To the Selectmen:

Herein I submit my annual report as Chief of Police of the Town of Haverhill.

- 36 accidents investigated.
 - 2 escaped prisoners captured. One from the Grafton County Farm and one from the Weeks School, Vergennes.
- 22 criminal cases prosecuted in court
- 44 motor vehicle cases prosecuted in court.
 - 1 fugitive from justice captured.

We had officers on road construction most of the summer.

We had five juvenile cases in court this year. This is a slight increase from last year but still a very low number for the size of this community and it is a credit to the parents and the boys and girls. Let's keep up the good work. I am very pleased.

The approximate total man hours for all complaints logged at the department—about 1,000. This has increased in the past year as the town grows and your municipalities have more problems and calls for service.

I want to thank the Selectmen, The Woodsville Precinct Commissioners, and the general public for their cooperation and support this year.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

DO WE NEED AN AMBULANCE SERVICE ON CALL IN WOODSVILLE? A year ago the decision was YES and a group of towns took steps to keep Mr. Ricker from discontinuing his ambulance service.

Early in 1968, a committee of Cottage Hospital Trustees met with selectmen from ten towns and asked for their recommendations. This resulted in a group of towns asking for an appropriation to provide financial assistance in keeping ambulance service available. This seemed to be the logical solution to the problem since Mr. Paul Ricker would continue for at least a year under this arrangement. All that he asked for was financial assistance to cover the cash costs that he would not have should he discontinue ambulance service. Budget for 1968 was as follows:

S Salary of one man 6,000.00 Workmen's Compensation 40.00 Liability Insurance 100.00 Ambulance Insurance 60.00 F.I.C.A. (Social Security) 260.00 \$ 6,460.00 Amount requested Amount received \$ 5,885.00

During the first ten months Mr. Ricker had about 180 ambulance calls from a group of thirteen towns. Four towns in Vermont and nine in New Hampshire. To handle these limited calls, which are all important and many emergency ones, he has to have personnel and equipment ready to go seven days a week and twenty-four hours a day. This around the clock availability accounts for the added cost. The regular ambulance fee covers only a fraction of the total cost of maintaining ambulance service twenty-four hours a day.

Mr. Ricker has agreed to continue service during 1969 under similar arrangements as last year. This is assuming that all towns calling on Mr. Ricker choose to provide some financial assistance in the amounts worked out by the planning committee. In setting the town request, the committee uses town population adjusted for expected use where a town is served by more than one ambulance service. The 1969 budget was proposed on January 18 by the joint meeting of the committee and selectmen from seven of the towns. This program will assure ambulance service out of Woodsville as long as Mr. Ricker is willing to continue. This will be reviewed and negotiated each year. If Mr. Ricker should decide to discontinue this service, the area would have to solve the problem in some other way, and, if so, possibly at a much greater cost. To set up a new service, we would perhaps consider figures such as these.

Equipment cost	\$25,000.00
Annual Operating cost	25,000.00
Gross revenue not to exceed	3,000.00

The total budget for 1969 is \$6,575.00. The Town of Haverhill is being asked to appropriate \$2,600.00 as their share.

This item is included in the town budget.

Ambulance Committee

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN & DISTRICT CHIEF

New Hampshire is the fastest growing state in the northeast in terms of population increase. It is also an industrialized state and this growth is likely to continue, all of which means more families and homes. Our growing summer population is scattered throughout the state with a phenomenal increase in vacation homes.

Many new homes and practically all cottages are being located in woodlands and abandoned fields and forests crowd into the back yards of our village streets. In a state where the forests cover 86% of the land surface, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow until the snow comes again, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
 - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for *all* debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.

- b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
- c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire *before* you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save our tax dollars for useful purposes.

WOODSVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT OF TRUSTEES

One year ago, we described our library as a very busy place. To say it's even busier this year sounds like an understatement. Circulation is up again, totalling 23,585 books which is an increase of 4,088 over that of the previous 12month period. During July, 1968 alone, circulation was 2,381. an increase of 613 over that of July, 1967. Our various activities, listed briefly in this report, seem to describe our library as it really is these days—one of the busiest, liveliest, most popular places in town.

