Town Meeting Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 12th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for protection of the premises on Lafayette Avenue from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the Skating Rink, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State Aid and for expenditure of other public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1945, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 6. To see what action the Town will take toward authorizing and empowering the Board of Selectmen to acquire aviation facilities under the provisions of Chapter 51 Public Laws State of New Hampshire and to appropriate money therefor.

ARTICLE 7. To see what action the Town will take toward the building of a new bridge over the Ammonoosuc River on Cottage Street in Littleton to replace the present structure; to appropriate money therefor and to accept aid financially and otherwise from State and/or Federal Agencies pertaining to the same.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway from Pattenville State Road to the Old Monroe Road near the Bagley house.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to discon-

tinue the highway from the old Newell Steere place to the Nelson Higgins Farm.

ARTICLE 10. To see what action the Town will take empowering the Selectmen to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to provide suitable recognition of the services of Littleton men and women in the Armed forces during World War 2.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 1/100th of one percent of the Town valuation, for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

ARTICLE 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Littleton which had been made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the town. Exhibits and Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts of the selectmen, treasurer, tax collector, town clerk, trustees of trust funds, municipal court, overseer of the poor, road agents, library treasurer and park commission, for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945. The accounts of the Water and Electric Light Department of the town and the Littleton Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

Financial Statements

The balance sheet as of December 31, 1945, is presented in Exhibit I.

As indicated by Exhibit I, the Net Debt was reduced during the year ended December 31, 1945, by

\$13,525.29. This decrease resulted principally from the retirement of notes and bonds.

A summary of receipts and expenditures for 1944, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit II.

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, are presented in Exhibits IV and V. As indicated by the budget summary, a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,945.39, less a net excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$974.22, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,971.17.

Summarized statements of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes, covering a ten year period, prepared from reports on file in the office of the Tax Commission, are presented in statistical Tables II and III.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1945, is indicated in Exhibit III.

General Comments

It is recommended that a bond and coupon account be set up at the depository bank separate from the general fund account. Prior to the maturity dates of principal and interest on notes and bond issues the required amounts to meet such debt service payments should be transferred from the general fund account to the bond and coupon account through the

issuance of regular town vouchers and checks. All payments made by the bank on account of principal and interest on indebtedness would then be charged to the bond and coupon account.

Attention is again called to the matter of unredeemed taxes outstanding on the books from the tax sales on account of the levies of 1944, 1943, 1942, 1941, 1940, 1939, 1938 and previous years. All taxes which remain unredeemed after two years from the date of the tax sale should be cleaned up either through collector's deeds to the town or by abatement if for any reason a deed cannot be taken. Tax delinquent property taken by the town through collector's deeds should subsequently be disposed of as soon as possible by resale to the original owner or other party thus bringing it back on the tax rolls.

The accounts and records of all town officials, with exceptions as herein noted, were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the Annual Report of the Librarian is Herewith Submitted:

The number of books borrowed from the Littleton Public Library in 1945 held to the level of 1944, as seems to have been the case with other small libraries. The town population has increased, and it is expected that a proportionate increase in circulation will show for the coming year. School use of reference service is definitely growing, and the Apthorp School is taking full advantage of its privilege of borrowing classroom collections for extended periods.

Although the total number of books in the library has varied little, over four hundred new volumes have been added during the year. Our aim has been, first, to provide the current books which are sure to be in demand, then to replace out-of-date books in certain fields and to fill in gaps in the collection, as far as our funds will allow. In a way this is a perpetual process, but every year progress is made toward the ideal, the most alive and useful collection possible.

Too few people realize the valuable service the N. H. State Library gives in lending small libraries books which it would be impractical for them to buy. The Littleton Public Library borrows extensively there for its patrons. In most cases the books requested arrive within two or three days.

The Women's Alliance of the Unitarian Church presented the book of poems "Bolts of Melody" by Emily Dickinson in memory of the late Mrs. Elizabeth T. Beattie. Other gift books were received from interested patrons and were greatly appreciated. Mr.

Edward Landerkin gave an unusual Indian bridle, and Mrs. Louise Jencks, a bronze bust. The smaller upstairs room of the library was repainted in December and will soon house these gifts with the library's collection of objects of historic and local interest. Records of Littleton's participation in World War II will be kept at the library and filed by the librarian when they are complete.

In June an all-day district meeting of the N. H. Library Association was held at the library and was attended by about thirty librarians and trustees from towns in the northern part of the state. The program included a talk by Miss Catharine Pratt, Assistant State Librarian, on book buying procedure at the State Library. Book reviews and a discussion of book selection aids were also heard. The librarian also attended the annual meeting of the N. H. Library Association in Laconia in October. There the topics included the improvement of the library's public relations, and the preparation of adequate library budgets.

May I take this opportunity to thank the Board of Trustees and the patrons of the library for their interest and help during the year just past.

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts and records of the Town of Littleton Water and Light Department which has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission at the request of the Commissioners of the Department. The Exhibits and Schedules included are part of this report.

