WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rollinsford in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, One Selectman and Overseer of the Poor for a term of three years, One Road Agent. and Chief of the Fire Department.
- ART. 2 To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 2 per cent on all taxes of the 1941 levy, except poll taxes, paid on or before September 1st next.
- ART. 5. To see if the voters of the Town of Rollinsford will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes.
- ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the purpose of creating a me-

morial park on the site of the former Sullivan Schoolhouse, and to erect a suitable memorial tablet in honor of the men of this town, who served in the First World War.

- ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) for the purpose of extending the water-main on Broadway Extension, so called, in addition to that already laid. (By Petition).
- ART. 8. To hear the report of the committee, appointed at the last annual town-meeting, as to the advisability of establishing water-holes for fire prevention purposes, and to see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for such purposes.
- ART. 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Appropriations will begin at eleven (11) o'clock sharp.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER AND FOREST FIRE WARDEN

CITIZENS OF ROLLINSFORD:

WHOSE RESPONSIBILITY IS IT?

Never before in the history of the United States has it been more imperative that the municipalities of our country look to their fire defenses, with an eye toward determining the adequacy of their fire departments with respect to physical efficiency of operations. Whatever doubt there has been in the minds of the public as to the important task facing fire service in the erection of an impenetrable fence of National Civil Defense around the country, has been rapidly dispelled by continuous perusal of the columns of our daily newspapers and other periodicals. We now believe that it is not only desirable, but highly imperative that we expand our efforts in an endeavor to bring these points home to those who, although not of the fire service proper, are nevertheless, responsible for the purchase of much needed apparatus and equipment, and the provision of ample personnel to meet the heavy demand anticipated by the fire service. In this category we are particularly interested in the various taxpayers groups and the general public, whose actions influence the judgment of adequate appropriations for public safety. We also know that by far the majority of American cities and towns range from moderately to seriously lacking in fire defenses necessary to meet even the normal peace time demands of the communities. Unfortunately this holds only too true in the many of the medium towns of the country which, although not metropolitan in character, do encompass a great deal of industrial activity of vast importance.

The tendency toward retrogression in public expenditures, including those for the promotion of vital public safety, has been emphasized only too much during the last decade. While we agree in principle that the budget expenditures of our American cities and towns must be brought in line with the potential tax income to be realized, we nevertheless maintain in these times of trouble more than ever that responsibility of the municipality to provide public protection through an adequate fire service is vastly more essential than the improvements of certain streets, the construction of side walks, the construction of magnificent public buildings and the hundreds of similar outlets for expenditure of the taxpayers monies. We are particularly aggrieved over the action of many of the so-called "protective individuals and groups" whose main objects in reality seem to be inspired by the selfish and personal desires to save the expenditures of their own finances through essential taxation, without regard to public responsibilities and obligations, by being against any additional expenses a municipality may propose to undertake. This notwithstanding the fact that some of these additional expenses are accured through the dictates of wisdom with regard to personal and public safety. There are those who claim that National Defense Measures are a Federal responsibility. The facts of the case are that the Federlal Government has steadfastly maintained that the provision of defenses to protect the safety of lives and properties of the public is a local municipal responsibility. Up to the present time we see no evidence to lead us to believe that opinion will be altered, at least until such a time as the municipalties may have proven themselves incapable of the task. If, and when, such a time may come, we may reasonably expect the responsibility for this protection to shift to the Federal Government. but with such a shift may be involved many of the principles of our long standing heritage of democracy, namely the sacred privilege of local Home Rule. Again we ask. WHOSE RESPONSIBILITY IS IT?

Looking back 15 years we find one White fire truck three years old in your fire station, some two thousand feet of two and one-half inch single jacket hose, two ladders—one roof ladder of 12 feet and one extension of twenty-four feet. About 150 feet of three-quarter inch chemical hose attached to a 35 gallon chemical tank on White truck. Two, two and one-half gallon acid soda type hand extinguishers, on truck.