Special projects this year have been planned especially with children in mind, and they have brought an excellent response. There were 19 entries in the spring Poster Contest held during National Library Week. Prizes were awarded at a special party in the library.

The Summer Reading Club for grade scholars had over 90 children participating in a "Mystery Trip in a Book", coast to coast with 300 miles progress given for each book read. The children volunteered their services in preparing the material and seemed to enjoy their part in making this a most successful program. A lawn party was held at the conclusion of the contest with United States puzzle maps and book plates awarded to the winners. Top winner was little Miss Diane Bergeron of Woodsville Elementary who read 148 books over a period of six weeks.

Our work with children was inspired by an excellent extension course offered both librarians this spring, the Children's Programs and Services course, held at Plymouth and sponsored by the University of N. H. and the N. H. State Library. Stressed at these meetings was the importance of film programs for the children. It is hoped that such a program can be arranged at the library in the near future, once basement improvements have been accomplished.

Children's books accounted for 8,899 of the total circulation. This is an increase of 2,295 for the year. It is obvious that the young people are using the library constantly, not only for school projects but also for their own enjoyment. We couldn't be happier about this encouraging trend.

The annual State Aid grant of \$100 made it possible for us to add some badly needed books to the reference shelves, and the State Library's Reference Workshop held in Littleton was a big help on how to use available material to answer specific reference queries.

Gift books from several townspeople have helped our general collection and have contributed much to circulation. We have been borrowing more and more books from the Bookmobile. We take between 800 to 1,000 books, and that is five times a year. But, no matter how many we borrow, it never seems quite enough to satisfy the demand.

In June our librarian, Mrs. Vevah Leonard led a storytelling discussion in the library as part of a Baby Sitting course sponsored for the local 4-H group. Mrs. Leonard gave the girls several pointers on reading to children and discussed the Do's and Don't's at Story Time urging that baby sitters take books along on their baby-sitting jobs after first seeking the library's help in choosing the right books for reading aloud.

Both librarians, Mrs. Leonard and Mrs. Mary Cochran, attended the May meeting of the N.H. Library Association held at the Wayfarer Inn, Bedford, N.H.

Space is our No. One problem. Books are spilling out from all sorts of places, window-sills, tables, chairs, and shelves. Plans are underway for making some needed improvements to the basement; added space that we hope will help alleviate the problem somewhat.

Why not plan to visit your local library some time during the coming year. This is YOUR library, and it needs support and interest.

WOODSVILLE RECREATION

The 1968 Recreation program commenced in May with the beginning of a double season in Little League Baseball. Over 60 boys again participated in this program. The cost of the program was partially defrayed by a little league tag day. Bats, balls, helmets, and catcher's mitts were purchased with this income.

New uniforms were purchased and sponsors included: American Legion, H. O. Taylor Chev. Co., Woodsville-Wells River Rotary and Larty's Gulf Co.

Coaches included: Robert Frazer, Ronald Hemenway, Buster Gould, Marshall Allen, Victor Roy, Pierre Baker and Frank Leafe.

Games outside the league included: Groton, Vt., and West Lebanon. An all-star team selected from the league competed in the Lyndonville Boys' baseball tournament and advanced to the finals.

The league caliber improved as the season progressed. Appreciation is extended to all coaches and officials who assisted in the conduct of the league.

Plans for 1969 include the incorporation of the Woodsville Little League Baseball program with National Little League Inc. of Williamsport, Pa.

