*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton in the
County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to
vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Town Officers' Salaries.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,900.00 for Town Officers' Expenses.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Election and Registration Expenses.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Expenses of Town Hall and other Town Buildings.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for the Police Department.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the General Expenses of the Fire Department.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

appropriate the sum of \$1,750.00 for Fire Protection. (\$750.00 not recommended by the Budget Committee).

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the installation of a new Town Fire Alarm System.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to study and advise with the Selectmen in the developing and installation of the Fire Alarm System. The committee to be composed of: the Fire Department Chief, the head of Town Civil Defense, one member from each of the Village Precinct Commissions, one member representing each Village, and two members at large.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Care of Trees, including spraying trees in the Hopkinton and Contoocook Precincts, and for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for Insurance.

✓ 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for use of the Planning Board. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

✓ 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to present a Zoning Ordinance at the next Town Meeting for its consideration.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Damage by Dogs.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the employment of a District Nurse and other Health expenses.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,184.00 for the support of the Concord Hospital.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Vital Statistics.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for the Care of Town Dump.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,500.00 for Town Maintenance of Highways and Bridges.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 for the General Expense of the Highway Department and Street Lighting.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,386.31 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$9,242.04.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the support of the Hopkinton Free Public Libraries.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for Town Poor.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Old Age Assistance.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Parks and Playgrounds.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 for Cemeteries.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Damages and Legal Expenses.

31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$525.00 for Social Security.

32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Interest on Temporary Loans.

33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55.00 for Interest on Long Term Notes.

34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Town Construction and permanent improvement of roads.

35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$466.00 for Sidewalk Construction.

36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Cemetery Trustees to sell to Harold C. Kimball for \$1.00 a piece of land on the South side of the New Hopkinton Cemetery not suitable for Cemetery purposes, and to purchase from Harold C. Kimball for \$1.00 a piece of land on the West side of the Cemetery that is suitable for Cemetery purposes.

37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to give a quitclaim deed of the Town's interest in the old Eugene Foote camp and land acquired by tax collector's deed (Book 628, Page 518) for the amount of the overdue taxes \$37.61 to Dr. C. H. Plaisted, who already holds the Old Age Assistance Lien of the State.

38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey by quitclaim deed the Town's interest in any and all real estate acquired by tax collector's deeds on such terms and conditions as they deem in the best interests of the Town, this authority to continue in effect until modified or rescinded at some future Town Meeting.

39. To see what action the Town will take with respect to abandonment of the public right of way across the land of Hopkinton Associates, Inc. in the vicinity of the intersection of the South Road, so-called and the Main Street in Hopkinton Village. (By Petition)

40. To see if the Town will vote that there shall appear in the Hopkinton Town Report each year without exception a complete listing of property owners in the Town of Hopkinton together with the assessed valuation of their property and the amount of their Town taxes, said listing to be divided into resident and non-resident property owner sections. (By Petition)

41. To see if the Town will vote to grant authority to the Selectmen of the Town of Hopkinton to enter into an agreement with the State of New Hampshire whereby the State of New Hampshire, in connection with the Hopkinton-Everett Flood Control Project, will represent the Town of Hopkinton relative to all engineering matters, plan rights of way, advertise for bids, and prepare and enter into contracts for, and supervise, the construction of relocated Town roads.

42. To see if the Town will approve the proposed agreement between the United States and the Town of Hopkinton for the relocation, rearrangement and/or alteration of Town roads in connection with the Hop-

kinton-Everett Dam and Reservoir Project and authorize the Selectmen to enter into and execute an agreement with the United States in reference thereto.

43. To see if the Town will vote that the United States Army Engineers, and/or the Merrimack Valley Flood Control Commission, or/et al be required to raise the grades on the extension of the Thain Rd. to the Stumpfield Rd. so that it may be maintained. (By Petition)

44. To see for what purpose the Town shall vote to expend during the current year the income of the G. Everett Kelley Fund.

45. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Cemetery Trust Funds, the income to be used as directed, subject to such provisions as may be applicable thereto:

- (1) The sum of \$200.00 from Rita W. Allen, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of the Charles W. Allen lots Nos.85-86, Sec. E, in the Contoocook Cemetery.
- (2) The sum of \$300.00 from Blanche M. Elkins, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of the Elkins lot No. 26, Sec. C, and Fenton lots Nos. 25-35, Sec. C, in the Contoocook Cemetery.
- (3) The sum of \$300.00 from Miriam C. Emerson, Roy C. and Frank D. Emerson, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of the Lloyd S. and Miriam C. Emerson lots, and the William C. and Fred H. Emerson lots Nos. 59-59R, 60-60R, in the Contoocook Cemetery.
- (4) The sum of \$150.00 from Louis Reycroft, plus the interest to date, for perpetual care of the Louis Reycroft lot No. 1, Sec C, in the new section of the Hopkinton Old Cemetery.
- (5) The sum of \$500.00 from Norman F. Davis, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of the Nathaniel F. Davis lots Nos. 69-70-71-72-73-74, Sec. E, in the Contoocook Cemetery.