At the present writing, February 1, 1941, your fire station is twice the size of 1926. There are two fire trucks housed there, the 18 year old White and the 10 year old Ford. The Ford was inducted into service as Engine 1. in 1936, after being constructed and outfitted for fire service at an expense of \$700.00 to the town. There are today some 2,500 feet of two and one-half inch hose about half of which is double jacket to withstand pumper pressure. Each truck carries three ladders. The White carries one roof ladder of 20 feet, one extension ladder of 32 feet and one side wall of 10 feet. The Ford carries one roof ladder of 16 feet, one extension ladder of 24 feet and one short chimney ladder of 7 feet. The White truck carries 1.300 feet of two and one-half inch hose, 150 feet of three-quarter inch chemical hose, 6 soda acid type two and one-half gallon hand extinguishers, 2 hand axes, 1 pike pole, 1 crowbar, one door opener, 3 nozzles, two and one-half inch size, reversers, adapters, lanterns, wrenches, spanners, mittens and other necessary appliances including two 10 foot lengths of five inch smooth bore suction hose with 30 feet in reserve.

Your Ford truck is outfitted with a water tank of 225 gallon capacity, Booster Pump of 100 gallon capacity capable of drafting from brook, cistern, well, etc., thru two and one-half inch suction hose and discharging either two and one-half or one and one-half inch streams in conjunction with booster line of three-quarter inch. Your Ford carries 300 feet of two and one-half inch hose and 350 ft. of five-eighths inch hose, 500 ft. of one and one-half inch hose, and 200 ft. of three-quarter inch hose, with adapters to couple all the various sizes together to form one solid stream through the various size hose with nozzles, for each size stream. Your Ford carries 2 foamite two and one-half gallon size extinguishers, 2 wet battery hand wheat lights, 2 canister type all service gas masks in individual case, 1 set high voltage wire cutters, 1 large and 1 small firemans' pickaxes, 1 hand axe, 1 well stocked first aid kit, 1 steamer connection for hydrants equipped with this five inch outlet of which we have eight, three located on Dover Street, near Oak, and one each on Locust, Prospect, Willey and Pine Streets and one across street from Somersworth Foundry office.

Erected in your station we find a side-wall hose dryer where wet hose can be dried, cleaned and rolled to be placed in our lately constructed air-conditioned hose rack until needed on trucks. There is also an open front side-wall closet with hooks holding firemen's warm waterproof coats. Plenty of door room now at the station for the trucks to get in and out without damaging trucks or building and which also adds to a quicker getaway.

The private telephone on the wall at the station is a great asset for cooperation between the Chief's home and station when answering a telephone alarm.

This past year we have installed atop the town hall an electric siren which will answer admirably for a substitute alarm when our steam whistle is, for any reason, rendered useless.

The White truck received a \$1,500.00 overhauling and repair job at the plant of the White Motor Co. in Boston as voted last town meeting. It is my personal opinion that this overhauling job at a cost of \$1,50.00 on an 18 year old truck was not true economy, because you still have a truck 18 years old and will not stand up as would a new job which could have been purchased at just a trifle more than twice what was expended for the overhauling job voted for.

We should have at least 500 feet of new two and one-

half inch hose this year to replace old and delapidated hose now in service and and not dependable, the most of which is of the single jacket variety and dates back to 1919, much too old for service.

In regard to loss from fire this past year I might say we have not been hit so hard considering the thirty or more alarms. We suffered a complete loss of one large barn and contents when struck by lightening during an electrical storm and the other complete loss was a home and contents well removed from water supply for a quick stop.

In many instances we have been aided by fire departments from our neighboring towns for which assistance we are very thankful and we in turn have assisted in out of town fires which is the cooperative spirit among fire departments in this immediate vicinity. The grass, brush and woods fires have been far from troublesome during 1940 and the citizens are obeying the fire permit law by procuring the necessary permit from the Forest Fire Warden before kindling a fire in the open. Continue this good work and by obeying the state laws save valuable property.

Before concluding it is my pleasure to suggest, yes request, that the ten (10) percent cut in firemen's salaries be restored this year. Surely they earn all, and more, than they have as yet received in salaries and that ten percent cut, taken in good part by your firemen when things looked dark for the taxpayer, should now be returned to them, making their salaries budget \$50.00 per year. Think it over—Do they get it?

It is again time to sincerely thank all who have assisted us in the past and I am sure that your continued future assistance can only make for better cooperative fire fighting efficiency for future years.

The following has been prepared for you with the idea of having it inserted in your Town Report. If it meets with your approval please take it to the Selectmen and ask them to include it.

TO THE CITIZENS OF ROLLINSFORD:

Our forest lands represent a substantial proportion of the town's valuation. They provide income to our citiizens, from the sale of forest products and through employment to woods' workers. The protection of our forest lands is essential to the continued welfare of the town. Fire is the forests' worst enemy. It not only destroys the growing crop but leaves the land in such condition that nothing of value will grow for a long period of years. In addition it costs good tax money to extinguish forest fires.

