### MINUTES OF 1957 TOWN MEETING

### Greenland, New Hampshire March 12, 1957

The meeting was called to order at 8 p.m. by Ralph DeH. Fisher, Moderator. The following officers, elected by non-partisan ballot, cast from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., were sworn in:

Town Clerk, Mabel E. Thaxter; Selectman, Frank G. Rolston; Treasurer, Eugene F. Wilcox; Tax Collector, Andrew R. Schools; Fire Chief, William B. Brackett; Highway Agent, W. Richard Weeks; Auditors, Herman W. Parker, Frank E. Wirling; Library Trustee, Russell A. Rolston; Trustee of Trust Funds, Frank J. Lane.

Article III. The sum of \$14,452 was raised and appropriated to defray town charges.

Article IV. The sum of \$5,500 for summer and \$3,000 for winter, for the building, repair, and maintenance of highways and bridges, was raised and appropriated.

Article V. The sum of \$62.52 against the State's \$416.79 was raised and appropriated, for construction and maintenance of Class V roads.

Article VI. The sum of \$450 was raised and appropriated for the Extermination of Moths and Elm Tree Beetles.

Article VII. The sum of \$700 was raised and appropriated for the support of the Weeks Public Library.

Article VIII. The sum of \$800 was raised and appropriated for the care of the cemeteries.

Article IX. Cemetery By-Laws Adopted:

- 1. Sale of lots in cemeteries owned by the Town of Greenland shall be restricted to residents of Greenland and their families. Resale of lot or part of lot may be made only to trustees.
- 2. The price, including grading, of  $\frac{1}{2}$  a lot (4 graves) to be \$75; of an 8 grave lot to be \$150.
- 3. Every monument or headstone shall rest on a well constructed foundation of masonry or comparable material at least 2 feet deep, with an apron 4 inches in width around the base. Corner stones shall be set level with the ground.
- 4. No hedges or curbings to be permitted on any lot, and no trees or shrubs be planted thereon, except as approved by Cemetery Trustees.
- 5. No tablets, markers or other devices of wood, or other perishable material, are permitted.
- 6. No person shall raise or lower the grade on any lot or cause the same to be graded or maintained at a level other than that established for the cemetery.
- 7. All persons who hereafter purchase lots, shall pay to the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town of Greenland such sum as may be set by the schedule adopted by said Trustees for the perpetual care of said lot.
- 8. There shall be in the Town of Greenland a Board of Cemetery Trustees, to consist of 3 members, one to be elected each year for the term of 3 years, which said Board shall have the care and control of the town cemeteries, and shall make annual report of their doings to the town.
- X. The sum of \$100 was raised and appropriated, for the guarantee of ambulance service by the City of Portsmouth.

XI. The sum of \$1,000 was raised and appropriated to be used in participation with Government Wild Life, New Hampshire Fish and Game Department, and the Water Resources Board for reconstruction of the dam at Winnicutt River.

XII. The sum of \$150 was raised and appropriated for the care of Parks.

XIII. The sum of \$50 was raised and appropriated for observance of Memorial Day.

XIV. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term note in anticipation of taxes.

XV. The sum of \$525 was raised and appropriated for Civilian Defense purposes, this money to be expended at the discretion of the Civil Defense Director and Selectmen.

XVI. The sum of \$1,010 was raised and appropriated to be used with the \$1,000 raised in 1956, for the purchase of a Police Cruiser.

XVII. The sum of \$240 was raised and appropriated to defray one half the expense of providing an installing a two-way radio in the Tank Truck of the Fire Department.

With no other business to be transacted, the meeting was adjourned.

### TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenland in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Greenland Central School in said Greenland on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

(The polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. to elect town officers. Discussion and action on the articles in the warrant will take place at 8:00 p.m.)

- 2. To hear the report of the Town Clerk on the result of the election of Town Officers.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The estimated amount for town charges is \$16,259.09.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the building, repair, and maintenance of highways and bridges. The estimated amount is \$5,500 for summer work and \$3,000 for winter.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$81.72 against the State's \$544.83 for construction and maintenance of Class V roads.

- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450 for the extermination of moths and elm tree beetles.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 for the support of the Weeks Public Library.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the care of the cemeteries.
- 9. (By request) To see if the town will vote to close the road through the School Yard to the Cemetery, to all vehicles, during school hours.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the care of parks.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$625 for Civilian Defense purposes. This money to be expended at the discretion of the Civil Defense Director and the Selectmen.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240 for the purpose of providing and installing a two-way radio in the Tank Truck of the Fire Department. Said sum to defray one half the expense of providing and installing above equipment.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount not exceeding 1/100 of 1% of assessed valuation to the Seacoast Regional Development Asso-

ciation for publicity and promotional purposes in cooperation with other towns of the Region as authorized by State Statute. The amount requested is \$97.50.

- 16. (By petition) "To see if the Town of Greenland will increase the annual salaries of the selectmen. Chairman from \$250.00 to \$500.00, the other two selectmen from \$200.00 to \$450.00" (signed by ten resident property owners.)
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Regulations by adopting the revised code of Building Regulations as recommended by the Planning Board.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance by adopting the revised code of Zoning Regulations as recommended by the Planning Board.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Subdivision Regulations by adopting the revised code of Subdivision Regulations as recommended by the Planning Board and direct the Town Clerk to file a notice thereof with the Registry of Deeds for Rockingham County.
- 20. To transact any other business that legally may come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

At the request of the selectmen I shall make this report to you of the activities of the Police Department for the year 1957.

First of all I am pleased to inform you that our town is to be congratulated and admired for its clean record. Also we have been commended by other police departments regarding our lack of major problems.

I have found that the months between April and November necessitate much police activity.

I believe that patrolling our town at night during these months has discouraged to a great extent those who would otherwise abuse and disturb the peace of Greenland.

The calls upon the police are many and varied. Following is a partial list of our activities:

- 1. Two court accounts against juveniles.
- 2. Eleven arrests on motor vehicle charges.
- 3. Night telegrams.
- 4. Suspected night prowlers.
- 5. Shooting near homes.
- 6. Complaints regarding dogs.
- 7. Felled trees.
- 8. Stranded cars.
- 9. Burning wires.
- 10. Eight auto accidents.
- 11. 117 Defective tags distributed at the request of the State Motor Vehicle Department.
- 12.. Answering fire calls.
- 13. Assistance in moving hospital cases.
- 14. Frequent assistance of the aged.
- 15. Three emergency trips to hospital.

These are part of the calls made to the police. Many others are of a personal nature.

At my request, John Chick was appointed to the Greenland Police Department.

I have found him an able and valuable assistant, particularly at night when a policeman should not be alone. At his own expense, John has acquired the necessary police equipment. Also he has had his own two way radio installed, which makes for double protection for our town in case of emergency.

Due to nation-wide radio interference, it was necessary to have the cruiser radio converted and an additional unit installed.

The cost totaled \$73.00 which was paid for out of the Police appropriation.

Our new cruiser is most efficient and has already proved its worth in emergency. Its business like look has also been an aid in our work.

In all due consideration to the residents of Greenland, our police department desires to continue to serve our town, with courtesy and efficiency and maintain its well being.

#### REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Greenland, N. H. February 6, 1958

The Greenland Volunteer Fire Department responded to a total of seventeen (17) calls for the year 1957.

Of these calls fifteen (15) were local and (2) were for Mutual Aid calls to assist the Town of Newfields, N. H. and a call to Elliot, Maine.

Of the fifteen (15) local fires, four (4) were of serious nature and required the assistance of Mutual Aid from nearby towns and the city of Portsmouth.

On two occasions the value of Mutual Aid and tank trucks was ably demonstrated in the fact, that despite the extreme dryness and high winds existing at the time, the combined departments were able to confine the fires to the original buildings and prevent the spread of fire to surrounding property and woodlands.

Consideration of the extreme dryness which existed during the spring and summer of 1957, and the fact that fire losses were kept at a low level for the year, indicates that most townspeople were aware of the "fire situation" and co-operated to the fullest extent in the prevention of fire.