- (6) The sum of \$150.00 from Elfleda M. Call, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of the Arthur Call lot No. 68, Sec. D, in the Contoocook Cemetery.
- (7) The sum of \$200.00 from Richard A. and Elizabeth B. Brunel, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of the Richard A. and Elizabeth B. Brunel lots Nos. 15-17, Sec. C, in the new section of the Hopkinton Old Cemetery.

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REPORT OF CEMETERY TRUSTEES December 31, 1958

During the year of 1958 three major projects were completed. The Blackwater Cemetery fence was renewed, a coordinated map showing the location of each lot in the Old Hopkinton Cemetery was completed, and a similar map for the New Hopkinton Cemetery was made. The necessary upkeep was continued.

The New Hopkinton Cemetery is an area of about 10 acres. The land in the front is level and sandy, but in the rear there were ravines and swampy sections. The deed had been lost and no one knew the bounds. After searching the Town Records, we found the date of purchase and the town counsel then was able to furnish us a copy of the original deed as recorded in the Registry of Deeds. Engineers were then employed to establish the lines and furnish a map.

We found that the Construction Company building the new highway had used some of the fill, the exact amount of which will be determined by the State Highway Department who have the necessary data to establish the ground level. Acting on the advice of the town counsel and in cooperation with the Selectmen, we have agreed to accept payment for the fill which has been taken from the property which would have been costly to make suitable for cemetery purposes.

The town counsel has advised us that any funds received from the sale of the fill, etc., must be used exclusively for cemetery purposes.

The property on the south (in rear) and west side of the cemetery is owned by Harold C. Kimball. He is willing to accept a deed to a section on the south side in exchange for a strip of level land on the west side. We seek authority for the Selectmen to execute the necessary documents to effect this exchange.

Consideration has been given and an estimate of cost secured for the repair and improvement of the

vault at the New Hopkinton Cemetery. The sexton feels that a vault should be available for use in extreme winter weather. If funds become available from the sale of fill, a part of them might be used for this purpose.

Article V

Mr. Alfred Chandler offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

I move that Hopkinton School District in School Meeting convened, adopt as its check-list, the Town checklist, as provided in RSA-197: 12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957; this provision to be effective for the 1959 Annual Meeting and subsequent Annual District Meetings.

An explanation was given as to the Law by the Moderator.

A voice vote was declared unanimously adopted in the affirmative by the Moderator.

Article VI

Mr. Harry Parker offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

I move the Hopkinton School District in School Meeting convened, that the School Board be authorized to sell and convey the land with the buildings thereon, known as the Hopkinton Village School, in whole or in part, and to give as may be appropriate, such sum deeds, or bills of sale, in conveyance thereof in the name of the School District.

A voice vote was declared unanimously adopted in the affirmative by the Moderator.

A discussion followed on the motion.

A voice vote on the original motion was negative and the Moderator declared the motion lost.

Article VII

Mr. Earl Rice offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

I move that the Hopkinton School District in School Meeting convened, name the new elementary school now under construction in Hopkinton Village, The Harold M. Martin Elementary School.

A voice vote was declared unanimously adopted in the affirmative by the Moderator.

The meeting was open for any further business.

Mr. Joseph Ransmeier asked that the Hopkinton School District give Dr. J. Howard Lightfoot a vote of thanks for all his work, love and devotion for the District during six years as a school board member.

A standing vote was declared unanimously adopted in the affirmative by the Moderator.

Mr. Pete George moved to adjourn.

To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to purchase a school bus and to raise and appropriate not in excess of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) for this purpose and to authorize the School Board to borrow in the name of Hopkinton School District not in excess of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) and to execute and issue as evidence of such indebtedness notes in serial form of the School District under and in accordance with the applicable laws of the State of New Hampshire, including the Municipal Finance Act, and to delegate to the School Board authority to

fix the date, maturity, denomination, interest rate, discount rate, place of payment, form and all other essential matters and details of said notes and providing for the sale thereof.

