## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Jackson on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of summer high-ways and bridges.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal and breaking winter roads.
5. To see if Town will give Selectmen authority to discontinue snow removal from any particular road or section of road, for such time as seems absolutely necessary in order to avoid prohibitive cost.
6. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.
7. To see if Town will vote to allow a discount of 2% on taxes paid before June 15th.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reduction of debt.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to paint and repair parsonage and stable.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for permanent improvement of hill on Iron Mountain road, near house of Joseph Willett.



12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for construction of tarvia top on iron bridge on mile circuit in Jackson village.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, not exceeding \$4000.00, in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class 2 road, known as Carter Notch Road or Middle road and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$1,018.50, or will accept State Aid for construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$113.71.

15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for poor relief.

16. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to move iron bridge now alongside Pinkham Notch road and erect same across Great Brook on cross road near home of L. A. Fernald.

17. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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*To the School Board and Citizens of Jackson:*

Your superintendent believes that the schools are in excellent condition and that credit is due to a corps of well-trained and earnest teachers.

Six pupils are attending New Hampshire high schools this year, five in Bartlett and one in Conway. They are: Rodney Charles, Olive Hayes, Elizabeth Hodge, Olla Kelley, Harold Kelley, Virginia Kelley.

The question of securing approval of our ninth grade on the secondary level has been in the mind of your superintendent for several years and last fall was taken up with the state board of education. Study of the standards for high school approval makes evident the fact that we can not meet them except by a reorganization which would necessitate another teacher, fitting up another room and providing considerable equipment. This might be desirable educationally but is not feasible for financial reasons.

It is, however, desirable to offer a year of instruction above the ninth grade for pupils who may not go to high school and others who are enabled in this way to get one year of high school at home.

Some needed repairs including a floor have been made at Dundee. A few years ago we had six pupils here and this year we have thirteen. This is an interesting school and excellent work is carried on by pupils and teacher.
