To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Rumney Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

All articles not on the Ballot will be acted upon at 7:30 P. M.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Cemeteries.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common and the daily raising and lowering of the flag.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.
- 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post No. 76, American Legion for Memorial Day and other patriotic purposes.

- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$351.64 to secure from the State \$2,344.29 to be expended for Town Road Aid.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in co-operation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the operation of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth, N. H.
- 14. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to Civil Defense and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal Advice.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow a sum of money sufficient for the purchase of the Road Grader with Plow and Wing now on lease by the Town Highway Department and to authorize the Selectmen to trade in the F. W. D. Truck with Plow and Wing.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appriate or borrow a sum of money sufficient for the purchase of a new truck for the Town Highway Department and to authorize the Selectmen to sell or trade in the F. W. D. Truck.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to match a similar amount by the State for the purpose of cleaning our Fire Trails.
- 19. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to printing the inventories in the 1958 Town Report and raise and appropriate money for the same.

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its tax collector's sales.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 22. Shall the provision of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing games of Beano be adopted in this town.
- 23. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The surplus list has enabled the Fire Dept. to purchase a number of articles at a reduced cost.

The Air-Raid-Take-Cover alarm is a continuous wailing of our siren. When you hear this please "take cover" and listen for instructions on your radio until the "all clear" sounds, which is one blast.

Please do not use your telephone during an Air-Raid-Alert.

FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem — 97 per cent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable — a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires — all result in serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort — The rules are simple.

- 1. Don't burn at home use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
- 2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.

- 3. Be sure that all lighted material cigars, cigarettes and matches are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
- 4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
- 5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER — the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT TO THE RUMNEY SCHOOL BOARD

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your superintendent of schools:

I am sure that the school district is interested in knowing that the routine in your new school building has now been established and it is my opinion that the Rumney schools have never operated as well or as efficiently as they are now. You have a fine staff of teachers who work well together. The pupils also are benefiting from living, working, and studying together.

Our staff now includes Miss Nellie Ashley as principal, Mr. Seth O'Shea, Mrs. Amy Merrill, Mrs. Dawn White, Miss Mary Russell, Miss Ruth Russell and Mrs. Arline Wilson, music supervisor. Mr. O'Shea made a contractual agreement with us to teach in Rumney when he returned from the service and Mrs. Zaneta Collins substituted for him until he was released. Mrs. Marie Atherton retired in June and Mrs. Dawn White, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College in 1957, was employed to replace her.

It is very gratifying to see an extra-curricula program developing in your school and I am sure as time goes on, it will expand.

Your lunch program under the supervision of Mrs. Cross is another fine addition to your school and I think the numbers we serve indicate its success. Several fine compliments have been received from the State level concerning your program. At some future date you perhaps should consider another paid helper to assist Mrs. Cross.

We now have most of the books, supplies, and equipment we need. I am recommending and intend to introduce, as soon as the budget permits, a correlated science series for Grades 2 through 8. When the social studies books wear out, I would like to replace them with a new, revised edition that more nearly meets the State Social Studies Curriculum Guide.

Undoubtedly you are also interested in the article in your school warrant regarding a Helping Teacher. Several years ago the New Hampshire Legislature made it legal for some New Hampshire school districts to secure the services of a specially trained teacher to work with other teachers and children to make school systems more efficient. It was agreed that if such a person of whom the school districts approved were employed, the state would pay \$2500 toward the salary of this person. The remainder of the salary would be prorated among the several towns in the supervisory union on the same basis as other union expenses. Supervisory Union No. 48 has now become eligible for this service if it is desired. One law relating to this matter states that certain designated unions may employ a helping teacher so-called in accordance with Chapter 186, Section 24, of the New Hampshire School Laws when the majority of districts in said union vote for it in their annual meeting and towns so voting include at least 85% of the pupils in said union. If this article is voted in the affirmative, it merely gives the Supervisory Union Board power to act and money to act with if they desire and the district approves. The definition of a Helping Teacher is as follows: Helping Teacher, as referred to in paragraph XXIII, is defined as a teacher with specific training and experience which will enable her, or him, to give helpful advice, counsel, and assistance to teachers, pupils, and parents of a school system as a constructive

means of improving the educational growth and development of children, solving pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment, adopting the program of studies to meet the needs of the children and the community, bringing resources outside of the school to classroom teachers, pupils, parents, and community, and in general acting as consultant to the entire staff and community in recognition of the educational needs.

I have enjoyed very much this past year working with the building committee and the board of education on your school.

Please feel free to contact me either through your school board or personally on any educational problems that you may have.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent as per the following quotation:

"REPORTS. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of the Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1956-1957 received a salary of \$6150 which was made up as follows: \$2500 paid from the per capita tax and \$3650 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$900 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

This, plus \$900 travel allowance as indicated above totals \$7050 — amount received from State Treasurer for salary and travel of the Superintendent of Schools.

The regular work of the classroom has been supplemented by music under the direction of Mrs. Arline Wilson, and handwriting under Mr. Douglas Robinson.

The Hot Lunch Program, sponsored by the P.-T. A. has been most beneficial to the welfare of the children and is greatly appreciated. We wish to acknowledge the help of parents and friends in assisting Mrs. Cross.

Mr. Seth O'Shea joined our staff January first, and has a basketball program underway for the boys.

Your principal and teachers appreciate the honor and responsibility of serving you. Our best wishes for a good school year.

THE MUSIC PROGRAM IN RUMNEY

This first year in the new school has aided in the improvement of the music program as well as the academic and social aspects of school life. Your music supervisor has been able to devote the time formerly used for travel from school to school to increased time in the classrooms. A new record player with good tone and ample volume without distortion has been available to all classrooms and the records can be easily obtained when needed.

A Chorus has been formed of sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students which performed for the first time at the Christmas program in December. We also have a small girls' ensemble which presented a program for the Parent-Teacher Association and selections for the Christmas program.

Activities in the classrooms center around singing, with particular emphasis on pitch and tone quality. Two and three part singing is developed in the fourth through eighth grades. Rhythms such as marching, skipping, running, etc., are enjoyed in the lower grades, while rhythms for the upper grades include singing games and folk dances. Playing rhythm instruments with songs and recorded music aids in rhythmic development, with the older children using more intricate rhythm patterns. Appreciation of fine music is developed through listening to good recordings for phrases, melody, form, rhythm, harmony, tempo, mood, instruments, etc.

The majority of students have shown improvement in some or all of these activities and are gaining a better understanding of music.
