

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their annual report for the year ending December 31, 1917, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Jailor, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician and Auditors for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1917.

Mr. O. A. Putnam, as Superintendent and Mrs. Putnam, as Matron remain in charge of the Farm and Almshouse.

We believe they look carefully after all the interests of the county, also the welfare of those committed to their care.

The Convention of 1917, voted the sum of eighteen hundred dollars, to be used in the construction and equipment of a vault for the use of the County Commissioners and for doors to a vault already constructed in the basement under the vault used by the Register of Probate.

A contract for building the new vault and equipping same with metal shelves and files for papers together with the repairs to the vault in the basement was made with Offices Bank and Library Co. of Boston.

The Commissioners find the new vault very convenient and trust it will be useful in the future in protecting the papers and vouchers contained therein.

The vault in the basement will be used for the safekeeping of books and papers, not frequently referred to now in the vaults in the offices on the first floor. All of the vaults on the first floor are filled to overflowing.

We wish to thank the overseers of the poor and selectmen in the several towns for their hearty co-operation in the past, and to urge them to lookout, as carefully as possible, in the future for the expense of taking care of those needing assistance.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

Gentlemen:—For certain details relating to the prosecution of the criminal laws during the period between April 1 and December 31, 1917, I would call your attention to the table I am herewith submitting. In addition to the matters shown in the table I have handled five juvenile cases resulting in the commitment of three delinquents to the State Industrial School and two neglected children to the custody of the State Board of Charities and Correction. Four injunctions have been obtained restraining liquor nuisances. Twenty-three prosecutions were begun by search and seizure process, thirteen for keeping liquors for illegal sale, five for keeping gambling machines, and five for larceny. In each case the goods sought for were found and convictions resulted. In connection with the prosecution of one drunk eighteen quarts of spirituous liquors found in his possession were destroyed by order of the Municipal Court of Newport. Seven libels for the forfeiture of liquors illegally kept for sale have been prosecuted with the result that eleven and one-half gallons, eighty-four quarts and one pint of spirituous liquors, four barrels of cider, and eight barrels of beer have been forfeited and turned over to the County Commissioners by order of the Municipal Court of Claremont.

The enactment of penal laws relating to automobiles, labor; health, pure food, fish and game, juveniles, etc., etc., has in recent years greatly enlarged the scope of the work of the prosecuting officer. In my opinion our County has been relatively free of crimes that were *malum in se*. A large portion of crimes of certain classes are committed by our immigrant population. I

age purposes.
think that better methods of making good American citizens of them could be found than by branding them as criminals for doing the things that are customary with them.

As usual violations of the liquor laws require much attention. A number of cider joints and "Clubs" have received my attention: It is my hope that the illegality of the distribution of liquors by fraternal organizations among their members may be better understood. The giving and filling of prescriptions for liquors by physicians and druggists is much abused and must receive attention. A stop, so far as possible, must also be put to the traffic in Jamaica Ginger and certain patent medicines for bever-

Much of the success of the Solicitor's work depends upon the faithfulness and efficiency of the Sheriffs and Police Forces. The wholehearted support and effective coöperation of these officials during the past year has been deeply appreciated by the Solicitor and should command the commendation of all citizens who are desirous of having such offices filled by men who are able and willing to perform their duties in accordance with their oaths.

No continued cases remain upon the criminal docket except two indictments against a respondent who is at large.

No civil suits in which the County is a party are pending except one against the town of Andover seeking reimbursement for expenditures in aid of one who had, as we believe, a settlement in said town.