Scope of Audit

The audit and examination covered the twelve month period ended December 31, 1945 and consisted of:

- (1) An examination of the Current Assets of the Department including Cash on Hand and in Banks, Securities and Accounts Receivable as of December 31, 1945.
- (2) An examination of the Current Liabilities including employees Federal Taxes withheld and Customers' Deposits Accounts.
- (3) An audit of all cash disbursements through exam-

ination of cancelled checks, supporting invoices, pay-rolls and receipts.

(4) An audit of all cash receipts through credits to accounts receivable, customers' deposits accounts and deposits to savings bank and checking accounts.

(5) An examination as to the proper distribution of purchases, labor and other charges.

(6) A review of the Depreciation Reserve Accounts and activity therein during the period.

(7) Tests were made proving the mathematical accuracy of the various records.

CURRENT ASSETS:

CASH (General Fund):

The checking account and the petty cash account were examined and the balances were reconciled with the ledger account balances as of December 31, 1945.

CUSTOMERS' DEPOSITS SAVINGS ACCOUNT:

The balance on this account was verified and found to agree with the contra account representing Customers' Deposits after proper effect had been given thereto for additions, repayments and distribution of interest earned.

REPLACEMENT FUND:

The only activity in this fund during the period under review was the result of interest earned and credited to the fund by the depository bank.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE:

The accounts receivable were examined and aged. Due to the fact that monthly bills are rendered to the customers which indicate an open balance, it was not considered necessary to verify any of the outstanding accounts. An analysis of this account indicates the following:

INVESTMENTS:

Investments were increased during the year by the purchase of United States Defense Bonds, Series G in the amount of \$10,000.00 to bring the total held by the Department to \$26,000.00.

FIXED ASSETS:

PLANT ACCOUNT:

The plant account was increased during the year by additions to Accessory Electrical Equipment totaling \$2,310.62 and to Transmission Poles, Lines and Fixtures totaling \$950.00

RESERVES:

The reserve for depreciation of plant and equipment was increased by \$9,896.28, arrived at as follows:

It should be noted that the rate of depreciation on the first three classes of equipment was set at 3½%, a reduction of 1% from the previous years' rate. Depreciation was computed on the book value of the fixed assets exclusive of the cost of equipment installed during the year.

EXHIBIT B—Statement of Operations:

Operations of the Light Department for the year ended December 31, 1945 resulted in a net profit of \$45,371.35. This was arrived at after certain general expenses applicable to both the Water and Light Departments had been apportioned between them on a basis commensurate with the activities connected with each. During the period under review \$45,247.16 of the net profit was turned over to the Treasurer of the Town of Littleton for general purposes. The undistributed balance of net profit, \$124.19, was credited to Surplus which brought the balance of this account at December 31, 1945 to \$262,320.81 (Exhibit C)

As all Water and Light Department money is handled

in a general fund, cash receipts and payments of the Water Department were audited with those of the Light Department. Water Department cash on hand at December 31, 1945 amounted to \$7,358.17.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE:

The accounts receivable were examined and aged. As in the case of Light Department accounts receivable, it was not considered necessary to verify the outstanding balances at this time. An analysis of the above account discloses the following:

There was an increase of \$51.58 in this account during the year as indicated by an inventory taken as of December 31, 1945 by employees of the department. No physical examination of this account was made as part of this audit.

EXHIBIT E—Statement of Operations:

Net profit for the year ended December 31, 1945 was \$9,794.23. Of this amount \$9,752.84 was turned over to the Town Treasurer for general town purposes. The balance, \$41.39, was credited to Surplus thereby increasing this account to \$324,289.22. (Exhibit F).

General Comments

There is no criticism of the accounting system and we found all the records and accounts in good order. It might be advisable to set up in both the Water and Light Departments an inventory control account to

which all purchases of materials, supplies and equipment would be charged. Credits to this account would be made whenever any supplies were withdrawn from stock. If such an account were set up and an efficient control of receipts and withdrawals of stock maintained, it would provide better information as to the cost of various projects. Cost of supplies purchased and not used would not enter into the operating costs of the departments and likewise if more material was used from stock during the fiscal period than was purchased the additional cost would be reflected in the operations statement. It would also provide a check on the physical inventory at all times.

It was noted that various purchases had been made by employees and others through the department. Inasmuch as there is no profit realized on such sales it would appear advisable in the future to place them on a cash basis.

We wish to express our appreciation to the Commissioners, Treasurer and employees for their courtesy and assistance rendered during the audit.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report relative to your schools.

The past year has again brought several changes in faculty membership.

Mr. Raigh Mason, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, receiving both Bachelor's and Master's degrees from that institution, with previous experience in Goffstown as well as several years in the A. A. F., is teacher of social studies and physical education director.

Miss Grace F. Cassidy, a graduate of Trinity College, with experience as teacher in South Hero, Vermont, and as social worker for the Vermont Public Welfare Department, is teacher of English.

Mrs. Agnes R. Petzold, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, with several years teaching experience in Charlestown, Essex, Vt., Southboro, Mass., and Whitefield is teacher of English and French.

Miss Helen June Armitage, who graduated from Bates College last June, is teacher of English and Latin.

