### TOWN WARRANT

### State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.
- 2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or to pass any vote relative thereto.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town highways for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Orford Free Library, and for Orford Social Library.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell any property acquired by tax deed.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- 13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Orford Common so called.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent (1-100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1943 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee region.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for reconstruction of Class V. roads, and how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for that purpose.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to install a new furnace in the Town Hall, and how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for that purpose.
- 18. To see if the Town will co-operate with the State in building a new bridge on the Dame Hill road near the store of Alvin B. Weeks, and how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for that purpose.
- 19. Bring your ballots for delegates to party National convention.

20. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### THE DARTMOUTH-LAKE SUNAPEE REGION

The legislature of 1937 authorized the establishment of six Regions, each comprising a group of towns suggested by the State Planning and Development Commission. The Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region comprises this town and 37 others in this section of the state. The Region is incorporated as a non-profit corporation and its affairs are supervised by a group of officers chosen annually. The Region employs a full time secretary who is paid by the state (not by the towns.) Thus your Region is a set-up established by law and the matter of whether or not it has sufficient financial support to render real service to your community rests with the voters of the towns. During its existence the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region can point to the following accomplishments: Through the publicity it has issued it has brought visitors to every town, some have established summer homes and others have become permanent residents. It has been instrumental in bringing industries to several towns. It has inaugurated plans that have saved historic landmarks. It has sponsored paving summer attractions. It has been active in bringing about a survey of our mineral resources that has resulted in revenue to many towns, and has conducted studies of new agricultural products.

By an appropriation not exceeding 1-100 of 1% of the assessed valuation the Region now asks the support of your town in continuing the program that has brought about the aforementioned results and to institute the following three projects which, if carried through, must result in added income to each of the 38 towns of the Region: (1) A research of the possibilities of establishing industries that will use as raw materials, minerals within our area and make a study of the feasibility of the production, processing and sale of several agricultural products that in the past have received but little attention. (2) To co-operate with each of the towns in preparing descriptive pamphlets showing the attractions, natural advantages and resources of the community with the idea of eventually incorporating such material into a book descriptive of the whole Region. (3) To establish a system of Recreation Trails following back highways and little used roads leading to scenic areas and desirable locations in each of the 38 towns in the Region. As it is not deemed proper to devote more space in your Town Report to this subject, details have been omitted. However, letters of inquiry regarding any matter here mentioned will be welcome and given careful reply. Address: Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, New London, N. H.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Orford:

The Superintendent of the Orford School District herewith presents his sixth annual report. It contains the usual statistical and financial material and such comments and recommendations as seem pertinent to the situation at the present time.

General. Boys and girls who are now 14 years of age or over may soon be called upon to do men's and women's work. At the shortest the time will not be more than four years. This and many other events and changes of the last few years make it obligatory upon those of us who have the responsibility of providing for the education of youth at all levels to modify our thinking and actions in connection with the educational outlook in our communities. It must not be forgotten that in the post war world soldiers, sailors and marines will not immediately be cajoled into becoming normal citizens as soon as they give up the practices of war. Our own citizens who have left our midst will likewise be returning to us and will need a period of time to become accustomed to life in a smaller community. All of which means that the public schools must be more and more alert to provide the necessary education for our young citizens and to keep the general morale of the young people on a sane and even plain.

High School. The High School continues to maintain a satisfactory standing. It is a pleasure to report that the average attendance has increased during the last two years and that it is expected this increase will continue so long as it is possible to provide a bus for the pupils from Warren and Wentworth. It has been necessary this year to have one employed teacher during the entire year. This will lessen somewhat the amount of money to be received from Plymouth Teachers College, but it is of advantage to the boys and girls as an experienced teacher was found to do the work. This teacher is not only an excellent teacher, but is able to carry on the music program and has done so for all the schools

of Orford. It will not always be possible to have such an arrangement as teachers with these particular qualifications will not always be available. The work in agriculture has emphasized dairy farming rather more than the other types, although the director is careful to give the boys an all around training in several fields closely related to farm life in this and surrounding towns. So many of the boys who are older have entered the Armed Forces that it was not possible to carry on the same type of program that has been true in years past. It is expected, however, that after a reasonable length of time the usual program will be resumed. At that time it may become necessary and advisable to provide additional appropriations for recreation and other co-curricula activities.

**Pupil Activities.** The statements made in the preceding paragraphs do not mean that the pupils in our schools are not doing their part in connection with the war effort. They are still at work upon the problem of salvaging scrap of various types and urging their parents to assist in preventing waste of those materials which are vital to the war program. Many of the boys and girls are still interested in the 4H Clubs. The older boys and girls have assisted the farmers both in the planting and harvesting of crops. Pupils in all schools are continuing to purchase War Savings Stamps and are planning various parts of their work, particularly in the field of geography, in such a way as to keep conscious of the areas which are in the forefront of the battle lines. One school has received a citation from the U. S. Treasury for the stamps bought. All of these several activities indicate that, whether adults recognize it or not, the young people with their useful zest are taking seriously many of the needs of the men at the front. While many of the activities have to do with the war, some of them have as their objective the interest of the young people in united service and also their natural inclination to join each other in healthful activities.

