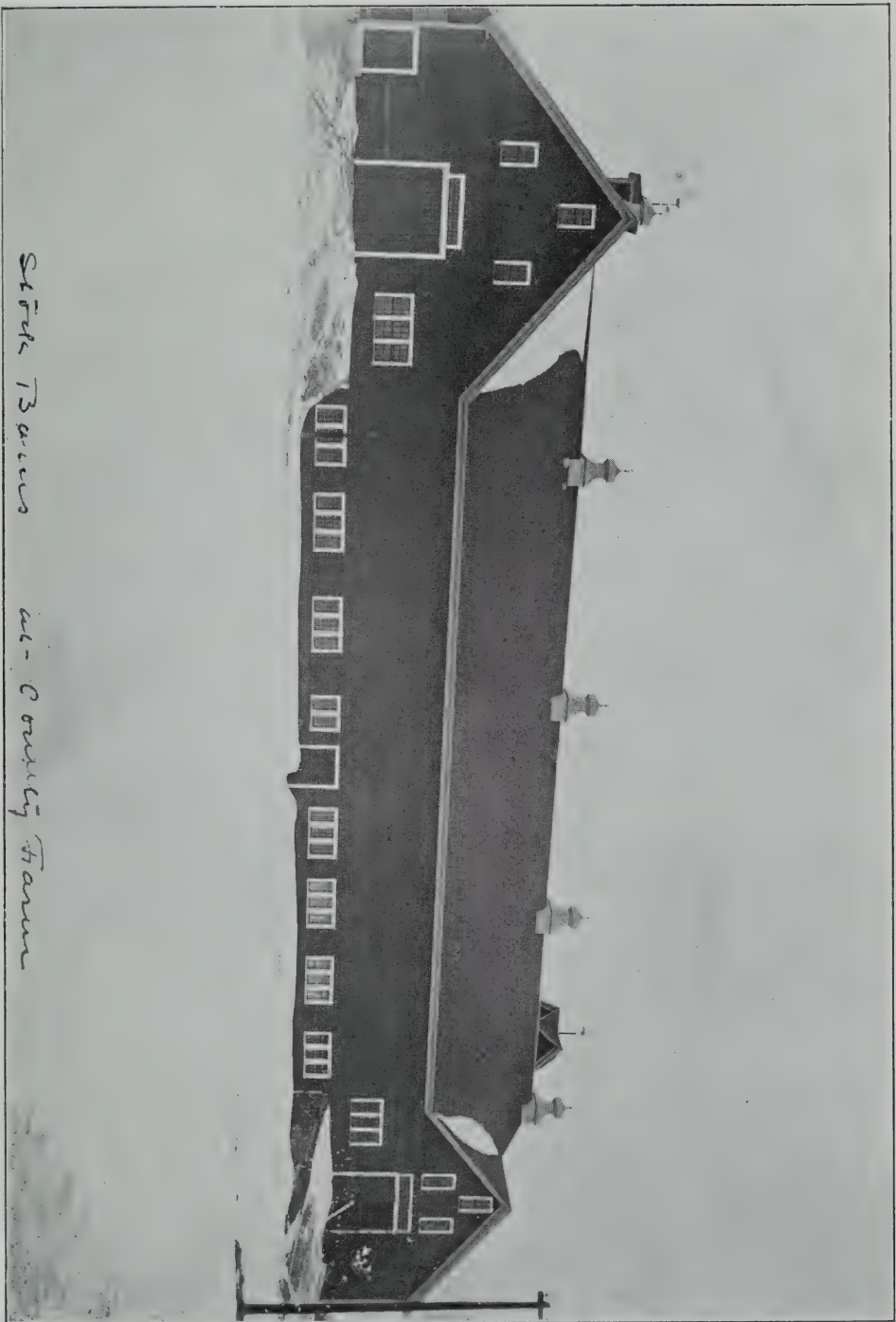

SELECTMEN OF TOWNS AND OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

Your attention is called to the following extracts from
the laws of 1903

CHAPTER 42, SECTION 1

SECTION 1. Any town or county furnishing any assistance to any person within six years preceding his death shall be entitled to recover from the estate of such persons the sum or sums paid out for such assistance, the said claim to be a preferred claim against his said estate after payment of funeral charges, expense of last sickness and expenses of administration, provided he leaves no widow or minor children living at his decease.

CHAPTER 106, SECTION 1, as amended

“SECTION 1. No town shall be liable for the support of any person unless he, or the person under whom he derives his settlement, shall have wholly gained a settlement therein during the ten years preceding the last date of application for support; provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he still resides in said town.”

CHAPTER 110, SECTION 1, last clause as amended
 "Also to Chapter 67 of the laws of 1903, Chapter 84 of
 the Public Statutes, Chapters 1 and 71 of the laws of 1907,
 relating to paupers, and the following from Chapter 110,
 Public Statutes, relating to 'assistance to persons in quar-
 antine.'"

SECTION 1. Whenever any person or family is placed
 in quarantine by a board of health, to protect the public
 against small pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or any other
 dangerous, infectious or contagious diseases, it shall be the
 duty of said board to assist such person or family while in
 quarantine in such manner as in the judgment of the board
 may be deemed wise and necessary.

