#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lempster, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Lempster, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To bring in your votes for Delegates-at-large, Alternate Delegates-at-large, Delegates and Alternates Delegates to the National Convention of the various Political Parties to be held to nominate Party Candidates for the President and Vice President of the United States.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 3. To hear all reports and act thereon.

ARTICLE 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for interest on debt.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to keep the Common mowed around the Soldiers' Monument at Lempster Street.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$370.50 for State Aid Construction and the State will contribute \$1,000.00 to be expended on the Second New Hampshire Turnpike.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to deliver blank inventories at the time they appraise the property for taxation.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to reinsure the Town Hall and Union Hall.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day and Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Library.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the Town in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to limit the Road Agents to the appropriations.

ARTICLE 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Old Age Assistance and pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to receive sealed bids for mowing Town roadsides, a separate bid to be sent for each District.

ARTICLE 16. To see what sum per hour the Town will vote to pay for labor on the highway.

ARTICLE 17. To see what action the Town will vote to take to continue the Town Forest Committee and to take any necessary action thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Fire Company.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25.00 for the Athletic Association.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of any Other Town Officers.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of eleven dollars (\$11.00) to purchase an areial map of the town.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one per cent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, the sum of \$24.78

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

ARTICLE 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfull and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most

serious conflagrations we had.

Govenor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent

fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a min mum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue

burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

## LEMPSTER TOWN FOREST CHAIRMAN'S REPORT—JANUARY 1948

The year 1947 has been one of much progress for the town forest and for the Long Pond recreational development. It is better organized and is sound financially. The committee realized enough money from the sale of timber to rough out a road system all the way to the end of the pond, put in some necessary bridges and culverts and have a substantial balance for further work.

At the 1947 town meeting the duties of the various member

of the committee were announced, they are

1948 George L. Richardson, Financial Secretary 1949 Hubert C. Hartwell, Construction Foreman

1950 John Wirkkala, Business Manager 1951 Harris H. Nichols, Secretary

The years refer to their term of office. It was voted then that this committee continue in office until 1948 and then one member be up for reelection each year. There was much discussion on the article about changing the name of Long Pond. This was finally laid over until such time as more people have seen the pond and have a better idea of what they wish to name it.

#### TOWN FOREST

Sprague and Carlton of Keene had the hardwood on the sale area cut during June and July. The scale of logs was checked and the lot inspected by members of the committee and Bill Dussalut, County Forester to see that the terms of the contract were observed. The operation as a whole was fairly satisfactory. Hard maple, yellow birch, ash and soft maple were cut to a minimum stump diameter o 15 inches and beech was taken to a minimum stump diameter to 10 inches. As most of the lot ran to fairly large trees the cut overran the estimated volume of 135 M. originally intended to be cut on the selected tree basis. The actual cut of logs and amount received is as follows:

The beech and soft map'e run close to the actual cut. The larger volume of maple cut is partly due to the butt swell which increased stump diameter above breast high diameter and to the large size of many of the maples which made estimation difficult. It was decided to sell the few large spruce to the logging operator as there was no immediate use for them by the town and if left exposed would die or blow down.

The lot has a good cover of young hardwood left which will prevent the soil drying out and provide a good start for the next crop. The hardwood tops may yet be salvaged as cordwood. The operator improved the road to the lot which will be a help in getting out cordwood or in reaching the gravel on this lot.

No other woods operations were attempted the past year, but the opening up of the Long Pond road offers some good chances for pulpwood and cordwood cuttings if labor becomes available. Some christmas trees were sold again this year.

#### LONG POND RECREATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

With funds available work on the access road to the pond was started in September. We were fortunate in securing the services of one of Arthur Whitcomb of Keene's 17 ton bulldozer and an excellent experienced operator, Mr. Robert Clough of Marlow. He showed a great deal of personal interest in the job, made no waste motions and gave us great value for our money. Labor at town road prices was difficult to obtain. Some was used to clear the roadside but this was found to be unnecessary when bulldozing operations started. Large hardwood trees and boulders weighing many tons were moved with ease, rough clearing of the road progressing almost as fast as a man could walk through some of the blowdown area. A mile of the old road was rough graded along the pond to the Washington town line. Dirt was pushed up for fill, culverts were laid, and their drainage opened, and the beached scooped all with the bulldozer. No other operation yielded so much of value for the money expended.

Abutments were built up, stringers cut, and the brook bridged, the outlet of the pond was crossed with a larger metal culvert with stoned and cemented abutments. Fill pushed up by the bulldozer was tractor loaded and used to smooth some of the low places. The town tractor and grader smoothed and shaped the road as well as could be. Most of this work was done early in October when the ground was very dry and the road was soon surfaced with powder dry dust which was impossible to shape.

