DISTRICT No. 1.

Shall include the road running by the Simpson farm and shall extend to the Durham and Dover lines.

DISTRICT No. 2.

Shall include all town roads east of the so-called N. H. College Road except those in District N. 1. It shall also include the road running westerly from the N. H. College highway by the farm of George B. Clark to the junction of the road leading from Madbury to the Dover Mast Road.

DISTRICT No. 3.

Shall include all town highways east of the Boston & Maine R.R. except those included in Districts No. 1 and 2. It shall also include those highways west of the B. & M. R.R. to the residence of Major John Demeritt and the Durham boundary.

DISTRICT No. 4.

Shall include all of the Madbury road which runs from the corner at the residence of Major John Demeritt to

the Durham boundary at the residence of George McGunnigles.

DISTRICT No. 5.

Shall include all town roads not assigned to any other districts and shall include the so-called Dube road, the main road through Madbury center, the road leading to the residence of Albert Emerson, the road leading from the Fernald estate to the north school house, the road beginning at the residence of George D. Hayes, and the Mill Hill Road, also the road leading from John Hanscom towards the County Farm.

DISTRICT No. 6.

Shall include the road from Nute's corner to the Barrington line passing by the farms of Herbert L. and Greenleaf Drew.

DISTRICT No. 7.

Shall include that road leading from the State Highway near the residence of Lewis Young to the Barrington line, which road passes the farm now operated by H. H. Hayes.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

TO THE CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

The School Board feels that it owes you an explanation for the deficit we have incurred during this school year. Our budget was figured as closely as we could from the facts we had at hand and our estimate of \$3,135 to be raised by taxation was the result.

AFTER the school meeting a family moved into town with four children for whom we were legally obliged to provide school facilities. In this case it meant the purchase of desks at a cost of approximately \$40.00. Also, AFTER the school meeting we were notified that the High School Tuition would be raised from \$90.00 to \$100.00 per pupil. One high school student moved into town during the summer. Under the circumstances, our budget fell short by \$275.00 due to reasons beyond our control and due to expenses we were legally liable for.

It should be pointed out at this time that there is still due the school board from the assessment voted in 1922, the sum of \$63.40. If this had been paid over, our deficit would be that much less.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Somersworth, N. H.,
February 1, 1931.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

I present my second annual report. The statistics appended refer to the school year ending June 30, 1930 and a comparison is given with the year before.

There has been no change of teachers and the schools have profited from this. Miss Dorothy Kavanaugh replaced Miss Ina Marden, resigned, as nurse. Miss Kavanaugh has all the schools of Somersworth, public and private and the schools of Durham and Madbury. This arrangement keeps the nurse and superintendent in closer touch than did the previous arrangement. Miss Kavanaugh has made a brief report which follows my own.

Both schools have been interrupted by outbreaks of whooping cough and measles. Fortunately most of the cases of measles occurred during the Christmas vacation which made it necessary to prolong the vacation. We had no warning of either outbreak and no one can be blamed therefor. Attendance is again normal. I must warn parents, however, that pupils missing very much time cannot expect to be passed on to the next grade.

We find not only the same crowded conditions in both schools, but worse. North Madbury has twenty nine pupils enrolled, and as I write this I am told that four more are moving in at once. A survey of this district shows that there are twenty more under school age. Three of the 29 pupils are in the eighth grade. Madbury Center school has thirty-two now enrolled and there are two fam-

ilies from this district who are sending their pupils to Dover at their own expense. A survey here shows 21 under school age. There are five pupils in grade eight and seven in grade one. Four of those in grade one are recent arrivals from Italy with no knowledge of English. This school offers a difficult problem. Grades one and eight would be problem enough without the intervening grades. What can we do about it? In my opinion there is only one proper solution and that is a consolidated building in Madbury. If the District does not vote to provide facilities it may be necessary for the School Board to provide them and the district be placed in debt. The law says in Chapter 117:1— “The *school board* of every district shall provide standard elementary schools for at least thirty-six weeks in each year, at such places in the district as will best serve the interests of education and give to all the pupils within the district as nearly equal advantages as are practicable.”

Chapter 117:20— “A standard school is one maintained for at least thirty-six weeks in each year, in a suitable and sanitary building, equipped with approved furniture, books, maps and other necessary appliances, and supervised by an approved superintendent, with suitable provision for the care of the health and physical welfare of all pupils”.

Any other solution otherwise than a new building must be only temporary. If room for another teacher is provided a large share of the expense of the new teacher would be borne by the State. We ought to be drawing more state aid.

Costs have remained about the same. We operate on a minimum budget anyway. If continued in use the North Madbury school should be refinished inside. Its papered walls are dirty and its ceiling peeling. Some sort of a portico, or covered entrance with chance for an outside door would prevent a great deal of cold from entering the

Center School and endangering those who must be seated near the door in this crowded building.

