[L. S.] TOWN WARRANT State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said town on the ninth day of March next, at 1.30 of the clock in the afternoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and to elect one person for Selectman for three years.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of Highways under the law passed January session, 1905.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the use of highways and bridges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same, and determine in what manner the same shall be expended.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the extermination of moths, beetles and white pine blister.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law, for the Public Library.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries for the ensuing year.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

9. To choose two persons for three years for trustees of cemeteries.

10. To choose one person for three years for trustee of the Public Library.

11. To choose one person for three years for trustee of the Trust Funds of the Town.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.

13. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent on 1926 taxes paid before September 1st, 1926.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to build a Fire House, and if voted in the affirmative to determine in what manner the same shall be expended, or act in any other way relative thereto.

15. To see what action the Town will take relative to the removal of snow from the highways and if voted in the affirmative raise and appropriate money sufficient to carry the same into effect, or take any other action relative thereto.

16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of Woodbury Avenue, so called, as laid out and accepted by the Selectmen, bounded and descibed in the records of said Town of Pelham.

17. To see if the Town will vote to procure electric lighting for its streets in any portion of the Town, and if voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate money and appoint a committee to carry the same into effect or take any other action in relation thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to bond itself for \$25,000.00 to be expended for laying a road with crushed stone foundation from Pelham Center to the Dracut line or any part of that distance, or take any other action relative thereto.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Pelham qualified to vote in district affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 20th day of March 1926 at half past one o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the coming year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditor, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statuary obligation of the district or determined by the school board in its annual report.

9. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of school houses and buildings.

10. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for local High School.

11. To see if the district will vote to extend the course of the present High School one or more years, and if voted in the affirmative, to see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to carry this article into effect.

12. To see how much money the district will raise and appropriate for the tuition of pupils attending High Schools or Academies, and fix the amount to be paid by the School Board.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Union No. 27

To the School Board of Pelham,

Gentlemen:

I have the honor of submitting herewith my seventh annual report as superintendent of your schools and to it I have attached reports from your headmaster and your school nurse.

TEACHERS.

You were more fortunate in retaining your teachers for the present year than you have been at any time during the past seven years. Of the seven teachers in your employ, four had served one or more years in Pelham. The three new teachers are all normal graduates. It has been my observation from long experience that after a teacher has gained an acquaintance with the personalities and abilities of her pupils and a familiarity with the community that the efficiency of her school is much enhanced and that the teacher becomes a more vital part of the community life. The lawmakers in many of our states appreciating this fact have enacted statutes designed to lengthen the tenure of office of their teachers. I hope that an effort will be made to retain a large per cent of our present force for another year.

HIGH SCHOOL.

You now have a two year high school which has been approved each year by the State Board of Education. This approval is absolutely necessary to give the school any standing, whether for the purpose of admitting its pupils to other high schools or academies or for exempting the district from liability for tuition of pupils attending secondary schools elsewhere.

Now is the proper time for considering the advisability of extending the courses for another year. If a third year is added for the school year '26-'27, it would seem best to make the school a full four year high school next year. This is a momentous step and one which will have much influence on shaping the future of Pelham. This step should receive your most careful consideration that you may present the matter to the people with all the advantages derived from a four year high school and at the same time the difficulties involved in such an undertaking.

I have received from the State Board of Education the following suggested curriculum from the third and fourth years.

Should the district decide upon a third year, the following requirements would have to be met:(a)two full time teachers above grade VIII, (b) equipment for Physics or Biology, (c) a minimum list of reference books for each social science course offered, (d) the same conditions for approval would have to be met in respect to qualifications of teachers, attendance, program, standards, etc.

The estimated cost for a minimum equipment for teaching Physics is \$125, for Biology \$200. There should also be some kind of a cabinet provided for the storage of this equipment.

I hope that the Pelham people will fully appreciate the fact that although the small high school cannot offer the variety of curricula found in the large schools that there are decided advantages enjoyed by the pupils attending the small school. Among these advantages is the greater amount of individual attention received, that which the pupils from rural schools as a rule sadly need.

TESTS AND RECORDS.

I believe the time has arrived in the development of intelligence testing and in the application of the results thus obtained to the administration of public schools when we should have for our guidance the intelligence quotients of the pupils whom we are trying to train and instruct. It is, of course, true that these tests are far from perfect. They are designed to indicate the capability of the child for learning, and there seems to be no way of measuring any ability except by its manifestations. In other words, the child's capacity for learning has to be judged from what the child has actually learned. For this reason unfamiliarity with the English language or unusual environment may detract from the reliability of the tests as indicating general intelligence. This does not materially affect their value for purposes of school administration, for our problem deals with what the child is capable of learning in our school system as established.

Acting in accordance with this conviction and also because of the new obligation in regard to reporting defectives, which was imposed upon school superintendents by our last legislature, we are devoting considerable time to intelligence testing. Before next June we expect to have the intelligence quotients of all pupils above grade one in this union and to have them carefully tabulated and recorded on the permanent record cards. For this purpose group tests are being used and the individual tests are resorted to only in cases showing either unusually high or especially low ratings. Besides the assistance which the information thus derived will lend to the general administration. I believe that a familiarity with the general capacity for education of her pupils will greatly assist the teacher in varying the task in accordance with the varience in ability.

Theoretically these tests need never to be given but once in the school life of the child. The intelligence quotient is supposed to remain a permanent ratio.

I have prepared, had printed, and distributed a new permanent record card for preserving such data concerning the individual pupil as seems desirable for school purposes. The card which has been quite generally used for this purpose in school systems was designed two decades ago and called for but little of the data now obtainable and desirable for permanent record. It was of so little value that many of the smaller school districts failed to keep the cards filled in. Such I found to be the case in this union when I took charge and I have allowed this condition to continue. To overcome this laxity I have designed a new card which, omitting all useless data allows for the recording of all usable information which is easily obtained. These cards are preserved in the various schools and when a pupil is dismissed a copy is forwarded to the new school.