Miss Luwilda M. Placy, who graduated from the University of New Hampshire last June, is home economics teacher.

Miss Ruthanna Stone, a graduate of Bates Col-

lege last June, is social studies teacher and girls' physical education director.

Miss Anna Lewis, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with teaching experience at Bristol, is third grade teacher in the Kilburn School.

The enrollment last year as will be seen by the table at the end of this report was 636. This year a total of 644 have registered as compared with 612 at the corresponding time last year.

The several repairs and improvements to school property authorized this last year have been necessary and desirable. Major items included painting the outside woodwork on the high school building, replacing many tubes in the high school boiler, and construction of a teachers' room in the Apthorp building.

Purchase of new materials has helped to improve instruction. New spelling books have been bought for the first eight grades. New arithmetics for the Apthorp School, new science books for the Kilburn School, some history sets for both schools, and a few sets of geography and music books have replaced worn sets. More reference sets of books have been supplied to both elementary buildings. In addition to the above, many replacement sets have been furnished in the high school. A set of maps has been secured for the social studies department. A new, modern motion picture projector has been purchased.

Information concerning the high school is furnished in Headmaster Cummings' report. The many changes in the staff of teachers have burdened him with heavy responsibility. His sincerity of purpose shown in conscientious and untiring effort, and his experience acquired over a period of years are a real

asset to the school during a difficult period.

The medical inspection report of last year showed 576 pupils were examined and the following defects noted and reported to parents: Underweight 111, defective vision 72, defective hearing 17, cardiac disease 4, deformity 4, defective teeth 74, diseased tonsils 12. The school nurse reported corrections as follows: Underweight 54, defective vision 63, diseased tonsils 1. The following clinics were held: Vision, ear, dental, orthopedic and tuberculosis. Special physical examinations were given the members of the athletic teams.

The penny milk program is again being carried on this year. A lunch of hot cocoa or soup is served at cost during the winter to noon pupils.

The high school is indebted to the Music Lovers' Club for providing annual awards at graduation to the boy and girl who have shown the best personal development in musical ability and contributed the most to public enjoyment of music during their high school career.

The war has ended but the shortage of teachers continues. Some men are returning to high school positions, so that the high school situation has eased slightly except in certain fields such as home economics and commerce. Elementary teachers, however, are leaving their positions for marriage, or other causes, much faster than new elementary teachers have been trained as replacements. The shortage of elementary teachers started even before the war, when four years of training were required to secure a position paying less than high school teachers received. At the present time it is difficult to secure enough elementary teachers in our state to keep all schools running another year.

The remedy for this situation is undoubtedly higher salaries so that girls will feel more inducement to train as elementary teachers. The present shortage will continue for the next few years until replacements have been trained.

This situation, together with equipment needs and increasing prices of all materials in this inflationary period, is increasing the financial cost of schools.

The cooperation of the public has been generously offered the past year. This has been thoroughly appreciated by the entire school personnel.

Headmaster's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I take pleasure in presenting to you my second report as headmaster of Littleton High School.

REGISTRATION

The total registration to date is 287 and shows an increase of six pupils more than were in attendance last year. The senior high school accounts for four pupils and the junior high school two. Of the number registered in the senior high school 13 pupils have withdrawn. The causes of these withdrawals are:

Change in family conditions	2

ATTENDANCE

The attendance record for the school is as follows:

Senior High School	93.51
Junior High School	96.21

Such a record may be considered creditable when we consider that a number of school days are lost

by pupils who were needed for essential work in our stores during the holiday season. It is hoped that as conditions become more normal that it will not be necessary to excuse as many pupils for work during the school year.

THE CURRICULUM AND TIME-TABLE

The time-table was changed this year to include seven periods instead of six. Aeronautics, as a unit course, was dropped from the curriculum and economics was added. This course is divided into fundamentals of economics and consumer economics. This change permits a pupil to pursue a social science study for a full four years.

THE TEACHING STAFF

Six new members were added to the teaching staff as the result of a like number who resigned to accept other positions. While such a situation might not be considered wholesome in normal times, such a turnover this past year is typical of what has been taking place throughout the entire nation in the teaching profession. Littleton High School was fortunate in that a full staff of qualified teachers was procured well in advance of the opening of school.

EXTRA-CURRICULA ACTIVITIES

A full program of extra-curricula activities is being carried on which includes athletics, music, both vocal and instrumental, dramatics, publication of *The Record* and socials throughout the year.

GRADUATES

A recent survey was made of the graduates of the Class of 1945 and it revealed the fact that practi-

cally all of its members were gainfully employed, in the armed forces, or in post secondary institutions. Of the 44 graduates, 8 are in the armed forces and 12 in post secondary schools as follows:

Two members of the Class of 1945, who left school previous to graduation to enter the armed forces have received their diplomas after completing the necessary requirements through basic and technical training in service. A third member will be awarded his diploma as soon as his record is received by the school.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to you, Mrs. Howland, the teaching staff, and the school board for the cooperation and help I have received this past year. To the people of Littleton, I wish to express my appreciation for their interest and their support in all activities of the school.
