FOREWORD

Estimated expenditures for 1949 exceed actual expenditures for 1948 by better than \$5,000. At present values this represents a tax rate rise of about \$12.30 thus raising the rate from \$34.60 to about \$46.90 per thousand dollars of value.

The causes for this sharp rise in our budget are due primarily to increases in the School District Appropriations and the cost of the proposed new bridge on the Fremont Road near Reverend Chapman's summer place. Scrutiny of these two items is invited.

It is suggested that the voters keep in mind while the budget is under discussion, that for every thousand dollars appropriated the rate will rise about \$2.46 per thousand of value, or conversely, if the present tax rate of \$34.60 is to be maintained, your assessors shall have to raise values about \$28,900 for every thousand dollars appropriated.

Raising either values or rates, or both, has proved to be quite unpopular with those taxpayers (60 per cent of total) who are nonresident and therefore have no voice in budget matters.

The voters of the town are, therefore, urged to consider the budget carefully making certain that the town receives full value in return for the appropriations made.

TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the town of Sandown in the County of Rockingham in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sandown on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 1A. To see if the town will postpone consideration of all articles of the warrant starting with article two until seven of the clock in the evening of the same date in order to give those voters who necessarily are employed, an opportunity to discuss and vote on these items.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to accept Town Road Aid: State to contribute \$1,375; Town to raise an estimated amount of \$353.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Bridge Aid: State to contribute \$4,500; Town to raise an estimated amount of \$1,500.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of, at either public or private sale, property taken through Tax Collectors Deeds.
- 7. To see if the town will appropriate \$100 towards the general rehabilitation and continued maintenance of the Central Cemetery.
- 8. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to help pay for the painting of the Old Meeting House.
- 9. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to be expended for fire control purposes. Suggested sum is now included in the proper budget item.
- 10. To see if the town will appropriate \$50.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust, State and Federal Governments to contribute an undetermined amount.
- 11. To see if the town will voe to appropriate \$325 for an eight foot wing to be used in conjunction with the snow plow.

- 12. To see if the town will accept for public use and maintenance a piece of road twenty five (25) feet wide situated at Angle Pond and starting at the Hampstead-Sandown line and proceeding north-easterly and westerly in the general direction of said pond, seven hundred (700) feet more or less and in accordance with plan of William Lancaster, C. E. dated 1941 as recorded at Exeter, for J. Lape and F. N. Pillsbury.
- 13. To see if the town will appropriate \$300 to perform a land control survey and assessors' plan for that portion of the Angle Pond Area lying within the limits of Sandown.
- 14. To see if the town will raise \$100 for the purchase of kitchen equipment for the town hall.
- 15. To see if the town will raise \$40 for economic advancement of the town through the publicity and promotional services' of the Seacoast Regiment Development Association.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to increase the treasurer's salary from \$60 to \$100 per annum.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

At the Town Meeting of March 9th., 1948, the Town chose a committee of seven to study fire protection needs and appropriated the sum of \$500 to be used for the purchase of equipment.

The committee decided, that with this appropriation as a foundation something definite could be accomplished. A Volunteer Fire-Dept., was organized and a Volunteer Fire Association was formed to aid in the support of the Department.

SCHOOL WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Sandown qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fourth day of March 1949, at eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500, each year for six years to be held in a capital reserve fund for the purpose of building a new consolidated school and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come beforethis meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the Citizens and School Board of Sandown:

It is with pleasure that I submit my second report as Superintendent of your schools.

The major problem facing all of us today is finding the money to give our children the type of education they should have. All phases of education are costing more money and there seems little chance of a recession. Studies show that our elementary schools will have a large increase in enrollment, during the next 8-10 years and we will feel this in the High Schools after 1960. Larger and better school facilities are needed badly. It is hoped that some form of State or Federal Legislation will aid this situation financially in the near future. This item needs your active support so that the property tax will not continue to carry such a heavy burden.

As the number of eight grade one-room rural schools are decreasing rapidly in New Hampshire it becomes very difficult to obtain teachers for them. Due to this fact, the State Board of Education alloted to Sandown \$900 in emergency State Aid for use in grading its schools and allowing for additional transportation. Schools opened in September 1948 with grades 1-4 at the Pine School and grades 5-8 at the Clark School. This change has proven for the best interests of your children and a visit to your schools will convince you of this fact.

GUIDANCE

No school can have an efficient instructional program without knowing what it is accomplishing. It must know what is happening to boys and girls as well as what it is teaching them. The children in your schools are being given new type intelligence tests this year that measure both verbal and non-verbal. These tests will tell what a child is thinking as well as doing. Parents are urged to consult with teachers concerning their child's school progress.

The tests are being corrected and processed in the Superintendent's Office thus saving much valuable teacher time. Standardized Achievement tests will be given next year.

VISUAL AIDS

During the fall, I received a war surplus sound motion picture projector for use in your schools. This was obtained through the State Board of Education. This machine is for the use of Sandown, Brentwood and Fremont. To date six films have been shown to each school and films are planned for each month during the balance of the school year. Pictures concern health, safety, conservation, science, geography and history. The use of motion pictures supplements text-books and is a valuable aid in the process of education.

REPAIRS

During the summer both schools were thoroughly cleaned and painted. The boys and girls toilets also received paint and cleaning. Your schools are in clean excellent condition, but still lack modern conveniences. Parents and friends are urged to visit schools to seetheir condition and witness teaching processes.

TEACHERS

Mrs. Martha Guinesso of Derry was hired to replace Joan Moody who is now teaching in Dover. Mrs. Guinesso teaches in the Pine School grades 1-4 and is a graduate of Lowell State Teachers. College followed by eight years of teaching experience.

P. T. A.

A. P. T. A. was started in Sandown this year. It is hoped that a strong organization will grow to aid your children. Such a group is an excellent means of cooperatively working out school problems and furthering the cause of better education through understanding.

AN INVITATION

The schools are yours! Why not visit them while in session? Teachers welcome visits of parents to class as well as to public assemblies. The home and the school should cooperatively work together for the development of your children. Parents should take a little time to acquaint themselves with school problems and get to know the teachers and accept them as friends. Greater public participation in school affairs is a crying need in this community and deserves your support.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, teachers, pupils and citizens of the community for their hearty cooperation during the past year.

The health of the school children during 1947-1948 was unusually good. We had no serious epidemics.

The annual health examination of eyes, ears, teeth, throats and skin was made during the early part of the school year. This examination was followed up with home calls for the correction of physical defects, and any other conditions which would result in having healthier and happier children.

The usual health program is being carried on with frequent visits to the schools, close contact with parents, teachers and pupils.

Our greatest need is dental work. It is impossible to secure the services of a dentist for clinic work. This condition exist all through the State. Therefore I ask the parents to secure their own family dentist and get their children to him at least once a year.

I sincerely thank the School Board, teachers, parents and many others for their continued fine cooperation.