5. To see if the School District will vote to appropriate the unexpended balance of the building fund for the Harold M. Martin Elementary School, together with accrued interest thereon, to capital reserve fund, to be held for future construction requirements of the School District.

6. To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, agents and employees, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as may be received from any state or federal program for the support of public education, together with other income: the School Board to certify to the Selectmen, the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

7. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or State Agencies.

8. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to sell and convey the land and the buildings thereon, known as the old Hopkinton Village School, either in whole or in such parts or parcels and from time to time as the School Board may deem best, said sales to be public sales either by invitations to submit sealed bids, by public auction or by some combination of the two; and further to authorize the School

Board to give in the name of the School District such deeds and bills of sale transferring the land and/or buildings so sold and conveyed as it may deem appropriate.

9. To see if the School District will adopt the following as a continuing Resolution to be effective until hereafter duly changed by vote of the District:

RESOLVED: Subject to the provisions of RSA 197:18, the terms of office of officers of Hopkinton School District elected under the non-partisan ballot system shall commence and terminate at the close of the regular annual meeting of the School District.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

In the above Enrollment trends I have compared the figures as printed in my 1953 Town Report with the present enrollment of classes to show what has happened to the pupil population of the Hopkinton schools. If the Harold Martin School hadn't been built and we had had to have all the sixth graders in the high school, we would have had 397 pupils in the high school building in 1954 instead of the 310 pupil figures which was predicted on the basis of the enrollment in the grades in 1953.

You will notice that here this year there are thirty-six pupils in grade seven. Next year we expect 47 pupils in grade seven and the following year there will be 57 seventh grade pupils. The years following will be 51, 48, 47, and 57 if no drop outs take place and no increase takes place.

I believe that this means that next September we will have to have two seventh grades and in the school year 1960-1961 we will need two seventh grades and two eighth grade class rooms. On September of 1961 these large classes will be entering the ninth grade so that some of the high school classes like English 9 and Civics will have to be divided into two classes.

Every time a class has to be divided another class-room is needed. Next fall the science room will probably be used as a home room so book lockers must be provided or the arm chairs removed and regular desks installed in the room. The next year we will be in serious trouble unless more space is provided and each succeeding year the problem becomes more acute unless we have a decrease in school population; however, the trend in Hopkinton is quite to the contrary.

At the annual school district meeting of March 13, 1956, majority and minority reports of the building committee were presented, and after a great deal of discussion the majority report was accepted by the

school district. The majority report had the recommendation as follows, "The replacement of the present two obsolete elementary school buildings with two new structures over a period of time." "The first unit in such replacement program is to be a six room structure recommended for immediate construction in or near Hopkinton Village and the second unit to be constructed in Contoocook at the earliest practical time, as the need demands (probably in about five years)." Present indications are that the Contoocook unit should be adopted to early expansion to twelve rooms.

This past September the Hopkinton Village unit was completed and the six new classrooms were ready for the children for the start of the new year. It now looks as though we should begin planning for the Contoocook unit.

One other alternative remains: The consolidation with other communities to build a new high school in some central location and converting the present high school into an elementary school to serve the needs of Contoocook, or the present high school could be converted into a cooperative high school with other towns buying in shares of the present structure which might enable Hopkinton to use such funds to construct an elementary school.

In Massachusetts there is a definite trend established toward Cooperative or Regional High Schools and even in New Hampshire we have four or five cooperative high schools. As the demands on American Education increase I feel sure that larger high school units will follow. Already seven towns in the New London area are making a serious study with preliminary votes indicating a great deal of interest in a cooperative school district of high schools and very little interest in a cooperative school of grades through twelve at this time.

Rising school population means more building space and more teachers, which in turn means increased cost of communities educational program. Hopkinton has been able to offset these increased costs somewhat by the increased valuation of property in the community. This year our school budget increased, but the total assessed valuation in town showed a decrease although there was additional construction of houses in the community. The result was a larger increase in the tax rate than usual.

The state and federal government have recognized to a very limited degree the plight of the property owner. The state has provided school building aid and there will be bills introduced in the legislature to give a flat grant of ten dollars per pupil and another bill will be introduced to give transportation aid. The National Defense Act passed by the last Congress will provide funds for improvement of Mathematics, Science, and Foreign Languages and other benefits which will be administered through the state departments of education on a matching basis, which in New Hampshire probably means that the local school district will have to match the federal funds available. At least we are beginning to recognize that a local property tax cannot carry the whole burden.