**Teachers.** The teaching staff has rendered generally efficient services in all fields. The changes among the teachers have been limited up to the present time. War conditions are making it increasingly difficult to secure and retain teachers trained and willing to under-

take programs such as ours. It is probable that the community will be obliged to recognize the necessity of somewhat higher salaries, unless world and national conditions change materially in the next one or two years. The number of persons entering the teaching profession through the teachers colleges in the country at large and in our state particularly has been decreasing the last two or three years. This means that there will be available fewer trained teachers and those communities which can offer higher salaries will be the ones more likely to secure the better trained personnel. This statement is made so that all may understand why it has been deemed necessary by your superintendent to ask for a little larger budget item for teachers' salaries.

**The Lunch Program.** The appropriation granted by the School District Meeting last year has made it possible to continue the school lunches. Contrary to previous information the Federal Government made available to us certain funds for local use which must be expended under the direction of the Superintendent of Schools. The canning which was done by the citizens last year and donated to the school lunch program and this fund together with the appropriation have all made it possible to carry on a more consistent program than was feasible by the utilization of surplus commodities. These lunches have been provided in both the Orford Street and Orfordville schools. They have become more and more popular with the boys and girls and give an added zest to their school work. It may be interesting to know that more than twice as many pupils have had their lunch at Orford Street as compared to the number last year. In the interest of continuing the plan it is recommended and made a part of the budget prepared for this meeting that the appropriation be continued for this particular item of the budget. It is not known whether or not any subsidies will be available for another year, but with the co-operation of the citizens in utilizing their own surplus products for canning it is possible that with the plan set up to pay something toward the lunches by the children themselves, the whole program can be financed locally if it becomes necessary.

Repairs. Rather more than the usual number of minor repairs have been taken care of during the past

year. The fence at the Orfordville school has been reinstalled. A part of this work was done by the boys in the Agricultural Department. There is evidence that the work done to the heating system in this building was of such a nature as to afford much better results and give the needed heat for the building. The other major improvement there was the repainting and redecorating of class and lunch rooms. The wood work was painted and that in the halls revarnished. This work has improved the appearance of all of the rooms and made the atmosphere rather more cheerful. Cupboards were built so that supplies of all types are more adequately protected. There were several minor routing repairs which were made at the Street. The major item of the work done at that building was the provision for a lunch room. Plans were made during the summer to utilize a portion of the basement area for this purpose. A comfortable room has been built and the pupils, as well as the teachers, find it very satisfactory. Because of this, it is possible for the Domestic Arts Department to carry on the work in the high school proper without any interference because of the preparation of the lunches. This latest plan has been so successful and the preparation of lunches has been so much improved that a larger percentage of the boys and girls in both Grade and High school remain in that school for lunches. The next important step in caring for the buildings will be that of painting the outside of the building at Orfordville. The paint has lost its effectiveness and worn off in many places. Unless it is taken care of reasonably soon, greater deterioration will take place. The willingness of the School Board and the citizens to care for the school buildings of the town is not only commendable, but at the same time is also economical.

**Budget.** It will be noted in the proposed School Budget that a request is made for an additional sum for teachers' salaries. This is in keeping with the trend of salaries in other parts of the country and in this State. If Orford is to maintain even its present standard, it will need to have this additional amount. The fewer young people entering the teachers' colleges will make the teacher shortage more and more acute in the next

four or five years. The item classified as other obligations is for providing for school lunches and this year made a part of the School Budget rather than in a separate article. On the other side of the account you will be interested to know that State Aid has been increased nearly \$500, with this increase and with the budget request the needed amount to be raised by taxation is only slightly more than that of two years ago. You will recall that it was stated in the report of last year that the reduction "Should not be thought of as permanent." The amount in the present budget is not unreasonable. This somewhat extended explanation is made so that all may understand that there is no effort on the part of the Board to increase the appropriation when it can be avoided and as indicated in the estimated balance there is no effort to spend all of the appropriation if it is found not to be needed.

Conclusion. It is a source of continued satisfaction to be able to report that the same spirit of helpfulness on the part of the School Board and citizens of Orford, mentioned in previous reports, continues to prevail. Your teachers and Superintendent are ever mindful of this co-operative attitude. They sincerely hope that they may continue to merit such support and to give their best in the effort to improve the educational opportunities of the community.
