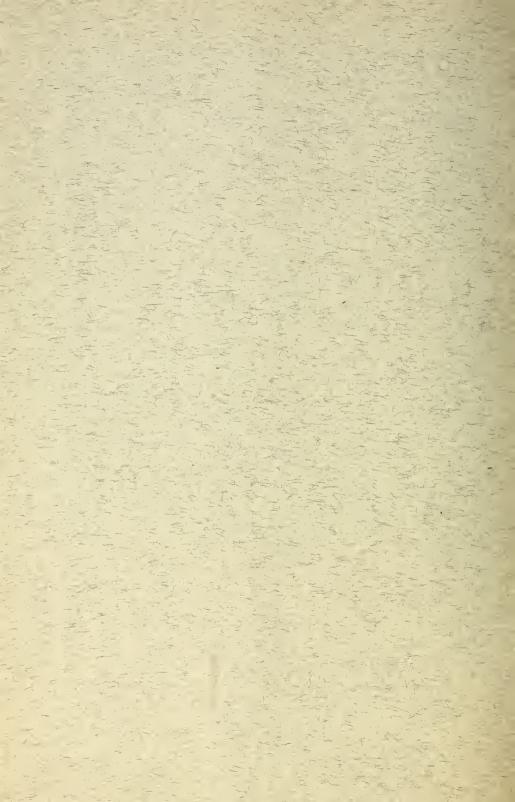

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
 - 3. To elect one Selectman for three years.
- 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To hear reports of agents, auditors and officers heretofore chosen.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust. (Estimate \$400.00).
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-five dollars (\$45.00) for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages

and resources of the Town together with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. (Estimate \$100.00).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$150.00 for the Franklin Hospital.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to build a new road to replace the Humphrey Road so-called, starting from Flag Hole Road so-called to Milton Humphrey's dwelling house, the Humphrey Road to be discontinued upon the layout and construction of the new road.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to rescind Article No. 14, relative to the Municipal Budget Law, as it appeared in the town report of 1935 and accepted at the annual Town Meeting of March 10, 1936.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Finance Committee of nine (9) members. Said committee to be elected one third for one year, one third for two years, and one third for three years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vacancies shall be filled by the remaining members of the Finance Committee until the next annual Town Meeting. This Finance Committee is to review the budget and make recommendations to the town meeting for expenditures on the budget and appropriations are to be voted on by the voters. The Finance Committee shall also have the authority to summon all boards, committees, and individuals before them to secure and ascertain necessary information pertaining to any and all appropriations.
- 15. To see what the Town wishes to do about recommendations by committee on roads.
- 16. To abolish the several highway districts in the town of Salisbury and to constitute the town one highway district.

- 17. To authorize the selectmen to appoint one or more highway agents for the ensuing year.
- 18. To elect by ballot one or more highway agents for the ensuing year.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to have the listing of all assessed property valuations in the town printed in the annual town report and become a permanent part of the town report until rescinded at an annual Town Meeting.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to grant the free use of the Town Hall to the Summer Theatre group known as the Salisbury Players for the period June 15th to September 15th, 1949 inclusive, without having to post a bond, subject to the supervision of a committee of three interested citizens to be elected at this Town Meeting.
- To authorize and empower the selectmen for and in behalf of the Town, to release and convey to the United States of America, either in and through condemnation proceedings or otherwise, a perpetual right and easement to overflow the public highways and bridges belonging to the Town and within the Blackwater Reservoir Project, so-called, a flood control project on the Blackwater River consisting of the Blackwater Dam and Reservoir, with a pool-full elevation of five hundred and sixty-six feet above sea level, as may be necessary for the construction, maintenance and operation of said dam and reservoir for flood control purposes, for the sum of Sixty-five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000), and further to authorize and empower the selectmen for and in behalf of the Town, to make, execute and deliver any and all such deeds, releases, assents, stipulations and agreements, including a release of any and all claims for damages to said highways and bridges, as may be necessary for the acquisition of said perpetual right and easement by the United States of America on said terms, and to do any and all such things as may be incidental or necessary thereto.
- 22. To establish out of funds received from the United States a capital reserve fund for capital improvements and capital expenditures and for the maintenance, repair and construction of the highways and bridges in which the United States may acquire easements.

23. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than three o'clock in the afternoon.