The balance of the fires were of minor nature, including chimney, flooded oil burners, and grass. Prompt notification to the Fire Department and quick extinguishment resulted in practically no property damage.

We again wish to thank the townspeople for their support of our various projects throughout the year. Also to the Ladies Auxiliary of the Fire Department for their continued efforts on our behalf.

#### FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

#### FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem — 97 percent of all our forest fires being mancaused and preventable — a serious indictment of interest in our welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires — all result in serious loss of property disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town 'and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort — The rules are simple.

- 1. Don't burn at home use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
- 2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires; home incinerators; outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
- 3. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
- 4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.

- 5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 6. Call th warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Greenland, New Hampshire:

The school year 1957-1958 started with the following staff:

Mr. Eugene Haight, Principal and teacher of Grade 8; Mrs. Gwendolene Sanderson, Grade 7; Mrs. Arlene Dahl, Grade 6; Mrs. Marion Kenison, Grade 5; Mrs. Elinor Milbury, Grade 4; Mrs. Lillian Hodges, Grade 3; Mrs. Mary Varrell, Grade 2; Mrs. Margaret Blakeney, Grade 1; Miss Mary Shea, School Nurse; Mrs. Eleanor Henry, Music teacher; Mr. Harold Mataver, Handwriting teacher.

There have been no changes in the personnel and this staff is competent, diligent and sincere and is making every effort to give good training to the boys and girls of the community.

This year the work of the seventh and eight grades has become departmentalized with Mrs. Sanderson and Mr. Haight teaching both grades in the fields in which they are strongest. This strengthens the instruction in these two grades.

The new plant has been in operation for about a year and the many advantages which it has become more and more apparent as time goes by. I think that all of the teachers, the students and the administration appreciate what a fine school plant they have in which to work. There are many evidences that this is a very good school.

The school enrollments of the six districts which comprise Supervisory Union No. 16 have grown 58% during the last ten years that I have been superintendent. This increase is from 1245 pupils in 1948-1949 to

1966 pupils in 1957-1958. Because of this growth it is obvious that the work loads of the school nurse, the Union secretary, and the superintendent of schools, who are the Union employees, have increased proportionately.

At the Supervisory Union budget meeting in November it was voted to furnish an assistant nurse to work with Miss Shea and to increase the secretarial help in the superintendent's office so that one and one-half secretaries would be provided instead of the present one and one-quarter. This action is to become effective in September, 1958.

It was also agreed that the first step towards providing assistance for the superintendent would be taken at the school meetings this year. This would be in the form of an article asking the voters to consider the addition of a Helping Teacher effective in September, 1959. Such a person would assist the superintendent in many ways but his primary function would be that of an elementary supervisor who would work closely with all of the elementary teachers in the Union in coordinating the elementary program and suggesting improved methods of teaching.

The state law provides for five assistant superintendents and these are located in the larger cities. It also provides for administrative assistance in the larger supervisory unions through the so-called Helping Teacher. The law states that whenever a majority of school districts in a union representing not less than 85% of the total pupils vote favorably, a Helping Teacher may be established.

At present there are ten unions which have Helping Teachers as follows: Milford, Plaistow, Lebanon, Peterborough, Tilton, Hampton, Hudson, Derry, Newport and Laconia. The state pays \$2500 of the salary of this

person. The remainder of the salary is pro-rated according to the supervisory union percentages.

I believe that the addition of a Helping Teacher would do much to strengthen the educational program in our union.

The Parent-Teacher Association has greatly helped the school program by taking as its number one project the improvement of the physical education equipment in the building and on the playgrounds. This is something that is needed to complete the building program.

I believe the citizens may be interested in knowing what equipment was purchased with the Federal money in the amount of \$8,480.00 so I am listing this as follows:

Conditions at the beginning of the school year were certainly different from those we were confronted with last year. Gone were the saws, trucks, hammers, and other noise producing implements of construction. Speaking for the teachers and myself, I can't say we are sorry.

The big item for this year, as far as the youngsters are concerned, is the purchase of playground equipment and basketball facilities by the Parent-Teachers Association. It is expected that installation of this equipment will be completed soon.

