TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of persons and property, including the police department. For health and sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for highways and bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for education, including the public library; for charities, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for recreation, including band concerts; for cemeteries; for interest: for new construction and improvements, including state aid and town construction; for indebtedness, payments to other Governmental Divisions, includ-

ing county tax, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 2 per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, if paid within 15 days after receipt of bill.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

5. To see if the Town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$47.00 in addition to that required by law.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

7. To see if the Town of Newmarket will vote to accept, maintain and tar Rock Street.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

8. To see if the Town will vote to expend the sum of \$200.00 for the removal of two trees considered dangerous, this sum to be deducted from the highway appropriation.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Zoning Ordinance as submitted by the Selectmen at the two Public Hearings held for the discussion of same.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

10. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

11. To see if the Town of Newmarket will vote to have a revaluation of all property by Independent Assessors.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

12. To see if the Town will appropriate the sums necessary for the carrying out of this revaluation project.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

13. To see if the Town of Newmarket will vote to construct and equip a new Community Center Building.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75,000.00 to \$100,000.00 to construct and equip a new Community Center Building, and to purchase any land necessary therefore.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

15. For the purpose of constructing and equipping a new Community Center Building, and for the purpose of purchasing any land necessary therefore, to see if the Town will authorize the issue of serial coupon notes or bonds of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bond Statute, and all amendments thereof.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

16. To see if the Town will name a building committee to execute contracts and agreements for the Town.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

17. To see if said new Community Center Building shall be dedicated as a living memorial to those who served their country in World War II.

to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

February 2, 1950

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with pleasure that I submit my third annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

This past year was indeed an unsettled one for education. The legislature cut state aid to Schools from \$2,000,000. back to \$400,000. This fact seems unbelievable when it is generally understood that education is the basis of our democracy. The school children of today will be the citizens of tomorrow.

As a part of this report, there will be a page devoted to Return of District Revenue, which shows the actual budget that the School District is using for the current year (1949-1950). This is also a result of legislative action.

The expenses for the Supervisory Union have also been changed. Formerly all towns in this union paid their share of expense according to their number of teachers. Now it must be divided equally between equalized valuation (1949) and average daily membership. Newmarket's share of Union expenses is approximately 30%.

TEACHERS

Mrs. Pauline Breck of Laconia, a graduate of Plymouth, was hired to replace Ellen Deem in grade 3. Miss Deem left to marry and is now teaching in Milton.

Mary Maguire, teacher of English, French and Latin, left at the end of last school year to complete her master's degree. She was replaced by Marjorie Wood of Hampton, who has had many years of successful teaching in New Hampshire and Vermont.

Howard Jackson of Keene T. C. was elected to replace Marion Burnett. Mr. Jackson teaches Math and Science and comes from Alstead, N. H.

Mary Rheault of Lowell, Mass., a graduate of Salem T. C. replaces Mrs. Jean Hibbard who resigned to accept a teaching position at Claremont. Miss Rheault coaches girls' basketball, edits the yearbook and handles school finances.

William Marcoux, of Nashua and a graduate of Keene T. C. was elected to replace Gardiner Holmes. Mr. Marcoux teaches Manual Training plus Math and Science. It is hoped that shop courses can be offered to High School students in the future.

Mrs. Matilda Youngman, a graduate of the U. N. H. and a resident of Hampton was elected as teacher of Home Economics, replacing Mrs. Lewilda Raymond, who resigned to accept a teaching position in Concord.

Forrest Miner, a graduate of the U. N. H. replaces Walter Foster who resigned to become Headmaster of Nute High School in Milton. Mr. Miner comes from Brattleboro, Vt., coaches all sports and teaches social studies.

John Economopoulos of Dover, N. H. has been acting as Sub-Master in High School due to the sudden resignation in January of John McGrath due to illness. Mr. Economopoulos has been acting

very capably as Headmaster with the assistance of the teachers and superintendent.

Rexford Avery Headmaster of Amherst High School was elected to replace John McGrath. Mr. Avery plans to live in Newmarket and assume his duties February 27th.

REPAIRS and REPLACEMENTS

To comply with the State Fire Marshal's requests, the following has been completed:

Central and Stone Schools

- 1. Boiler rooms made fire resistant
- 2. Provided one Soda-Acid Extinguisher for each classroom and boiler room
- 3. Front entrance repaired, platform raised and new doors installed
- 4. Altered all school room doors to swing outward
- 5. Provided an individual fire alarm system having a button in each school room, boiler room, and in front hallway
- 6. Rebuilt fire escapes and door to make easy safe escape from building

In the High School fire extinguishers were purchased. In addition to these fire repairs the school board has had the following completed:

Central School

- 1. Fence around the central school yard
- 2. Painted trim on outside
- 3. Repaired roof
- 4. Installed lights in Grade 4
- 5. Installed new flag pole
- 6. Installed stoker

Stone School

- 1. Painted Grade 6 classroom
- 2. Installed oil burner
- 3. Painted trim on outside
- 4. Covered boiler

High School

- 1. Painted two classrooms
- 2. Painted trim and roof
- 3. Installed two sinks
- 4. Installed new electric range
- 5. Installed new electric water heater
- 6. Rewired Home Ec. Room
- 7. Replaced two outside doors
- 8. Tarred driveways
- 9. Replaced five typewriters
- 10. Repaired all poor plaster

A new gas range was presented to the Home Ec. Dept. by Edgar Moison of Rockingham Gas Co. This was greatly appreciated. Turcotte Hardware has also replaced the refrigerator with the latest Frigidaire.

Mr. Harold Dawes and Charles Lang deserve many thanks for the excellent shelter they built for the bus children.

It is hoped that the Central School yard can be graded, lighting improved in another classroom and one or two teachers' desks replaced.

At the High School, several classrooms and corridors need paint. Window curtains need to be replaced and one front walk needs to be raised and resurfaced. Buildings kept in good repair are an asset to any town and Newmarket deserves much credit in this respect

In closing, I wish to express my thanks and appreciation to the School Board, citizens, teachers, and pupils of Newmarket who have been so cooperative and helpful during the past year.