I feel that the school board, teachers, parents and pupils are now working in harmony but I agree with the following, as given by Associate Editor, Anson W. Belding, *Journal of Education*, Boston, Mass.

"The educational merger needs to go further. It needs to obtain the participation of a third party, the community. Parents and teachers may be in perfect agreement as to policies which will help the children. The citizens as a whole may not be in accord. Generally speaking, the community of today supports its schools enthusiastically. It does not always support them intelligently. Moreover, the community has many responsibilities for the educational welfare of tomorrow's citizens besides the duty of providing formal instruction. To see that opportunities are afforded for wholesome recreation is one example of a community's duty. To maintain high standards of civic pride; to operate government without corruption is another. If a community is clean and beautiful; if it has proper industries; a healthy industrial life; if it has sup-
planted tenements with homes; if loafing places and speak-easies have been abolished; if public health and highway safety are sedulously promoted—then the community is to this extent laboring along with the schools and the homes to train the children in the way they shall go.

Marvelous progress in education is made possible wherever the home, the community, and the school are cooperating in a single-minded partnership for the good of the children". Let us believe that Madbury is a community doing these things.

I am grateful for the support given me and the teachers by an interested school board and good citizens.

FLORENCE PENDEXTER MILES

Our community has been deeply saddened by the passing of one who was our friend, neighbor, and fellow-club woman—Mrs. Florence Pendexter Miles. Scarcely in middle life, and in the fulness of years, entering with great zeal into various activities and life interests, she had endeared herself to the home and immediate circles in which she so recently moved. Although quiet and retiring in manner, she possessed qualities which won for her many friendships, and helped her to realize her aims in social life and work. After finishing school Mrs. Miles was a most successful teacher for some years, and while in that capacity gained the respect and love of her pupils as well as that of her friends.

An eventful year came for her in 1919 when she was married to Mr. Edward L. Miles, a former resident of the town, and soon after returned to live in the old homestead where she was born and reared. Mrs. Miles was descended on the father's side from Edward Pendexter, who, according to records, was born August 22, 1778, and who married April 3, 1803 Polly, daughter of Jacob and Hannah (Cram) Joy. This connection with the Joy family was a fortunate one, bringing land, early acquired by the latter, into the Pendexter name, which was perpetuated by their son, Edward, born Sept. 19, 1805, and in turn by their son, Edward, the father of Mrs. Miles, to the present generation. The homestead built by the grandfather, Edward, is typical of the early 1800 Architecture, and is one of the most attractive in Madbury. Through her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Miles is related to the Stickney family of Concord, Martha C. Stickney who was married to Edward Pendexter 2nd in 1840. Many residents now living remember her with pleasure, and as one who was active in all pertaining to the family and the

town. The Revolutionary history of the Stickney family it too important to be passed over without mention. It was Thomas Stickney, the grandfather of the above Martha Stickney, who pledged his life and fortune to sustain the Colonies in the Revolution, March 14, 1776, and was chosen one of the Committee of Safety. He was Colonel at Ticonderoga July, 1777.

"Colonel Stickney was one of twenty-eight men from Concord who were in the battle of Bennington, Aug. 16, 1777, where he commanded a Regiment under General Stark on the right wing of the army and particularly distinguished himself." "Aug. 3, 1778, he was ordered to raise volunteers, and to send them speedily to join General Sullivan in Rhode Island". This fine record enabled Mrs. Miles to enter with prominence the Margery Sullivan Chapter, D. A. R. in which she was proving a patriotic and valuable member. Mrs. Miles' mother was Sarah E. DeMerritt, the daughter of Alfred DeMerritt who was a direct descendant of Elie de Merrit, the emigrant who took his first grant of land in this locality on April 11, 1694. His first son, Eli by name, born March 1, 1696, was the founder of the Eli branch of the family and was a man of prominence in the early settlement of the "western part of Dover" as it was then called. He was one of the signers of the petition to have Madbury set off from Dover May 10, 1743. He was selectman of Dover, 1736-1753 and of Madbury 1755-1758, and owned one of the first saw-mills on the Bellamy River. He also served in the Colonial wars. Every son of this Eli branch has been active in town affairs.

Mrs. Miles was also a valuable member of the Durham Woman's Club, serving on the Executive Committee, but above all she was a valuable citizen of our town, interested in the educational, religious and political matters, and never failing to respond to every call for the upbuild of our community. Her deeds of kindness to her neigh-

bors and friends will live long in memory and many will regret her untimely passing. "So many live for amusement, routine, conformity; so few for virtue, truth". The greatest teachers have proved to us that behind all the activity of the world is the wealth of being—that it is what we *are* rather than what we *do* by which we are able to help and comfort those about us. Also whether we are conscious of it or not, the real life of any community, as of the world, is concentrated in the character of a number of persons who are so strong and upright that they become the moral and spiritual force of that community. Mrs. Miles was undoubtedly one of these, and dared be true—and we are better because she has lived among us.