Given under our hands and seal, this twelfth day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-nine.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Salisbury qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Heights School in said district on the eighth day of March, 1949, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to the assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make contracts for the transportation of pupils that are most economical and efficient and will best serve the interests of the district. This action to rescind any previous district action relative to contracting for transportation of elementary pupils.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to build an addition at the Heights School and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) by the issuance of serial notes or bonds for the purpose of constructing and equipping the addition and any other expense incidental thereto, the School Board being given authority to issue said notes or bonds in the name of and on the credit of the District.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to contact the appropriate Federal Agency or Department for, and accept in the name of the District, any grants in aid or other monies made available by the United States Government for purposes of improvement of educational opportunities and school plant construction, and to execute any and all contracts, or instruments necessary to obtain said grants in aid or other monies.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to accept for the district any and all gifts they deem advisable.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 14. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into contracts for transportation up to and including three years.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE SCHOOL BOARD'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Salisbury:

When school began last fall we had less pupils in our elementary schools but more were attending high school than the year before. As of the first of February our average pupils per day are about the same as last year but our total registration is less.

High school tuition is going up and this will account for much of the increase in our budget as printed in this report. According to our records there will be more boys and girls in high school next year than this past year and our elementary registration will be about the same barring the possibility of a mill or mills moving into town and this might require the hiring of one or more buses.

The problem of securing teachers is still acute in New Hampshire (less then thirty will graduate from the two New Hampshire Normal schools next June), and we feel we have been most fortunate in being able to hold the two teachers we now have.

As for the schools themselves: we have installed a fire door at the Heights School and at South Road we hung the storm windows purchased last spring.

As you will note in the annual school warrant, we are recommending that the school district seriously consider the possibility of putting an addition on the Height's School and thus eliminate the use of the school at South Road. The superintendent's report also mentions about this article. The plan calls for the construction of and addition of a room about the same size as the present building.

Five possibilities of what the district might do to make the schools better and safer were suggested to the school board by the State Board of Education. A careful study was made of our requirements by a representative of the State Board of Education and the superintendent, Fred W. Snell. They suggested that the addition seemed to be the most logical and best plan for us.

The committee, elected at the last annual district meeting to study the possibilities of Salisbury joining with other towns to form a cooperative union, is giving their findings in a separate report.

The school board again wishes to express their sincere thanks to all who have helped to make the schools more pleasant and cheerful for the children. Our special thanks are extended to Mrs. Charles Brockstedt for her time and efforts with music at the Height's School and to Mr. and Mrs. James Campbell for their gift of paper supplies to the district.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Salisbury:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

In a recent publication regarding a White House Conference on Rural Education is found this statement, "Every rural child has a right to attend school in a satisfactory modern building. The building should be attractive, clean, sanitary, safe, equipped with materials and apparatus essential to the best teaching, planned as a community center and surrounded by ample space for playgrounds, gardens, landscaping and beautification."

With this statement in mind an analysis of our school plant shows that we are lacking in many of the conditions that every pupil has a right to expect. Our boys and girls in Salisbury certainly deserve and should have, facilities equal to those of any other school child in New Hampshire or the United States.

In order to bring about an improvement in the condition of our schools a number of proposals were studied. The final outcome of these many hours was that an addition be made at the Heights School to house the youngsters who are now attending the South Road School. A decided improvement in our system would be had by bringing about this consolidation into a single unit and allowing for the installation of modern toilet facilities, drinking water, heating and lighting improvements. It would alleviate our most glaring fault, that of the location and danger at the South Road School. Improvements might also be brought about in the transportation facilities for the pupils of the district. I recommend that you give considerable thought to the article calling for the building of an addition to the Heights School.

A recent survey of the district showed that we were decidedly lacking in playground space for our boys and girls. It might be well for us to consider, at some future

date, the possibility of obtaining more land for this purpose. The survey also showed that with the present projected figures for the census we will not be overcrowded to any great extent unless we have people with large families moving into the district. When the enrollment in the eight grades becomes taxing on the facilities the District should consider making arrangements with other districts for the education of the seventh and eighth grades.

We have made many accomplishments during the past year. Improvements in the spelling systems and language have been made. It is our hope that improvements in the way of textbooks can be made this year in the field of Social Studies. Your teachers attended a Social Studies Workshop and have been considering texts for use in the new outline to be adopted by the State. Another needed field is health and science. Once these are accomplished we will then be on a firm rotation period in regard to replacement of old texts by the adoption of newer ones, thereby bringing to the boys and girls the very latest materials.

Through the cooperation of the Parent Teachers Association we are most fortunate in being able to have a projector to use at the schools. We are most grateful to them for this. It will serve to give to your boys and girls many materials which they would not be able to gain without the projector.

The cooperation of the citizens, the School Board and the teachers has been appreciated and for this I am grateful. I hope that the spirit will continue and that we will all do our part in making the very best of the opportunity which we have in improving the lot of our boys and girls. It is only through our cooperative efforts that we will make for improvement in the schools. My relationships with all in Salisbury have been most pleasant and I look forward to a continuation of these for many years.