The Woodsville Babe Ruth baseball program commenced in June and the Woodsville Babe Ruthers won the Triangle Baseball League and went on as all-stars to win the Vermont Babe Ruth Championship. They gave a good account of themselves in the New England playoffs at Laconia, N.H. before being edged out by Rhode Island. ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the North Haverhill Elementary School Auditorium in said Town on Tuesday, March 11, 1969 at eight o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners and any other Town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, one highway agent, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of Trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary Town officers.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for construction of Class V Highways, as provided in Chap 241 RSA, as amended.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town as recommended by the budget committee in its report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for said purposes, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing notes or orders to provide for expenses of the current year in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks by mail, or at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate, acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds, by public sale or by receiving sealed bids.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a Budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next annual Town meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to Gates and Bars, the highway extending easterly from the eastern terminal point of Ammonoosuc Street in the Village of Woodsville at the driveway leading to the residence of Douglas Adams, as laid out in 1906 Book I page 15 of Haverhill records, to the Bath Town line, a distance of about one mile.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to Gates and Bars, the highway extending easterly from the east side of Route 10 near the residence of George Wheeler on the east side of Ladd Street so-called in said Haverhill, to the Ladd Street Cemetery, a distance of about one-eighth of a mile.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, the highway extending southwesterly from the south side of the road from Route 10 to the Bedell Bridge, to the property of Joseph Lavoie, a distance of less than one-sixteenth of a mile.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a committee of five legal voters of the Town, of whom not more than two members shall be from the same part of the Town, to study the advisability of locating all Town offices in North Haverhill, and to report their findings and recommendations at the next annual Town Meeting.

Article 14. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

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REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS 1968-1969

It is indeed a pleasure for your superintendent to present his fourth annual report to the voters of the Haverhill School District.

After twenty years of studying various school cooperative plans the voters of the Town of Haverhill have made their decision to incorporate into one school district. The voters' approval was overwhelming but it should be stated again that this is not the final answer for with our ever-changing society, varied educational needs for our children in the future, possible population growth and state requirements may require this community to continue evaluating and expanding its educational program. It is our belief that this is a positive approach and together we can solve our problems adequately.

Our economy has grown tremendously in the last year with everyone feeling the impact of inflation and this, in turn, has affected our school budgets. In preparing a fiscal program your school board and its executive officer prepare a budget eighteen months prior to its finality. Voters can appreciate this type of a challenge when our economy has grown by approximately five per cent a year.

Several years ago secondary school in New Hampshire suffered through the pangs of Minimum Standards. At the present time your State School Board of Education and State Department of Education have developed Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools. This manuscript is only in its discussion stage but its content will have a terrific impact on elementary curriculum and facilities in New Hampshire. We believe our cooperative school program has solved any major problem we might have encountered had we remained as single districts.

May I say it has been a pleasure to serve you during the past year and, in addition, I would like to thank the voters, parents, teachers and School Board of the district for their fine support and cooperation during the past year.

The past year or so has been a rather active one for us at the Academy. Due to the fund-raising activities of the students, in particular the Student Council, we were able to purchase new uniforms for our basketball and baseball teams. We also designed and ordered a new school ring for the Juniors.

A chapter of the National Honor Society was begun last year. The members are chosen by the faculty and their choices are based on a student's scholarship, leadership, service, and character.

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The National Educational Development Test (NEDT) has been administered to interested Freshmen. We decided not to have Physical Education this year. Instead we have been able to broaden our curriculum by offering our students more courses. Consequently, we now have General Biology, Physical Science, and Math III available for those students who are not planning to go on to college. Most of the Freshmen are now able to take a course in social studies (Civics) and we are teaching Latin III on a somewhat independent study basis. We have two separate science courses available for Freshmen. Introductory Physical Science (IPS) for those taking the college prep program and General Science for the other students.

- 4. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to convey to William Fillian a tract of land adjacent to his property at a price to be determined by the board and Mr. Fillian.
- 6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to convey to the Woodsville Precinct, by Quitclaim Deed, all land adjacent to the Library now owned by the school district.
- 7. To see if the District will vote to direct the Treasurer to pay over to the Treasurer of the Haverhill Cooperative School District any cash balance in his hands or money due the District as of July 1, 1969, or thereafter, less any outstanding bills or debts; any sum so transferred to be used as a credit against the Haverhill Cooperative School District assessment to be raised by the pre-existing Woodsville School District to defray its share of the cost of operation of the Cooperative District during the first year of operation.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make disposition of all school records.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

1968-1969

It is indeed a pleasure for your superintendent to present his fourth annual report to the voters of the Woodsville Union High School District.