The teachers are enjoying the use of the teachers' room which was very nicely furnished by the Greenland Junior Woman's Club.

A Christmas assembly was held at school this year and each grade contributed to the program. The 4th and 5th grades re-presented their parts in the school program at the December PTA meeting.

The 8th grade is sponsoring a series of entertainment films which are shown periodically after school. Attendance has been rather good considering the transportation problem.

Plans are being made to continue the ballroom dancing lessons. Preliminary enrollment indicates another large group.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Hoyt, and the Greenland School Board for their support and cooperation.

It is difficult to find words to express my appreciation to the teachers for their willingness to work and for their good classroom achievements.

Mrs. Henry and Miss Shea are doing their usual good work in music and health respectively.

Mrs. Allen and Mrs. Booker are showing remarkable ingenuity in providing excellent meals in spite of an unpredictable financial situation.

In closing, I offer my sincere thanks to the people of Greenland and to their organizations for the cooperation and understanding so prevalent here.

### SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The past school year was an average one in regard to the health of the Greenland school children. Because of the constantly increasing number of pupils throughout the school union, it has become necesary to concentrate most of our efforts on the service end of the program. The health education part has suffered as a result.

Ninety per cent of the children in school have received their third and final polio shots. A few of the remainder have had two shots and are to be given the third by a private physician. There are some, however, whose parents have not given permission for this very important protection.

Vision tests have been done on all the children and hearing tests on about half the children so far this year. The number of referrals for vision conditions was about 27%. This percentage is within national averages.

Last year the P. T. A. offered to have physical examinations done on some of the children but, because of the building program, there was not available space. Now that facilities for this are adequate, I would like to recommend to the School Board that they think seriously about providing this service. Many correctable conditions doubtless go unnoticed because of lack of strip physical examinations and a school the size of Greenland's should provide such regular examinations. P. T. A.'s can and do provide this in some places, but only the School Board can provide that it be a regular routine not dependent on P. T. A.'s good or poor financial condition.

Following are the things we plan to accomplish during the remainder of the present school year:

- 1. Finish hearing tests.
- 2. Patch test all children.
- 3. Perform urinalysis on all children.
- 4. Provide a clinic to help bring all children up to date on their protection against whooping cough, tetanics, and diptheria.
  - 5. Give routine checks on tonsils and teeth.

We wish to thank the teachers for their ever-ready willingness to help and also the P. T. A. members for giving of their time and assistance. We are most grateful to the School Board for its insight of the difficulties of working with so large a number of children and for voting for additional help. In the end, it is the children who will benefit.

### REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

A well-rounded music program should provide the pupils with certain musical experiences each year, so that there is necessarily some repetition in the yearly music report.

Each pupil should have the chance to experience a wide variety of pleasant musical activities with the hope that from these he may find something that will help enrich his life.

Singing provides an excellent means of self-expression. Helping a child find his singing voice is extremely important in the lower grades. Rote songs, singing games and action songs provide happy experiences for first and second graders. When a child reaches the point of reading readiness, he is provided with a song book. Modern music books contain a wealth of good singing material. Folk songs, religious and patriotic songs, and songs that can be used in correlation with other studies are included. Two-part singing is generally begun during the last part of the fourth grade, with three part singing beginning in the sixth grade.

Rhythms are another important means of self-expression. Clapping, walking, running, skipping, galloping, see-sawing and skating to music are a few examples of lower grade rhythmic activities. Rhythm band and dancing are included in the program. Folk and square dances are enjoyed by the pupils of the upper grades.

Work with tonettes, listening to records, learning the fundamentals of music and note reading are included in the music program each year. In the spring a musical program, "The Mexican Fiesta" was presented by the pupils of the school on our fine new stage. Over a hundred dollars was realized from this program. With about thirty dollars an auto harp and accessories were purchased for the school. This leaves a substantial amount in the bank, which will be used for something desired by the teachers.

There was special music at the Graduation Exercises in June.

In the fall new music books were purchased for the fifth, seventh and eighth grades.

In closing, I wish to thank Mr. Hoyt, the Greenland School Board, the Parent-Teacher's Association, the teachers and the parents for their co-operation.