The roads and the shore of the pond were surveyed and this information is being plotted to show the extent and nature

of the land available for camp sites.

The problems immediately confronting your committee are to decide:

The size and layout on the ground of the lots.
 Whether to sell or lease lots and the price or rental.

3. Where to secure gravel for the road.

Other matters for consideration are fire prevention and protection, roadside cleanup, waterfront safety, control of traffic on the road, control of campers, layout of public areas and the possible building of a public shelter at the beach.

There is still considerable boundary survey work to do, the forested area should be typed and cruised so that the size, amount and composition of the growing stock will be known.

Future plans for each area can then be worked out.

### Report on Long Pond Road for 1947

The road from the Washington road was bulldozed to Long Pond and down the length of the Pond, one short spur to the right, a small circle to the public beach, a loop to the point, and one other loop out towards the Pond. The total length of road bulldozed is 10,738 feet. The approximate cost per lineal feet is seven cents, which also includes 2 piles of fill bulldozed up in the field. This fill was hauled into spots where the bulldozer was unable to find any dirt; with the exception of one spot which needs a days hauling with two trucks. Approximately 500 yards of fill were hauled onto the road.

One wooden bridge built including abutments of stone. One 4ft. by 14ft. paved culvert laid complete with stone headers. Two 10 inches by 14 ft. paved culverts laid. One 10 inches by 16 ft. paved culvert laid. These above culverts were purchased this year. Three culverts purchased last year were also laid.

The entire road was rounded with the road machine and town tractor. Because of the dry weather causing so much dust it was impossible to put the road in first class condition.

Cars and trucks driving over the road made ruts; therefore, it will be necessary to put some labor on the road in the spring before gravelling. About one and one quarter mile haul from gravel pit to entrance of road.

To the Lempster School Board!

It is with pleasure that I herewith submit my second annual report. This year has been marked with a growing awareness of the important position of the schools in the welfare of the nation and the world. I feel confident that developments of this past year will mean more and better edu-

cational opportunities for our children.

World Wars I and II have left such an impact upon our lives that we have not yet become fully aware of its implications. Educators are doing a great deal of research in an attempt to equip our schools and our teachers so they may adequately prepare the children to meet the changing conditions. Supervisory Union No. 5 was singularly honored by being one of ten unions chosen by the State Office of Education to carry on a three day workshop in citizenship training. I'm sure the quality of teaching in our schools has improved as a result of this concentrated training. Plans now include a five day concentrated course in another of the subjects next year.

The teaching situation, rather than improving, is now in the most critical condition since 1940. Dr. Edgar Fuller recently released statistics showing that there is an expected shortage of three hundred teachers for our elementary schools. Needless to say, it is altogether too often the rural towns that suffer.

It is always a source of inspiration to work in a town whose parents are ready and willing to cooperate. Our schools can progress only as far as this cooperation goes and there are always many outlets for this spirit of cooperation in any school system.

I would like to express my appreciation for the support given me this past year. The friendly, cooperative spirit of het

board has made my task much easier.

#### SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

Number of school visits 22 Number of home visits 19

This year the Lempster Parent's Club carried on the annual school dental program by taking the children of Lempster schools to the office of the dentist.

Through the State Department of Education, the N. H. Crippled Children's Hearing Conservation program made it possible for all hard of hearing pupils to receive treatment by

ear specialists.

Through the routine health inspection made by the school nurse, defects of ears, eyes, throat, teeth, posture, speech and nutrition may be found. The nurse, by training and experience, is able to suggest corrective measures necessary for correction of these defects.

During the winter there were five conferences of superintendents of schools and school nurses. As a result of these conferences, the duties of a school nurse have been clearly defined. Thinking they may be of interest to you, I am including them as a part of my report. They are as follows:

. Carry out fall inspection of all children, followed by

notices to parents and by home visits.

2. Assist school physicians in examination of school children and in the preparation of standing orders to be posted in all schools.

3. Conduct vision and hearing tests and carry out neces-

sarv follow-up.

- 4. Supervise or attend first-aid cases. Check and equip first-aid kits for all schools.
- 5. Carry out monthly inspections (wieghing, measuring and noting symptoms.)

6. Make out monthly reports and records.

- 7. Stimulate clinics and assist at all clinics: dental, T.B., toxoid.
- 8. Offer guidance to teachers: noting symptoms and supplying materials for health education teaching.

9. Teach courses in first-aid and others.


10. Direct summer check-ups.


11. Follow-up handicapped children.