After twenty years of studying various school cooperative plans the voters of the Town of Haverhill have made their decision to incorporate into one school district. The voters' approval was overwhelming but it should be stated again that this is not the final answer for with our ever-changing society, varied educational needs for our children in the future, possible population growth and state requirements may require this community to continue evaluating and expanding its educational program. It is our belief that this is a positive approach and together we can solve our problems adequately.

Our economy has grown tremendously in the last year with everyone feeling the impact of inflation and, this, in turn, has affected our school budgets. In preparing a fiscal program your school board and its executive officer prepare a budget eighteen months prior to its finality. Voters can appreciate this type of a challenge when our economy has grown by approximately five per cent a year.

Several years ago secondary schools in New Hampshire suffered through the pangs of Minimum Standards. At the present time your State School Board of Education and State Department of Education have developed Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools. This manuscript is only in its discussion stage but its content will have a terrific impact on elementary curriculum and facilities in New Hampshire. We believe our cooperative school program has solved any major problem we might have encountered had we remained as single districts.

May I say it has been a pleasure to serve you during the past year and, in addition, I would like to thank the voters, parents, teachers and School Board of the district for their fine support and cooperation during the past year.

The increased number of functions which schools are expected to perform is the natural result of changes throughout our entire society which, in the nearly two centuries since our country was founded, has increased enormously in complexity. Yet, today, the individual at birth differs little from the children born at the time of the American Revolution. All the *knowledge, skills* and *attitudes* required to survive and prosper in our modern society must be acquired after birth. Since society is bound to increase in its complexity, the effective development of our youths' knowledge, skills, attitudes and values must be of paramount concern and interest to the family, church, school and community.

Therefore, what is the role of the school in this human development? A number of purposes can be stated, such as: 1. To help prepare each student for the world of work; 2. To help prepare each student to become an active and intelligent citizen; 3. To help each individual achieve his highest intellectual potential, and 4. To help instill the desire for learning and to encourage this desire as a life-time process. The last goal mentioned is extremely significant since with its achievement within the individual, the other goals of learning will follow.

Hence, it is the obligation and responsibility of everyone interested in the welfare of our youth to provide vigorous and enthusiastic support of our educational systems to enable the students of today to successfully meet the challenges of the present and future eras. I sincerely believe that the people in the town of Haverhill have wholeheartedly assumed their obligation and responsibility to our children by overwhelmingly supporting the formation of the Haverhill Cooperative School District. During the 1967-68 school year, Woodsville High School submitted its five year annual report to the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This report was accepted and approved by the Association, and as a result, the high school has received a full accreditation status until 1972, at which time we shall undergo the complete evaluation process for continued membership in the New England Association.

Minor curriculum improvements were implemented during the school year. They included the adoption of a General Physics course specifically designed for those students who intend to pursue their education in vocational or technical schools. Also, the establishment of a physical education program was introduced into the curriculum. Although, initially, this program was somewhat limited in equipment and facilities, its needs are steadily being met. The skills, attitudes, and physical fitness derived from such instruction are essential to the student and to a comprehensive educational program.

In the fall of 1968 Woodsville High School saw a number of changes in faculty personnel in the following departments: *Home Economics*—Mrs. Mary Beth Dickey replaced Miss Katherine Adamian; *English*—Mr. Richard Pike assumed the duties of Mr. George Armstrong; *Science*—Miss Linda Read succeeded Mr. Miles Cornthwaite; *Social Studies*—Mr. David Robinson replaced Mr. John Campobasso.

Extra curricular activities continue to be an important aspect of the total educational program. A large percentage of our students belong and actively support the various school, class and club organizations. Increased student interest has led to the formation of two additional groups—the Latin and Varsity Clubs. Through the diligent efforts of these students many projects, field trips, scholarships, etc. are made possible.

Woodsville High is extremely fortunate in having Miss Emery, Mr. McLure, and Mrs. Spear as the directors of our vocal music, instrumental music and dramatics areas respectively, through whose efforts and leadership our students have been accorded high praise for their many outstanding performances both here and elsewhere. Also in the spring of 1968, our Drama Department participated for the first time in the New Hampshire Drama Festival and received favorable ratings.