There have been some changes of the teaching staff. Mr. Malcolm Merrill was promoted to the principalship of the Harold Martin School and his place was taken by Francis Macukewicz. Mrs. Margaret Sinclair returned to the fifth grade at the high school replacing Mrs. Berlind who accepted a position in the Concord schools. Mr. Robert Holloran was employed as the additional teacher in the junior high school. Mr. Elwin Bourey, the science teacher and coach received a fine scholarship for a year's study and was replaced by Miss Mary Nelson who was a cadet teacher under Mr. Bourey. Mrs. Kathleen Titcomb resigned the first of

November and was replaced by Mrs. Rebecca Makin. This is a very small turnover in teachers and speaks well for the teacher-community relationships.

I wish to express my appreciation for the loyalty of our hard working and conscientious teaching staff and for the fine support we have received from the school board, students, and the community.

I hereby submit my report for the year 1957-1958 as Principal of Hopkinton High School.

Five of the above graduates are furthering their education — two at New Hampshire Technical Institute, one at Plymouth Teachers' College, one at the University of New Hampshire, and one at Margaret's Beauty Salon. Of the remainder, six are gainfully employed, two are in the armed forces, and three are married.

This year Miss Mary Nelson replaced Mr. Elwin Bourey as the science instructor. Mr. Bourey was granted a national scholarship to study at the University of Wisconsin. A new Junior high instructor was added to the staff — Mr. Robert Holloran.

The coming school year will see the addition of another teacher to the staff — a junior high instructor. It will be necessary, for the first time, to have two seventh grades. Based solely upon the present enrollment in our elementary schools, it will be necessary to have two seventh grades each year for several years to come. This, in turn, will mean two eighth grades and in three years the impact on the high school will be felt. About the only way in which we shall feel this problem next year

will be that the laboratory will have to become a home room for a high school class. After the coming year, we may experience serious difficulty in scheduling classes.

We are constantly seeking to improve not only the quality of our offerings but the variety. Another course, a third year of French, will be added to the curriculum for the coming year. We also hope to strengthen our non-college program by offering a second year of mathematics. At present, each subject area is being checked to find out how far we have progressed toward meeting the recommendations of the Evaluation Committee. Considerable work is being done to expand our library facilities. We greatly appreciate the money donated by the Hopkinton Parent-Teacher Association for the purchase of books.

I wish to thank all those who have cooperated in helping us to better meet the needs of the youth of our community.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

A few years ago the Town of Hopkinton was faced with a serious problem of overcrowding in the schools and a new High School was built in 1952. This building has served us well, and yet by 1956 we were again faced with the same problem, this time in our grade schools. At a special School District Meeting on February 6, 1957, the Townspeople voted to build a new grade school in Hopkinton Village. The building program was reviewed and approved by the County Commissioners. After their decision supporting the plan as voted, the Building Committee was able to proceed.

We had an option to purchase a very suitable piece of land from the Heirs of the Samuel Chase Estate, and the School District was given an adjoining piece of land by Mr. Harold Kimball. This provided us with a spacious lot at an excellent location.

After many meetings with our architect, Mr. Norman Randlett, we agreed on a building design with two levels and having six class rooms, a combined lunch room-activity room and a kitchen. This plan offered us construction and maintenance economy with a maximum of light and ventilation in the building.

Like all Building Committees of today, we were faced with building costs that had risen after the decision to build had been voted, and so many parts of the contract were advertised for bids with alternate specifications, and final decisions were made only after the bids had been opened and reviewed. The committee was also fortunate to be able to arrange directly with local residents to do certain phases of the work so that these could be handled outside of the main contract and without the overhead expenses attaching to it.

On September 5, 1957, the contract for the basic structure was awarded to the Richard Bean Construction Company, Inc. of Keene, N. H., and on September

24 Dr. Howard Lightfoot, Chairman of the School Board, officially broke ground with the first spade of earth. Work on the building proceeded as weather permitted and the building was formally accepted in August, 1958, thus being ready for the fall term. Again the Town of Hopkinton could properly accommodate its school children.

On Sunday afternoon, September 14, 1958, the building was opened to the public and many witnessed an official dedication by Rev. Charles Moyer. In accordance with the unanimous vote of the District at its meeting last year, the building was to be known as the "Harold M. Martin Elementary School," and an appropriate plaque was unveiled at this dedication.

And thus we of the Building Committee take pleasure in presenting to the People of this Town a much needed educational building, completed within the fixed appropriation; and which is now daily proving its value both in itself and also by helping to relieve the overcrowding in our other schools. A financial accounting for the project appears herewith.