SECTION 2. All expenses thus incurred, or such part
 thereof as the board may determine, shall be deemed a
 legitimate expenditure for the protection of the public
 health and shall be charged to the account of incidental ex-
 penses, but not to any indigent pauper account, nor shall
 such expenditure be construed to mean a public aid to the
 person or persons so quarantined and assisted unless such
 person or persons are already paupers as defined by the
 Public Statutes.

present their bills to the commissioners at Woodsville the second Tuesday in September. If considered advisable, additional dates for settlements with towns may be arranged.

All applications for aid should be immediately reported to the commissioners, as under the laws of 1903 no bill will be paid for more than 10 days' support previous to the proper affidavit being received. Affidavit blanks will be supplied by the commissioners upon request.

Haverhill, December 31, 1918

In accordance with chapter 30, section 1 Public Statutes, the Superintendent of the County Farm shall make up his report to January 1, annually, and also Section 2 of said chapter requires that the Superintendent's report shall contain in addition a list of paupers actually supported at the Farm and the number of weeks each was supported, also a statement of the average cost per week for each pauper with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending December 31, 1918 was 150. The number of weeks board is ascertained by taking the number of days between the day of admittance and the day

of departure of each individual and dividing that number by seven which gives the total number of weeks each was supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the Farm for the year ending December 31, 1918 was \$25,055 19. This sum divided by the whole number of weeks furnished, viz: 3851 gives \$6 50 as the price per week.

Before closing my report I wish to thank the Board of Commissioners, Chaplain, Physician and all connected with the institution for their hearty cooperation at all times, also the W. C. T. U. and kind friends, who so generously remembered the inmates at Christmas and various times throughout the year.

It gives me much pleasure to present my second annual report to your Board.

Through the kindness of the Superintendent and Matron I have been granted the privilege to distribute religious literature and magazines to the inmates that have been given by friends who are interested in the institution.

Those who are sick in the hospital and rooms and unable to attend services, have been visited, and the Gospel carried to them.

During the epidemic of Influenza in the autumn, September 29 and October 30, no services were held, but there were no cases in the institution.

As usual services are held in the Chapel every two weeks under the direction of Mrs. Henry Phillips and Miss Blanche Hemeon, organist, which adds much to the services, as singing smooths the rugged way. The W. C. T. U. observed their annual flower day in June and carried sunshine and cheer to all.

Christmas, although a sad one to many, brought to the inmates their annual tokens, which was much enjoyed.

Cleanliness seems to be the "Motto" of the institution, which impresses me very much, as I frequently visit it.

I am glad to report that the efficient Superintendent, who was on the sick list for a few weeks, is on the gain.

I wish to thank the board of Commissioners, Superintendent, Matron, Nurse, and Jailer for courtesies shown during my visits.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY PHYSICIAN

The physician-in-charge of the Grafton County Hospital respectfully presents the following report for the year 1918. During the past year there has been very little sickness among the inmates of the almshouse, jail and house of correction, due I believe, to the careful oversight and management of Superintendent and Mrs. Henry C. Phillips, supplemented by the excellent work of the nurse, Miss Blanche E. Hemeon.

For the moral and financial support of the County Commissioners in maintaining the hospital at its high degree of efficiency I wish to express my deep appreciation.

The confidence and gratitude shown by all of the patients toward the management is remarkable—a condition which is hard to attain, but which is particularly desirable in an institution of this kind.

It has been our aim to give each patient the same individual attention that would have been theirs in private homes, and in addition to their medical treatment we have attempted to make their stay in the hospital cheerful and homelike.

The institution has been fortunate in that there has been no contagious diseases during the year. The rooms are well heated, ventilated and kept scrupulously clean at all times. The sanitary arrangements are excellent. During the past year there has been installed a modern bath-room for the exclusive use of patients in the hospital. The diet kitchen is conveniently arranged for the serving of hot food to the patients. Fire protection is afforded by a hose reel conveniently located and instantly accessible.

Floral gifts sent to the hospital by anyone at any time would be appropriate and will be acknowledged. Cut flowers particularly in the winter-time add greatly to the helpfulness and convalescence of these patients.

The following statistics include only those who have occupied beds in the hospital. Besides these there have been many out-patients in the almshouse, jail and house of correction who have been treated in their rooms, or have come to the hospital for treatment.

REPORT OF COUNTY SOLICITOR

Woodsville, N. H., Dec. 31, 1918.

In pursuance of the statute, I herewith present my report for the year 1918 as County Solicitor.

There are two methods by which the expense to the county in criminal cases can be materially reduced. One is by insisting that the Selectmen of the various towns do their duty by taking charge of prosecutions for petty offenses; the other is by disposing of matters in Municipal Courts when possible, and thus saving the county the expense of presenting them in the Superior Court, where the time of the Grand and Petit Juries is an important element in the expense. Both methods have been pursued quite generally in recent times, and I am glad to say that nearly all Selectmen and municipal officers and courts have shown themselves willing to co-operate in these ways when the matter was explained to them.

A list is appended of the cases which I have handled in the Superior Court during the current year. Cases in the lower courts do not appear in this list.