The athletic tradition at Woodsville High School has been a coveted one for many years but possibly the year 1967-68 nurtured it more than the others. Although we did not realize state championships in any sport, our teams did reach the N.H.I.A.A. semi-finals in soccer; the finals in basketball; and the semifinals in baseball. However, the Engineers were crowned the White Mountain Conference Champions in the three sports stated previously. The coaching staff, Mr. John Bagonzi (basketball and baseball) and Mr. Robert Fiset (soccer) are to be commended for their fine leadership and guidance as well as are the ballplayers for their tremendous achievements and the student body and community for their loyal support.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, the faculty, and the people of Woodsville and the surrounding communities for their continued support and cooperation.

WOODSVILLE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of the Woodsville Elementary School for the year ending December 31, 1968.

The school enrollment as of the writing of this report is 323 pupils. The enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten— 44, Grade 1—35, Grade 2—33, Grade 3—27, Grade 4—31, Grade 5—38, Grade 6—36, Grade 7—38, and Grade 8—41. The kindergarten enrollment of 44 includes 12 children from the Ryegate-Wells River area who are on a tuition basis. Kindergarten has a morning and an afternoon session. Grades 5 and 8 are in two sections.

There were no changes in the staff of the elementary school for the second year in a row.

Children in grades 1-3 with the most severe learning difficulties have been placed in the Remedial Reading Program under the direction of Mrs. Kathleen White. Mrs. White is at the Haverhill Consolidated School in the morning and Woodsville Elementary in the afternoon. Children are selected for this program because of low achievement on standardized tests and poor classroom work. By request of the teacher or the principal they are given a diagnostic test to locate the area of difficulty in reading. If the reading level is a year below their mental age regardless of their grade level they are placed in remedial reading where they read and develop word study skills at their potential level.

The school lunch program serves approximately 200 pupils and teachers each day. The program is under the direction of Mrs. Marjorie Paronto assisted by Mrs. Mary Dupuis and Mrs. June Chamberlin.

The school library has added 225 books since last year and now has a total of 1585 books. The library is working towards the state recommendation of 10 books per pupil.

Woodsville Elementary School is taking part in a new State Testing Program for all students in grades 2, 4, 6, and 8. This new program was approved by the State Board of Education on August 14 and the Governor and Council at their meeting on September 3. The new program is being offered through the cooperation of four federally sponsored programs in the Department of Education—Title I, Title III, Title V and Title VI of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Tests given will be the Otis-Lennon Ability Test and the Stanford Achievement Test Battery at each grade level. All tests will be machine scored by Harcourt, Brace and World, Inc. Under local sponsorship Stanford Achievement Tests will also be given in grades 1, 3, 5, and 7 and Otis-Lennon Ability Tests in grade 3. Metropolitan Readiness Tests will be given in kindergarten.

A Science Fair was held by the Junior High Science pupils in May. Many worthwhile exhibits were displayed and prizes awarded by members of the Science Department of Woodsville High School.

The Music Department presented a Christmas Program, Spring Music Program, an assembly in observance of Veterans Day and the Junior High Chorus sang Christmas music at the Cottage Hospital.

Physical Education is offered for grades 7 and 8. Boys' and girls' basketball teams and the boys' baseball team play a regular schedule of games with nearby schools.

I wish to thank Superintendent Mullen, the School Board and Faculty for helping to make this a year of achievement for the Elementary School.

- ARTICLE II. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, two members of the school board, (one from the pre-existing Haverhill School District and one from the pre-existing Woodsville School District), each to serve for a term of three years.
- ARTICLE III. To hear any reports of the School Board, Treasurer, and the Superintendent and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE IV. To see if the District will authorize the Schol Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other federal, state or private source.
- ARTICLE V. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of said District and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid and Building Aid Funds together with

other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the preexisting districts in accordance with the formula adopted by the Haverhill Cooperative School District, and the School Board further to certify to the selectmen the amount to be raised by taxation by each of two pre-existing school districts.

- ARTICLE VI. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
- ARTICLE VII. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