An analysis of forest fire records indicate that 97 per cent are man-caused and consequently avoidable. Carelessness and failure to comply with reasonable regulations governing the building of fires in and near woodlands has been costly to both towns and individuals. Through elimination of the human equation, forest fire losses would be reduced to a minimum. This is possible if very citizen would be careful, familiarize himself wth burning regulations, comply with them and then use proper discretion.

We have been particularly fortunate in this town since the hurricane in not having had more serious fires. This is due in part to the strictness of our warden in issuing permits and splendid cooperation on the part of the public. Great care is needed because conditions in our blown-down areas are more critical with down material drying out and becoming more highly inflammable. THE CONTINUED COOPERATION of every one is necessary.

We should all remember that:

1. WRITTEN PERMISSION OF THE LOCAL FOR-EST FIRE WARDEN TO BURN brush, rubbish or other debris in or near woodlands or where fire may be communicated to woodlands IS NECESSARY WHEN THE GROUND IS NOT COVERED WITH SNOW. Violation of this requirement makes the responsible party liable—

- a. To a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.
- b. To the town for expenses incurred by the warden or deputy warden in attending or extingushing such fire.
- c. For damages to abutting owners if the fire runs onto the abutters' property.
- 2. It is a violation of the Forest Laws of the state to-
- a. Drop or throw any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire, from any vehicle while the same is upon a publc highway or private way.
- b. Drop, throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.
- Violation of these prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty by a fine of \$25.00.
- 3. You should promptly notify your local forest fire warden of any fires you see.
- 4. The forest laws are being more strictly enforced each year.

Your cooperation will save the warden considerable worry; you and your town much trouble and expense.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF ROLLINSFORD:

I have the honor to make my thirteenth annual report.

As usual the statistics are for the school year ending June, 1940 with comments on the work being done this year.

There has been no change in teachers. The professional spirit is very good as manifested by the willingness of the teachers to take courses for professional advancement. Last spring three of the teachers attended a course of sixteen lectures given at Portsmouth by Dr. Payson Smith of Harvard University. This fall term the same teachers have just completed a course of the same length given at Dover High School by Prof. Linwood C. Chase of Boston University. Your superintendent attended the same lectures and is thus better enabled to help the teachers put into practice what they have learned. Principal George Cross attended the N. H. U. summer session and plans to get his degree in June.

The Manual Training equipment is now quite well supplied and the electric range and sinks, very good ones, have been installed for the Domestic Arts. The boys built a large cooking table. This was very well done and saved the District quite a sum. Mrs. Martha Thayer Evans of Durham continues to teach the course and in addition is supervising the girls in the preparation of a self supporting hot dish for each noon lunch. Miss Margaret Thomas supervises the serving and remains during the noon hour, her services being paid for by the teachers. This plan will be very highly successful if it receives the approval of the pupils and parents, otherwise it is doomed to be a failure. It should be recognized that what is served one day may not be relished by all, but as large a variety will be served as can be and the cost kept low enough for the pupils to afford it. The Red Cross is contributing some funds to pay for free milk for the under-nourished and for lunches to the few who cannot afford the two and one-half or three cents per day.

As I write these lines the pupils are again taking the Metropolitan Achievement tests given in the middle of each year. The superintendent has personally scaled handwriting of all the pupils in his Union in grades above the second. Thelma Hamilton, of Grade 6, was marked as the best writer of the 600 pupils tested. This vear the Detroit First Grade Intelligence test was given and those who desired to enter the grade, and whose sixth birthday occurred after January first, were obliged to reach a six year old standard to remain in the school, as it has been determined that a child must have attained a mental maturity of at least six years, in order to be able to learn to read. The Standard Graduation tests will be used again in June with the eighth grade. Forty-two pupils are attending Dover High School and 12 Berwick Academy. The tuition rate at Dover has been reduced from \$100 to \$91 this year and a further reduction is promised for next year.

At the graduation exercises in June, Janis Eva Dodge and Lewis Jenetos were awarded the William Martel Post of the American Legion, medals.

The adult school is still holding sessions but as most of the pupils have received their naturalization papers, the class is small.

Statistically you will note from the table that the record for 1939-40 was good. The enrollment in September was less than last year but it has since increased to about the same number. St. Joseph's Parochial School reported 110 in attendance on October first.

To the Superintendent of School and Members of the School Board:
